JONES GAOLED

FOR NEGLIGENCE

Mr. Frank Jones, key figure involved in a fatal accident on the Fulford-Ganges Road last July was convicted of Criminal Negligence and was sentenced to 90 days in Gaol. Mr. Jones was also barred from driving for four years.

The trial took place in Victoria last week.

The accident, a head-on crash between the Jones vehicle and one driven by Mr. Victor Sholes resulted in the death of Mr. Sholes and critical injuries to Mrs. Sholes. Mr. Jones also received critical injuries and is still using crutches to get around one year later.

A third car, also involved was driven by Mr. Haire of Victoria. His wife and two daughters riding with him were also injured, less severely.

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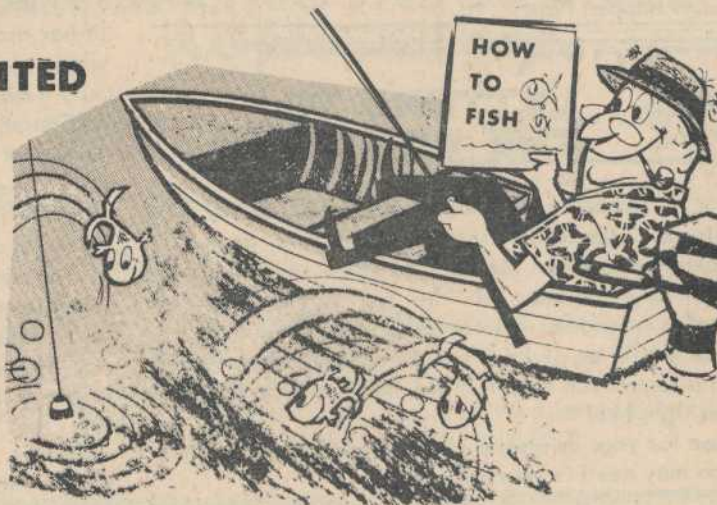
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Editorial



Having been a small boater in and around Active Pass this past week we wonder how long it will be before a serious marine accident befalls some unfortunate cruiser or fisherman. At the present time this stretch of water, with its treacherous tidal currents is almost as busy as First Narrows Bridge on a sunny Sunday afternoon.

Ferries, now on summer schedule, fishermen both sports and commercial, holiday cruisers, freighters and tugs with barges in tow can be seen at any given time during the day making their way through this narrow pass.

The smaller boats during flow or ebb tides can be very hard to handle in the swift waters and small boaters need to be experienced in handling their boats in order to avoid serious trouble. It should be obvious to anyone remotely acquainted with boating that any spill here would have disastrous results because of the speed of the water.

Much of this hazard to life would appear to be the speed with which the large ferries to through here as they do not seem to slow from their regular cruising speed of about 16 knots. At this rate it is frightening how little time it takes to be overtaken in a small boat. If the sun happens to be low either in the early morning or late afternoon, it must be most difficult for skippers of large craft to see a boat in the way. Another major reason for concern is the heavy wake following the large ferries that could easily swamp a small boat.

One way to lessen the hazard here might be to have the ferries slow their engines through the pass. They could still probably maintain their schedules by making up the time each side of the pass.

We are admittedly not expert in such matters. There maybe some legitimate reason for this. It only seems to us from our own observation that this situation at this moment reminds us of the old saying about an accident looking for some place to happen.

It could happen here.

Dear Sir - "I wonder why some American visitors find it necessary to make like Western Bad Men? I saw one pale, pot-bellied man from Seattle this week, wearing hacked off pants as shorts, and carrying a sheath knife on one hip, with a large calibre pistol in a holster in the other. There was no pretense over the gun either, as this character pulled it out and loosed off half-a-dozen shots at something in the water. He and his friend had several children with them, so they were setting quite an example for the kids. This is not an isolated incident either I saw another in Montague Harbour last year, firing a pistol from his boat, at a seagull in that crowded anchorage. On another occasion, I was in the woods helping to hunt for a stray cow, when suddenly confronted with a 13 year old American youth armed with a rifle. He blithely informed me that he was hunting squirrels. When I pointed out that he was breaking the law, he replied that he had a licence. So he had. But it was an American one. Many of these people seem to be under the impression that if they are on one of the privately owned islands, especially if the owner is American, they are outside the requirements of the Canadian law. If one tries to give a friendly word of advice, it is received with hostility. I am sure that in many of these cases, the culprit has lied deliberately when passing the customs at Port of Entry. I think that American owners of Canadian Islands should be advised by the RCMP to keep a check on their visitors as to the use of guns and illegal shooting before one of them causes a tragedy."

