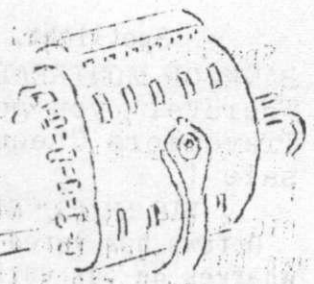

BIG SHIPS, BIG WHARVES, BIG MONEY.

Ottawa has voted the following monies for the wharves on our various islands: Galiano \$105,000, Mayne \$126,000, Saturna \$44,500, Pender \$42,000, Salt Spring \$19,000. All this is very good news. The C.P.R. plan, according to reports, is to connect Vancouver and Sidney by the Gulf Islands run. Sidney has been voted for her wharves \$180,000 with an additional \$27,000 for her wharf at Roberts Bay. Our wharves, after repairs, should take care of any traffic.

Our islands owe a debt of gratitude to the Gulf Islands Improvement Bureau (and to its Secretary, Capt. I.G. Denroche) for the hard work they put in bringing the necessity for wharf improvement & repairs to the attention of the responsible Ministers and Officials. Well done!

NORTH S.S. WATERWORKS DISTRICT.

The Annual Meeting elected two Trustees, Colin Mouat & Arthur Millner, and the Auditor, H.A. Lees (Note: the chap who took his hat returned it.) and consisted of some 75 voters, Chief Engineer Pagett of the Department & some 25 or 30 others interested in one way or another. Some people thought that the present water rate of \$4.00 a month was too high; H.J. Carlin suggested that the minimum should be raised to 3,000 gallons, V.C. Best in two short and witty speeches asked who was going to repair his fences knocked down during pipe laying operations (The Waterworks) but the burning question was whether the Ganges & Vesuvius systems should be connected by a water main. The meeting thought they should be (60 for, 15 against). The question was how it should be financed.

Gavin Mouat, the Chairman, said he thought that the new pipe line could be financed on the present debenture issue, \$120,000 (\$41,000 not issued, \$800 redeemed, \$78,000 issued at par recently -- Vesuvius took \$75,000, Ganges \$3,000). It should cost 71¢ a foot for 3½ to 3¾ miles or about \$12,000. He was adverse to taxing land if the owner didn't get water. On the other hand the District was a very queer shape, & he had considered the advisability of extending it to include all the North Division of Salt Spring. There were at present 197 water connections, and he expected an increased revenue of \$1,500 next year which would more or less take care of the present operating deficit of some \$1,575. He hoped to bring down the water rates in 4 or 5 years time.

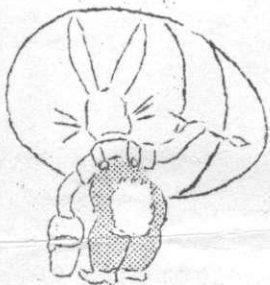

CHAMBER OF COMMERCE COUNCIL.

18Mar. The Committee looking after Garbage Disposal made their report, got the green light from the Council, went out got a suitable piece of land made arrangements with the Medical, Health & Police Officers, and have made it open for the convenience of the public. The credit for this goes to the President of the Committee V. Case Morris & his helpers. The disposal place is up the Cranberry Road, and anybody can dump their garbage there. People who want their garbage collected can make private arrangements with J.M. Dorval 72q.

The Street Lighting Committee reported that as a condition of getting 30 lights in all (6 at Vesuvius, 18 at Ganges, 6 at Fulford) it has to pay for 4 @ \$2 a month plus tax making \$98.88 a year. It also pays for the lamp replacements, a minimum of 3 cases @ \$26.79 for the streets and say \$12 for the wharf at Ganges making a total of \$190.25 minimum. So they're out to raise \$200 from somewhere.

Clean-up week will be 20 to 26 April. Ganges is looking a bit better now.

The Council had taken up the report of the Fulford Committee regarding the Fulford Bridge & seawall, and the Department of Public Works had requested the District Engineer to inspect these works and take the necessary action. The Committee would find out whether a garbage disposal area was needed, or could be obtained at Fulford. Clean-up would present little difficulty as this has been done well by the Christophers in the past.

