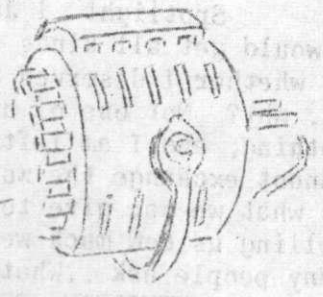

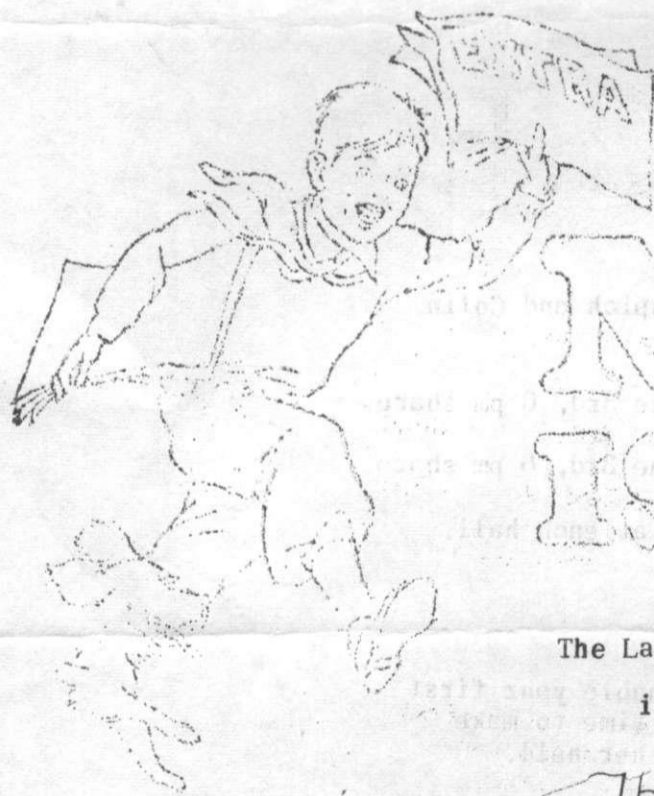

CIVILIAN DEFENCE

In the event of air raids on the Gulf Islands, the first thing to do is, of course, to go to Australia immediately. But for those who don't care for sea voyages, there are other things to be done, and they should be done now. At the Ottawa level, there are a series of booklets, mostly costing 10¢ each, issued by the Queen's Printer, which give useful information and instructions. At the local level, the following report shows what is being done on Salt Spring.

"DISASTER NURSING SERVICE. A start has been made toward the forming of a Civil Defence Zone on Salt Spring Island. The first meeting was held at Mrs Roddis' at Fulford on April 23. Ten women were present. Discussions on forming a Zone Committee, commencing Home and Disaster Nursing lectures in September and getting a more complete list of available nurses as enrolled, too place. New enrollees are to contact Mrs A.G.Lett, Captain, Ganges or Mrs Nancy Roddis, Co-captain, Fulford.

"In September there will be a lecture in A.B.C. Warfare Nursing, and it is essential that all nurses take this course. The lecturer from Victoria will be on the island for five days while giving the course. This course is comprised of three lectures by doct-

