### WATERWORKS DISTRICT TO TAX

In order to (1) re-finance, (2) float a \$36,000 bond issue, and (3) provide for a yearly improvement program, the North Salt Spring Waterworks District has instigated a "Parcel" tax for all property fronting on the water system. The tax will be in effect for the 1962 tax year.

As will be explained at a public meeting, to be held on Wed., Aug. 29th at Mahon Hall, the tax is the only feasible way for the Water District to resolve some rather serious financial problems. The District has the right to tax and does not need to go to plebiscite.

The present difficulties facing the Water District is due to the necessity of replacing many of the old and inadequate lateral water lines, of providing an ever-expanding service to more and more users and the fact that the Waterworks has been operating in the red.

In previous years, when replacement of old lines was not as severe as now, and service was to fewer people, the Water District was barely able to provide service to users on revenue from water used. And this would not have been possible without the help of the late Gavin C. Mouat who did not redeem his bonds on the due date and who forfeited many interest-bearing coupons in the desire to provide water service to the community.

Very few water districts in B.C. operate without a tax and only water districts with a compact area to serve have been able to do this.

It is estimated the average home, fronting on the water lines, will be taxed about \$16 - \$18 per year.

The Board recently had a full scale engineer's report made upon the water system. The engineer's main recommendations were 20,000 ft. of 4"Transite pipe and a 15,000 gallon storage tank for the Sunset Drive extension.



"Dear Sir: I was glad to see that the Chamber of Commerce was stirred to action, re our beaches.


How is anyone to find them? Beddis Road
