SECOND CLOSE CALL AT IMPERIAL RENOVATIONS

Another near miss was scored last week at the site of the Esso plant at the dock where extensive renovations have been going on for some weeks when one of the large tanks was accidentally drained of some 2000 gallons of gasoline.

Some weeks earlier a spark from a welder's torch set off a nasty oil blaze underneath the dock and it took our local firemen some time to extinguish it. The excitement caused the partial evacuation of all businesses on Mouat's Point in and around the dock area.

This time, Earl Kaye of Kaye Logging, was backing

his heavy logging truck into a position from which machinery would be used to pour cement. The space was very small and in jockeying the truck the rear wheel ran over an outlet pipe to one of the storage tanks, causing it to snap off.

Gasoline spouted some six feet in the air. Mr. Kaye quickly shut off the truck engine, jumped from the cab and tried to plug the pipe with his jacket and some rags getting his clothing soaked with gasoline in the process.

The fire department was summoned and the entire area was washed down with water for some time. Some of the gasoline was noted in the drain running into the salt chuck but it is believed most of the gasoline disappeared into the rock

DOUBLED IN 1965

Mrs. H.C. Giegerich, Dr. O.L. Stanton and John R. Sturdy were re-elected to the library board for further two year terms at the annual meeting of the S.S. I. Public Library Association held last Friday in the Legion Hall. Mrs. S.H. Hawkins was elected for a term of one year.

Dr. Stanton will continue as board chairman and Mr. Sturdy as secretary. Mrs. Hawkins is the new treasurer.

As expected the board reported a successful operating year in 1965 with sizeable increases both in membership and circulation. It was announced that the building debt had been cut to less than \$1000, with the hope that public support would help to erase it entirely in 1966. The secretary stated that the provincial government grant for the purchase of new books had been more than doubled in the past year, indicative, he said, of the continued growth of the library and of its position among the small public libraries of British Columbia.

IN THE HOUSE

Three days of bright, sunny weather, two cloudy days, fifteen speakers have gone by since His Honour read the Throne Speech and the debate grinds on. Speeches so far have ranged from a high of 2 hours and 2 minutes to a low of 37 minutes.

Perhaps because I am our side's Debate Leader in Agriculture I found the speech delivered by Cyril Shelford, Socred MLA from Omineca, to be the most interesting so far from the Government side of the House. He did a very good job of outlining some of the problems facing people in the rural ridings and particularly the farmers. For many years now the farmers have been faced with higher costs of production and steady or even declining prices for the products they sell.

On Tuesday afternoon of next week I will be going into this same topic in more detail and at that time will be presenting the New Democratic Party policy statement on Agriculture.

As a supporter of the government Mr. Shelford stopped short with his presentation of the problems facing the industry. In defence of the government, of which he is a supporter, he argued that little could be done on a provincial level.

As the opposition spokesman it will be my task to outline some of the measures that a provincial government could take, and measures that a NDP government

would take to improve the status of the agricultural industry.

Mr. Turner, NDP, MLA from Vancouver-East and Dean of the House is now starting his 26th year in the legislature. He spoke on Wednesday of this week and as is natural for a member representing Vancouver, dwelt mainly on the financial situation of the province. (Cont'd to p.7.col.1)

