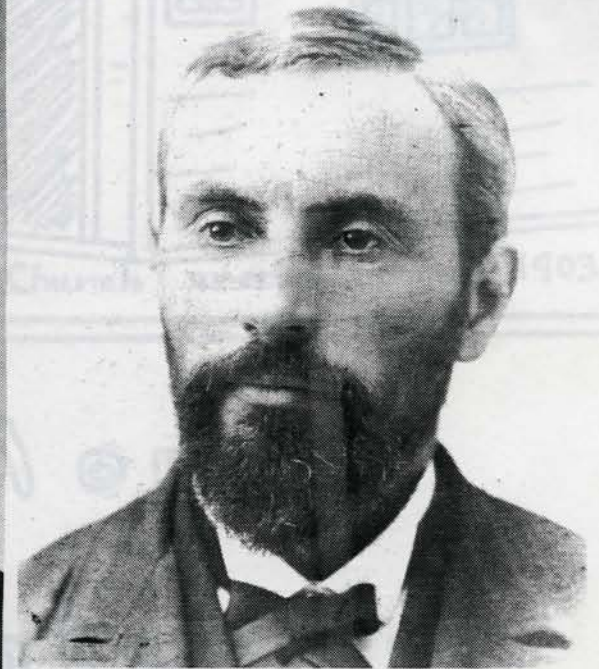

A memorial service was held Friday at Salt Spring Island to mark the 100th anniversary of the arrival here of Thomas William and Jane Manson Mouat.

Seventy-five grandchildren, great-grandchildren and great-great-grandchildren gathered at Gangés United Church for the occasion. Also present was Mrs. Jessie Mouat Toynbee, 88, the only surviving child of Thomas and Jane Mouat.

Following lunch in the church hall, a private family service of remembrance and thanksgiving was held. Rev. Al Skinner and Rev. John Bailey conducted the service while Mae George was the organist.

The lives of early family members were recalled and tributes paid to them with a special tribute to Jane Manson Mouat, who was known as Grannie Mouat to early islanders.

Reflection: That Pioneer Spirit - Rev. Allister N. Skinner

First, let me say how I appreciate this opportunity to share with you on this historic occasion.

I feel we need to put more emphasis on going back to our roots and catch that homesteading spirit of 100 years ago.

What tremendous pleasure and inspiration we can find through our inspirations with pioneers; by listening to their stories we can come to appreciate our rich heritage!

I am deeply moved at sharing in this large gathering of the extended Mouat clan. I am most aware of that invisible cloud of witness that surround us and are with us in spirit today.

One of my favorite hymns contains the lines:

For all the saints who from their labours rest,
Who thee by faith before the world confessed,
Thy name, O Jesus; be forever blest. Alleuia!
And when the strife is fierce, the warfare long,
Steals on the ear the distant triumph - song,
And hearts are brave again, and arms are strong
Alleulia!

As I have looked back over the historic documents of our church, I find records of the baptisms, marriages and funerals of many of the Mouat families. Just to mention two: on January 1, 1924 : Richard Toynbee and Jessie Mouat were married; yes, and there is the record of Colin Mouat's baptism.

The lives and memories of such individuals are an inspiration to us.

I would like to recall and re-capture the special qualities of our pioneers in the Mouat family here on Salt Spring!

I believe their spirit is of Christ and the Christian life.

1. **FAITH!** I believe at the heart of a meaningful and relevant faith is the spirit of risk and adventure. Just put yourselves back in the shoes of your family as the Mouats leave the familiar surroundings of the Shetland Islands. Feel, with them, what it must have been like to launch out into the unknown, not knowing what was ahead, but seeking a good living standard, freedom, progress, educational

opportunities, strong family life. They adventured out with a vision and a dream of a future in resources and opportunities.

We recall the ancient words of the author of Proverbs: "where there is no vision, the people perish." 29:18

As the poet, Langston Hughes, expressed it:

Hold fast to the dreams
For if dreams die
Life is a broken-winged bird
That cannot fly.
Hold fast to dreams
For when dreams go
Life is a barren field
Frozen with snow.

Their dreams fulfilled because of their spirit of faith, risk and adventure.