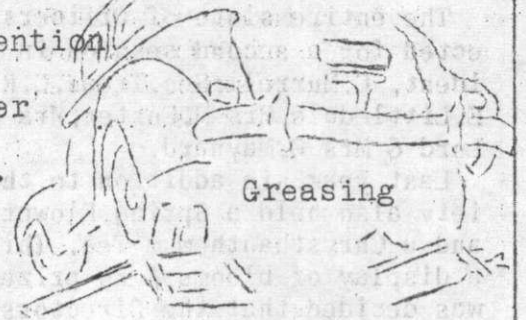

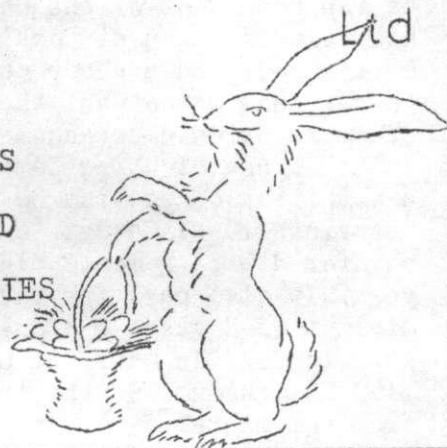

FULFORD PUBLIC MEETING

40th ANNIVERSARY OF THE GUILD OF SUNSHINE.

The Guild of Sunshine has lent your editor a synopsis of its meetings since it was first organized in 1911, and your editor would like to express his thanks for being allowed both to read and use such an interesting document. "The purpose of this Guild is to unite the sympathy of its members towards helping each other; our institutions; or any other benevolent interest or object which may be decided on by the majority of its members; thus trying to brighten others lives & bring sunshine to all." It is non-political and non-sectarian. It works on Salt Spring only.

Over \$1,000 has been provided by the Guild for its purpose since its inception, and it seems to have had a remarkable stability -- Mrs G.J. Mouat was President, on & off, for 11 years, Mrs A. Walters, the 1st President, was Hon. President for most of the 40 years.

The document is a very human one. In the strain of the First War years the meetings must have been short, for there is a suggestion that members should have some story to tell or incident to relate after the business was over; and in 1919 (the time of the Bright Young Thing's wasn't it?) when at the time of a proposed dance it was heard that certain ladies intended to come in fancy dress as men, it was moved that the Secretary write to them and request them not to do so! What the Secretary did is not recorded! And how, at many a meeting, do we wish we had the courage of the proposer & seconder who in 1919 moved that it would be more business-like to attend to the business in hand at the meetings and indulge in general conversation when the business was ended!

But the Guild was always very busy. In 1917 it did the catering for the Agricultural Assn Show (this stopped in 1923); it bought a piano which it turned over to the Assn in return for the free use of the Mahon Hall... Forty years spent in bringing sunshine into other people's lives is a very fine record to have.

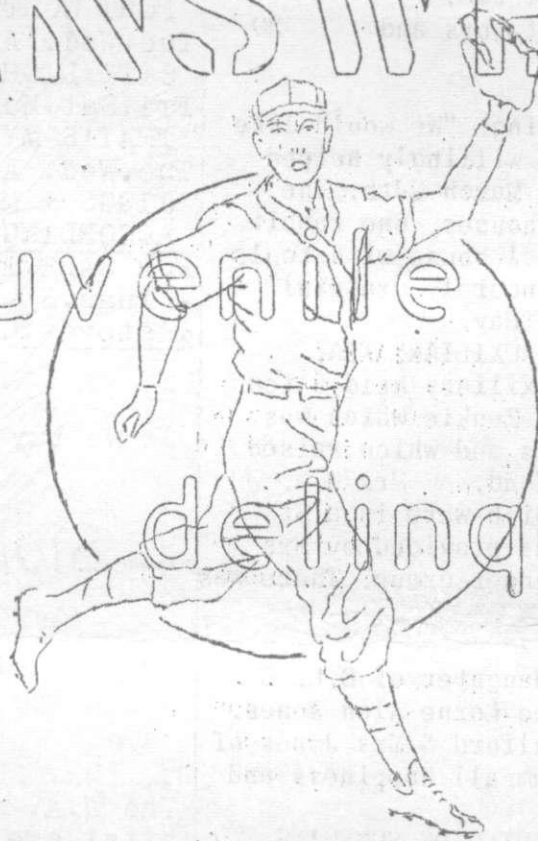