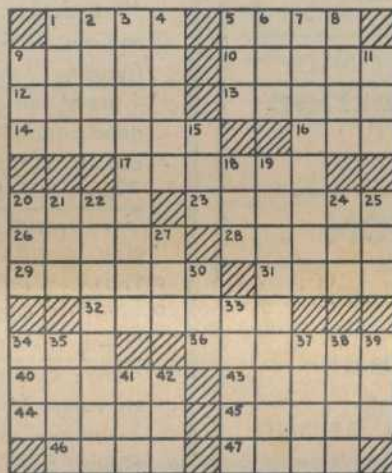

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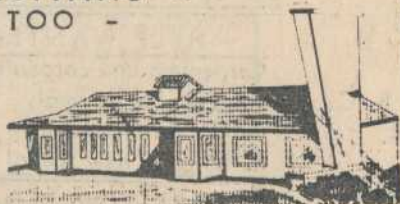

GARDEN CLUB ENJOYS VANCOUVER ISLAND FIELD TRIP

It was a glorious day last week when 26 members of the S. S. I. Chrysanthemum Society and Garden Club arrived at the Saanichton Experimental Farm, to spend part of the day and later visited three leading Nurseries on Vancouver Island. The morning was spent visiting green houses and garden plots. The fabulous and extraordinary begonias, fuschias and azaleas were a beautiful sight indeed with a gorgeous array of colour.

Azalea seed planted this year were already grown to good sized plants by a special method of experimenting, using what was termed "photoperiod"—meaning long day, short day and natural day. Such unusual and exotic plants as the Bouganvillea or "Crown Jewels" from Brazil, the Gynura aurantiaca or Velvet plant with its dark purple and green leaves which produces a lovely deep orange flower in winter or early spring were beautiful and unique. A huge philodendron monstera was interesting in that it had buds, flowers and fruit all on the one plant. Two of the Ges-

neriaceae family - Columnea stavanger and columnea gloriosa were most attractive with their shrimp colored flowers all aglow. They hung to the floor from revolving pots which were six feet high. These were only a few of hundreds of such rare specimens. It was interesting to watch climbing tomatoes being pollinated by an electric pollinizer. Members enjoyed a friendly visit at lunch time on the picnic grounds. A beautiful setting partly surrounded by the shrub garden and a splendid view of the ocean in the distance.

The Flora-Vista Gardens were next; a beautiful place and extensive nursery stock. Mr. Marshall of Marshall's Rose Nursery on Quadra gave a short talk on roses and their care before we explored the garden.

Gay Border was the last port of call. By this time members who hadn't already filled their cars with plants which they had purchased, found "just what we had been looking for" and pushed a few more in somewhere for the ride home.

For a rest to the eyes from the array of color, members view a green vegetable garden at Gay Border where Mr. Barton conducted

a tour. At this point when we left Pat Bay Highway for home, one most active and enthusiastic member remarked that he didn't think he could look another flower in the face for some time, but a wonderful day was had by all.

Important Notice about Old Age Security

The Parliament of Canada has amended the Old Age Security Act. Over the next five years the age at which the Old Age Security pension becomes payable is to be gradually reduced to 65. Eligibility for pension is subject to certain residence requirements.

In January, 1966 the Old Age Security Pension of \$75 a month will be payable to those aged 69; in 1967 to those aged 68; in 1968 to those aged 67; in 1969 to those aged 66; in 1970 and thereafter to those aged 65.

Mr. Foulis has been as-

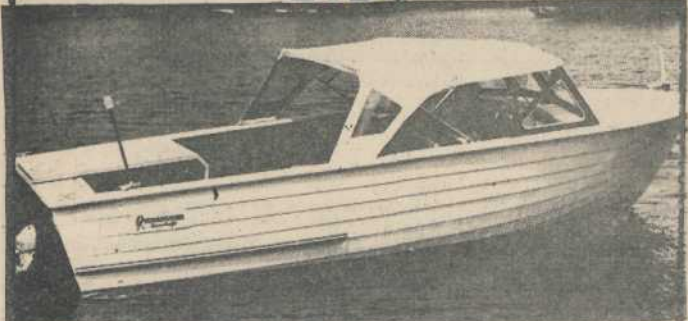
signed to the Presbyterian Church in Whalley just outside New Westminster.

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ISLANDERS HEAR ABOUT ST. VINCENT ISLAND

Recently Reverend Father Roland Roberts gave an illustrated talk on his work at St. Vincent in the West Indies to over 100 people at the home of Mr. and Mrs. R. Akerman, Fulford.

Not much bigger than Saltspring, St. Vincent is 17 miles long, 13 miles wide with a population of 85,000 crowded into an area of two miles along the shore.

Father Roberts showed excellent coloured slides of the lovely tropical scenery and the brilliant holiday attire of the citizens.

Cane sugar used to be the main crop for the Island but now it is bananas. Father Roberts gets all the bananas he wants, free, because they give him unmarketable fruit. They grow and process arrowroot powder at St. Vincent, and ship it in various forms to other countries. The natives pick huge basketsful (about 10 a day) and get a big 10¢ for each one. Oh well, one could always eat a spoiled banana to even things up. It is almost unbelievable that such a small island can hold all it does in the way of industry, interests and people. There is privation, starvation and sickness as the people do not benefit from the industry.

