

## If only . . . .

This was an editorial in a recent issue of Vancouver's Western News. It tells a story that might be written about anybody else.

He suddenly appeared in our front office one afternoon, about three weeks ago.

He was a slightly surprising visitor, this dark, medium height, somewhat heavy set fellow who looked to be in his early forties (actually he was 34) --one found oneself rather automatically wondering where he was from, and how, seemingly out of nowhere, he all at once came to be standing in front of our counter.

He was a Native Indian, you see, and we are very seldom visited by one of those.

In his hand he carried a slip of paper. "I want to put in an advertisement!" he said.

"Very good. What classification?" we asked, reaching for a classified pad.

"No-no, I want a box advertisement," he explained.

"Display!" we echoed. "What business are you in?"

"I make these," he said simply, and touched his fingers to a large, ornately carved silver pendant that hung from his swarthy neck.

"That's beautiful!" we exclaimed. "What do you want to say in your ad?"

He handed us the piece of paper he had been holding. His advertisement was written out in full. It was a little different from most. "Hi there! Getting married?" it began. Then it went on to proffer those about to be wed some of the advertiser's handiwork.

Our client remained silent as we began roughing out his ad.

"You live near here?" we asked.

"Just over there -- on Fifth," he told us.

"Where are you from?" we queried.

"The Nass River," he answered.

"You're a long way from home!"

"Uhuh," he nodded, giving a faint, wistful smile.

We finished his ad., agreed on the appropriate size, and he pre-paid us. Then he bade us goodbye, and went away --off into the gloomy afternoon, almost as mysteriously as he had come.

Now we wish we had studied his features more searchingly. Would we have seen, etched thereon, some telltale sign of the terrible thoughts that must already have been churning within his brain?

It was a busy day. Yet for some things, one can always make time. We have many visitors each week, some of whom are anything but run-of-the-mill.

Might we have somehow been moved to invite the man from the Nass River into our office for a few minutes --to coax some quiet conversation from him, and to have conjured for him the sense of at least some small measure of the friendship he so desperately needed?

Had we done merely this, maybe, just maybe things might have been a whole lot different.

We shall never know. All that we can do is wonder, as we often must, in a trade that calls upon us to touch briefly so many other human beings' lives.

In the case of our visitor from the Nass, there is a special haunting in our compulsion to ponder the imponderable.

For last week, Samuel Nelson --that was his name-- Nishga artist who carved in silver and gold, reached the end of his endurance of what was revealed as having been a torment of loneliness --and took his own life, in the place where he lived but a few blocks from our office.

Maybe, just maybe things might have been a whole lot different!

## Mendies and the Orient

### DORIS ANDERSON REPORTS BACK HOME

Susie and I have had two weeks in Nepal and I don't know where to start telling you about it.

The Mendies have a big home which was once a Rana Palace, but parts of it are falling down. At present most of the kids eat in the stalls where the main cooking is done on an open fire. The staff and some of the bigger children eat upstairs.

Tom Mendies and his Ontario wife operate a home for waifs and strays in Kathmandu. Fulford nurse, Doris Anderson discovered the Mendies home some years ago while touring the far east. She has launched campaigns to raise funds for them and she has taken friends to see them. Once again she is in Nepal and here is her report on Christianity afar.

There is a bath and toilet, but at present all the water is carried up in pails. They are building three stoves at the back of the house which will include a small infirmary, nine bathrooms and accommodation for all the big boys who are at present sleeping in the attic. The staff room and office will be there as well.

The biggest problem at present is income to feed the children, as the \$20,000 that was lent them by a man in Calgary is all being paid off monthly leaving Bett once more living on "Faith".

Thirty-two of the children go to the local school for whom the older children pack lunches for them. They pay \$5 a month to each child, but they all have to wear uniforms and good shoes.

Five of the children go to boarding schools sent by sponsors, but Bett has to get them there. The children who go to the private schools have the advantage of being taught in English which will keep them in the future.

They all appear very happy: the older girls looking after the babies.

The day we arrived a new tiny sick baby died, so the bigger boys built a coffin and built a grave away out in the country on some property owned by the Christian community on the side of a very steep hill. There we took the little body and had a little service for her.

There is no free medical care in Nepal even in the mission hospitals.

Bett is doing a wonderful job and we certainly feel that they need all the help we can give them -- when we come back to Salt Spring Island we will have another big rummage sale so we can send them a big fat check.

Don't forget, any money, however small in amount, can be put in the Bank of Montreal, Ganges and made out to the Mendies fund.

Bett says God bless you all for all your help.