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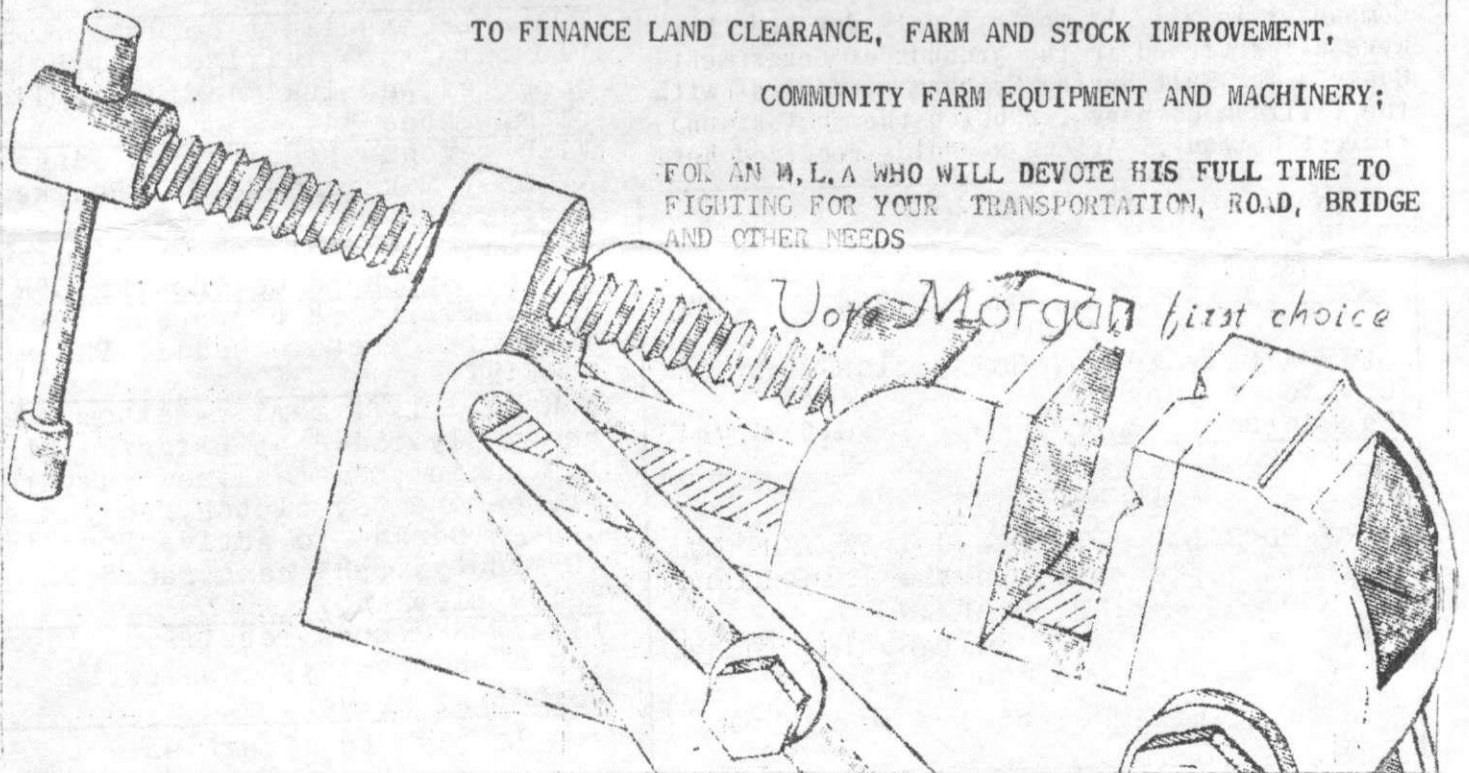

IT HAPPENED IN 1920

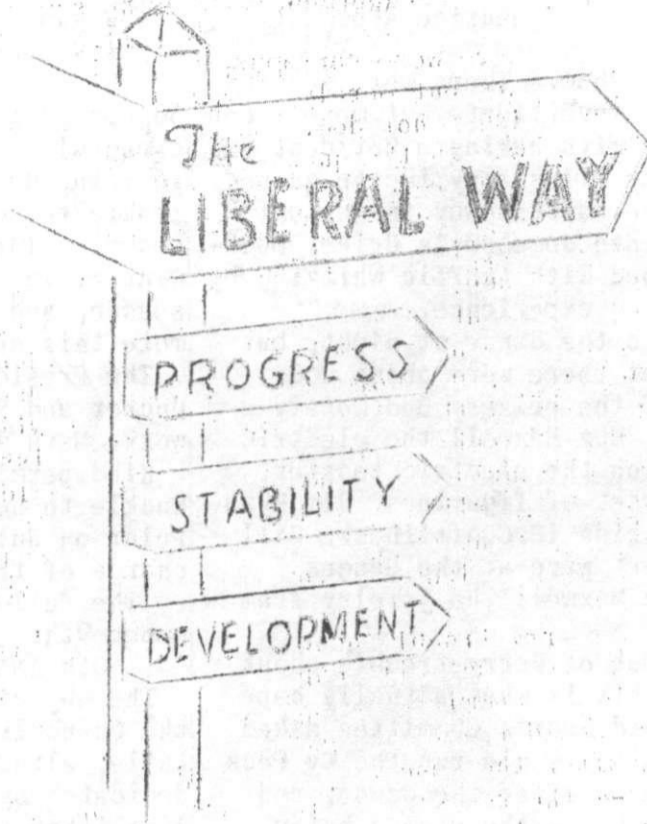
