#### MEMORY'S NOTEBOOK - by Elsie Worthington THE SUNDAY SCHOOL CHRISTMAS CONCERT

There can be few Canadians born in the first two or three decades of this century who have not, at some time during childhood, enjoyed, tolerated, or suffered their way through a Sunday School Christmas concert.

Memories of this custom of a bygone day are no doubt as varied as the temperaments of the participants. Circum-

stance played a part too, as I so well remember.

Most of my childhood was spent in an Ontario town in the years preceeding and during World War 1. For two years of that time I had a foot in each of two religious camps; attending my own (Anglican) Sunday School each Sabbath morning and the nearby Presbyterian mission school in the afternoon. Mother went along with the idea and no doubt welcomed this diversion which kept an active little girl busy on dull Sunday afternoons. (Lively outdoor play on Sunday was frowned upon in our town at that time.) However, when Father came home from the war he soon put an end to the spiritual two-timing!
But it was fun while it lasted. For one thing I enjoyed

two Sunday School picnics and two Christmas parties each year-an advantage not to be lightly dismissed in those days. And the experience taught me many things, although the lessons did not become apparent for some years.

Looking back, I realize that Anglicans and Presbyterians of that time would have found it difficult to worship with an easy mind in each other's churches. Although holding a common belief in God, their views on the proper way to worship Him seemed poles apart. Their differing philosophy af life could be detected to some degree in parties arranged

for their Sunday School children. Christmas "treats" at the "English" church left hazy memories of a relaxed and happy mixture of Santa Clause, magicians, games, and bags of oranges and nuts.

Presbyterian parties were really concerts followed by refreshments. They were more formal and we were required to stay with our classes. But the Presbyterians served the most luscious food! Currant buns were the good old standby at Anglican picnics and parties. On the other hand I recall so well the mouth-watering iced cakes-each piece topped with a fat half walnut - served by Presbyterian ladies!

My two Presbyterian Christmas concerts stand out so

clearly in memory because of the devasting attacks of stage fright suffered on each occasion. Our little mission Sunday School joined with the large downtown church school for

the Christmas concert, held in the church.

Countless others have shared the experience of a little girl, who, having learned her "piece" word perfect, mounted the platform oozing self-confidence only to have every vestige of that same self-confidence drain away as she saw before her an endless sea of faces in a long narrow church. Somehow memory remained true, the quaking knees did not collapse and I was able to recite my "piece" "loud and clear" as directed.

This trying ordeal served the purpose of cushioning an even more paralyzing experience in the same church the

following year.

Four girls from my class were teamed with a quartette of boys from a corresponding age group, and trained for several weeks to sing a special Christmas song. Came the night of the concert and in due time our names were called. We were seated half way down the church with the boy's class behind us. We four girls trooped up to the front, fully expecting the boys to follow, but to our consternation found ourselves Two of the boys refused to leave alone on the platform. One boy started up the aisle but finding his comrades had deserted him he changed his mind. A second boy, after much persuasion left his seat, but seeing the first boy turn back, his courage also failed, and he too, beat an ignominious retreat.

Meanwhile, our teacher, seated at the piano and faced with the fiasco, decided to make the best of the situation.. She played the opening bars and gave us the chord to start. Dead silence greeting her efforts. We were too terrified to sina. Besides we had depended on the boys' voices to lead





before giving the chord she hissed: "Sing! You can do it!"
Obeying the peremptory command four thin quavering voices began "Hark the Christmas Bells are Ringing." Returning courage and strength seeped into the second verse. I am sure a wave of sympathy from the vast audience engulfed us and helped us to find full voice for the third and remaining verses. The applause was tremendous - and sweet! And each of us received an extra bag of candy at the end of the even-

The old-fashioned Sunday School concert has become by and large, a thing of the past. Nowadays where Sunday Schools mark Christmas it is usually with a pageant centred on the Nativity; which is as it should be, for the Nativity is the heart of Christmas. Children taking part are undergoing the same joys and fears, depending on temperament and circumstances, and will recall their experiences with varying degrees of pleasure as they leaf through the pages of memory's notebook in the years to come. \*\*\*\*\*\*\*

## EDITORIAL

Was Ebenezer Scrooge's philosophy regarding Christmas and its so-called goodwill towards men so very far wrong? Even today there are many who cry, "Bah, -humbug!"They become increasingly depressed as the day draws ever closer with the desperate thought of all the things they feel forced

to do pressing them.

You address and mail a long list of Christmas Cards, then worry about missing someone, You rush through crowded stores to get those last few gifts. You are asked to respond to this and that appeal to help someone or something you never heard of and know less about. All of this to the constant background of shouting commercials from the TV and radio brainwashing you to buy more Dive soap so you can be odorlessly dry-cleaned for Christmas. No wonder you get a little sick and wish you could chuck the whole thing. It gets to the point where you think Scrooge never had it so good.

Could be one of the reasons for this growing emptiness toward Christmas and what it is supposed to mean, is that we are content to wish goodwill for about a week, rather than to do something about man's inhumanity to man all year round. Like the weather everybody talks about it but no one has

figured out a way to do something about it.

So far as the meaning of Christmas is concerned, man hasn't come very far from the first Christmas, He hasn't learned to translate this nice sounding warm philosophy into an

active way of life.

Could be another reason for the deadening sameness of each successive yuletide is that we have allowed our worship of scientific technology to outstrip our understanding of, and appreciation for human personality. We are losing our birthright of choice and reason to the computer that is silently taking over. We can solve any problem except the problem of ourselves and our relationship to society. We just don't know how to go apout it.

We insist on excusing ourselves for our oversights and transgressions in our relations with our fellows by adopting stock answers and catch phrases such as, "That's the way the ball bounces", or, "It's human nature". Personally we object to the widespread belief that you can't change human nature. And many of us who do try to change, start at the wrong end . . . with someone else instead of ourselves.

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#### WHAT'S COOKING ON SALT SPRING?

For some people a jellied salad forms a necessary part of the Christmas dinner, while other welcome its colorful appearance on the talbe at any time during the festive season. The following recipe can provide the main course for one of the lesser meals during Christmas week:

SHRIMP SALAD: Mix 1 packet lime jelly powder with 1 cup of boiling water and 2 tablsp. vinegar. When partly set add 1 cup of salad dressing; chopped celery and diced cucumber to taste, and 1 can of shrimps. Use individual moulds if preferred, and serve on lettuce, endive or fresh parsley leaves.

This second recipe takes longer to make but will provide a gay and welcome addition to rich Christmas fare:

CRANBERRY SALAD: Put 2 cups raw cranberries and 1 peeled orange through the food chopper, using medium blade, Add 1 cup sugar, 3/4 cup crushed pineapple and 1/3 teasp.salt.

Let stand about 2 hours. Drain off juice which should measure about 1 cupful. Add water to make 1 1/2 cups liquid. Bring liquid to boil, add 1 packet orange jelly powaer and stir until dissolved. Cool until partly set then add cranberry mixture. Turn into lightly oiled mould and chill.

Each of these recipes will make 6 to 8 servings.

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
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CHRISTMAS SHIPS

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



