MAJOR RENOVATIONS BEGUN AT

IMPERIAL ESSO PLANT

Tuesday morning saw the beginning of major changes to the plant and marine facilities of the Esso plant operated by Norman Mouat. The changes are to take several weeks and involve increasing the capacity of oil storage facilities with several new tanks to be installed.

The new tanks are to be shipped on a barge and are expected here about the end of the week. They will be loaded on a flat bed truck and hauled to the top of the present site. Four of the present tanks are to be removed as are the loading facilities and piping.

A new system of delivery of oil from the barge is to avoid the present interference with float and servicing operations.

Major building changes in progress now include the removal of all old buildings presently being used as ware-houses.

The large shed at the south end of the float is to be finished and fitted as a modern warehouse for the storage of Esso products.

Norman Mouat was understandably pleased after waiting some time for these necessary changes. He beamed at the thought of a brand new office, included in the plans to occupy the space at the present entrance to the plant.

While the extensive changes are being accomplished the business will be carried on via a special barge to be anchored at the dock. This will enable the products to be distributed as usual without having to use the present tank facilities.

Did you watch "Seven Days" and its documentary on Viet Nam on Sunday last? Did you have the same sick nausea I did while listening to a grinning U.S. pilot describing with shouting erotic rapture the thrill he experienced as a result of hitting a native village with napalm and "utility bombs?

Did you feel the same sense of hatred and disgust for the American when a series of photographs showed the result of the air raid - row on row of burning homes with the mangled bodies of native men, women and children, entangled in the utter devastation?

This same pilot's only regret was that he could not be two places at once in that he was in his plane miles away and could not be on the scene on the ground to see how "we really knocked them over."

The recorded words of another marine infantryman in a sort of blind soliloguy on how he saw the position he was in. That he had a job to do. That the U.S. had never been beaten or wrong before and he figured it wasn't up to him to ask himself any questions. "He had a job to do. That job was to kill communists and that was what he was there for."

Another lovely scene showed several soldiers holding down on the ground a trussed up prisoner who was blindfolded and who was being tortured by some sort of liquid which appeared to be poured over his head.

My mind went back to World War 11, I recalled that many of these brave fighting men of the new U.S.A. were only the so-called gleam in the eyes of their fathers, or at best, infants newly arrived on this planet. They could not remember or know of the black anger and world condemnation called down on the head of Hitler, who, without compunction or guilt of any kind, deliberately walked into other sovereign nations declaring he had a better way of life for them. Battering down any resistance put up by the natives of each country in turn with an overwhelming force of highly trained and equipped army that could strike with lightning speed.

They could not know that this same man, Hitler, came within an ace of accomplishing his objective of world domination before the forces of justice caught up with him and eventually broke his awful power.

If they could know or have experienced this bit of shameful history, would their attitude still exude blind unthinking bestiality toward fellow humans?

Wasn't it just this kind of long-term emotional ignorance and hatred in a large segment of an otherwise civilized society that made it possible for Hitler to go as far as he did? How long do we wait before the American people, who have a proud history of friendship toward the under-privileged and needy, to give over this present folly and recognize this brute destruction foreshadows their own national ruin.

An equal tragedy is the present trend in our own country to hear official statements condoning this savage American foreign policy in Southeast Asia.

This, in spite of the policy recommended by Prime

Minister Pearson in a speech delivered in New York, March 5, 1965, In that speech he said, "Today...the aim of the international community must be to secure conditions in Southeast Asia in which, under international control and international supervision and effective international policing, the states in that area can work out their own affairs and conduct their own policies without any interference from any neighbour or any outside power.






