#### JOINT COUNCIL NEWS

Department of Fisheries will be asked to take action with regard to large numbers of American vessels engaged in sport fishing in Canadian waters. This decision was taken at Joint Council of Gulf Islands Chambers of Commerce luncheon meeting held Dec. 7 at Harbour House, Ganges. Representatives from all Gulf Islands were present at the meeting.

Chief objection was directed against American charter boats in Canadian waters. It was stated that hundreds of U.S. vessels come over with three to six lines overboard. Canadian sport fisheremen are allowed only four salmon but this rule does not apply to Americans fishing in our waters.

Letter of protest sent to Hon. Ray Williston and forwarded to federal fisheries department brought the information that Canadian law allows c American sport fishing boats to cruise in Canadian waters without reporting unless they touch shore or anchor. Council members asserted that Canadians ! are not allowed to go into American waters without reporting, on penalty of seizure of their boats. Mrs. H.D Scott, Pender Island, and John Menzies, Galiano, were asked to discuss the problem with Department of Fisheries officials.

The vexing matter of dealing with unprincipled hunters came up for discussion. It was stated that these men come over from the mainland, shoot indiscriminately, with no consideration for life or property, and make themselves a general nuisance. Mrs. Scott said they camp on Pender Island roadsides and dead end roads and this, along with other troubles, creates a sanitation problem. She said RCMP have stated that signs, obtainable from Department of Health, can be posted forbidding camping in unauthorized places.

Mrs. Scott said all property on Pender Island is posted

with "no trespassing" signs but this does not stop hunters from shooting from the road on to private property. She asked if islanders would be within their rights to post a sign at the ferry wharf forbidding shooting on the island without owners' permission. John Menzies said Galiano has the same problem. He doubted that the Games Department would allow complete closure but said RCMP had advised that the island can be closed to rifles. This would allow bird shot only.

There was general exchang of views on the subject but no action was taken by the Council.

Melville Spouse, Galiano, reporting on transportation, said radio service between Mayne Queen and other ferries at Swartz Bay will ensure passengers making connections where ferry schedules are tight. Mr. Spouse noted that the long walk to and from ferries at Swartz Bay has been eliminated for the physically disabled. He was critical of some complaints about ferry service and said if people choose to live on the islands they should be prepared for some inconveniences. "Let's not go overboard", he said. A.W. Wolfe-Milner, Salt

Spring Island, agreed that the ferry service in general is good but said some of inter-island service is not what it should be Passengers on Queen of the Islands going into Mayne Islanc see the Mayne Queen pulling out even before they can disembark. Mr. Wolfe-Milner said this arrangement seriously curtails the movements of work crews and islanders having business on the other islands. He suggested Mr. Spouse was evaluating the service from point of view of Galiano. Council was told by other mem? bers that Mayne Queen's tight schedule does not allow her to stay longer at Mayne Island.

Mrs. Scott said it is not possible to get patients from Pender Island to Lady Minto Hospital at Ganges under three hours by ferry. Mrs. Scott, a registered nurse, said taking seriously ill patients in by water taxi is a frightening experience. Mr. Spouse offered ta discuss the Islands' requests for changes with ferry authorities if representatives would put them in writing. Robert Hindmarch said Saturna Island has to move the sick and injured to hospital by plane. Ferry travel is not feasible, he said, but he objected to any improvement in the service if it means that another island "loses even five minutes"

Joint Council will ask Department of Health to leave arrangements for Gulf Islands health services as they stand at present. Reported possibility of incorporation of local health services with Duncan regional district was protested by all the islands and strong opposition was expressed to any link contd. to P. 2 col. 3

SCHOOL BOARD NEWS

School trustees agreed unanimously but without enthusiasm to sell 15 feet of school playing field to Department of Highways for widening of Rainbow Road. Closure of Kanaka Road from Rainbow Road to school bus shed, which the Board had hoped would compensate for loss of land on Rainbow Road side, was left in abeyance. Objection to closure was made by Kanaka Road resident Dr. G. H. Holmes and for this reason the highways department has stated it is unable to allow the road to be closed.

Prior to discussion of the matter the Board heard a delegation from the Chamber of Commerce headed by Mrs. Beth Wood. An appeal was made to the Board to separate the Rainbow-Kanaka Roads issue and to treat the problem as two separate questions. Mrs Wood said there is urgent need for Rainbow Road to be widened before someone is hurt. She said the highways department is prepared to spend money to c do the work now. Should Ganges become a village and the work is not done the cost will fall on village taxpayers.

A.W. Wolfer-Milner said this part of Rainbow Road, 33 feet wide, forms a serious bottleneck where it abutts the 66 foot wide section of the road to the west. He asked the Board to agree to widening the road and make Kanaka Road closing a separate matter. C. R. Horel argued that if Ganges becomes a village the cost of necessary storm drainage for this area of Rainbow Road would be reduced if the road is widened now. This will have to be done eventually, he said and if not done now would make double expense for the killage. Mrs. Wood promised full support of the Chamber of Commerce in any future attempt by the Board to have Kanaka Road closed.

Following withdrawal of the delegation trustees discussed the subject at length. Sam Hughes said he was reluctant to commit himself to giving up the land. Donald New said he couldn't understand why the highways department was asking for the land, "Usually they just take it," he said. Vote was tied on a motion to make two issues of the Rainbow-Kanaka Road problem. Chairman L.J. Armstrong cast an affirmative vote to break the tie.

