

## Adult education fees reduced by trustees

### Systems checked

The majority of malfunctioning sewage disposal systems in Ganges have been corrected. A few months ago, about a dozen property owners in Ganges were ordered to bring their disposal systems up to standard or they would face charges under the Health Act.

Regional medical officer of health Dr. A.S. Arneil told Driftwood on Tuesday that the "vast majority have been corrected".

He said that in some cases holding tanks have been installed and in others, corrections were made to the existing systems.

Dr. Arneil said he was very pleased at the response and that everyone was very co-operative. There are still some systems remaining to be corrected but they have been given further time extension.

"Those who haven't improved their disposal systems have had good reason for not doing so yet," said Arneil.

The Board of the Gulf Islands School District has ruled that all Continuing Education courses will be free to senior citizens upon presentation of a Pharmacare card.

The School District will now assume the balance of the costs in such instances.

A registration fee of \$1 will be charged and any books or materials that may be needed in the course will be the responsibility of the participant.

Another plan to enable more people to participate in the Continuing Education program of this district is the reduction by one-fourth of the course fee for a second member of a family, and the half-price reduction for subsequent members of the same family.

Fall classes will begin next week with evening sessions still in the majority. Many afternoon classes are being offered, along with a few week-end courses.

## Save Our Seas reports oil port hearing soon

There will be an Oil Ports Hearing in Ganges at the end of November.

The Tanker Committee, the Save Our Seas group, is organizing a campaign.

In the meantime, we would beg islanders to subscribe to the free and very readable periodical West Coast, a digest of evidence being presented to the West Coast Oil Ports Inquiry.

Dixie Lee Ray says it is none of our business. However, an oil spill on the American side of the Strait of Juan de Fuca or Georgia Strait will put oil on our shores, at our expense. That there will be a spill is certain - even the oil transportation companies admit this.

### GRIM RECORD

The statistical record for tankers is grim. For the five years from 1969 to 1973, the Tanker Advisory Centre, in New York, reports some 3000+ incidents, and of these, 82 tankers were totally lost, and 719,000 tons of oil discharged into the seas.

Groundings, collisions, fire, explosions...in just about all the "incidents" human error was involved.

In the first nine months of 1976

there were 604 incidents in which 13 tankers were totally lost and 200,000 tons of oil discharged. Then, on December 15, 1976, the 28,000 DWT vessel "Argo Merchant" went down and discharged her entire cargo of 7.8 million gallons of oil. And on and on.

But it is not the little vessels like the "Argo Merchant" that the oil transportation companies want to bring into our inland waters; it is the super tankers, of over 100,000 dead weight tons. The magnitude of the oil spill which these unmanoeuvrable giants could dump is ghastly to contemplate.

### WE DESERVE IT

Instead of continuing to bring

oil into the North American market by the use of existing ports, tankers and pipelines, the people who have built the supertankers and the people who have invested \$9 billion in the Alaskan pipeline have a surplus of oil to sell. If we don't fight them, we deserve our fate!

## Driftwood editor named to second term as president

Frank Richards, editor of Driftwood was named last week to serve a second term as president of the British Columbia and Yukon Community Newspapers Association.

He is the sixth president in the association's 59 years to serve a second term.

The association represents weekly newspapers in all parts of the province and in the Yukon. It grew out of the old British Columbia Division of the Canadian Press Association, which came into being in 1916. In 1917 it changed its name to the BC and Yukon Division of the Canadian Press Association. In the same year it divided into weekly and daily sections.

By the end of the war, thinking had changed and in 1921 it became lewesquianly independent, the BC and Yukon Press Association.

In the 30's the association still included daily and weekly newspapers, but in 1936 the final move was made and the association

became the British Columbia Division of the Canadian Weekly Newspapers Association. Weekly publications by this time vastly outnumbered the dailies. Later, once again, BC asserted itself and it was the BC Weekly Newspapers Association.

### Sailors seek rezoning

A public hearing is to be held at Ganges, October 4, to review an application for a change in zoning.

The Salt Spring Island Sailing Club has applied for Water B zoning on a water lease and foreshore located near Beddis Spit. There had been a private oyster lease on the property before, and it is presently zoned as Water A.

A half-time aid is to be engaged for the alternate class at Ganges.

The decision came last week at a meeting of the Gulf Islands School Board.

Trustee Tom Davidson introduced the motion to hire the aid and told his fellow trustees that he'd discussed the matter with elementary school principal Tom Watson. Davidson said the principal had advised an aid be sought and suggested the enrolment could then be increased to 25. The class teacher, Reid Collins, has set a limit of 20 students.

