## Flying Concrete On Job

Helicopters were called in to service on a construction job on Salt Spring Island this week. It is the first operation of its kind in local history.

Part of the transmission line carrying power across the islands runs over the top of Mt. Erskine.

The slopes of the mountain are steep and there is no ready access to the site of the transmission towers.

On Tuesday the concrete for the foundations was shipped to the site from Duncan and flown to the mountainside by helicopter.

## NEW BEDS FOR ISLANDS HOSPITAL

Pared to 15 beds, the extended care unit for Lady Minto Gulf Islands Hospital has been approved by the health minister, Ralph Loffmark.

Mr. Loffmark told the provincial legislature on Monday that approval had been given

subject to confirmation by the Capital Region Hospital Board.

Original plan called for 20 such beds at the Salt Spring hospital serving all the Gulf Islands. Land has already been acquired for the extension.

The islands project is the second to gain ministerial approval under the recent hospital building by-law of the capital region.

Construction of the new beds will be in a new wing whose lo-

cation has not yet been established.

Announcement has settled fears which were expressed by a number of islanders when the islands became part of the capital region. It was felt that the islands hospital would be forgotten in face of the vast hospital problems facing the entire district.

Harold Hoffman, administrator at the hospital is vindicated. Mr. Hoffman has contended since the by-law was approved that the Lady Minto project would be a No. 1 priority of the board.

## SIX CHARGES EARN HIM SIX MONTHS JAIL

Six charges of obtaining money by false pretences were admitted in Ganges police court last month by an Okanagan man, Charles Glen Emick.

Emick was sentenced to six months in Oakalla, when two sentences of six months will be concurrent.

His wife, Velma Emick was fined \$250 when two of the charges were levied jointly against the couple.

The charges came after the couple gained accommodation and goods with worthless cheques.

# IRVING SINCLAIR



IRVING SINCLAIR  
...as many will remember him

Native Gulf Islander who became a famous American painter never relinquished the link with his old home. He always came back. Last year he came back for the last time. Irving Sinclair died in California a week ago after a long illness.

Even 73 years after he was

born on Mayne Island he was as familiar to the islands as he was to the famous Americans he had portrayed.

To Islanders he was also notable for his wide range of skills. He was still planning a painting tour of the Islands shortly before his death. He wanted to record on canvas all the beauty

live. It was an enthusiasm that grew up with him. His island friends can recall the early days of his life at Mayne Island when he would get up in the middle of the night to go out and catch the deer drinking.

When he was 11 years of age he won an award in the Toronto Exhibition and there was never any doubt in his mind of what he wanted to do with his life.

In 1917 he went to San Francisco and worked as an artist for an outdoor company there. In the 1920's he was art director for the Fox West Coast Theatres.

While engaged in commercial art, he was still busy with his own pursuits and during those years he painted many portraits of movie stars.

In 1930 he moved east and studied art in New York, under Wayman Adams, still carrying on with his portraits.

At the conclusion of his studies he returned to the California coast, where he had resided since 1934.

Mr. Sinclair was born on Mayne Island, where his father, J. W. Sinclair was teaching. Later the family moved to Galiano, when Mr. Sinclair became the teacher there.

The artist was a visitor to Galiano almost every year. He and his wife, Juliette were familiar figures at art exhibitions and classes during the summer months. His classic elderly model Cadillac convertible was to be seen through Seaton from Vancouver and Mr. and Mrs. Don Johnson, Victoria.

## HE WAS THE PUSH

We lost St. Mary's Church to Saanichton last issue, didn't we? (Page 3 — Feb. 27th). Also notice with some surprise about St. Mark's Church — neither the Rev. E. F. Wilson nor the Rev. J. B. Haslem built St. Mark's — (Page 5 — Feb. 20). St. Mark's was founded by the people who got together in 1888 and had the wee Church started in 1889, and it was used almost as soon as the roof was on to hold services when visiting clergymen came from Victoria and Saanich and in 1891, the first resident Clergyman, Rev. J. B. Haslem was posted to the island. He may have been there for the consecration service in 1892, but the builders were the people and S. J. Beddis, his son, R. A. Purdy and Carl Walter, maybe others — all did the actual work.

