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PROVINCIAL VOTE NEARS

Seen on the Election Scene

It's odd that conservationists are, largely, liberal thinkers.

SAM, of the crushing jaws, the state-sponsored automobile undertaker is heading into a free enterprise channel. Some auto-graves had been rattling the chains in indignation over the provincial and regional government's entry into their arena. This week the Capital Regional District is inviting tenders to either collect wrecks for SAM in the Colwood area or to undertake the whole project of collecting and crushing the relics. It was a blow struck for free enterprise.

Liberals campaign committee rooms are in Sidney. That is probably as far as Malcolm Anderson could row after his earlier triumph in Sidney.

Foster Isherwood was in better fettle this week when he announced the only campaign committee rooms in the islands. He is looking to next Saturday, when he will open his rooms in the former Jolley accounting office. Probably be a jolly political office for a few weeks.

Hugh Curtis moved into high gear among the islands this week when he arrived on Salt Spring Island on Tuesday. With a stint on Pender on Wednesday, he was hoping to move on to the other islands without delay.

Eric Sherwood is also traveling hard. He is making the islands trail and this week end will land in Mayne to coincide with the fall fair. That'll be Big Gun Day, when Tommy Douglas will be there with him.

Top man on the islands tote 'em pole so far is Foster Isherwood who must have met more islanders than any other candidate.

Forecasts of the provincial election are early yet, but Hugh Curtis is already making some estimates. He is optimistic

that the Conservatives under Darryl Warren will elect six members to the new legislature, and he hopes for better.

Mr. Curtis made his forecast in the electoral bailiwick of the last Tory to be seated in the legislature, Larry Giovando. He actually made it over luncheon at Harbour House.

FIRST AID AT GALIANO

Provision of first aid for Island visitors as well as emergency equipment for local residents has been under study by the Galiano Chamber of Commerce for some time. There are two retired physicians living at the north end of the Island, but there has been no one in regular medical practice since Dr. H.D. Barner died last year.

At the Chamber council meeting on Wednesday evening it was reported that Mrs. Clare McAllister, head of the health and welfare committee, working with Dr. Hart Scarrow, had completed arrangements for a temporary first aid room which will be available until a permanent centre can be opened.

Fire Death Inquest Thursday

— AFTER SEARCH

Inquest will be held on Thursday evening in the Court House at Ganges into the death of Philip Turley, aged two, who died in a fire at Musgrave Landing.

When four cabins at Musgrave were destroyed by fire on July 28 a search was instituted for the small boy.

Police and volunteers examined the woods and the ashes for a week before laboratory tests proved that ashes contained the remains of a two-year-old boy.

RCMP from off-island detachments were augmented by local volunteers for the search.

Dead child is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Clifford Turley, of Sidney. Small colony of young persons was living in the four abandoned cabins. They lost their possessions in the blaze.

Cpl. D. E. Burke, in charge of the Ganges detachment, expressed his gratitude to the men who took part in the search and those who were not called and offered help.

Police recovered a 15 ft. boat which had been taken to Sidney. It is believed that a group of young people had been responsible. One juvenile has been charged with the theft.

Second theft is being investigated and at press time on Tuesday, RCMP boat, Sidney, was investigating reports of the discovery of a missing 14 ft. boat at Pender.

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
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QUESTIONS ARE RAISED ON PERMITS

Meeting Hears Protests — Quick Replies to Charges

List of complaints voiced at a small semi-public meeting in Ganges on Tuesday of last week covered protests of needless delay on the part of five different authorities.

There were reports of hold-ups by the building inspector,

the health inspector, department of highways, electrical inspector and the Attorney-General's department. Nineteen people attended.

It was an evening of complaints and the meeting in the Court House had been called to air the complaints and to exchange notes.

Jim Wilkinson was named to the chair as soon as it opened. He invited each complainant to explain his problems.

