



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

Some selected excerpts from a Diary, said to have been found with sundry letters in rubbish removed from a derelict farm on Maxwell Mountaid, Saltspring Island, 1959.

Being the Journal of Anthony Tripp, born St. Keverne, Cornwall, England, in the Year of Our Lord, 1846, the

second Day of March.

15 of November, 1866 -Being of a pensive turn of mind, though a poor scholar, I have determined to spend some of the little leisure time available to me in setting down a few written Notes, so that as I grow older, I may refresh my memory from time to time. Of a truth, there is little else to occupy me after dusk. I write, in a manner, with a heavy heart, for my father is clearly not much longer for this world. His experiences as a Miner in California sadly affected his health. if not his spirit and when he arrived in Fort Victoria, partly to seek the gold reported to be in Yale and Boston Bar and partly to escape the dreadful War in America, his days were already numbered. The soul, at these times, developes a clarity of perception, oft denied when a man is in more robust health. The truest things in Life draw men more surely than the gold which took them first to California and then to Vancouver's Island in 1858 and as he told me, these things are the tilling of the land, to provide the food that men might live, the enjoyment of the bounteous beauties which God has provided, above all in great measure in these Islands of the Canal de Arro and the striving for Peace with all men, whatsoever be their Race, Creed or Colour. The threat of a general War with the Indians has remained but a threat and given Good Will, shall we hope soon pass. Our holding, carved with so much toil and sweat, has prospered by Gods Will and the Apple and Pear Seedlings Bot. of Mr. Jonathan Begg, bid fair to mature within a few years, when we shall be provided with an abundance of healthful Fruits....

I remember well with what profound joy I was reunited with my dear father in Fort Victoria. My mother died when young and I was left in the charge of an aunt, together with my younger brother Richard, in St. Keverne, Cornwall, England. Josiah Tripp, my father, went as a Miner and Prospector to America, like so many other Cornishmen. When the time came to join him, I had perforce to travel the Cape Horn route, a miserable and

a terrible Journey, of which I must set down more ....

Historical interest will occur, which it is hoped will bring diverse blessings to this Isle of Saltspring or Admiral Island, as Capn. Richards would have us call it or Chuan as some say. To wit, Vancouvers Island and British Columbia will be consolidated as one Territory. It is well, for in union lies strength and it was in this vein my father spoke at length with me...... 16 of November, 1866

Within a few days, an event of

My father hopes that we may never be called upon to consider and meet the manifold difficulties of the Defence of this Land against a resolute Enemy, for if sorely pressed by a Foe, help and succour from England would be slow of arrival, having to brave the Horn, for there is no quick route and not likely to be across Canada. He had in mind the Russians, against whom we fought so recently in the Crimea, who are a doughty race and but a few days sail up-coast. The Americans are exhausted by Civil War and cannot be besought for effective aid perhaps in our lifetime. My father is strongly in favour of the erection of a series of Forts on Vancouvers and these Islands, for there is nothing wrong in looking to Defence. They should be manned by a drilled and disciplined Militia. There are many who argue this to be a bogey, as the Indians are and will be a more pressing menace than the Muscovites ever shall be at any time ....