St. Mary's was founded by the Rev. Wilson but the money

collected came from the people and the builders were Fred Raines and some of today's late granddaddies who were here in the days when oxen were used to break the ground and haul timber. Perhaps rather than state that the Rev. Mr. Wilson was the founder it would be more correct to say he was the PUSH behind the project to build St. Mary's.

But as for St. Mark's on the Hill — that little old Church was UP and in use before Mr. Haslem arrived on the island. As a matter of fact, Mr. Haslem was ordained the same year that St. Mark's was founded — 1889. I would suggest people read "St. Mark's on the Hill" by John Rhodes Sturdy — he has done an excellent job on writing the history of St. Mark's. Just though a few of the pillars were slipping and wanted to straighten them out.

As for the Rev. J. B. Haslem, he DID get the lumber on to the Fulford beach for St. Mary's Church and collected several hundred dollars to help with construction. Mr. Wilson carried on from there — and performed a good job.

## A BACKWARD STEP

Despite the warm support of Parliament; despite the endorsement by two prominent political parties in Canada; despite the apparent apathy of half the country; despite the failure of Canadian churchmen to take a stand on the matter; despite the assurances that to oppose it is failure to live with the times we are convinced that Canada is taking a backward step in placing governmental approval on homosexuality.

Many Canadians have worked hard and long to bring the new Criminal Code amendments into effect.

There was a sharp opposition to the change in abortion laws, particularly by the Roman Catholic Church. This opposition was only shared by those who could share the proposition that the unborn human embryo is, in fact, a separate human being. It was, then, not surprising to find the majority in support of an easing of restrictions on the legality of abortion.

It was surprising to many to find almost complete indifference to the law which will countenance homosexuality.

The practice has gained immensely in recent years. It has gained popularity and it has gained support. There is extensive lewd literature available for the delectation of those engaged in the practice and there is enthusiastic lobbying for laws which will make it easier to pursue the perversion.

It is even possible that when a new Gibbons appears, all set to write his story of the Decline and Fall of the Canadian Nation, he will cite this Year of Grace, 1969, as the rotting away of the first bulwark.

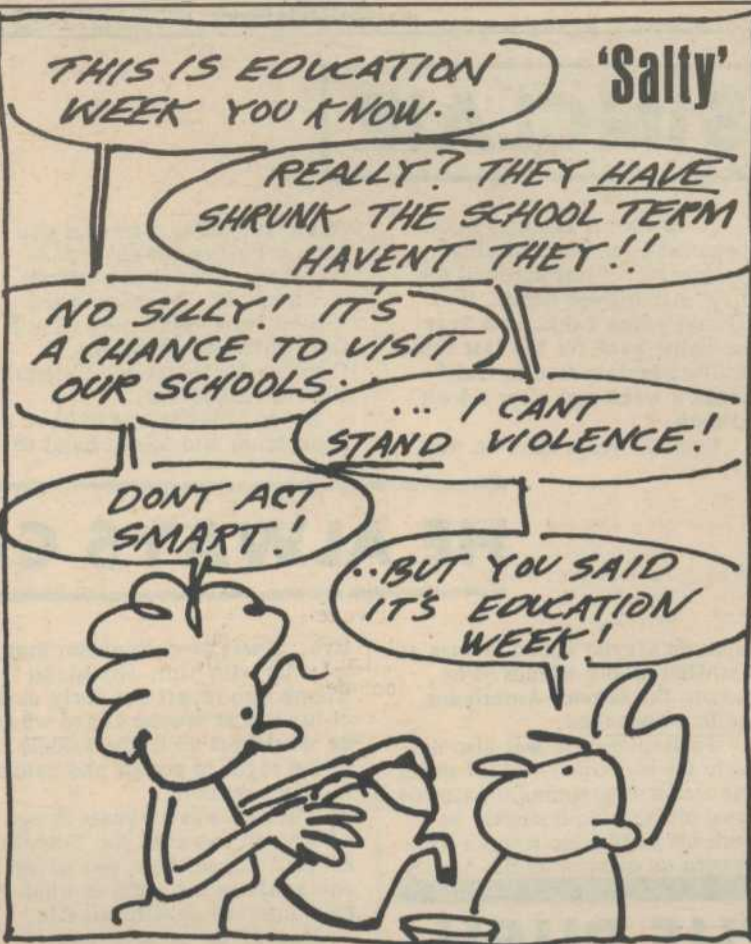