Mr. Walker recalled that when his house was burned he was told by Building Inspector Emil Lachmuth that he could use the original septic tank and disposal field. Later, when Contractor Wilf Bangert went to finalize the permit, he was told to stop everything.

Property consists of three quarter-acre lots in the vicinity of the Walker Hook subdivision, where Dr. J.L.M. Whitbread, medical officer of health, had refused permits for septic tanks on individual lots.

For the past five weeks he has seen the building inspector each week, but he has not received any satisfaction, reported contractor Bangert.

Walker continued to explain that he had finally put it in the hands of his lawyers, who told him he would have to have the lots surveyed and staked at a cost of about \$250. He would be held up for about six months, he told the meeting.

Percolation tests have been 100%, he added.

"Can't seem to find out who to go to," commented the chairman. "It's not the building department. It's the health department."

Ted Delmonico said he wasn't going through the same old (Turn to Page Seven)

**MODERNISE
WITH
PROPANE**

Following complaints of electrical inspections voiced at a small meeting in Ganges last week DRIFTWOOD called Inspector Phil Bennett, of Duncan who covers Salt Spring Island on a weekly visit.

Mr. Bennett explained that he had seen Fenton Lee at the Ganges office on Thursday last week and that he had agreed to extend the connection in order to avoid hardship.

Mr. Bennett explained that the controls on electrical wiring and service are enforced in the interests of public safety. A temporary service is connected in order that a builder may have power on the site to use power tools, he explained and the regulations in British Columbia make it very clear that such a service must be used for no other purpose.

Mr. Bennett also stated that he was unaffected by regional disputes and that electrical permits were not granted or withheld in accordance with local disputes.

The inspection of electrical wiring and installations is made in accordance with the provincial Electrical Energy Inspections Act and regulations arising from that act, said Mr. Bennett, and no other factor comes into the matter.

He urged that householders should call his office when they have a complaint.

"If you feel you have a grievance or a complaint," he told DRIFTWOOD, "Please call my office."

He added that he will be very happy to meet the building committee of the Salt Spring Island Chamber of Commerce and discuss all aspects of electrical inspections.

On Tuesday Regional Director Marc Holmes reported that the chief building inspector for the region had arranged a visit to Salt Spring Island by the Chief Health Inspector last week. It is awaiting the deci-

sion of the health department, he explained. Mr. Holmes told DRIFTWOOD that the regional district can do nothing until a health permit is issued.

George Code had expressed fear of discharges from the lots in Walker Hook Place polluting his well.

It was at his instigation that the Superintendent of Insurance had prohibited the sale of quarter-acre lots in that subdivision said Director Holmes. The ban continues until August 14.

"No bathroom, no privy, no septic tank, no cottage and no house can be built on those lots," explained Mr. Holmes, "Their sale had to be stopped."

Terry Dow protested that he had received notification in the press before he received official warning of the ban. Formal notification had been given by double-registered mail on July 28, said Director Holmes.

Building inspector examined the barn on the Evans property following repeated complaints by a neighboring property owner that it was being used as a dwelling, contrary to regulations.

Emil Lachmuth had reported to the board that the barn was of good construction and a permit could be issued to convert it should the owner so desire, recalls Mr. Holmes.

Mr. Evans may take out such a permit at any time, he added, as far as he is aware.

Last comment was in respect of the Delmonico complaint. The board has agreed to let Ted Delmonico appeal to the Board of Variance, although the board has no apparent jurisdiction in the matter.

Function of the board is to arbitrate on variations from the building regulations or interpretations of regulations. It cannot exert any authority in matters of planning and zoning, he explained.

* * * THEIRS IS FIRST EVER

Construction of a rest home on Salt Spring Island has been delayed by the administrative problems of an entirely new legislation. It had never been done before.

When Mr. and Mrs. Daniel R. Ellis applied for rezoning of their Blackburn Road property this spring, the application was rejected by the Capital Regional District. Applicants were told on May 24 that the zoning was not permissible.