We are faced with many challenges today that are going to require of us a high spirit of risk and adventure to deal with them in a creative and imaginative way. We'll need that pioneer spirit of sacrifice and hard work!

2. **Perserverance, endurance and resilience** are three key marks of the pioneer spirit.

As you recall the Mouat story, you'll find that the families in the early years experienced terrible disappointments, hardships, set-backs and heart breaks.

We can stand in awe of their tremendous spirit of determination that enabled them to make the best of each situation. The good results that have prevailed even after terrible suffering.

Through courageous stubbornness, your forebearers were able to "hang in there" and find the solution to problems and difficulties as they arose.

Their spirit of peace and serenity in the midst of turmoil and difficulties, recalls for us the words of Christ, "I have said this to you, that in me you may have peace. In the world you have tribulation, but be of good cheer, I have overcome the world." John 16:33

3. **Creativity, innovation and ingenuity** were remarkable pioneer traits well exemplified in the Mouat families.

4. **Neighbourliness and hospitality** were prevalent in our pioneer families.

Think of the barn-raising and harvesting workbees. People were the most important feature of life back a hundred years ago; each person contributed for the benefit of all. And all recall how they made their own entertainment, a spirit which is hard to be equalled today.

If you look back at the marriage patterns, most of the pioneers married neighbors within a half-mile radius of where each grew up together.

Today's patterns are markedly changed and how we need the spirit of family togetherness today!

5. **Belief in God** - our Supreme Creator; His Church and the Worship of God were of top priority in the pioneer spirit of the Mouats.

The extended Mouat families played key roles in all the Churches, of all denominations on this Island.

Louis Evely in his book, *The Gospels Without Myth*, speaks of the Presence which prevailed the lives of the pioneering Mouats.

God is not an idea,
or a definition
that we have committed to memory;
God is a Presence
which we experience
in our hearts.

Your forefathers and mothers knew well the truth of Jesus' words: " Do not lay up for yourselves treasures on earth, where moth and rust consume and where thieves break in and steal, but lay up for yourselves treasures in heaven.

Mathew 6:19

Edward Farrell, the poet, reminds us of this profound teaching of Jesus, in his lines: We Forget :

We ask for a piece of sand
and God gives us a beach.
We ask for a drop of water
and God gives us an ocean.
We ask for time
and God gives us life eternal.
And it is so easy for us
to fall in love with the gift
and forget the Giver.

The Mouat family has passed on the flame of faith to us, ours is the challenge to keep it burning.

As St. Paul expressed it, "... and like living stones be yourselves built into a spiritual house." Peter 2:5

Yes, that pioneer spirit as it applies to self, family, Church and through:

6. Service to the Community! You will find the Mouat names on the records of every Church, club and organization on Salt Spring. From the Hospital Board to the School Board, from political parties to service organizations, from the Agricultural Society to the Islands Trust; only to mention a few.

Your family did not live their faith selfishly or in isolation, but gave of their best with a keen sense of humor, cheerfulness, and humility.

Let these qualities of our pioneer roots, which are qualities of God-likeness, inspire our lives and the lives of future generations.

Living by their spirit, then we'll have noble people -

- strong family life
- a strong Church - a strong community
- a strong nation and a better world.

Let us crowd our lives with deeds that will be worth remembering and treasuring.

Let us pray:

Blessing, and glory, and wisdom, and thanksgiving, and honour, and power, love and might, be unto our God for ever and ever. Amen.

Jane Mouat

1859 - 1935

Today's service of thanksgiving is taking place to commemorate the centennial of the arrival on Salt Spring Island of the Mouats and to honour those family members who settled here in 1885. Among them was one who, during the ensuing fifty years, came to be loved and respected by everybody who knew her, and especially by those of us who were privileged to call her Grandmother.

Jane Mouat was born in 1859 in Sandwick, Shetland, the eldest of four children of William Manson and Janet Ramsey Manson. Life in a Shetland croft could not have been easy, but Jane, her sisters Barbara and Margaret, and her brother William did enjoy the good fortune of growing up within a loving family.

In 1882, Jane Manson married Thomas William Mouat, a widower with a young son, Thomas William, then seven years of age. They made their home in the village of Cullester where a daughter, Margaret was born. Shortly thereafter, in May of 1884, the family immigrated to North America accompanied by Tom's maternal grandmother and Jane's sister Barbara. Other relatives had immigrated earlier.

