NEW BEDS FOR ISLANDS HOSPITAL

Pared to 15 beds, the ext-ended care unit for Lady Minto Gulf Islands Hospital has been approved by the health minister, Ralph Loffmark.

Mr. Loffmark told the prov-

incial legislature on Monday that approval had been given

subject to confirmation by the Capital Region Hospital Board.

Original plan called for 20 such beds at the Salt Spring hospital serving all the Gulf Isla ands. Land has already been acquired for the extension.

The islands project is the second to gain ministerial approval under the recent hospital building by-law of the capital region.

Construction of the new beds

will be in a new wing whose lo-

cation has not yet been establ-

Announcement has settled fears which were expressed by a number of islanders when the islands became part of the capital region. It was felt that the islands hospital would! forgotten in face of the vast hospital problems facing the entire district.

While engaged in commer-cial art, he was still busy with his own pursuits and during

his own pursuits and during those years he painted many portraits of movie stars.

In 1930 he moved east and studied art in New York, under Wayman Adams, still carrying on with his portraits.

At the conclusion of his studies he returned to the California coast, where he had resided since 1934.

Mr. Sinclair was born on Mayne Island, where his father, J. W. Sinclair was teaching. Later the family moved to Galiano, when Mr. Sinclair became the teacher there. came the teacher there.

The artist was a visitor to Galiano almost every year. He and his wife, Juliette were familiar figures at art exhibi-tions and classes during the summer months. His classic elderly model Cadillac convertible was to be seen through-Seaton from Vancouver and Mr.

A BACKWARD STEP

Despite the warm support of Parliament; despite the endorsation by two prominent political parties in Canada; despite the apparent apathy of half the country; despite the failure of Canadian churchmen to take a stand on the matter; despite the assurances that to oppose it is failure to live with the times we are convinced that Canada is taking a backward step in placing governmental approval on homosexuality.

Many Canadians have worked hard and long to bring the new Criminal Code amendments into effect.

There was a sharp opposition to the change in abortion laws, particularly by the Roman Catholic Church. This opposition was only shared by those who could share the proposition that the unborn human embryo is, in fact, a separate human being. It was, then, not surprising to find the majority in support of an easing of restrictions on the legality of

It was surprising to many to find almost complete indifference to the law which will countenance ho-

The practice has gained immensely in recent years. It has gained popularity and it has gained support. There is extensive lewd literature available for the delectation of those engaged in the practice and there is enthusiastic lobbying for laws which will make it easier to pursue the perversion.