The board agreed that the project was a valuable service to Salt Spring Island and suggested that an application be made for a land-use contract. At that time the land-use contract was a new form of control and the Capital Regional District had no guidance on the methods to be used to initiate such a project.

The Ellis application for such a contract was received at Regional District headquarters on July 19 and placed in the "pending file" until the Board had established procedures to be followed.

To date, the board has not signed any Land Use Contracts, a relatively new form of land use control, and there is every possibility that the Ellis proposal will mark a first for the Capital Regional District.

SEWER PROPOSED

Editor, Driftwood,

The news item "Basic Sewer Cost \$72,00" in Aug. 3rd edition of this paper - with emphasis on the 6th paragraph - will surely be causing concern to those of us who reside in the 'designated area'. And by 'designated area' it is assumed to be that portion of the Island from Cranberry Road to Crofton (Hospital) Road.

Since Salt Spring is part of 'unorganized territory' is it not the full responsibility of the Provincial Government to protect the health and welfare of its people through all adequate facilities -- in this case a sewer system which meets the rigid standards of their Health Department? Why should it be expected of a small group - many of them Old Age Pensioners - to subsidize a project of which it is stated 'all costs must be carried by the area enjoying the service' when the Island as a whole, directly or indirectly, would benefit? This would be extremely unfair.

The basic \$72,00 perhaps to some is a mere 'drop in the bucket' but to many of us in the 'designated area' it would further increase an ever-dwindling purse. And that would only be the beginning; spiralling costs would increase the maintenance of such a project out of all proportion and perhaps make it necessary for some to move from the 'designated area' to another part of the country where they could afford to live. Is this the intention of those desiring a sewer system?

Another point - and a very important one - to be considered is the site of such a system. Where? Most of the Village stands on fill, parts of which are affected by tidal water and heavy run-off from the Rainbow Road area. When the sewer question was raised some years ago costly plant operation and lack of a proper site defeated the purpose of that committee. A referendum presumably undertaken in the 'designated area' would probably result also in defeat. And we would be back where we started!

It should be made clear to all concerned that most establishments from Harbour House north to the Hospital have at considerable cost, ranging from \$1,000.00 to over \$20,000.00, installed their own systems fully certified by the Provincial Health Department. Is it at all

likely that these people would scrap these installations to become part of a general village operation? I think not!

And to those of you who would raise the point of infectious hepatitis; the writer is a victim of that disease, and it is one reason why she established a properly certified disposal unit on her property.

The culmination of this dissertation is why cannot those who desire it install proper sewer disposal at their own expense without forcing the small group in the 'designated area' to carry what could be an ever-increasing costly burden?

Of course the ideal would be for the Provincial Government to carry out its function by adequately taking care of its people residing in 'unorganized territory'.

FOR THE COOK IN THE KITCHEN

HOT PLUM SHORTCAKE

2-3 cups fresh sliced plums
1 tbsp. lemon juice
1/3 cup sugar
1/8 tsp. nutmeg
1 cup all-purpose flour
2 tbsp. baking powder
1/2 tsp. salt
1/2 cup shortening
1 egg
3 tbsp. milk
1/4 tsp. cinnamon
Combine plums, lemon juice, 2 tablespoons sugar and nutmeg in bottom of greased 8x8 baking pan. Sift together flour, baking powder, salt and 2 tablespoons sugar. Work in shortening until crumb-like. Add egg and milk beaten together. Drop by spoons full over plums and top with remaining sugar and cinnamon. Bake in 350 deg. oven for 35-40 minutes or until fruit is cooked. Serve with cream, ice cream or whipped cream. Serves 6.

