GANGES SHELL SERVICE

The Ganges Shell Service has been in operation since the era when gas tanks were filled by a bucket and the buyer tested the quality of the gas he purchased by throwing a match into a small sample. This 37 years of continuous operation makes the Ganges Shell Service one of the oldest Shell stations in B. C.

Mr. Albert Bittancourt, a member of one of the oldest families on. S.S.I., started the business in 1923, when more horses than cars were seen and four customers a day was a busy day at the gas barrels. The

first station was located near the

present White Elephant Cafe under a huge maple tree that has long since disappeared.

After the first manual, visual gas pump was installed, it wasn't long before the canny people of S.S.I. learned that it was much better to buy only one gallon of gas at a time. Due to the height of the pump and the angle of sight, the operator invariably put much more than a gallon in the car when he attempted to give the customer only one gallon.

Mr. Bittancourt built the station, as pictured above, in the present location in the early Thirties. He ran the station until his death in 1947. The station was then sold to D. L. "Goody" Goodman who ran it until selling to the present owner, Alex McManus, in 1956.

Alex, who has been the Shell distributor for the past fifteen years, has modernized the station, added a

modern tank truck and wrecker service, sells gas and electric appliances, and has added a Rockgas storage area. Alex has lived on S.S.I. (Fulford) since 1945. He and his wife, Ida, have four children, three girls and one boy.

The fantastic growth of the oil industry is reflected in the story of this local station – from 1923 when more coal oil and naptha was sold than gasolene, to the present day modern oil company that sells hundreds of products ranging from rocket fuel to synthetic fibres.

this year's queen, Lynn Akerman, in a lovely gown of white nylon, embroidered with yellow flowers and wide yellow cummerbund. The retiring queen, Kathy Butt, stood behind her, also dressed in white. The two princesses Roberta Akerman and Verlyn East, wore pink and apricot gowns. Michael Horel was the page boy. The new queen was crowned on a flower-bedecked dais at the main entrence to the school building. She and her court were introduced by Miss. Marguerite Gear, secretary of the Student Council, and presented with .. i cups and gifts to mark the occasion.

The winning float depicted the MODERN BAKERY famous "Beaver Point Bean Supper." There was a large stove with huge Quality iron pot of beans being looked after by Bakery "cook" Andrew Stevens. Tables along Products each side were all set for the hungry mob and were being served by all kinds of "beans" There were green beans, purple broad beans, coffee beans, scarlet runner etc. On the very back of the float was a huge bun, plate of beans and pie. On top of the cab Johnny Klassen was running the Bingo game and on the hood sat a "has bean" with large bingo card.

The second place winner was the Canadian Legion float depicting "The Village Błacksmith." A huge spreading chestnut tree (genuine) was mounted in the center and underneath its branches a com-

plete blacksmith shop was in operation. An island blacksmith was located on the present site of S.S. Motors over 50 years ago. The anvil came from the old stone

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old. Mr. H. Loosmore was the blacksmith and Mr. Magorran was kept busy at the grindstone.

Third place winner was McGill's Bakery with the lovliest assertment of S.5.1. "cookies" ever assembled in one box. This float was piloted by the "chief baker," Miss Jennifer Graham.

In addition to the three winning floats there were many others worth honourable mention. A group of "roaring 20's teen-agers" in an old 1921 Model T. Mr. A. Quesnel as Paul Bunyan complete with his ox, "Bive Babe." The local Fire Department was hilarious as they made a "2 a.m. fire call." Firemen were dressed in pajamas, and one, Ben Greenhough, was trudging behind the truck in his boots and underwear. A "just married" fireman was in his car, with boots hanging alongside and tin cans still tied to the rear of his car. There were Sea Scouts and the local Dog Obedience Training Club paraded their prize "pooches" and even horses complete



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


