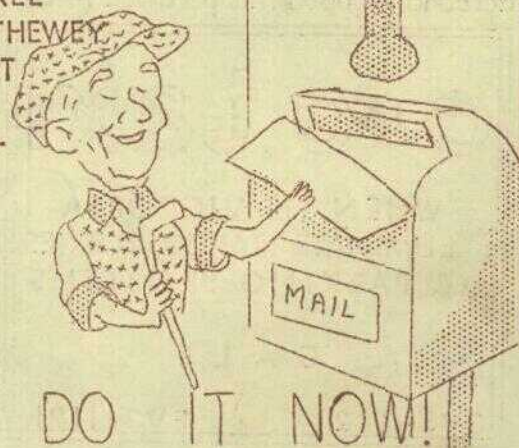

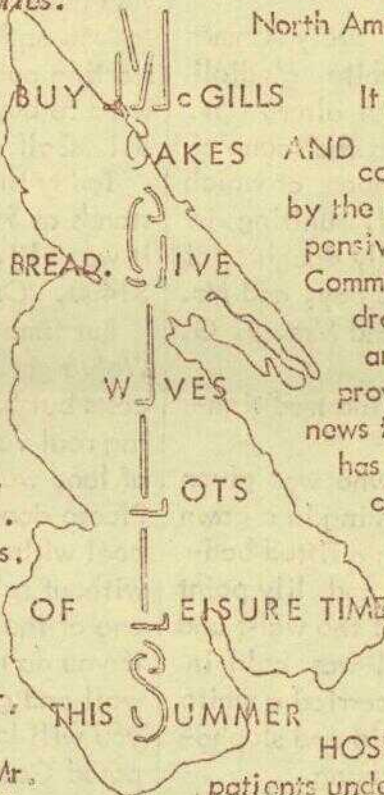
The toast was proposed by Mr. Glen Topping, uncle of the bride.

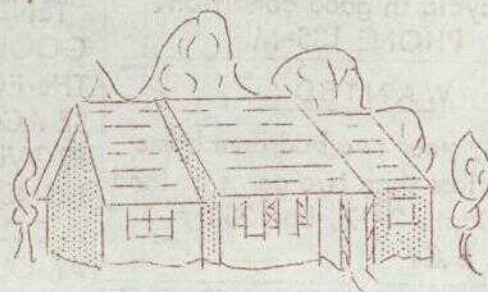

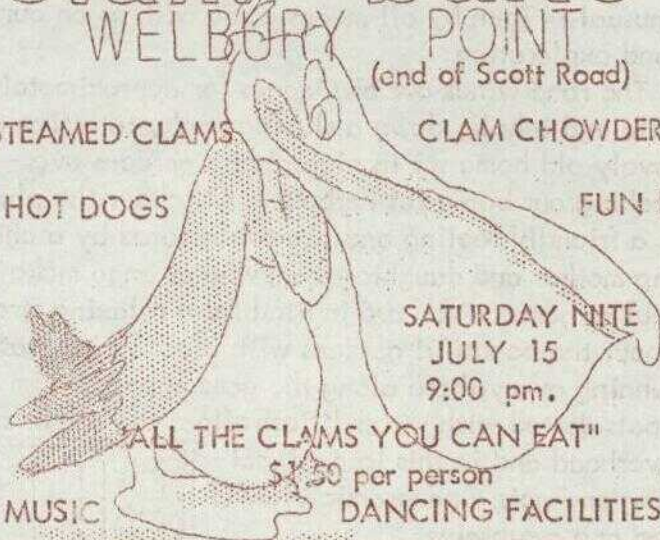