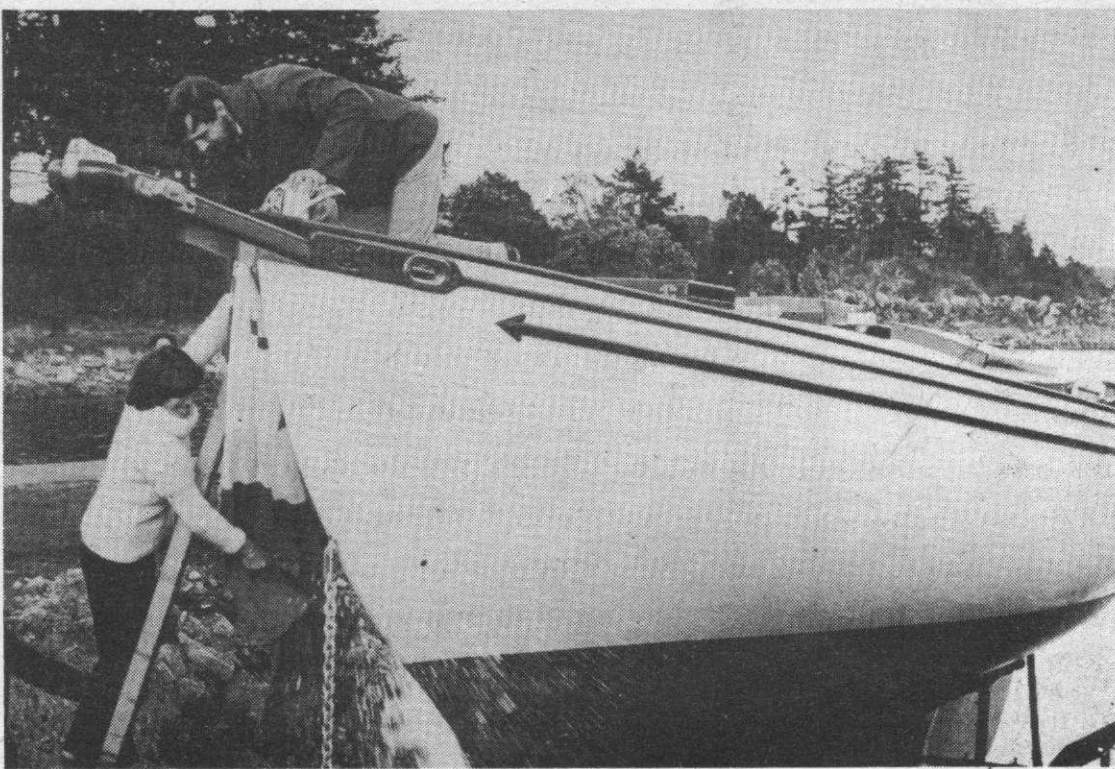

Ministry of Highways is planning to ease the problems facing Blue Gables Resort on St. Mary Lake.

# Two meetings planned to discuss Ganges sewer

The Ganges sewer plan is the subject of two public meetings to be held within the next month. Regional director Jim Bryce said last week that the Capital Regional District will be holding an information meeting early in May, at which time full details of the sewer plan will be presented.

"Nothing hard and fast has been decided on yet as far as what type of treatment plant is to be used," said Bryce, "and this will also be discussed."

"We hope to have as many people at the meeting as can provide information."

There is a possibility, he said, that the executive director of the regional district, Denis Young, and chairman of the board, Jim Campbell, might also attend.

Meanwhile, another information meeting is being planned by the Salt Spring Community Planning Association. Decision to hold the meeting was made at the association's regular meeting Monday evening.

Driftwood was told that a number of people will be invited to present their proposals for a sewer system in Ganges. They will include Dr. Lionel Coulthard, Mike Larmour, Phil and Yvette Valcourt and the Capital Regional District. The public will also be invited to express an opinion.

The latter meeting will be held Friday, Apr. 28 although the place has not yet been decided upon.

No date has been set for the regional district's meeting because, said Jim Bryce, the engineering staff has a lot of work to do in figuring out the costs.

He added that he "would strongly urge" Salt Spring Islanders to watch for the date of the meeting.

# Canadian first and Albertan second Loughheed asserts

Peter Loughheed is Premier of Alberta.

And he's a Canadian, first and an Albertan, second.

Addressing the Canada West Conference on Confederation, the Alberta Premier made the distinction without reservation.

Put the myths aside, he told the conference in Banff last week.

"A sense of separatism? That's nonsense! This province has no sense of separation!"

The emphasis on federalism is fundamental, he assured his audience.

The Premier admitted he does not pretend to have the answers to the problems facing Canadians.