Down Through The Years

With DRIFTWOOD

12 YEARS AGO

When H. A. "Buster" Horel lost a cat in Bedwell Harbour in July, it marked the beginning of a 25-day drama. Buster loaded the bulldozer aboard Asa Douglas's barge to tow it from Pender to Salt Spring. Almost immediately on setting out, the barge struck a dead-head and was holed. It started to sink and catapulted the machine into the salt chuck, 200 feet of it. It was gone for good. Everyone said so; even the insurance company. story. He had bought property for a resort and then it had been zoned before he could get started. He has been told he can't have a resort.

The regional board has denied him the privilege of appealing to the Board of Variance, he reported. This denial was confirmed by the secretary of the board of variance.

Fenton Lee reported that he was attempting to get a home on his piece of property. He has been warned that his power will be cut off for misuse of the temporary connection.

Sewer Proposal For Ganges From

Engineering survey of the proposed Ganges sewer scheme has been released by Ker, Priestman, Keenan and Associates Ltd., confirming an earlier estimate of nearly \$400,000 for the system.

Total cost, according to the estimates, will be \$393,000. This includes a collection system over all Ganges central area from Drake Road to Lady Minto Hospital and from the sea to one block west of Jackson Ave. in the southern end and approximately one block each side of Lower Ganges Road in the northern end.

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Cost of the system will be \$72 per annum for a single-family dwelling, rising to an annual cost of \$600 for a hotel; \$2,500 for a school and \$3,000 for a hospital.

The cost of the current survey was \$300. This cost was borne by the Capital Regional District. It is described as a review of the feasibility study originally carried out in 1965 and reviewed at the direction of the Salt Spring Island Chamber of Commerce in 1970.

Estimated cost of the scheme in 1965 was \$168,000, notes the report. This original scheme covered a wider area and included the section of Ganges Hill from Drake Road to Cranberry Road, as well as the Swanson Pond area to the west of the hospital.

Review of the proposal in 1970 came up with a figure of \$331,000.

It may be noted that the original scheme included only primary treatment of effluent. Since that time a greater awareness of the effects of discharging untreated wastes into the sea or elsewhere has resulted in dem-

ands for more extensive treatment and care. The new proposal includes a secondary treatment plant and a chlorination unit.

Since 1970 the disposal of sanitary sewage wastes has created serious problems at the Lady Minto Hospital, which has been extended and at the secondary and elementary schools.

In addition, warns the report, the presence of septic tank effluents at the shoreline in the downtown area causes obnoxious odours under certain conditions.

Serious pollution problems have been experienced by the hospital and the schools as well as various residential and commercial properties in the downtown area.

In most places the soils are not suitable for the underground disposal of septic tank effluent. "As a result, creeks, roadside ditches and the shoreline are polluted with effluent, giving rise to an unhealthy and unsanitary environment."

Treated effluent can only go to one of two places. It must go into the ground or into the sea. There is not much hope of finding a large enough piece of property in a central location to install a spray irrigation disposal system.

Investigation of the feasibility of such a system would be costly and the plan calls for discharge of treated liquids into the sea.

"Because the water depth in the harbour is fairly shallow and other factors," says the report, "a very high degree of treatment, including chlorination, is recommended."

There will also be provision for sludge removal, to avoid the discharge of solid matter.

Location of the treatment plant site is approximate. No specific property has been decided on. Cost of land has risen enormously in the interim period, report the engineers.

The engineers and the committee are at present negotiating with the government for the allocation of an acre or so of Mouat Park for this purpose.

Technical details of the scheme are based on the domestic sewerage contribution of 60 gallons a day per person. This includes the toilet, washing facilities, laundry machines and cooking.

In addition, there will be a seepage into the lines of about 500 gallons per day for every acre of the system. Initial flow through the sewer pipes is estimated at 75,000 gallons. This represents about one-third sewage and two-thirds water which finds its way into the system.

The system allows for anticipated growth for the next five years and is designed to accommodate expansion as the need arises.

The collection lines and trunk sewers are estimated to be adequate for all needs in the area for the next 25 years.


Population of the area today is about 300. Based on past developments, this would result in a population of 380 by 1978.

