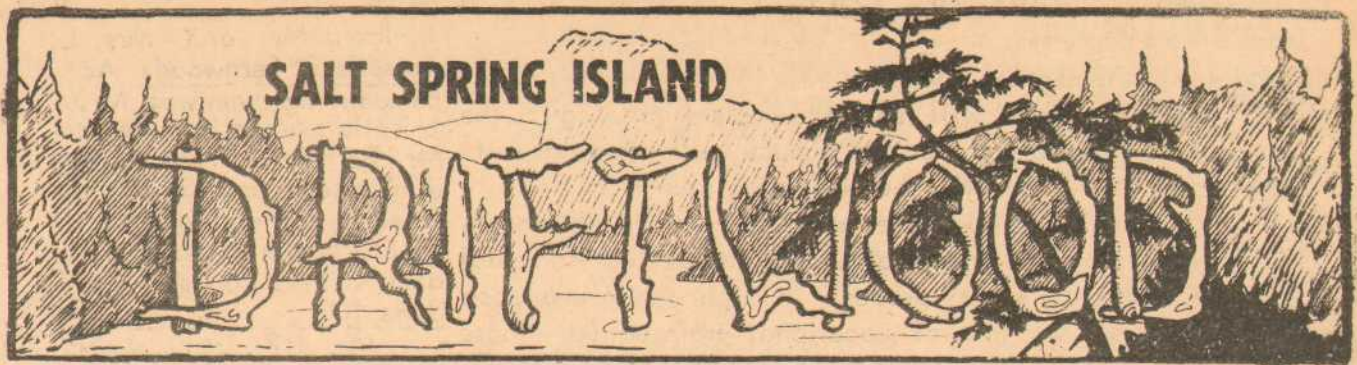

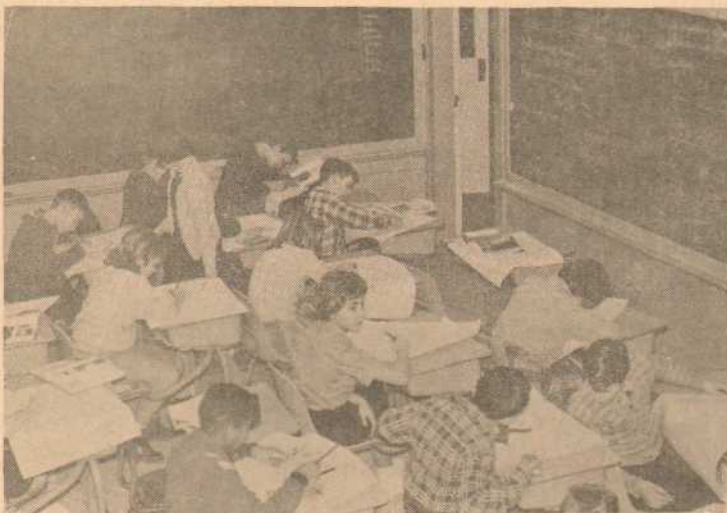

## EDITORIAL

Concluding this week DRIFTWOOD'S series of editorial comments and pictures illustrating the urgent necessity for an affirmative vote in the upcoming referendum, we should like to deal with what appears to us to be the most important aspect of the whole problem.

Much can still be said in favour of the concept of the little red school house even today in rural settings with relatively sparse population. After all there are still many assets to this situation where you have a few kids most of whom are fairly similar in age and interests. It has a bit of a family atmosphere and much can be done by a skillful teacher in this kind of setting.....provided the enrollment does not total more than fifteen. However our school has gone beyond this point many years ago.

One of the most exciting aspects of the plan for a new school on Salt Spring is the long overdue separation of the elementary and high school levels. This alone should go far to eliminate many administrative and communication problems with which our school is necessarily saddled. The present

## HARBOUR HOUSE SOLD

Harbour House Hotel, Island landmark since first World War days, has recently changed ownership. Now called Harbour House (1964) Ltd., the management will remain in the capable hands of Col. D.G. Crofton.

President of the new company is Mr. John M. Gurd; Vice-President, Mr. G. W. O'Brien and Sec-Treasurer Mr. Arthur W. Way, all of Vancouver. Col. Crofton is named Managing Director.

The charming old hotel which has been the vacation point for many families over the years will be retained. Mr Gurd's family was one of the families who enjoyed holidaying at Harbour House during the early years. In fact they were among the first guests registered at the hotel in the summer of 1916.

The new owners plan an addition consisting of a large modern motel complex on the Harbour House property to supplement the present facilities at the hotel.

It is expected that the new construction will start soon.

school has some 400 pupils ranging in age from five to seventeen, and from kindergarten to senior high school. All of whom are housed and taught in the one over taxed building.

