

TENANT-ELECTORS - British subjects of the full age of twenty-one years and corporations which are and have been continuously for not less than six months immediately prior to the submission of the declaration provided for in Section 69 of the Public Schools Act, tenants in occupation of real property within the school district and whose names or the names of which are not entered on the list as owner-electors or resident-electors.

CORPORATIONS are not automatically placed on the list and those Corporations qualifying as owners of property or as tenant-electors must also file a written authorization under the seal of the Corporation naming some person of the full age of twenty-one years who is a British subject to be its agent on behalf of such corporation. Such authorization shall be filed with the Secretary-Treasurer not later than August 31st, 1960.


We have been visited by Mr. Walch, who complains it is increasing difficult to find Employment on Salt Spring, there seeming an atmosphere of Hostility and suspicion on the part of the Settlers, for what reason he knew not, neither would the Settlers divulge it to him when taxed direct. In subsequent Conversation, Mr. Walch referred to the Guakuitl or Kwakuitl Tribe of Vancouver Island and said they reminded him strangely of the Polynesians of the South Pacific, where he had spent several

years in Trading. He spoke also with Eloquence, as seen with the eyes of a Poet, of the amazing beauty of the Sandwich Isles, where he was for Four years and might have been now but for the quirks of Fate. It was apparent to us that this Memory stirred in him the strongest Emotions, of which one was a deadly Anger and it was my father who in his Simplicity and intuitive Sympathy drew Mr. Walch to unburden himself of the Dross of human experience. Though the Story be common enough, I will in Brief fashion set it down. It transpired that Mr. Walch had prospered greatly in his Trading ventures and being hugely attracted by a young Lady, the daughter of the Owner of several Trading Schooners, he had made a proposal of marriage and was accepted. While on a Trade run which took much longer than anticipated, an unscrupulous if well-mannered, smooth tongued Englishman supplented him and persuaded the young Lady to elope with him to San Francisco, where they married. Mr. Walch took the matter very much Amiss and the Sandwich Isles becoming repulsive to him, he proceeded to the Californian Gold-diggings, where he did not fare well. Returning to San Francisco to book a passage for Fort Victoria, he made Discreet enquiry and found the young Lady had died of a Galloping Consumption, brought about, he thought, through the Nefarious activities of her husband, who despite the Lawlessness of San Francisco twas compelled to leave it and her in a hurry. Of this same Englishman, Mr. Walch said it was discovered after his departure from the Sandwich Isles that he had defrauded many Persons in a most skilled and consummate manner. My father offered Mr. Walch three days employ, to be paid for by a Parcel of our Mellowest Tobacco, the offer being gladly

(CONT'D FROM P.8) DIARY Mr. Walch gauged a body of Indians, accompanied by a White man, to have passed in the night. I was filled with unease over this happening.

20 of March, 1867

The night was vastly disturbed by the persistent Howling across the wastes to each other of the Wolves, one seeming close to our Cabin. Just Prior to dawn, Mr. Walch requested we let him out and he slipped through the door like a shadow, Pistol in hand. Scarce had he gone, when we heard two shots and sallying after him, found he had Accounted for one of these pests a bare forty paces from the Cabin. Contrary to the usual Dark colouring, this was a ... lightish Brown, a fearsome looking Beast. These Wolves are a perpetual; skulking Menace in Salt Spring and I doubt if we will ever be rid of them. It is said that in the grim Winter of 1862, so impudent they and the Bears became, Settlers were attacked in the light of day, many being mauled. It was with keen regret we bade Farewell to Mr. Walch late noon. This mountain is lonely.



FORESTS CLOSED!

Forest closure for zones #1 & #9 went into effect at midnight, August 9th. These zones cover Southern Vancouver Island, the Gulf Islands and the Fraser Valley. This means that virtually all the beaches, forests, etc are closed. No boat may pull up on a beach, no picnics, no camping, and it goes without saying, no fires. The only way a person can go salt

water fishing is to leave from a designated docking area or your own private property. And you must return to a designated docking area or to your own private property. However, the commercial camping areas will be operating with a permit. Camping and tenting will be allowed at Scott Point Marina, Welbury Point, Circle K. Ranch, and other commercial areas, providing they have a pemit. The public will be allowed to use Vesuvius Beach. The government park & marina at Montague Harbour at Galiano Is. is closed as such places as Tent Island. The

forestry boys are busily posting closure signs throughout the Gulf Islands. Anyone caught disobeying the closure law is subject to prosecution and the penalties are stiff.