As a trans-Canada railway had yet to be completed, they journeyed across the continent on an American railway, stopping in Spokane where Gavin, an elder brother of Thomas Mouat lived, and where in August Jane

gave birth to her second child, a son, William Manson. A short time later, the little party, now increased to seven, travelled to Nanaimo where relatives of the Mouat and Manson families lived.

Thomas Mouat rented a house and obtained employment as book-keeper in the store of Mr. Broadwell. Coal dust in the Nanaimo air aggravated a lung condition Thomas had developed while working as a stone mason in Shetland, so the family sought another place to make their home. Mr. Broadwell recommended a farm adjoining his on Salt Spring Island. And so it was that on February 8th, 1885 the family arrived at Vesuvius and proceeded to the farm on the shore of St. Mary's Lake. This was to be their home for the next twenty-two years.

Those years, as well as the ones which were to follow, tested Jane Mouat very severely. Farm life involved long hours, and hard work. A rapidly growing family had to be fed, clothed and educated, but that was only part of the burden. In addition there were heavy medical expenses. Robust health and longevity, unfortunately, were not blessings enjoyed by all members of the family. Jane's husband, Thomas William, passed away in 1898 at the age of 45, while just a few months later her youngest child, Grace, also died. Four more of the eleven children were to predecease Jane. But Jane Mouat was not to be defeated by adversity and grief. Without her steadfast courage, in the face of personal tragedy, the farm and later the store and the boarding house could not have succeeded.

There is no doubt that Jane Mouat would have been unable to cope with all of the demands life made on her had it not been for the great contributions of her children, particularly the older ones. It is equally certain that the family was able to overcome its difficulties and reverses

only because of the guidance and leadership that she provided. She was a good mother, but also much more. Her bravery, determination and generosity were an inspiration to all who came into contact with her. Though having to face far more than her share of sorrows, she was essentially a cheerful person. There was no place in her heart for bitterness or self-pity.

Jane Mouat was not just a professing Christian. She lived her religion and practised it every day. Even when times were difficult for her own family, she could never deny help to others in need. A follower of the Golden Rule, she also adhered to the precept, "Hate the sin, but love the sinner." Though a firm supporter of temperance, she had compassion for those with drinking problems. Slow to anger, nevertheless she had a social conscience that caused her to protest vigorously what she held to be wrong.

Although a devout Christian and an advocate of high moral standards, Jane Mouat could not be classed as having been reactionary or narrow-minded in outlook. She was not above flouting convention. At a time when the horse was starting to be replaced by the automobile and petitions were being widely circulated to keep cars off the Island, Jane Mouat, in order to be able to discuss the problem intelligently, took the risk of being thought indecorous by some of her friends and rode over some of the more dangerous roads with a Victoria salesman who had brought one of the first cars to Salt Spring.

Another occasion, and one which even disturbed some members of her own family, was when, on a Sunday, she attended a C.C.F. meeting in Ganges, where ways and means of dealing with the great economic

depression were being discussed. She firmly believed in debate and co-operation.

Jane Mouat was a supporter of numerous organizations working for the betterment of the community. Among the groups to which she belonged were the Hospital Board, the Sunshine Guild, the I.O.D.E. and the Ladies' Aid. She was a loyal member of the Methodist Church and subsequently the United Church of Canada. A regular church attender, there were few Sundays that did not find her in her second row seat. After such close and life-long church connections, it was perhaps fitting that death should have come to her while in Vancouver attending the 1935 B.C. Conference of the United Church.