Trustee Ivan Mouat amended the motion by substituting full-time for part-time.

"A full-time aid would guarantee that the teacher could rely upon someone at all times," contended Mouat.

The amended motion, however, was not approved by the board, but the original one was.

### BETTER THAN NO BREAD

"Half a loaf is better than no bread at all," said trustee Nonie Guthrie.

A request was made at the last meeting of the school board by a delegation of parents for an aid for the class. The request was turned down.

Following the board's approval of a part-time aid, Mary Williamson spoke to the trustees. She outlined the history of the alternate class and said the board had taken a lot of persuading at first, but had finally agreed to its initiation. She urged the board not to label the supporters of the class as "a bunch of malcontents out to give the board a hard time".

"The class is going into its fourth year now," she continued. "The individual achievements of the students are known to the principal, the teacher, the students and God. If the board is not aware of this, you haven't been listening."

She said a new dimension has been added to the elementary school and that "we are fulfilling our responsibilities as parents and taxpayers".

She asked the trustees if they knew they would be receiving applications next September for admission to the alternate class of all the children presently in the nursery school.

"We know how difficult it is to relate to others with a different philosophy and background...we wish you too could understand how rewarding and challenging the alternate system is."

Mrs. Williamson warned that at least two full time teachers will be required for the alternate class next September.

"We don't come here to beg," she concluded, "we come to remind you of our children's needs and your responsibilities."

Nonie Guthrie was also displeased with the way in which matters had been handled.

"I'm very disappointed in the way the board has dragged its feet over the alternate program," she said.

### MORE THAN ONCE

A few years ago the name was changed to an association of community newspapers to meet the increasing numbers of weekly newspapers appearing two or three times a week.

The group is devoted to the maintenance of high standards in the production and preparation of a newspaper. Many of the innovations in modern printing technology have been proved in the weekly newspaper business.

During the coming year the association will play host to the national newspapers association in Vancouver.

Islands publisher was first named to the head of the association a year ago at the annual meeting in Vancouver. First vice-president of the association is Keith Marshall, of the Smithers Interior News and second vice-president is David Gamble, of the Summerland Review.



## New dentist comes to Salt Spring Island from Alberta

There's a dentist on Salt Spring who has done a lot of work besides easing the aching tooth. He's Dr. Kenneth R. Trefz.

A Canadian by birth, Dr. Trefz moved to America 18 years ago to travel the United States, teaching school with his British Columbia born wife. He taught elementary school and later high school, instructing in biology and chemistry. The Trefz family moved around and saw a lot of country during their 18-year American journey.

Dr. Trefz taught in Texas, just south of Fort Worth, at Caldwell in Idaho (near Boise) in Springfield, Oregon and at Tacoma, in rainy old Washington.

Born in Hanna, Alberta, Dr. Trefz left to come west, where he married. The couple returned to Calgary but only briefly, before journeying down to the United States.

Between years of school teaching, Dr. Trefz took a year of here

and there. He'd get involved in construction work to lessen the monotony of his calling and at one point worked in a medical lab for 14 months.

### FROM LOMA LINDA

In February this year the island doctor graduated from Loma Linda University in Southern California. The university specializes in medical studies as well as in the liberal arts.

From there, the doctor came north, joining two dentists in association in Calgary, his old stomping ground. But the prairie town just wasn't the same and he and his wife packed their bags in August to come west to feel the rain and fog of west coast living.

They like the island and enjoy the uncongested environment. Dr. Trefz will begin his island practice on October 11 from his new office located in the Lancer Building.

At the Salt Spring Island Fall Fair two weeks ago, there were many items of historical interest on display, both inside the building and on the school grounds.

Numerous fair-goers crowded into the mini-museum to see items that were common in most households on the island some years ago. On the Friday preceding the fair, many islanders were retrieving old farm equipment that had long since fallen into disuse. Old balers, ploughs, rakes and seeders were picked up from the fields in which they had been left to rust, or from the barns in which they had been gathering dust, and were carted off down to Ganges. For one day, most of the equipment received more attention that it had had since the tractor took over from the horse.

### NEED IS THERE

The interest shown in these two displays at the fair is surely sufficient evidence of the need for a museum on Salt Spring. How many of those farming implements that are relics from an age so different from the present, were returned to the fields in which they were found and abandoned to the mercy of the elements?

The white man's history on Salt Spring Island doesn't reach very far into the past. But man's lifestyle has changed to such a considerable extent since the island was first settled, that the island's history becomes more meaningful and of greater interest.

Those would be the advantages of a museum: a display that would outline the history of Salt Spring and ensure the preservation of articles no longer in use.