Buildings and grounds chairman George Heinekey reported problems regarding heat ing, ventilation and wiring in the new school have been satisfactorily settled by experts sent out by the architects.

SATURNA ISLAND
CENTENNIAL PROJECT HITS
SNAG

School trustees have been forced to take a second look at at their approval in principle of Saturna's plan to take the islands' school children on a cross-Canada trip as a centennial project.

Letter from Hon. Leslie
Peterson, Minister of Education, indicates that while he shares the Board's enthusiasm for the venture he must also point out certain liabilities which may rest upon the Board. Föllowing is the main text of Mr. Peterson's letter:

"There is nothing to prevent absence of children from school for this venture if the Board has approved the principle involved. The children are simply absent for those days, unless the Board is prepared to consider this a school activity."

"If the Board wishes to consider the project a school activity then it should consult its solicitors as to its liability for the safety and well-being of the children.

"The Board cannot, of course, shut down the school unless all the children make the trip, since it has an obligation to keep the school open for those children who may not wish to go on the trip. If all the children do so under charge of teachers in emply of the Board, then the Board would be well advised to look into its liability as suggested above.

"Personally, I feel the project will undoubtedly be very valuable to the participants for the very reasons stated by the sponsors. My only concern is that the Board be certain of its own obligations."

James Campbell, chairman of education and organization committee, was asked to study the matter and report to the Board.

CHAMBER OF COMMERCE NEWS

Lions Club offer of help with the children, on arrival of Bellingham Junior Chamber of Commerce Christmas ship at Ganges, was accepted with appreciation at the recent Chamber of Commerce council meeting. The ship is scheduled to arrive Dec. 17 or 18 but detailed itinerary had not been received. Council will seek co-operation of a Victoria radio station to have time of ship's arrival at Ganges broadcast after the boat leaves Sid-

The Council will ask ferry authorities to post a notice on ferries stating transportation to the ticket office is available for physically disabled persons, also that passengers' baggage will be carried if desired. These services have been made available by ferry authorities.

Roads chairman A.W. Wolfe-Milner said numerous pot holes have appeared following weeks of rain, but grading of roads is impossible in this weather. He reported traffic survey of former cenotaph area has been made by authorities, who based their survey on a sketch submitted at Chamber of Commerce general meeting in October by Corporal Fred Rhodes RCMP.

Salt Spring resort owners have asked for co-operation of the Chamber in requesting local stores to alternate closing times during July and a August to accommodate large groups of visitors coming into Ganges by bus.

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

What's in a Name?

It is almost 200 years since Dr. Archibald Menzies, one of the most renowned botanists of the early west, officially found and catalogued the king-size monarch of our coastal forests known throughout the world today as the Douglas Fir. Menzies endowed it with the botanical name of Psuedotsuga Taxifolia which may be translated a s a false hemlock with yew-likeness to the spruce as well as to the nemlock and yew, and, strange as it may seem, modern botanists have not yet precisely pinpointed the connection.

#### DRIFTWOOD

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In the wake of the voting results on the School Referenda, DRIFTWOOD conducted a survey of opinion of key people in and around the islands. Here are the results.

D. Hartwig, Principal, Gulf Islands Secondary School: Mr. Hartwig expressed disappointment at the defeat of the referenda, especially so in that it was such a close result between yes and no. He stated that this is his first experience at such a defeat of a referenda to provide improvements to school facilities. Elsewhere he says they have passed almost automatically. He states the result means they will have to continue to do the best they can with the facilities they have. He says they still have, at the moment, one classroom largely unused, but fears with the expanding student enrolment they will soon be completely out of space to deal with teaching needs. As the school population increases, the crowding becomes more serious and a less than adequate job can be done.

Mrs. F.Bennett, President P.T.A.: Mrs.Bennett expressed extreme disappointment at the defeat. She states that conditions dictate that the same referenda will have to be placed again as soon as possible. The facilities are needed and she wonders whether this is the best way to have them provided .....by a referenda vote or by some other means.

W.M.Mouat, pioneer citizen and ex-school board member:
"The situation has left the school without needed class-rooms.
This is tragic because the rapid increase in population means that these facilities should be provided as soon as possible."
Mr.Mouat stated, "It is always difficult to assess the reasons for the defeat but it would seem that the trustees have apparently lost the confidence of a large number of the voters due to the apparent excessive cost of the present new school site and building.
The Dormitory is needed and we must provide well - supervised accommodation for the increasing number of students from other islands coming to high school here."

Mr. L.J.Armstrong, Chairman School Trustees:Mr.Armstrong stated the results were terribly disappointing. These requested facilities are desperately needed to bring the school up to the required standard. He feels that misconceptions on the part of the voters such as that these improvements should have been done earlier do not take into account the changing dollar values. He said that many wild unfounded rumours also added to the result. A simple majority should be enough to pass—such referenda and not a 60% majority.

Mr. Geo.M.Heinekey, Chairman, Buildings and Grounds, School Board: "What happened to 30 votes? 30 votes would have passed all three referenda. I feel through lack of interest people did not realize the need for the referenda and did not come out and vote. Unfortunately we did not get the whole-hearted support of the parents, as less than 50% of the parents voted. This is not a School Board referenda. It is the responsibility of the Trustees to bring to the people the needs of education. Thirty-two million dollars in School Referenda were passed in the province last Saturday. The Gulf Islands was the only one to be defeated. This means we will pay for part of these improvements in other school districts. I feel the Board still has the responsibility to the children of this district, and that they will review the matter and repeat the Referenda".