The large incidence of rock in the area brings the cost up.

The figure of \$393,000 is based on total cost of the whole system, including the pipes to property lines, trunk sewers, pumps, treatment plants and marine outfall. A 20% addition covers engineering and contingency costs.

The figure does not include the cost of connecting the property to the system. Neither does it include the cost of installing a sewer pipe from the building out to the property line.

Connection fee and installation would be a liability of the



Exact location of the treatment plant and outfall has not yet been established. They are shown on private property to afford some indication of where they are likely to be situated.

Boundary of the proposed designated sewer area is shown on this map. The scale is not sufficiently accurate to identify individual properties. Owner of a lot located near the boundary may ascertain at the forthcoming public meeting whether his own property lies within the suggested boundaries.

Areas adjacent to the projected area may vote to come into the district at a later date of the sewerage scheme gains support.

The proposal has been offered at this time by the Salt Spring Island Chamber of Commerce because the schools in Ganges are in urgent need of a sewage disposal system. Once the board has spent many thousands of dollars on a system there will be less support for a community system, which could be then out of the question for a number of years.

property owner in addition to the cost of the sewer system.

The engineers base their cost estimates on the assumption that the work would be undertaken by the Capital Regional District and not by an improvement district established for the purpose or already existing for a parallel service.

The cost could be higher, for example, if the installation were undertaken by the North Salt Spring Waterworks District or the Fire Protection District.

The costs under any scheme would be levied against properties within the designated area. No charge may be made against properties in other parts of the community or of Salt Spring Island.

The cost of the mechanical installation of the system amounts to \$316,000. This is the amount which would be considered by the Central Mortgage and Housing Corporation for loans for the installation. Under NHA, two-thirds of this figure may be borrowed, subject

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
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
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Salt Spring Island Representative

tion under Bill No. 11, there would be financial assistance available. This bill would be operative if the government accepts the project under the Capital Regional District, relating to a designated area.

The bill allows the government to assist in the costs of principal and interest payable each year. The bill takes the total figure of a levy of two mills on land and improvements in the designated area. The two-mill levy is then deducted from the total payments for principal and interest. The government will then contribute 75% of the remaining sum, on an annual basis.

The province takes the same figure approved by NHA. In this case it would be \$316,000. The NHA figure, with \$52,500 for given, is \$157,500, making repayments including interest of \$14,285 per annum. Eight per cent debentures for \$106,000 would cost another \$9,932. On this basis payments for principal and interest in respect of the basic sewer works would be \$24,217.

The engineers assume that a basic two-mill levy would yield \$2,500 in the early years. Deducted from \$24,217, this leaves \$21,717. A grant of 75% of this figure would bring in a revenue of \$16,288.

The costs estimates, warn the engineers, are based on various provisions. It is assumed that the NHA will be available in the amount visualized and that CMHC will accept the engineers' classification of the eight-inch lines as trunk sewers.

It is assumed that the Pollution Control Board, after a public hearing, will issue a permit for the discharge of treated effluent.

The Capital Regional District would have to amend its letters patent to permit the launching of the project.

The engineers took the figure of \$2,500 for a two-mill levy. The grant is based on the assumption that two mills would not yield a greater sum.

If the province did not make the contribution already calculated, under Bill 11, the financing would take on a new aspect.

It is assumed that the relatively high charges for commercial connections will be acceptable.

Necessity of purchasing land for a treatment plant could also change the picture.

Salt Spring Island Chamber of Commerce will examine the

figures and a public meeting will be called in the near future, when property owners and businessmen will be invited to discuss finer details.

No installation can be undertaken without a referendum in the area affected.

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



that it was impossible to push forward with the Ellis application.

"It would be very unfair for anyone to blame Director Marc Holmes for failing to expedite the matter more rapidly," Young says. This is still a very new form of land control and all board members were anxious that our procedures offered full protection, not only to Land Use Contract applicants but also all residents of the area concerned."

