### NEW INDUSTRY ON S.S.I.

Two young brothers, Stanley and Joe Moulton, are in the process of converting an old Fulford farm into a rainbow trout farm, a unique enterprise with exciting possibilities. The farm, located on Fulford Creek, is already in production of trout, with the recent hatching of 100,000 eggs. Two pools have approximately 8,000 fish from 6-13 inches in length.

At present, there is a hatching room and three pools all connected with an intricate, ever-flowing, water system, using the water of Fulford Creek and another creek from above the farm. The eggs were hatched in two-gallon crocks with fresh water flowing in continually. As the fish become larger they swim out the outlet hoses into a larger tank. From there, again as they grow a little more, they swim down a large plastic pipe to an outside pool. The trout are fed a prepared fish food purchased in the U.S.A. The food is powdered for the small fish and is in pellet form for the larger trout. It takes two years for the average fish to grow to 13 inches in length.

The brothers are now digging more pools, expanding their facilities to be able to handle one million fish per year. Their major market will be the hotels, cafes and butcher shops on Vancouver Island and the Lower Mainland. At present, the hotels in Victoria are air expressing fresh trout from Idaho. A minor market, but one that will be an attraction to visitors and residents of Salt Spring Island, is that some pools will be open to fishing! In fact, one pool is now open for anyone desiring to catch a trout. It costs nothing to fish: you pay for only the fish you catch. The fisherman (CONT'D P. 2)

### BOAT RACE

The Scott Point Marina was the scene of feverish activity and beautiful boats last Saturday, as boats from the Vancouver, New Westminster and Burrard Yacht Clubs prepared for their departure in the Predicted Log Race to Vancouver. Over thirty boats, from a 21 foot outboard cruiser to a 70 foot converted sub chaser, entered the race. Each skipper had spent long hours figuring to the second how long it would take his boat to reach the finish line. To insure fairness, an observer was aboard for the race. The boat had to travel at one throttle setting, which could not be changed except in a case of emergency. The slower boats began leaving shortly after midnight, with the faster ones leaving Sunday morning. Theoretically, all the boats were to cross the finish line at 11:00 a.m. Sunday morning.

The weather inside the Gulf Island was flat calm, but in the Gulf the boats ran into very heavy seas with eight foot waves. Five boats were forced to turn back to Nanaimo. One boat suffered a broken rudder. The winning boat was "Janra" of Burrard Yacht club, skippered by Ralph Madison. Mr. Madison was last year's winner. His percentage of error was 1.08%. Second place, with a 1.8% error, was won by "Show Girl", owned by Les Simmers of the West Vancouver Club. Third winner was Dr. L. Marshall's boat "Jaro" of Burrard and fourth place went to Bill Killam in the "Porpoise 11" of the Vancouver Yacht Club. The "Show Girl" was actually closest to her predicted time, being only 28 seconds ahead of her estimated (CONT'D P. 2)

### DOG TRIALS


Little "Suzie", a black and tan dachshund, owned and operated by Miss Jane Harrison, walked away with all the honours in the Novice Class at the dog trials held at Mahon Hall last Saturday afternoon. Scoring 198 points out of a possible 200, Suzie won the Willingdon Cup donated by the Willingdon Farm, the Club cup, and the Fernwood Farm Cup for dogs trained by someone under 16 years of age. The contest was close with four other Island dogs qualifying: "Hansel", owned by Mrs. E. Ellis scored 195 points; "Tamie", owner Mary Costering, 191 1/2 points; "Peter", owner, Mrs. J. Fendall, 189 and "Tawnie", owner Mrs. W. Seymour with 184 1/2 points.

The open "A" C.D.X. class was won by "Starshine" owned by Mrs. J. Burchett of Victoria. An interesting sidelight is that "Starshine" is the father of "Suzie" and "Hansel". The Utility cup was won by "Chion", owned by R.B. McLennan of Victoria.

Certificates of Merit were presented to Mrs. H. Hoffman and to Mr. T. Hare for winning the coveted C.D.X. ratings. Mr. Hare's dog, "Rebel", of dubious parentage, is probably the outstanding dog of the year. He, showing the pedigreed dogs how it is done, walked off with three straight shows, after only 11 lessons. Rebel had its first Novice lesson three months ago.

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

It will not do to lie down on the job and contend that tourist accommodation (CONT'D P.8)

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


5 of May, 1867