The butcher shop is next to the hospital (1) and the shop is open to flies. People bring a plate if they possess one, to collect a piece of meat; failing this, they carry it 'as is' up the beach, with dozens of dogs milling along behind trying to get a share.

Mothers of small children who all have to work, formerly would tie their babies by the foot to a tree, so it couldn't crawl away. There it would lie, hungry and exposed until ma came home

hours later. Some people got busy and built a school for these poor waifs. They gather them in to be looked after, fed and clothed. This was done by shared labor as there isn't much money for buildings. Father Roberts got donations by writing many letters.

We on Saltspring and in Canada as a whole, are fortunate in so many ways compared to natives in such places as St. Vincent.

Father Roberts said he used rum for his lanterns and lamps. That's because rum is cheaper than mentholated spirits! I hope this won't start a stampede for the island.

Breadfruit trees on St. Vincent were planted by Captain Bligh of the 'Bounty'. Buses are given strange and romantic names such as 'True Love', 'Never Late', and 'Hope'.

Although I have given this story a light hearted treatment, it is a very serious business to the people in charge of the Missions. They are doing a terrific job and need all the help they can get from outsiders.

One encouraging thing Father Roberts spoke of, the Anglican and Methodist Missions pull together in perfect harmony with the Roman Catholic Mission to help others.

Father Roberts is no stranger to the Island; he was often here on visits with his family many years ago, and Molly (Mrs. Carlin) let the cat out of the bag on one or two funny instances in his young past in Burgoyne Valley, as she introduced him.

ATTENTION EMPLOYERS

The Workmen's Compensation Act of B.C. requires employers carrying on business in British Columbia in any industry within the scope of the Act to register with the Workmen's Compensation Board of B.C. Any employer who refuses or neglects to do so may incur severe penalties because if his employee were to be injured, the employee would still be entitled to Workmen's Compensation benefits, and the employer would be liable for the full cost of such benefits.

This requirement applies to anyone employing workers in industries covered under the Act, irrespective of the size of the business or even if help is hired only on a part-time or casual basis. Some of the industries affected include the operation of laundromats, motels, cafes and restaurants, retail stores, service stations and garages, transportation and like service and trade industries as well as the primary industries of construction, manufacturing, logging, mining, etc.

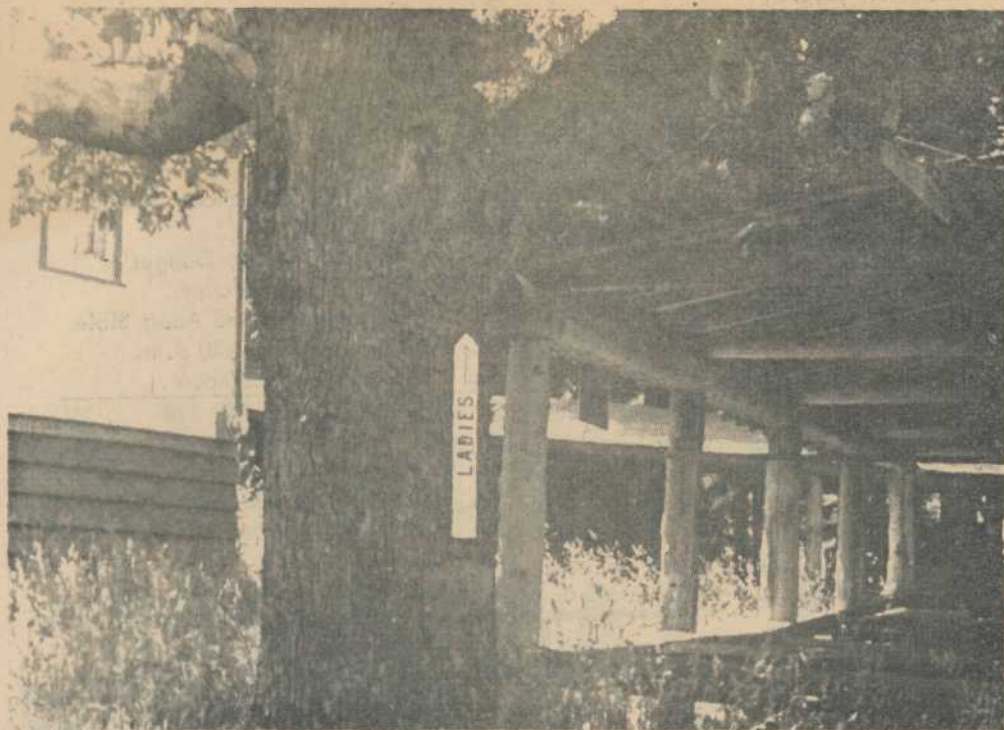