With the adoption of the laid-down procedures the next move in the process lies with the applicants.

The procedures state that the applicant is responsible for preparing the draft Land Use Contract.

"There is no doubt in our minds that Mr. and Mrs. Ellis will require assistance in drafting the document," Young says. "As a result I have instructed the planning department staff to extend to them all the assistance required."

Following receipt of the formal document the Land Use Contract will be reviewed by appropriate technical and political committees and forwarded to the Regional Board for approval or rejection.

Young notes that in the event of approval an appropriate by-law will be drawn up and given first reading by the Board. Following that a public hearing on the matter will be held and, if there are no firm grounds for objection, the by-law is then returned to the Board for final approval.

Young says he regrets any misunderstanding Mrs. Ellis may have had following a telephone call from senior planner Charles Wakelin on July 21.

"From the report filed by Mr. Wakelin at that time it is obvious that he informed Mrs. Ellis that the Regional Board would be finalizing procedural matters on July 26 and that a decision was expected on procedures that day," Young says.

"Unfortunately, Mrs. Ellis understood him to imply that

the matter of the Land Use Contract would be decided that day. That, however, was quite impossible even as it was also impossible for Director Holmes to push for a decision that day." Young adds that on receipt of the draft Land Use Contract by the Regional District all possible speed will be exercised to

bring the matter to public hearing and that, hopefully, final ratification of the contract can take place at the October Board meeting which will likely be held on Salt Spring Island.



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
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PLANNING SUMMARY ON RADIO PROGRAM

Morning commentator on municipal affairs over CBC in Vancouver is Michael Crampton. Mr. Crampton has reported on the Gabriola Island hearings as well as many other aspects of zoning and planning which affect communities in British Columbia today.

Recently the radio commentator spoke on the summary of planning needs. He quoted from answers received from a number of planners, mayors and other officials across the country on how to plan the future growth of a community.

I. C. Shank, of Salt Spring Island Planning Association, heard the report and asked for a copy.

Here is Michael Crampton's view:

1. Establish a policy of citizen participation from start to finish. Create a citizen advisory committee representing a community cross section. Do a broad, attitudinal, house-to-house survey (perhaps employing teen-agers during the summer) to discover how the community sees itself and what it wants. You'll be surprised.

2. Be aware of what land or features in your suburb to preserve. Once a building goes up, a housing tract is built, or a road laid, the land's natural identity is gone forever.

3. Decide on a maximum population size. Population density is the key here along with a quality and style of life that appreciates the cost of community services. Establish a height limit which preserves vistas. Rezone only with the most careful consideration.

4. Conduct a cost-benefit study of every feature of the community. If people want more open space than light industry, they must know what it will cost. Somebody always has to pay the bill.

5. In the planning process, include every concerned jurisdiction - flood control, utilities, school, sanitation, police, fire, chamber of commerce, and so on. Don't leave anyone out. If you do, they will haunt you later.

6. Realize a community obligation to meet the needs of low-income citizens - the elderly, minorities, or the handicapped. How low-income housing is blended into a community and the availability of public transportation, are both important. Industry, in the future, may take a greater hand in aiding low-income employees in housing.

7. Waste and pollution, ac-

cording to nearly all local officials, is the No. 1 problem. Meet the issue head on even if it means clashing with industry.

8. Encourage extensive local media coverage of the planning process. Broadcast or telecast all, or key, city-council meetings.

9. Seek out ways in which the federal government can assist you. The Department of Housing and Urban Develop-

ment (HUD) for instance, makes planning grants available to communities as well as subsidies for low-income housing.

10. Remember that you are not a town unto yourself. You are part of a region and the future must be faced shoulder to shoulder with regional considerations. Be aware of new decisions made the Legislature which directly affect local jurisdictions.

11. A plan for orderly growth is only as good as the strategy for implementing it. The needs of the game is implementation.