He spoke of the deep feelings of the rest of Canada wanting Quebec to be part of confederation. The anglophone regions are strongly aware that Quebec is so much a part of the country and the rest of Canada has a deep respect for Quebec and its aspirations.

There is a feeling in western Canada that a new era of strength is dawning, said Loughheed, and the people of the west want to be part of all Canada at a time like this. Loughheed was optimistic about Quebec remaining within confederation, although he would not buy

"sovereignty association". The referendum that seems to be coming is very important, he told the assembly, at the conclusion of the conference. He referred to the sovereignty association concept.

## NO ASSURANCE

An attempt to separate in a legal sense and then to have a relationship with the remains.... If that is correct, there is no assurance of a sovereignty association of such kind, he warned.

Unity started with French and English. It is now centred on the division of power.

Quebec is not looking for language guarantees, stated Dr. Robert Painchaud, Winnipeg historian. Bill 101 gives them all the guarantee they need. Quebec is looking for power.

There was more information available from the delegates.

There was the maritimer who left Quebec after World War Two in order that his children might have a chance.

Education was strictly limited and employment was still further restricted. Promotion was for Anglos and Americans, he asserted.

There was the engineer from Alberta. He had been in Montreal and he was working in that city when his company moved its operation to Ontario.

There was no source of qualified francophone engineers.

British Columbia could be vi-

able as a separate entity and probably more readily so than any other province, it was fairly evident. But British Columbia opinion polls made it clear that coast dwellers are better than 80% convinced federalists.

## EARLY DAYS

Canada existed for the benefit of Ontario and Quebec, suggested E.B. Osler, Manitoba author and businessman. He recalled the early development of the country and the manner in which all circulation centred on the heart of the nation, in Ottawa.

The early days of federal government left a legacy.

Ottawa laid a series of dubious eggs, said Osler, whose odour gave rise to the problems of today. He recalled Ottawa's insistence on its wide powers and Quebec's insistence on her right to govern herself.

He looked back on MacDonald's reaching out west and on Laurier's series of railway blunders.

He recalled the division of Ungava and Keewatin, with millions of miles to Ontario and Quebec, augmented by the gift of all resources. Manitoba, he explained, received 85,000 square miles, with no mineral rights.

## SWEETHEART DEALS

No sweetheart deal between Ontario and Quebec would be acceptable to the rest of Canada, he warned.

Many of the delegates were seeing and hearing western Canada for the first time. One francophone from Ottawa was impressed with the realization that having come "west" he was still 500 miles from the Pacific.

The ball game has changed in the past 110 years, said Osler, for Quebec and for the rest of the land, not even there 110 years ago.

Majority of Canadians live out their lives in one province, commented one of the authors of Alternatives Canada, Dr. David Elton. He explained that provincial boundaries exist and have real meaning for most Canadians. Regions help to appreciate broad problems, but the people identify themselves with the province in which they live.

## PESSIMISTIC

Bill Thiessen, of Kelowna was frankly pessimistic. He had entered into an exchange with a small group of committed Quebec separatists and he felt that further discussion was wasting time. Later in the conference, he had amended his view a little.

The 300 delegates met on some points and clashed on others. There was no single conclusion to be seen and still less to be seen by single participants.

The message was clear on two counts.

There is a need for change. There must be a change in the manner in which Canada administers its vast land. By major constitutional change or by negotiation, the relationship between the central government and the regions must be changed to afford provinces a wider range of input into national decisions.

The second aspect of the discussions emphasized that Canadians are, at base, federalists and that some give and take will be essential to the retention of Quebec as part of the confederation. Most were not prepared, however, to see a special status for any one province.

And the vast majority warmly applauded Saskatchewan Premier Allan Blakeney's warning that the time for decision is running out.

## Regional District is urged to initiate animal survey

Salt Spring Island is one of the worst areas in the Capital Regional District suffering from lack of animal control, Driftwood was told recently.

President of the Victoria chapter of the Association for the Protection of Fur-Bearing Animals, Mrs. Val Gislason, says that cases of cruelty and abandonment of animals are common on the island.

"We hear reports of roaming dogs and wild and starving cats all the time," says Mrs. Gislason.

And Mrs. Thora Bonneau, also of Victoria, estimates that there are 500 stray cats on Salt Spring Island.

"The suffering is so bad, so grim, I can't describe it," said Mrs. Bonneau recently in a telephone interview. "It's so terrible it's hard to get to sleep at night sometimes."

Both Mrs. Gislason and Miss Maggi Lynn, president of the Greater Victoria Animals' Crusaders, are trying to get the Capital Regional Board to initiate an animal control survey in the Capital Region.