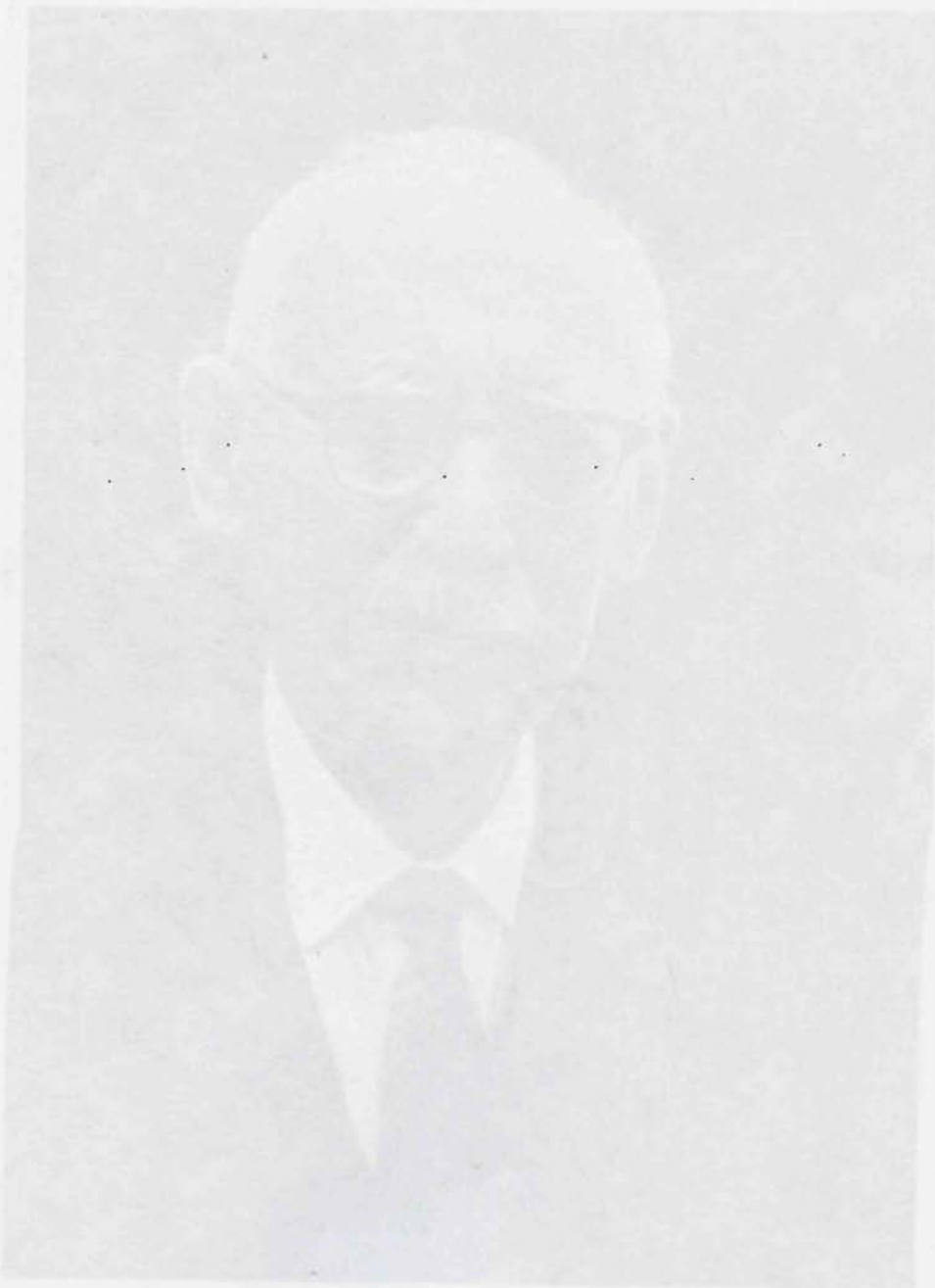
As I had just turned eight when Grandmother passed away, my memories of her are those of a young child. Among the things I can recall is the warm manner in which she welcomed a little boy. Scones, cookies or cake were always at hand to satisfy his hearty appetite. Then there were her busy fingers which went on with crocheting, carding, spinning, or knitting while conversation took place. Often I would be given the job of holding up my arms while she wrapped newly-spun yarn around them to form skeins. She was fond of children. Indeed, she had boundless love for all who were members of her large family. A notable manifestation of this was the annual Christmas gathering at the old "boarding house" which was her home for so long. A visit with Grandmother was an occasion.

As we look back over the past century of our family, it is only right that special recognition should be accorded to Jane Mouat. She was a great and remarkable lady who directly and indirectly contributed much to

all of us. Fifty years after her death we still have ample reason to remember our grandmother with pride and to honour her name.

