



This set of pictures are the result of our attempts at night photography wh we spent some time recently trying to capture the beauty of homes around the island decorated for the festive season.



EDITORIAL PAGE

Dear Editor - "The scrolls found in the wreck of the Martian spaceship which crashed a few months ago in the Rockies have now been deciphered by Prof. Hyra Gliffik, and appear to be a report on the various forms of government on Earth. The following is a partial translation of that portion of the report headed Democracy.

Here we have a very queer system. As far as we have been able to follow it in this system the humans elect some of their fellows by placing a mark against a name on a piece of papyrus which is then placed in a box. THE CHERRY TREE

Almost every tree that we know, in poem or song, has in some way been associated with the Christmas season. No exception is the cherry tree. According to the well-known "Cherry Tree Carol", the cherry tree bent its boughs so the Virgin Mary could pluck its fruit.



Card styles have changed, but no one has improved upon the message inscribed on what is generally conceded to be the first Christmas card. The message, "A Merry Christmas and a Happy New Year to You," has become a universal greeting.

Known as the Cole-Horsley card, the "first" card is in a private collection, the Hallmark Historical Collection, in Kansa's City, Missouri. The card is named for Sir Henry Cole and John Calcott Horsley. Sir Henry, director of the Victoria and Albert Museum, commissioned Horsley, a noted London artist, to design the card, which first appeared in print in 1843.

The card is composed of three panels. The center panel portrays a family at Christmas dinner, the other two panels illustrate the Christian virtue of feeding the hungry and clothing the needy.






