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The Hon, Earle C. Westwood and Mr. Ron Worley of the B.C. Toll Ferry Authority addressed a special meeting of the S.S.I. Chamber of Commerce Executive last Wednesday evening. Unfortunately, each man, pleading not enough time to study the ferry situation, could not answer such questions as frequency of service, ferry charges, or the possibility of new boats. Mr. Worley, however, did state that we would not be getting less service.

One point of interest was that the ferries under the B.C. Toll Ferry Authority are operated entirely separately from the Government ferries, such as the Quadra Island ferry, which are under the Dept. of Highways. The Highways Dept. ferries are heavily subsidized and carry passengers far as low as 13¢ and cars for 65¢. Mr. Worley intimated that ferries under the Toll Ferry Authority must pay their own way with no direct subsidies.

Mr. Worley stated that the Government was literally going to put the Gulf Islands on the map. He was referring to the 3/4 million folders the Toll Authority distributes, advertising their ferries. Both he and Mr. Westwood spoke of Tourism, what it means to B.C., and the tremendous effort the Government was doing in premoting B.C. as a vacation paradise. Mr. Westwood stated that it was now the business of the Toll Authority to produce more traffic for the Golf Islands. He stated the Golf Islands will be getting a fair perpertion of all the advertising and promotion the Government was carrying on in the U.S.A.

The big plea of both Mr. Westwood and Mr. . . . Worley was that the Gulf Islands provide more facilities and more entertainment for the tourists - something to attract them and something to keep them here.

In the question period that followed, Mr. A. Wolfe-Milner stated that good, dust-free roads was just as important as better accompodations for the tourists. Mr. Westwood answered, saying, that he had always thought the appropiations for roads in his constituency was much too low and was working on this continually. Mr. Ernie Watson advised the Government that when advertising, to please advertise Ganges as closed on Wednesdays, indicating his belief that Ganges should have services available for the tourists on that day during the summer.

Another point brought up during the question period was whether charter ferries would be available for ambulance (CONT'D ON P. 2).



Speaking on Tourism, two private campsite operators stated that the free Government campsite was hurting their business.

As we see it, Mr. Westwood's plea for better accomodations, more things for the tourists to do

and more things for the tourist to see, brings up the question, 'Which comes first, the tourists or the attractions?". Some will say, "When the influx is here, then we will provide him with what he wants." Others say, "Build the things the tourists wants and then he will come." We are inclined to agree with the latter. This has been proven many times, in many places. Persons, with vision and money, have gone YOURTAB into lonely deserts, seacousts, islands and mountains and have built the thing that altrac's tourists and the tourists come. Miami Beach is an example. So are many of the islands in the Caribbean and so is Lake OCC Louise and Harrison Hot Springs. Certainly these places, like the Gulf Islands, had beautiful natural attractions, but a relatively small amount of people were able to enjoy these natural attractions until the accomodations were there.

Now, what can the Gulf Islanders do to build up the attractions of these Islands, short of calling up Conrad Hilton and asking him to build a "Ganges Hilton"? It is a question that many people have been studying the past week. We think, there are many things that can be done that should cost but little money.

First, (if we want a lot of tourists, but that is another question we won't air at this time) we should make it easier for the tourists to enjoy the things we have. At present, the first-time tourist, driving

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here, has no idea what beaches he may go on or even how to get to a beach with public access. He also doesn't know what woods he may walk in or what is private property or what is not. A yachtsman can't even get water at the Ganges public dock. He has to go to a filling station to get water; and while he is there he may as well use the rest-rooms for those will be all he will find. There isn't even a garbage can on the dock for him to dispose of his waste. He has a choice of throwing his garbage in the harbour carrying it with him until he finds a dock or a community that provides such things. It it wasn't for the heroic efforts of Mrs. H.C. Alexander, the Scott Point Marina and possibly one or two others,

there wouldn't be a cu' e of ice on all of S.S.I. for the yachtsman.

These are little things, but these are the irritations that tourists remember and tell their fellow travellers. Little things that we can do that doesn't cost a great deal of money.

Some people wonder at the success of Scott Point Marina. There is no wonder. Pete Frattinger knows what the yachtsman wants and he provided it. This is the secret and that is why Scott Point Marina is the best-liked, best-known marina in these Gulf Islands. If the rest of Ganges or S.S.I. took a leaf from Pete's book, no yachts-ON man would ever pass up Salt Spring as a major stopping place.

There are many ways to make S.S.I. an attraction, no more visionary than Pete Frattinger's vision of hacking out the bush to make Scott Point Marina. How about hacking out a hiking trail from Movet Park, over the ridge and along the cliffs to Mr. Maxwell? Or hacking out some good access roads to some of our beaches?

People come here looking for historical values.

Someone has suggested a road-side pull-out over-looking Ganges Harbour with a sign telling of the famous "Bettle of Ganges", That is a very good idea and it should be done. We're sure there must be other historical points of interest that would be an attraction.

Ideas to make S.S.I. more attractive are endless and we're sure we have berely saraped the surface. Just thinking as we write, we can think of bridle

frails and horses to rent, peny rides for children, hayrides for grown-ups, A fiesta day with boat rowing contests and swimming events and etc.

The famous fishing derby of the Royal Canadian Legion, which will be held on August 6, was the brain-child of Dave Fyvie, a former resident of

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