The phrase "no longer in use"

would have to be considered an important one. The collecting of antiques has become an extremely popular pursuit, and in some cases, a very rewarding one insofar as financial gain is concerned.

### HORDING TOOLS

Tools, in particular, have become a very sought-after item and collectors all over North America are hording old tools made of high quality steel. One cannot buy new woodworking tools today that can compare with those made 50 years ago because of the poor workmanship and poor steel that goes into them today.

In my mind, there is no sense in stocking a museum with objects that are still useful and in demand.

There were over 200 signatures taken from people at the Fall Fair who were in favour of seeing a museum on the island. There are, undoubtedly, many more who did not sign.

There has been talk in the past of the Farmers' Institute buying property on which to hold the Fall Fair. If this were done, a museum on the property would be an excellent addition to their plans and one which would certainly receive assistance from all parts of the island.

## No support offered no smoking

A mention of prohibiting smoking in the Gulf Islands School District's board room brought groans of disapproval from the trustees last week.

A number of school districts have initiated this ruling.

The majority of trustees on the Gulf Islands School Board smoke, however. There are three who do not.

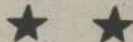
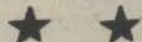
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## Quarter-century of Chamber of Commerce



### Mixed bag of functions considered by three Chambers

All other chairs will be up for nomination, stated the Chamber of Commerce report.

And the penny dropped. It was the first time in 27 years that I was not a director of the Chamber of Commerce, seeking, or accepting re-election.

More than a quarter-century ago I was elected a director of the Sidney and North Saanich Chamber of Commerce. Some 15 years ago I was president of that august body. At the same time I was also a member of the Brentwood Chamber of Commerce. I think it was the West Saanich Chamber. The Chamber at Brentwood is gone; many of my former colleagues are gone and even the building, in which we met for decades, has been ploughed under to make way for a shopping centre.

In some ways the Brentwood Chamber was the most enterprising in those days. It was vitally concerned with tourism and, beyond that, its main interests were community welfare in every phase.

#### SHOP AT HOME

The Sidney Chamber was not unlike the Salt Spring Island body in that its big project at all times was to encourage residents of the area to patronize local businesses.

The Chamber of Commerce in many communities was a more active and more powerful voice when the area it served was unincorporated. In many communities the advent of a local authority took over some of the activities of the Chamber.

When North Saanich was unorganized territory and Sidney was

merely part of the same district, the Chamber spoke for the district in a firm, community voice. Instead of hearing a series of small squeaks, the government departments heard a strong, united voice and the effect was notable.

With the introduction of local councils, the strength of the Chamber weakened. It was still a single voice for a substantial part of the community, but it was not the voice of the elected representatives of the people.

#### WATCHDOG

The Chamber of Commerce remained to keep a close watch on the councils of the district and various government departments as well as safeguarding the interests of the business community.

The list of accomplishments of the Chambers of Commerce I have known would fill a book. The list of proposals would be uncountable.

A decade ago I withdrew from the council of the Sidney and North Saanich Chamber and arrived on Salt Spring Island. Within months I was a director of the island Chamber. Within years I was, once again, president of a Chamber of Commerce.

I have lived planning in two communities and I have worked on a sewer committee in two. I have written to government departments, ferry companies, municipalities and individuals. I have served on the board of directors of a Chamber of Commerce with a CCF supporter as secretary and I have served with every other shade of political opinion in the secre-

tary's chair.

#### REGIONAL DISTRICT

On Salt Spring Island the advent of the Capital Regional District had an effect on the Chamber. Before there was any regional district, a dozen years ago, the Salt Spring Island Chamber boasted a membership of over 200 people, businessmen, retired residents and islanders who found in the Chamber of Commerce the machinery they needed to gain the attention of government.

I recall the Brentwood Chamber nearly 30 years ago, when guest speaker explained that he was not a veteran, but that his cousin had been in the forces. And I can remember timing politicians during the interminable speeches that made up that Chamber's banquets.

John Tisdalle, who served Saanich and the Islands in the provincial legislature for more than a decade, was among the veteran politicians. He would speak for at least half an hour at every banquet.

The Chamber of Commerce went to bat in Sidney for a sewer system. That Chamber stayed with it long and hard. The campaign was launched in 1912 and the sewers were laid about 1960. Salt Spring Island appears to be headed in about the same direction.

#### TOURIST BROCHURE

About 1960 I set out the Salt Spring Island tourist brochure on behalf of the Chamber. The same design has been used for about 15 years and some of the words are those I wrote a decade and a half ago.

