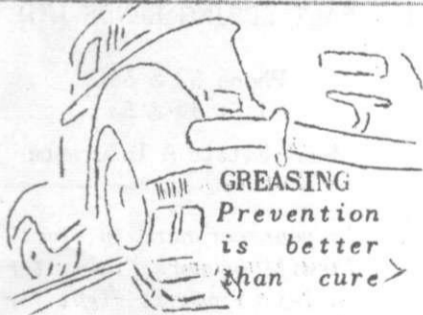

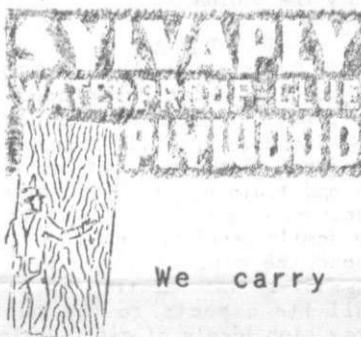

There is a long area of open sea to the southeast, from which full force of southeast storms reach this harbour. Some protection is given by the island offshore, but it may not be possible to put the landing far enough in to get full protection.

The westerly wind gives trouble at times and there would be no protection. Possibly also there should be a breakwater and pile dolphins against the lee shore to enable the ferry to turn round and head out in unfavorable weather.

The Isabella Point road is 3½ mi. long and the last 2½ miles has excessive grades and ends at a high elevation above the water at the harbour. This 2½ miles of road would have to be moved nearer the coast.

In 1945 a minimum cost for the road would have been \$35,000 and for the construction of a new landing \$30,000.

The distance to Swartz Bay to Fulford by ferry route is 6.3 miles and to Isabella Point, 3.5. In a one-way trip taking say one hour the docking time at both ends takes about 20 mins. In 1945 it was calculated that only 14 mins. per trip would be saved by the Isabella route.

Robert Larmour attended the meeting and was presented with a \$200.00 scholarship which had been awarded to him by the Legion.