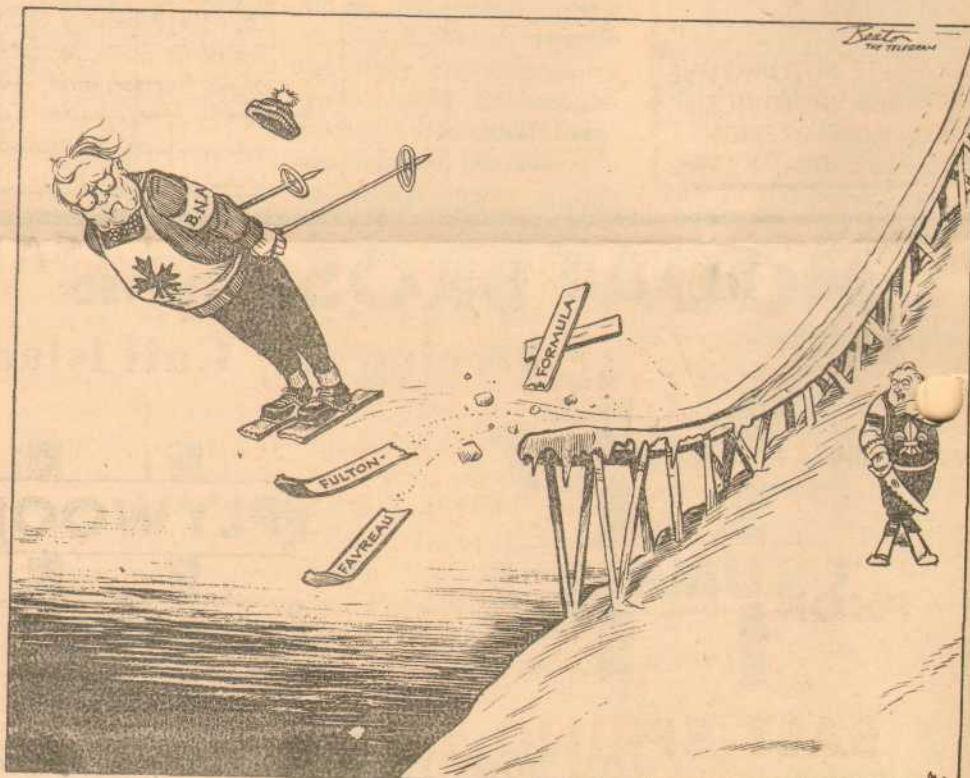

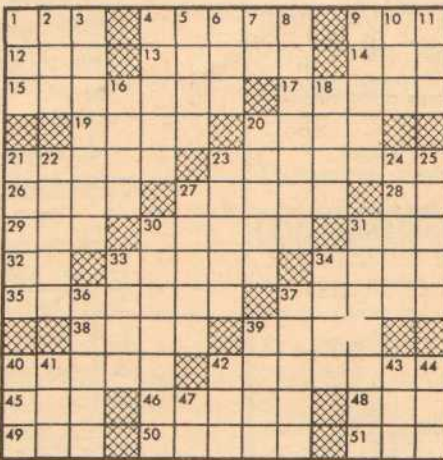

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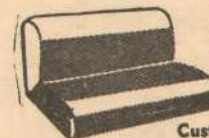

cial problems of municipal governments. He argued on the need for maintaining the lower levels of government on a satisfactory financial basis.

Governments at the local level are much closer to the people they represent that are the more senior governments, and as such are a truer representative of our democratic way of life. However their ability

to raise money is very limited in that they depend largely on taxation revenue based on property, and on government grants. Since most municipalities feel they are going as fast as they can in increasing local taxation, and are still finding it extremely difficult to finance local government services, the only alternative seems to be for the provincial government to increase its financial support.

This morning we had our annual battle about standing committees of the legislature. A few of the eight standing committees that are set up annually do meet and function well. The majority however meet only long enough to elect a chairman and secretary.

A year ago in the Agricultural Committee the Chairman elected seemed sympathetic to the opposition point of view as expressed by myself and Dave Barrett,

NDP - MLA from Dewdney. We argued that the committee should ask the House to refer specific problems facing the agricultural industry to the committee so that we could call in delegations of interested persons and perhaps make constructive suggestions to the legislature.

It would appear that the chairman - elect this year had come well prepared for our suggestions. He would

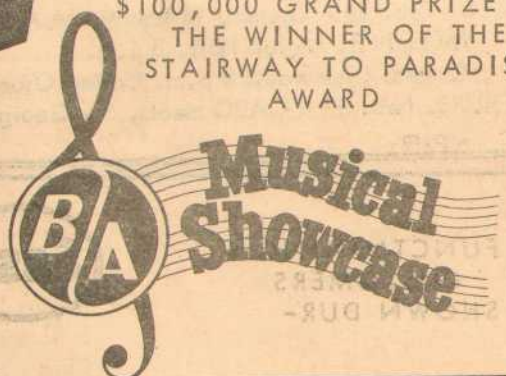

25 INCHES OF SNOW IN JANUARY

High temperature in January was 51 degrees on the 13th. Low came early in the month, January 4th at 25 degrees. The 8.66 inches precipitation included 25 inches of snow.

Maximum mean temperature was 42.2 degrees, minimum mean 33.8 degrees.

In 1965 the high was 50 degrees, low 27 degrees, with 6.91 inches of precipitation including 21 inches of snow.

Only 1 inch of snow was included in the 8 inches of precipitation in 1964. That year the high was 52 degrees and low 32 degrees.