In all those years during which I was associated with Chambers of Commerce, there was one factor which few of the general public ever stopped to consider. The Chamber is the voice of commerce. That is in the very name. But in a small community the businessmen are residents of the area in which they work. It can never wholly

represent one part of the community against another.

Highway maintenance, ferry schedules, business opportunities, unemployment, they all came up for discussion. There were bus services, noisy aircraft, bad debts, welfare services, garbage, parks, swimming pools, centennials by the dozen, policing and traffic hazards.

#### WAITING AND LAUGHING

I have waited on ministers, deputy ministers, senior civil servants and doormen. I have fought through meetings, laughed through meetings, enjoyed meetings, loathed meetings. For a quarter-century, when I was asked, was I a director of the Chamber, I replied, "Of course!" A year ago I said it for the last time.

They were good years, but it's a young man's game, the Chamber of Commerce. And I like my pasture!

## INFO-HEALTH

BY DR. BOB YOUNG

"Do not get involved in sports".

When, in this age of promoting exercise and physical activity, should a doctor give this advice?

One always risks injury when engaged in athletic activity. The chance is higher in contact sports such as football, hockey and lacrosse, but injuries may occur during such non-contact sports as tennis, golf, scuba diving, and even running.

The British Columbia Medical Association is developing a set of guidelines to help a doctor decide when a patient should modify his athletic activity. While intended as a guide only, the information will provide a compilation of expert opinion in readily available form which I and my colleagues will find useful.

Concussion is an example of one of the conditions considered. If concussion occurs with loss of consciousness, the athlete should be out of that game. This is basically common sense but it is not unknown for a coach (or the player himself) to insist on his re-entering an important contest.

Two concussions should put the player out for the season, while three are sufficient to remove him from contact sports altogether.

Blindness or retinal detachment of one eye is considered adequate reason to give up contact sports, but still allows participation in such things as tennis, golf and swimming.

#### LONG LIST

The guide considers a long list of diseases of the heart, lungs, muscles and bones, and other parts of the body. The possible consequences of further injury to the patient's general welfare is of considerable importance in rating the risk.

A recurrent dislocation of the shoulder, for example, is only a relative contra-indication to contact sports. Further injury may complicate the problem but will not kill the athlete. An enlarged liver, spleen, or kidney could be ruptured during a game with possible fatal consequences, and the presence of an enlarged abdominal organ is therefore considered to be an absolute contraindication for involvement in games such as football or hockey.

# New hospital wing at Lady Minto gets promise of help from CMHC

A preferred loan and contribution has been approved by Central Mortgage and Housing Corporation for the construction of a 50-bed hostel for elderly persons, to be located in Ganges.

Undertaking the project is the Gulf Islands Intermediate and Personal Care Society, eligible under Section 15.1 of the National Housing Act as a non-profit society. The building site is on Blair Street,

close to the Lady Minto Gulf Islands Hospital.

The facility will provide 50 hostel-bed units for individual occupancy. Objectives are to provide room and board, assistance with some of the activities of daily living, a planned program of social and recreational activities, lay supervision for personal care residents and daily professional nursing supervision for intermediate

care residents.  
**99 YEAR LEASE**

The site was obtained by a 99-year lease entered into between the Capital Regional Hospital District and the society. Rent for this lease is \$1 per year.

Meals will be served in the dining room, which together with the main lounge is arrangeable to provide space for large functions. Smaller lounges, a kitchenette and

MUSTELA NIVALIS. (11)

Occupying most of Canada with the exception of the Maritimes, Southern Ontario and Quebec, this fierce little carnivore is scarcely larger than the mice on which it preys. Total body length seldom exceeds 8".

Incredibly quick and agile, these tiny predators are seldom trapped except by accident. The coat, which is brown above, with white underside, turns completely white in winter throughout most of its North American range.

Living almost exclusively on mice, shrews and lemmings, they also use the fur of these animals to line their underground nests. The Eskimos in particular look upon this small hunter with great respect and the capture of one was considered a good omen.

