COMMUNITY BUYS GOLF COURSE PROPERTY

Sparked by the wide enthusiastic support of the community, the Founder's Committee, in-charge of acquiring the Golf Course property, has purchased the property and has started the necessary legal and organizational procedures.

The goal of \$20,000 was not reached. The final thermometer shows \$17,550, \$2,450 short of the goal. In spite of being a little short of the goal the Committee felt that the warm response of the community for this project gave every indication that it would be a success. 173 people purchased shares in the Founder's group. A meeting of all the Founder's will be called in the near future, as soon as some of the organizational chores are completed.

Now that the Golf Club property has been purchased by the Founder's group, a general meeting has been called for Thurs., Aug. 10th, 8:30 pm at the Legion Hall for all persons interested in joining and supporting the Golf & Country Club. This is NOT a meeting of the Founder's Group, but a meeting of people interested in becoming members of the Golf Club. Five members will be elected to direct the operation of the Golf Club.

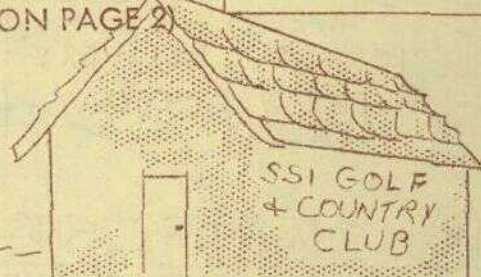

This is our last thermometer, but it does not mean the drive for more subscribers to the Founder's Group is over. Anyone desiring to join the group may do so. A share is \$50.

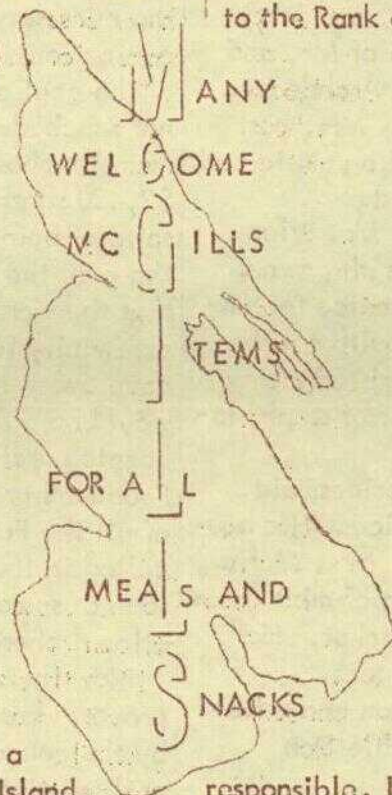

munity. Mr. Foord, to his pleasure, was elected Chairman.

Mr. Foord suggested that Balloting for the posts of Secretary, Treasurer, Vice Chairman and etcetera should be left until the end of the Meeting. In the meantime, he proposed an informal discussion be opened on more pressing matters, to wit, the wish of some of the Settlers that Mr. John Maxwell should be asked to make a written report on the events of the 30 of April for the Magistrate at Chemainus, that the pre-

sumptions and Illegal naming of local places should be stopped forthwith, since Baynes Peak being already named after the respected Admiral, any addition or alteration could confuse her Majesty's Geographers and that reprehensible conduct and Action by Borgoyne Settlers without prior reference to the Borgoyne-Fulford Committee should be sternly discouraged, as such could affect adversely at a later date the Elevation of Salt Spring to the Rank of an Incorporated Township or Municipality.

Mr. Maxwell told us that scarcely able to control the Anger he felt, he addressed the meeting, despite Mr. Foord banging his table with a hammer and calling, "Order, order!" He said he accepted full responsibility for the Affair of Baynes Peak and if any magistrate was interested enough to visit Salt Spring, he would be pleased to submit a full report, either written or by word of mouth. When authority neglected to provide protection for the Citizens, it was no Crime to take steps to assure the safety of Life and of Property. As regards Baynes Peak, he assumed they had in mind a joke to the effect that the mountain beneath the Peak should be called Maxwell's Mountain, for which he was in no way

responsible. In any event, if some settlers were sensitive about these matters, they could well make a start by observing the name given this Island by those in Authority, namely, Admiral Island. The allusion to reprehensible Conduct and Action baffled him and he challenged the man who made this allegation to step forward and declare themselves meanwhile, Mr. Lunney, Mr. Sparrow and Mr. Williams had moved to his side and the atmosphere was grown mighty thundery.

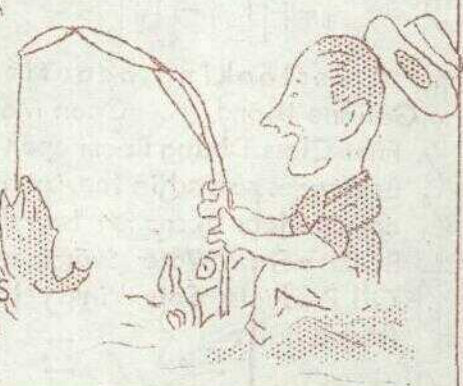

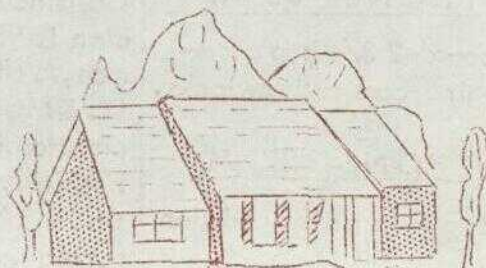
