The highlights of the business session was the presentation of the Director's Report, the Credit Committee's Report, and the report of the Supervisory Committee. One new director was elected, Mr. M. The Vancouver Island Hospitals' Regional Council held their 1950 Spring Meeting on Salt Spring last Friday and Saturday. 190 participants attended the various meetings and functions. Mr. E.C. Cooley, President of the Regional Council, and Chairman of the Board of Management of the Campbell River Hospital, stated that this was the largest attendance of any Regional Council meeting that he has attended.

The agenda began on Friday at 2 pm with welcoming speeches by the President, Mr. Cooley, and Mr. Henry Giegerich, Chairman of the Board of Management of the Lady Minto Gulf Islands Hospital. Later a group discussion was held, under the direction of the Panel Members' Chairman, Mr. Ian Dodds. This was followed by a series of short speeches, by different members, on various hospital problems. The last speech on the agenda was presented by Dr. A. Francis of Ganges. It was titled "Relation of Medical Staff to Board of Trustees in a Small Hospital." Dr. Francis stated, in part, "...It is very fine to have such new and modern facilities, (as has been provided by the B.C.H.I.S.) but that is only the beginning. To give the greatest benefit to the greatest number, we must attract modern well-trained doctors and nurses." He goes on to say, "that two essentials are needed: adequate equipment to make special operative procedures possible in a

and Captain L.B.D. Drummond was also at the meeting.

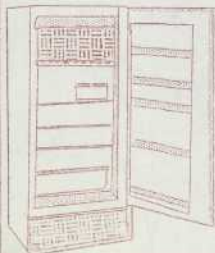

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NEW BANK MANAGER.
 The Bank of Montreal has announced the appointment of John C. West, as manager of its Ganges branch, succeeding John H.P. Frederick who becomes assistant manager at the Kelowna B of M. Born and educated in Toronto, Mr. West, joined the bank there in 1931 and subsequently served in six branches in the city. In 1941 he moved to Trenton, Ont., and the following year enlisted in the R.C.A.F. and became a flying officer. During his three years service with the R.C.A.F. he completed 52 operational flights on anti-submarine patrol and convoy escort duty over the Atlantic, and was mentioned in dispatches. He returned to the Trenton branch in 1945 and five years later was made accountant at Fort Erie, Ont. He also served at Woodstock, Ont., in the same capacity from 1955 to 1957, when he became assistant manager at a London, England, branch. Last May he moved to the assistant general manager's department in Vancouver, the post he now leaves. Mr. West is actively interested in boys' work and the Lions Club, and is also a keen sportsman. The departing manager, Mr. Frederick, leaves Ganges after two years, during which time he was vice-president of the Salt Spring Chamber of Commerce, director of the Salt Spring Island Lions Club, financial chairman of the Canadian Legion, president of the Ganges Badminton Club, an executive of the Bullock Farm Tennis Club and a member of the 5 o'clock Cricket Club. He expects to move to his new post at the end of the month.

OUR CORMORANT SITE----IT'S OLD BUT IS IT RARE?

Those snaky black birds in their dead nesting trees out in Ganges harbour cause a lot of craning, straining and borrowing of the captain's glasses when the Cy Peck or the Island Princess brings a load of visitors up past the tail of the Chain Islands.

Yet, local knowledge of these interesting inhabitants seems to be rather scanty. How long have they been there? Do they move from island to island? They are cormorants, but are they Baird's Pelagic, Violet Green or Double-Crested?

Old timers say they have been there for a long time and definitely do not go in for island-hopping. Guy Cunningham, who watched them as a small boy from his family home on Beddis Road, says they have been there "since the beginning of time". Captain V.C. Beat, slightly more conservative, puts it at "at least forty years".

What variety? It is possible that we have an ornithological rarity in our aquatic back yard. An admittedly ancient (1936) publication of the Provincial Museum, says that, in 1933, only two nesting sites of the double crested cormorant had been reported inside the B.C. boundary. One of these was Bare Island, off Sidney, and the other, the Ballingall Islets near Montague Harbour. The description of the Ballingall site tallies closely with our own.

It would seem that these three sites are the northern limit of a breeding area that stretches all the way to Lower California. Is there a dedicated local bird-watcher who can say for sure that Ganges Harbour has the distinction of offering its hospitality to PHALACROCORAX AURITUS, the double-crested cormorant, who much prefers, as a rule, to raise his family south of the border.

THE GUILD OF SUNSHINE

Next year will be the 50th anniversary of the organization of the Guild of Sunshine. Among its organizers and first president was Mrs.

Arthur Walters.

The first annual meeting was held in 1912 and the elected officers were: Mrs. Layard, President, Mrs. Dean, 1st Vice President and Mrs. Bastin, Secretary. In 1915 the constitution was drafted as follows: "The purpose of this Guild is to unite the sympathy of its members towards helping each other: Our neighbours, our institutions, or any other benevolent interest or object which may be decided by the majority of its members: thus trying to brighten other lives, and bring sunshine to all."

The first money gift to Lady Minto Hospital was given in 1917 and the first Hospital "shower" was given and organized in that year. In 1918 a piano was bought for use in Mahon Hall. The first tea and sale using daffodils as decorations was put on April 2nd, 1921.

Over the past 50 years money gifts have amounted to, at least, \$6,000., in all cases, gifts of charity. During the 10 years preceeding 1932 an annual gift of \$25.00 was given to the Hospital. This is a very creditable record for such a small but active group of ladies, as, "Spreaders of Sunshine."

The Spaniards had constant woes and troubles in their possessions but this was not so in the Brasils, where there was a more gentle Atmosphere.

I was sorry for the poor creatures, for they seemed Educated and Christian men, and having escaped the one Violence offered them in America, had straightaway fallen into fresh threats of Violence and worse. There was no news but I was very civilly entertained by the brothers Manoel and Estalao Betancort, who showed me their holding. They discoursed of many things and advised me that two others were from Portugal and St. Mary Lake, being Jose and De Larvo Norton. A TRAVELLER IN ROME by H.V. Morton.

If you cannot be tempted away from the blazing comfort of beachwood in the fireplace, if the garden promises to be too delightful in Spring to be deserted, and if---this is the big one--- you cannot afford to make a grand tour to Rome, then H.V. Morton is your man. Sitting by your fireside you cannot find a better vehicle in which to visit the city that is called Eternal.

Mr. Morton, who wrote this book in 1957, has a list of travel volumes to his credit that reach the bottom of the page. Don't shy away from him; he does NOT write "guide" books. What Mr. Morton does do, and very pleasantly, is to take you on wanderings through Rome on all levels---civic and social. He introduces you to writers and diplomats; he digs back into history to bring alive the magnificent ruins of Rome and breathes life into tyrants long dead and beautiful women long forgotten.

Mr. Morton covers Rome by walking and as he walks he dreams aloud of the people who once trod the same pavements. He is much too much of a skillful hand to belabour subjects to the point of boredom or to clutter up his account with "amazing" incidents and "quaint" people. Yes, he visited The Catacombs and in doing so with him you will have some misapprehensions on that subject cleared up.