It is a large and difficult job to administer adequately all activities that necessarily go into the operation of the high school. Add to this in our school what really amounts to two more levels kindergarten-primary and the intermediate elementary grades and the administration job is thus multiplied to the point where it is impossible in the time and space available. Something has to suffer. In this case the elementary school often gets short shift in the rush to get as many as possible necessities worked into the high school program. A new high school will solve this.

For the same reasons student activities such as are promoted by the Students Council are assumed to include the elementary school in theory but in practise the main events and benefit are largely enjoyed by the high school. This is natural since many of the activities of the high school are not

suitable for elementary levels.

A new high school will leave the present building for the use of the elementary grades and a much wider range of suitable student activities will then be possible.

Besides providing adequate facilities for the high school, the new building will enable an urgent and overdue remedial program in the elementary grades. It might even make possible a start on some form of vocational training for those senior elementary pupils who are not able to profit from regular academic classes. They have a right to your consideration when you vote on Saturday.

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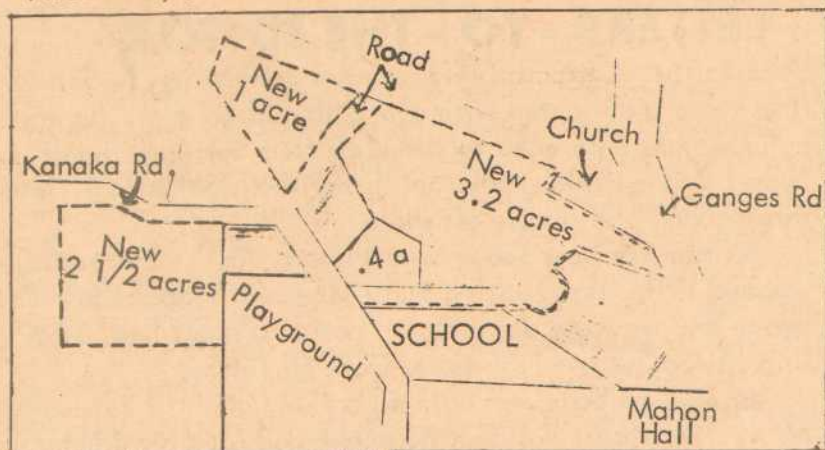

#### SCHOOL BOARD HIGHLIGHTS

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## GUEST EDITORIAL

In Education today the emphasis is still on the training of our youngsters from Grade One to Graduation from high school. But this emphasis is changing, Kindergarten is being added to give the little tad a flavour of life away from Mother's apron strings. School buildings are no longer locked and barred at 4:30 p.m. School grounds resound through week-ends with the activities of small and larger fry.

Education is coming to be considered as a "cradle to the grave" proposition - a continuous process. In many cases, this is the training of the young adults in skills which help him to keep abreast of a changing world. Added to this is the training of people in leisure-time activities. In those adult classes, the young and old rub shoulders to their mutual advantage.

Our schools are used more and more as community centres. Hardly an evening passes without a lecture, a political meeting, a nature or travel show, a play, a musical presentation, or a basketball game in the gymnasium. This of course, is the perfect answer to the critic who so often states that our school buildings sit idle so much of the time.

It is also the answer to the opponent of school by-laws who claims that his children are grown-up and he should not be asked to pay his share of taxes. He may, it is true, pay a fee for his leisure-time course, but it is a nominal fee, a modest levy made possible by the existence of our public schools. All he pays is a contribution towards the extra care and maintenance caused by his own evening classes.

The school system meets the changing needs of our community and the needs of our adults whatever age for education in many fields.

Before you vote on Saturday, June 20 on Referenda Nos. 4 and 5, consider the total effect the school system has on our Island. We owe it to ourselves - children and adults - that an adequate system of education is maintained for the communities as they are now - and as they will be.

Better schools mean better communities!

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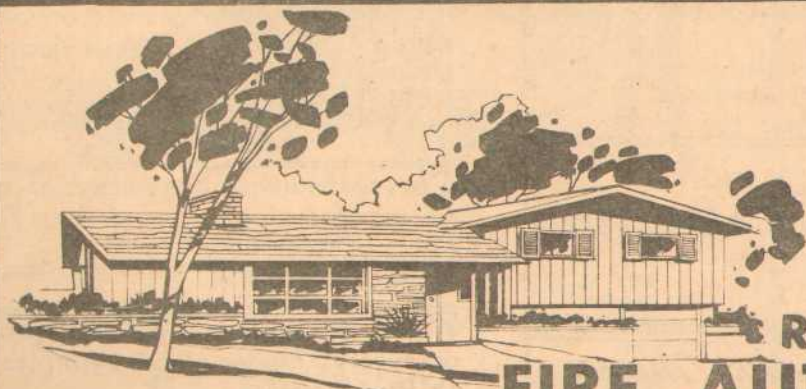
