SCHOOL MILL RATE UP 1.91 .....

It is indeed becoming more apparent that we live in a confused topsy-turvy world where taxes are concerned. Not only have our assessments gone up from \$8,988,631 to \$10,317,697, but our school mill rate has jumped from 17.99 mills to 19.90, an increase of 1.91 mills for 1962, and the Government grant for education has decreased from \$63,000 to \$43,000.

Each year, for the past several years, the School District has been penalized for practicing economies and if that isn't a topsyturvy way of doing business then the whole economic structure of the world has been wrong for centuries. For years, this School District didn't build this and didn't buy that because they were thinking of the taxpayer. So, last year we get hit with "equalization of taxes" that boosted our taxes. We could have build auditoriums, swimming pools, had free lunches and T.V. in every room and our taxes wouldn't have been any higher.

The School Board, at last Tuesday's meeting has passed a motion to proceed with plans for a referendum this fall on the question of having a gymnasium-auditorium and a science room built at the Ganges School. The actual cost of this major expenditure will be about two-thirds of one mill increase in our taxes. As the present trend indicates, it won't matter whether you vote for or against this project, the present Government will be raising our taxes a heck of a lot more than two-thirds of a mill next year. To vote against the much needed gymnasium-auditorium because it will cost us higher taxes is just so much nonsense. We are going to pay higher taxes anyway as long as this Government continues to tax the people of the Gulf Islands in this topsy-turvy confused manner.

Kenneth G. Pearson of Sidney has been charged with driving without due care and attention following an accident last Saturday evening on the Fulford-Ganges Road. The car, going toward Fulford from Ganges at a high rate of speed, according to eye-witness reports, didn't make the curve at the end of the "Straight-away" about one mile out of Ganges. The car, a Buick, plowed straight ahead and turned over, resulting in serious injury to one passenger, Ronald Fries of H.M.C.S. Naden. The driver received abrasions and the other two passengers, Bruce Brodie of Sidney and Charles Mahon of Saanichton received superficial injuries. The car was a total wreck.

Latest electricity bills received by Gulf Islands residents reflect reductions announced April 1st by the B.C. Hydro and Power Authority.

District Manager A.C. VanSacker said that householders will not notice the full effect of the reduction until the next billing, which will be the first one covering an entire month under the new rates.

The Hydro Authority manager stated that he was making available for publication the new official rate schedule in order that householders will have a better understanding of the extent of the reductions.

The new schedule of residential rates, which exclude tax, appears below. Changes are for residential classifications only; commercial, power service and primary power schedules remain unchanged.

Mr. Van Sacker said that it was difficult to generalize on the amount of "dollars and cents" savings under the new rates. However, the Hydro Authority official said that a comparison of former residential and new residential rates, together with the per centage decreases was being published so that individual consumers may gain an idea of their savings, based on their consumption.

As an example of the difference in the residential costs, the first 50 kwh, which used to cost \$4.50 now is only \$1.75, a decrease of 61%; 150 kwh cost was \$7.30 is now \$4.60, a decrease of 37%; 300 kwh was \$11.50 and is now \$7.90 or a 31% decrease; 1000

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kwh was \$18.50 and is now \$15.25, an 18%

The political fight for Salt Spring Island votes began last Friday with the appearance of the Liberal Candidate, Mr. Jack Saywell, at a rally held at Mahon Hall. Mr. Saywell, principal at Lake Cowichan School, was accompanied by Mr. Ron Fairclough, Provincial Organizer and Mr. Arthur Cox of Victoria.

Mr. Saywell, who was introduced by Mr. Gil Humphreys, claimed that he was not a politician, but a man who wanted to do something for his country and for his party. A life-long Liberal, and an educator for nearly 40 years, Mr. Saywell re-built the Liberal Party in Lake Cowichan from virtually no

party members to a present-day membership totaling over one hundred.