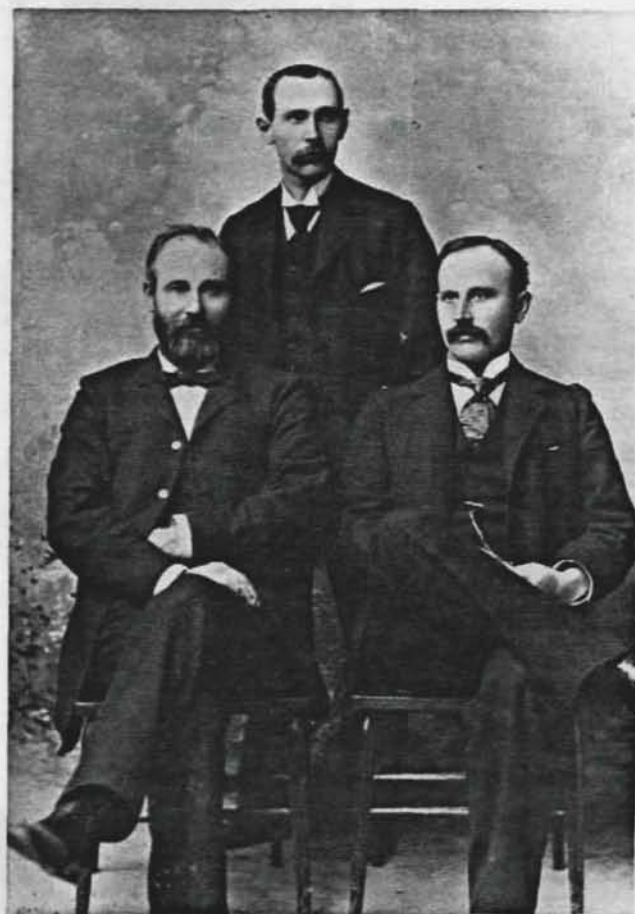
The youngest daughter, Grace, was born after her father's death and lived for only three months.

Shetland Islanders on leaving their homeland to seek a new life, have tended to settle again on islands; New Zealand, Fiji, Hawaii, Vancouver Island and the Gulf Islands. Thomas and Jane Mouat chose a beautiful spot on St. Mary's Lake, Salt Spring Island.

They very quickly became active members of the youthful Island Community. There was much to be accomplished in order that the settlement supplied the spiritual, physical and educational needs of growing families. The Methodist Church, the Public School, the Lady Minto Gulf Islands Hospital, the Agricultural Society and other Island Organizations all bear witness to their desire and devotion to help make the Island a better place to live and prosper.

Jane Mouat, in spite of her husband's illness, became an ardent supporter of all these efforts and many more. The sons, daughters, and grandchildren of Thomas and Jane have carried on the example set for them of devotion to and active participation in Island affairs. They have been particularly aware of the needs both financially and physically of the Civic Projects of Salt Spring. Donations have been made to Lady Minto Gulf Islands Hospital and its surrounding Health Care Units; Intensive Care and Greenwoods. Much volunteer work in and gifts to the various churches have been given. The Educational System has played an important part in Island life. Scholarships in Perpetuity have been set up in memory of various family members. In September 1961, Gavin C. Mouat on behalf of the Mouat family, presented Mouat Park to the British Columbia Government. Also, that year, donated to the North Salt Spring Waterworks District was approximately 120 acres, surrounding half of Maxwell Lake, for the protection of the community water supply.

This year, the Hundredth Anniversary of the Mouats' residence on Salt Spring Island, the present members of the family are donating Gates to the Ganges Cemetery. It is intended to enlarge the scope of the Memorial Gift to include some project in the area of the site of the original Mouat's Store. An account has been set up at the Ganges Bank of Montreal to which any member of the family may contribute if they wish.

Two of Jane Mouat's recipes -
favourites of her grandchildren

GRANNIE'S BUNS

1 cup milk	2 tbsp. yeast
4 tbsp, lard or butter	1 tsp. salt
4 tbsp. sugar	About 5 cups flour
2 eggs	

Scald milk with butter. Dissolve yeast in 2 tbsp. warm water to which 1 tsp. sugar has been added. Let sit for 10 minutes. Add the rest of the sugar to the hot milk. Beat eggs well and add eggs and yeast to milk which has been cooled to body temperature. Add flour, one cup at a time and heat in as much as possible. Knead well. Put in greased bowl. Grease top of dough, cover with cloth and let rise in a warm place until double in bulk. Punch down and form into buns. Let rise again. Bake at 375°F. approximately 20 minutes.

