DOG TRIALS

"Casey", a poodle owned by Mrs. J. H. Harkema of S.S.I. was the outstanding dog at the dog trials held at the Fulford Community Hall last Sunday afternoon. Scoring 198 1/2 points out of a possible 200, "Casey" won 2 cups; the Novice A class cup, donated by W.P. Evans, president of the S.S.I. Dog Obedience Training Club, and the cup for the best local dog, donated by the Mt. Brenton D.O.T.C. Of the 37 dogs entered, 11 were from S.S.I. the others being from Victoria, Mt. Brenton, Nanaimo, Cowichan, Alberni, North Sanich and Parksville. Four of the dogs from S.S.I. qualified for the Novice A class by scoring 170 points or more. Mrs. N.A. Howland's dog, "Pup" scored 183; 'Pe g" owned by Mrs. Irene Hawksworth, 187; "Kyp", Mr. W.Addy, 184 and "Casey" with 1981/2. The points are scored on such things as heeling on leash, examination, heeling free, recall, 1 minute sitting and 3 minutes lying down. The S.S.I. dogs have had only 12 weeks training under the guidance of Mrs. A. Best and four such dogs qualifying is looked-upon as a tremendous success. There was competition in Novice B class, Open A Class, Open B Class and Utility Class. These competitions were won by off-island dogs. Approximately 100 people attended the trials. Refreshments were served by the South Salt Spring Islands Women's Institute. The judge was Dr. E. Johnson, a veterinarian, from Cobble Hill. Harold Hoffman of S.S.I. was Trial Secretary. New classes for the dogs of S.S.I. will start in September.

SCHOOL BOARD MEETINGS School Board meetings are public meetings. But you could not tell that by the attendance. At the two meetings covered by DRIFTWOOD no one else attended and by all indications no one of the general public has attended one in a long time. The school trustees have the heavy responsibility of providing for your children's education and they over-see the spending of nearly a quarter of a million dollars of the public money. Granted the meetings are dull and lengthy, but the non-attendance of the public is what makes them dull and lengthy. With no one to watch the meetings week after week, the meetings become sloppy and many hours are wasted on petty wrangling that should have been done in committee. We think the P.T.A. is especially derelict in it's duty by not having a representative at every meeting and reporting back to the P.T.A. If the P.T.A. is really interested in better schools and better education, how could they miss this important facet of the educational picture? And how can people, who profess to be vitally interested in education, go out and vote for a school trustee when they have never seen the man in action or know his voting record or know what he stands for? DRIFTWOOD has been at two meetings and we will attend more, but we do not have the space to report verbatim what the public should hear for them-Island. selves. At present there is a wide area of mis-understanding between some school trustees and DRIFTWOOD on responsibilities of the press. We believe that anything said at a public (CONT'D NEXT COLUMN)

meeting is legitimate to print, but, admittedly, some of the things discussed at present meetings should be discussed in the privacy of committee meetings. In fairness to the board, who is not used to having an eager press at their elbow, we will print only their insipid press release at this time. But beginning next month, in fairness to our readers, we will print what we see and hear at the school board's meetings. The next meeting is on August 11th. Will the P.T.A. be there?

PRESS RELEASE

Mr. J.G.Reid reported that the Summer School was now in session with 136 pupils attending, more than the registered 133. The Teaching Staff is eight including Mrs. F.M. Hepburn from District No. 64. Mrs. Hepburn also is looking after the transportation for the Island students on the trip to and from Vesuvius Bay, with the Ladysmith Bus connecting at the Crofton end of the ferry run for the trip to and from Duncan. An addition is to be built to the Saturna Island School necessary from the increased enrollment. Tenders are being called with the completion date to be for the commencement of the School Term. Advertising for teachers to fill vacancies occurred since the closing of the School Term had taken place and applications are being processed and positions filled.

Mr. Scot Clarke has donated a sign for the Mahon Hall; thus fill-ing a long felt need for the identification of the hall to visitors on the Island.

The summer work program was outlined -covering painting at Saturna and Mayne Teacherages and tidying up of grounds, fencing the school property at Pender Island, and substantial repairs to the roof of the school at Ganges.

CHARLES GARDNER

Charles Gardner, well-known, long-time resident of Salt Spring Island passed away on July 25th at the Lady Minto Hospital at the age of 93. Mr. Gardner, who was in excellent health until two weeks before his death, was born in Stratford-on-Avon, England, Feb. 18th, 1867. He first came to Salt Spring Island in 1894, but did not settle permanently here until 1904, at which time he began his farm in the Cranberry District. Mr. Gardner was married in Victoria in 1903 to Miss Florence Search of England. She died in 1943. Mr. Gardner is survived by two sons, Mervyn of Salt Spring Is. and Audley of Victoria; and one daughter, Mrs. Freda Little of Port Alberni. He is also survived by one sister, Mrs. Firth of Edson, Alberta, five grandchildren, one great-grandchild and many neices and nephews. The funeral will be at St. George's Church in Ganges on Thurs. July, 28. Internment will be at St. Mark's Cemetery under the direction of the Haywards Funeral Home. Pallbearers will be Bob Collins, Jack Nelson, V. Case-Morris, Ted Brown, Gavin Mouat, and Hal Van Buskirk.
