CENTENNIAL PROJECT TO BE ISLAND ASSET

At the invitation of M. F. Peiler, chairman of the Island Centennial Committee, soil and landscape experts from Victoria recently inspected the Centennial Park site at the Ganges Boat Basin, and stated that the "fill" should be sufficiently drained of salt water to permit work on the park to commence in the spring.

They were enthusiastic about the project as an asset to the island and as one of the most attractive centennial schemes put forward by a small district in B.C.

Plans include a prominent position for the war memorial (now almost lost to view by signs and parked cars in the centre of Ganges) a children's playground, outdoor checkerboard and shuffleboard, and possibly

bowling green. A model of the all-over plan is now on view at the government building, and island residents are urged to inspect it.

It is hoped by the Centennial Committee that all Island organizations and the general public will give full support to the Park. The Royal Canadian Legion and the Lion's Club, whose memberships cover the entire island, have already pledged their support with active participation.

It is announced that a federally-sponsored trailer exhibit of Canadian history will visit Salt Spring Island on May 24, 1967, the Centennial Year.

Centennial 1966-67 Calendars, richly illustrated, are now on sale at local stores, with proceeds over the cost of production held for the island centennial funds.

MOST SUCCESSFUL SCOUT BOTTLE DRIVE

The drive covered the whole island with the exception of the Musgrave Mountain area, and involved 17 cars and drivers, each with a Scout and a Cub to collect bottles. Collections started about 9.30 a.m. and were completed by about 1 p.m.

Special thanks are due to Ken Ralph of Leisure Lanes Bowling Alleys for the use of his garage as a collection depot. to Salt Spring Island Trading Company for storage and disposal of several thousand pop bottles, to Mouat Bros. and their driver Dave Winter for loading and transporting to the Bottle Exchange in Victoria over 10,000 beer bottles and finally to those people who gave of their time to drive during the collection or to help sort bottles at the depot.

We are pleased and heartened to have received so many positive reactions to our editorial of last week on Viet Nam. It seems to be one of life's inexplicables that in the main, man detests and abhors man's inhumanity toward man... and yet we can spawn a number of these types, who, like the inhuman pilot in Viet Nam are capable of almost any detestable act of cruelty and be madly proud of it.

One gentleman came into the office and left a copy of a Vancouver Province Editorial of December 9th, which in essence, said that even if the two warring sides in Viet Nam did get together in peace talks resulting in some agreement, how could we be sure this would be worth more than the paper the agreement was written on?

We were directed to a specific paragraph stating that those who cry that the U.S. should get out of Viet Nam show a poor grasp of the situation in South-East Asia. We would be extremely interested to know, in this day of screened news and highly biased propaganda, where this writer in the Province gets his factual knowledge of the situation. One of the doubtful benefits of modern day television and movies, which was what we based our comment on, is an uncanny bare-faced realism that comes through a documentary of this kind, something the powers that be probably didn't reckon or it would not have been released for public showing.