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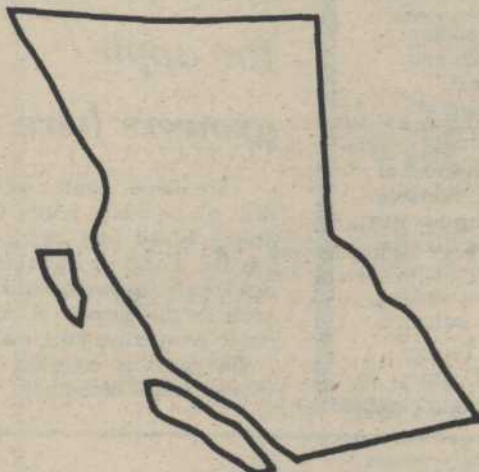
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## Men's soccer takes on senior boys in Sunday's game at Ganges

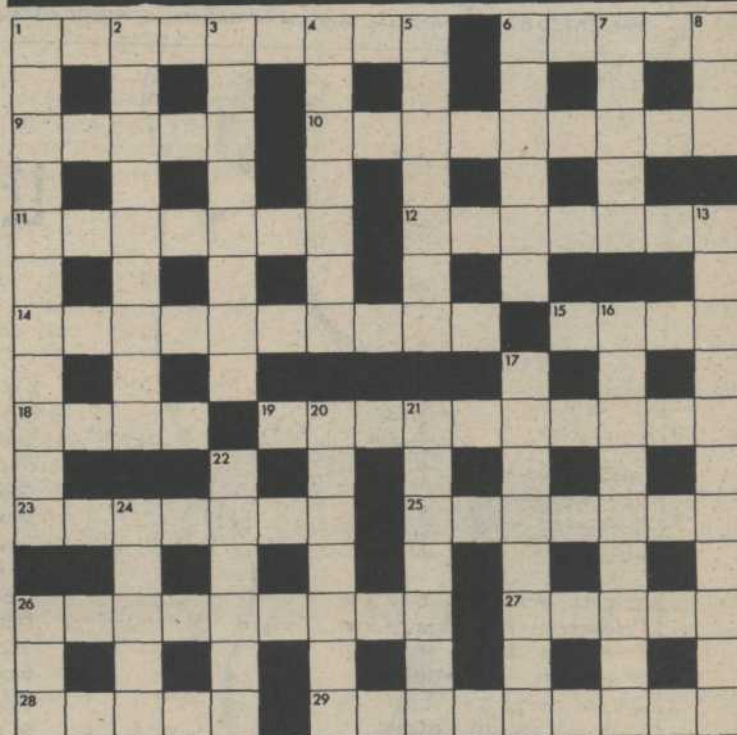

# Petroglyphs show possible link between Polynesia, Bella Coola

We may have come first! Contrary to the usual premises that our Northwest Coast natives came from the South Seas, evidence exists in Bella Coola that

our Northwest Coast and of the South Seas had a common origin.

But how did he make the discovery that we may have come first?

There are currents off the

A short distance from the town of Bella Coola, an unmarked dirt road turns off to the left. This is the road. No doubt you will miss it at first, looking for a sign or some



suggests the strong possibility that the Polynesians actually came from the Bella Coola valley!

Not possible? Thor Heyerdahl, famed anthropologist and writer of such books as the Kon Tiki Expedition, did his best to prove it.

The adventure for Heyerdahl started when he was on an expedition in the South Seas. He discovered pictures taken in the Bella Coola valley. Amazed, he carefully compared the pictures with similar objects found in the South Seas. He came to Bella Coola to study the intriguing evidence.

### COMMON ORIGIN

He found it, and what he found convinced him that the natives of

British Columbia Coast that flow toward the Hawaiian Islands. Wood from our coast has frequently come to rest in these warmer seas. So could our natives, either drifting or sailing south.

It would be impossible to drift in the opposite direction.

Add to this many Polynesian legends, which tell of a long sea voyage from a cold land of mountains, and the similarities between many Polynesian words and those of the native Bella Coola valley tongue, and you have food for thought.

You can see this same proof. The same clues still lie undisturbed

such commercial indication of a tourist attraction. There isn't one. A friendly citizen will give you directions to get back to it.

"If you cross the bridge turn back. You've gone too far."

No signs. No markings. You'll feel every inch a sleuth as you slowly drive along the narrow road, looking for "a bit of a clearing where you park your car and a sort of trail leading off."

You'll park in the small clearing and hunt for a path, convinced you've gone wrong. There's a partially overgrown path, very difficult to see from the road, but how could that possibly be it?

But it is.

The path will be quiet. As you walk you may keep an eye open for bears, and the other on the path as you may slip in the mud that often covers part of the trail. It's misty country, and often silent. You'll hear the river, and probably nothing else. Probably no other voices. **HALF A MILE WALK**

No more than half a mile walk and you'll climb up toward an impressive formation of rock.

This is your destination.

Still no signs, no admission charges, no postcard stands, no people.

Just the brooding granite boulders which hold the clue. Imprinted on them, clearly and unmistakably, are the vivid, ancient carvings...petroglyphs so old that no one can trace their origin....petroglyphs that strongly resemble those in the South Sea Islands.

No, that wasn't anything back there in the trees. Just the wind.
