

WHAT'S COOKING ON SALI SPRING?

by Elsie Worthington.

The following two recipes for easy-to-make candy may come in handy at this time. GINGER DELIGHT is an ideal sweet for use with rich Christmas foods. The recipe comes to us by kindness of Mrs.T.W.Mouat, Welbury Bay. COCONUT ICE is an old favourite, and so simple to make.

GINGER DELIGHT: Mix 4 or 5 teaspoons powered ginger

GINGER DELIGHT: Mix 4 or 5 teaspoons powered ginger (depending on taste and also on strength of the ginger), 1/4 teasp. dry mustard and a pinch of salt with I cup water; boil until reduced to 3/4 cup. Add 2 cups granulated sugar and 2 packets gelatine (soaked in 1/2 cup cold water). Simmer for 15 minutes. Moisten shallow pan with 2 tblsp. lemon juice. Pour in mixture and let stand over night. Cut in strips and pry out of pan. Roll in sugar and cut in cubes or as desired. Let stand for at least 24 hours before serving. COCONUT ICE: Stir 2 cups granulated sugar in 5 oz.(1/4 pint) cold water; bring to boil over slow heat and simmer for 5 minutes, stirring all the time. Remove from heat; slowly add 1/2 lb. coconut and stir for 5 minutes. Press half the mixture into a buttered pan; colour the other half with a little pink colouring and press on top of white mixture. It pink mixture shows signs of stiffening too much before ready for pouring, add a few drops of boiling water as needed. Do this carefully. Let stand for 24 hours before cutting into small pieces.

memories surrounding her by the few who are left from the early years. Mrs. Borradaile was 87 years old, and has two of her four children still living-Jack, at Victoria, and Gladys, (Mrs. Walter McDermott) in Holberg, V.I.

She leaves a sister, Mrs. Frank Scott, and two brothers, Keith and Lewellyn Wilson, in Ladysmith, B.C. and five grandchildren, as well as neices and nephews, on Salt Spring Island.

Mrs. Borradaile's late father, the Rev. E. F. Wilson, was the founder of the Shing-wauk Indian Homes in Ontario, at which he was principal. 
