The Canada Pension Plan and its benefits

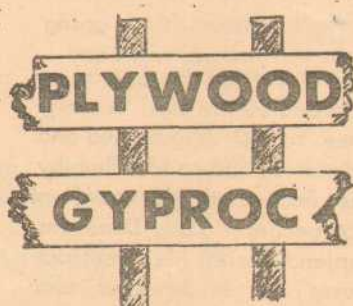
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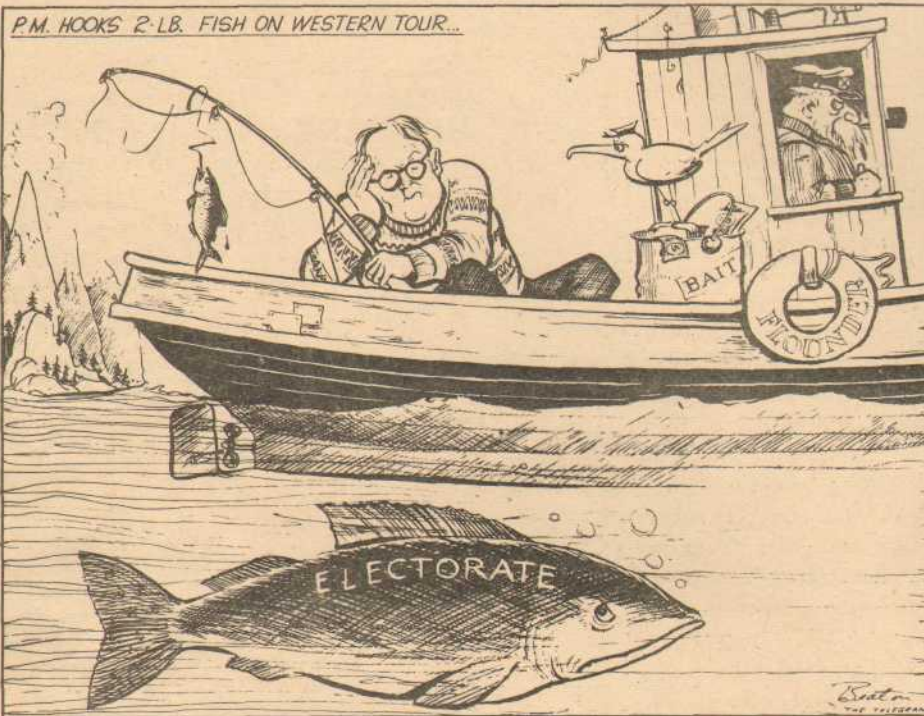

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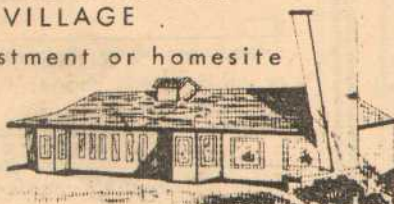

FIRE CHIEFS ACT ON CASES OF PARENTAL NEGLIGENCE

At a recent Fire Chief's Conference the following resolution was passed.

"Because the increase in the number of deaths of children by fire particularly in the last few years; and because these deaths are usually through the neglect of parents; and whereas it is usually too late to charge parents after a fire and after they have lost a child or children and because experience shows

great reluctance on the part of juries particularly with respect to convicting parents who have suffered the loss of their children; be it resolved that investigations be conducted who in the community habitually leaves their children alone and that charges be laid under Section 189 of the Criminal Code of Canada which states: "Everyone who unlawfully abandons or exposes a child who is under the age of ten years so that its life is or is likely to be endangered, or its health is or is likely to be permanent-

ly injured, is guilty of an indictable offence and is liable to imprisonment for two years.

Fred Donaghy, local Fire Chief, states this resolution is a direct result of an increase in the numbers of children who have been victims of fire as a result of being unattended for varying lengths of time. Mr. Donaghy says, "few people realize that such a law exists and that a life saved by impressing parents with this law is better than one rescued from a burning building."

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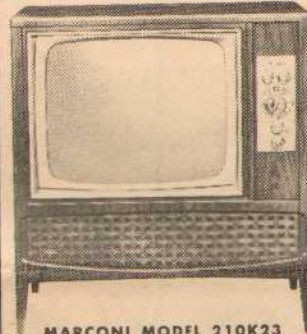

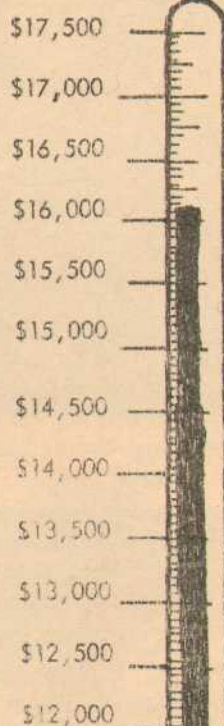

There has been a wonderful response so far to the canvass, and donations are still being collected from this source. Rumor has it to-

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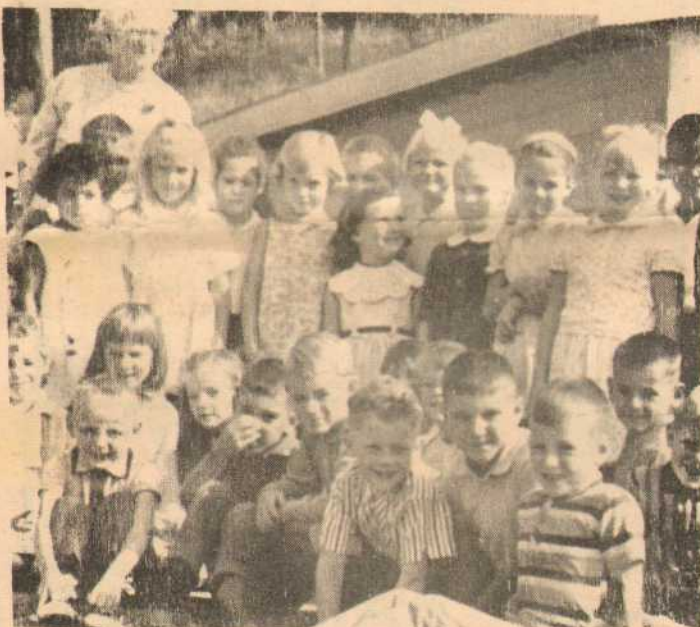

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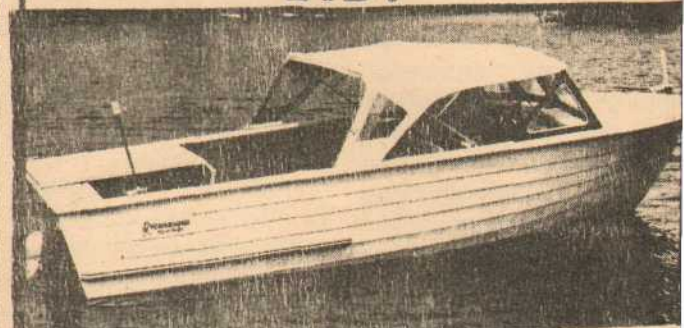