GRANNIE'S SHORTBREAD

1 lb. butter
4 cups all-purpose flour
2 tbsp. brown sugar
2 tbsp. icing sugar

Knead for 20 minutes at least and the more, the better. Roll out to 1/3 inch thick and cut into pieces. Bake at 325°F. until very light brown. Store in airtight container. Keeps well.

AUNT MAGGIE'S RECIPES

AUNT MAGGIE'S SCONES

2 cups flour	½ tsp. salt
½ tsp. soda	½ cup sugar
½ tsp. cream of tartar	1 cup soured cream

Mix with as little handling as possible. Roll out. Cut. Bake 12 to 15 minutes at approximately 375°F.

SHETLAND HOT MILK CAKE

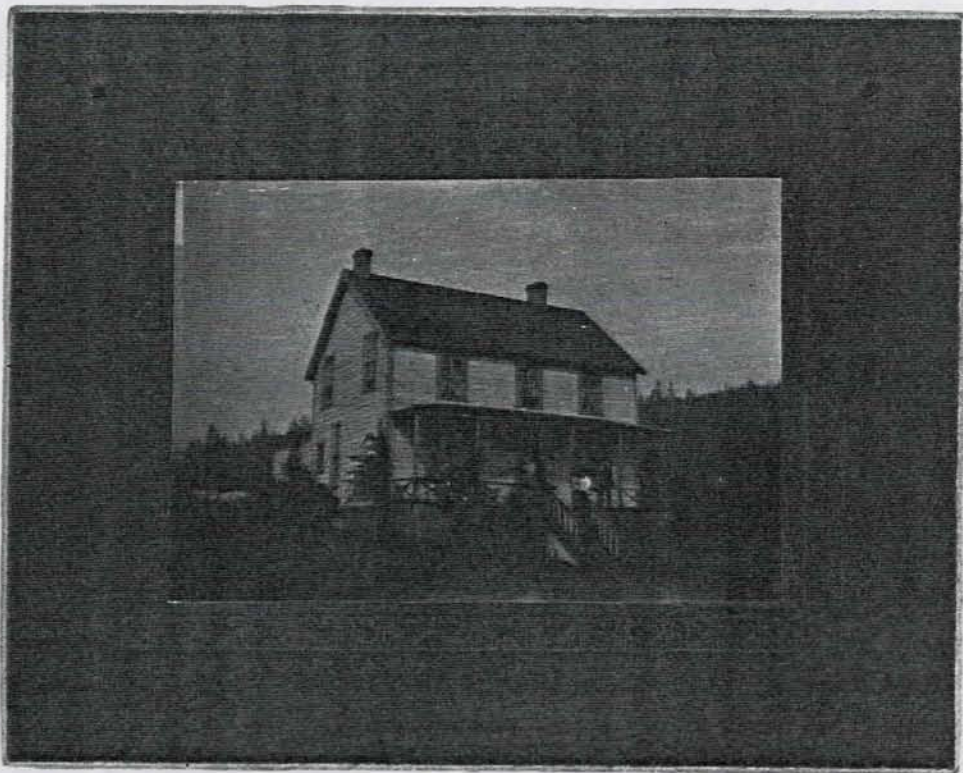
(Aunt Maggie's ?)

1 cup sugar	½ cup milk
3 eggs	Butter the size of an egg (2 tbsps)
1 cup flour (cake)	1 tsp vanilla
1½ tsp. baking powder	Pinch of salt

Beat sugar and eggs together until light and fluffy. Sift flour, baking powder and salt three times. Add to egg mixture and fold in milk and butter which have been heated to boiling point. Add vanilla. Put into 9 inch ungreased tube pan or 9 inch square pan. Bake in 300°F. oven for 45-55 minutes. When done remove from oven and invert on cake rack until cool. Sprinkle with powdered sugar.
