The ladies of St. Mark's guild have presented St. Mark's Church with a handsome new altar cloth, also hangings for the pulpit and prayer desk.

St. Mark's Church was very prettily decorated for Easter Sunday with primroses, hyacinths, daffodils, wild lilies, etc., intertwined with ivy and moss. There was a crowded congregation, good singing, and a hearty service. After the Easter services were over the wreaths were taken to the cemetery and placed on the graves.

At a meeting of St. Mark's Church committee, held at Mr. A. Walter's house, April 25th, it was resolved to raise the sum of \$35 by subscription, for needed church repairs and improvements. It is thought necessary to strengthen the walls of the church by an iron rod across the centre, and the church requires to be painted, besides several other minor repairs.

A design for the memorial to Queen Victoria, which it is proposed to place in the West End of St. Mark's Church, has been received. It represents the Royal Arms with inscriptions beneath, and the cost is \$125.00. About half this amount has thus far been paid in or promised, and it is hoped that some contributors may renew their subscriptions next winter, which, with the donations and possibly the proceeds of a concert, will bring up the amount to the required sum, so that the window may be ready at least for Coronation Day.