Most of his speech was devoted to the European Common Market, the Liberal pension plan and the Liberal platform on Federal Aid to education. He stated that the economic complexity of the world today needs a forwardlooking government - a Liberal Government that doesn't look back but looks ahead. In outlining the education aid he listed the Liberal promise of (1) guaranteeing at least 10 million dollars per year for scholarships (about one million for B.C.) based on worth and need of the student. (2) Making adequate monthly allowance toward room, board and expenses on a longterm, no-interest loan to students who can't qualify for the scholarship award, but still worthy of help; and (3) Interestfree loans and increased family allowances for men who wish to increase

their skill and training.

Mr. Fairclough, who preceded Mr. Saywell, gave his views on the "shallow evangelical fervor" of the Diefenbaker Government and outlined the Liberal policy on neuclear weapons, which was: "In the light of present-day conditions, Canada does not need neuclear weapons".

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PRODUCING CUCUMBERS

The cucumber is a warm-season crop that is easily injured by frost and cool weather, but it needs only a relatively short season to produce its fruits.

It tolerates slightly cooler weather in the fall than muskmelons or watermelons. The seed does not germinate unless the soil temperature is above 50 degrees F. Percentage and speed of germination increase with increase of soil temperature up to 85 degrees F. A cool, wet early summer commonly results in a poor crop. Shelter from strong wind is advantageous. None but the best land can be depended upon to give good yields of well-formed, high-quality cucumbers. Sandy or sandy loam soils are desirable for early production; silt or clay loams are preferable where heavy yields are wanted and earliness is not a consideration. A soil that has a tendency to crust or become hard and tight and lacks humus should be avoided. Fertile soil with a liberal supply of humus is necessary for a high yield. The cucumber should make a continuous, steady growth. Emphasis should be placed on manure or on the digging under of fertilizer. A relatively higher level of nitrogen nutrition seems necessary for the production of a high yield of well-shaped, highly coloured fruit than is needed for pumpkin, squash and

marrow.

"COOL AS A CUCUMBER" - 'Cool as a cucumber" is a time-worn expression used daily by thousands, many of them totally unaware of the actual degrees in coolness implied. A few years ago a test was made to determine this matter and it was found that the cucumber actually is twenty degrees cooler than its surroundings.

On Wednesday night, May 2, about thirty members and friends of the S.S.I. Chrysanthemum Society braved the downpour to meet at the United Church Hall. These doughty souls were rewarded by a most satisfying evening. After an extremely brief business meeting (the controversial issue of a Horticultural Society - to be, or not to be - was shelved for the time being) the group was addressed by Mr. John Palmer, an experienced fuschia grower from Victoria. His theme was their story - the original species came from South America and were discovered in the sixteenth century by a missionary looking for quinine, he took a speciman to a German botanist Leonard Fusch hence their name-; their growth and their culture. To conclude, he showed beautiful coloured slides of different varieties. These were so attractive that they instilled many of his audience with the desire to be able themselves to grow these gergeous blooms:



Dear Sir: Herewith is a letter sent to Mr. Ron Worley of the B.C. Toll Ferry Authority regarding their little gem of a regulation concerning commuter tickets. "Dear Mr. Worley: This is to register a protest against the regulation of the B.C. Toll Ferry Authority requiring that each and every member of a family have a separate book of commuter tickets. I came into contact with this situation on Sunday, May oth on my return trip to Salt Spring Island from Swartz Bay at 5:05 p.m. when it was insisted that I purchase a book of tickets for each of my children.

I cannot imagine intelligent persons instituting such a regulation which does absolutely nothing to uphold its apparent intended purpose of preventing one person from buying a book of tickets and transfering them to another.

Indeed, it serves only to add confusion and re-

sentment for the Gulf Island residents who have to use these ferries because there is no other direct traffic link with the Islands.

From the technical point of view — If I buy a book of tickets for my son or daughter am I not, in effect, transferring the book to one of them for their use? This is no different than buying a book of tickets for use by my wife, or mother, or aunt or uncle or friend, is it?

Two or more books of children's tickets for use by the children of a family serves no more useful purpose than one book of tickets. Similarly two or more books of adult tickets are no better than one book for family use.

One further point. Why waste money having two additional employees taking tickets when the ferry crew has done it quite efficiently in the past?


That last Sunday, twenty-eight beautiful Tourist Information girls disembarked at Vesuvius for a two hour tour of Salt Spring.
