
#### VOTE 21 - 17 FOR MARINA

At a public meeting, sponsored merce, to discuss the application of Mr. Art Young for an exten sion of 500 feet to his present foreshore lease for the purpose of establishing a marina, the property owners voted 21 - 17 in favor of granting the lease. 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