### REASONS AND OBJECTIVES

They submitted a brief to the district late in January outlining the reasons for and the objectives of such a survey.

The reasons were inadequate facilities for animal control in the district, pet population growth, lack of co-ordination between urban and rural areas and the failure of municipal and provincial gov-

ernments to take responsibility for animal control.

There are five objectives given for an animal control survey: to establish common goals of animal control within the Capital Region; to analyze various sources of pet animal supply and related problems and determine how the problems might be resolved; to evaluate existing statutes governing animal control and develop a model law or guidelines for preparing comprehensive animal control ordinances; to determine ways to enhance the enforcement of present and future animal control regulations; and to define audiences and outline possible programs for communicating with animal owners and non-owners, government officials and the mass media regarding responsible pet ownership.

The plan of action suggested in the brief was to contact animal SPCA and animal welfare groups; contact other sources elsewhere for information regarding animal control; and to assess the needs of the district and expected cost to taxpayers.

Needs for future animal control would be projected, including public education and low-cost health services. A brief would also be drawn up for government officials. Headings such as domestic animal protection and public health hazards of uncontrolled pets and roaming animals would be included.

### THROUGHOUT DISTRICT

Mrs. Bonneau told Driftwood that the problem of animal control is prevalent throughout the regional district, not just on Salt Spring.

There are places in downtown Victoria, she said, where one can find, at night, numerous emaciated cats. Their suffering, she feels, is "horrendous".

Where do they come from? Mrs. Bonneau said that people will move away from an area and leave their cat behind: they become wild and eventually starve.

Another Victorian, Ed Mader, told Driftwood that cats abandoned in such a manner will lose all their fur and take about three years to die. Mr Mader said he had seen kittens, born in the wild, without eyes or legs.

One solution, Driftwood was told would be legislation prohibiting the ownership of unsprayed female cats and dogs except by registered breeders.

And the 500 stray cats on Salt Spring? Mrs. Bonneau felt that they should be humanely trapped and put to sleep.

Licensing, she asserted, is not the answer for animal control. Spaying, she felt, was the only solution.

Each year, 30,000 Canadians die prematurely from the effects of smoking. Many more live on with crippled lungs and overstrained hearts.

## Crash writes off car

Imported car was a write off on Monday evening, April 10, when a Mayne Island driver was in collision with a power pole in Ganges. The power pole was also written off.

Driver of the car in the single-car accident was Bruce Beveridge, 22. He was uninjured, although two passengers in the 1971 Datsun were taken to Lady Minto Hospital for treatment.

Beveridge was taken to the RCMP Office on Ganges Hill for breathalyzer tests.

Charge of driving with a blood content exceeding 0.08% alcohol was laid.

## Mail truck left behind

Nothing stops the mail from getting to Salt Spring Island except, perhaps, when the ferry leaves the mail truck behind.

That's what happened on Tuesday and the mail was two hours late as a result.

The mail is brought to the island by Salt Spring Freight, whose truck, for reasons unknown at press-time, was left behind at Swartz Bay. The truck arrived early at Swartz Bay, Driftwood was told, and the ferry was not full, but for no apparent reason it was left behind.

However, the truck got on the next ferry and the mail got through.

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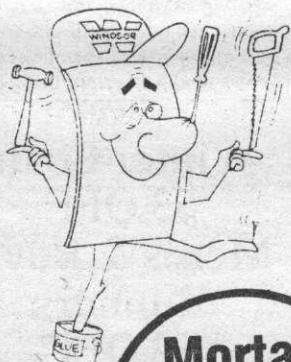
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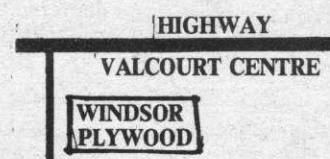
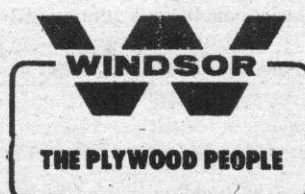

# Agriculture education to be topic of panel discussion at Ganges

Agriculture education will be the subject of a panel discussion on Thursday, April 20 at Ganges. President of the B.C. Agriculture Teachers' Association, Mike Byron of Salt Spring Island, told Driftwood that all members of the public are invited to attend.

The discussion will take place at Mahon Hall at 8 pm and the theme is entitled, Agriculture Education, Who Needs It?

The meeting will terminate the first day of the fourth annual B.C. Agriculture Teachers' Conference, which is to be held at the Beach House of Cedar Beach Resort.

One of the panel speakers is John DePape of the Fraser Valley College, Abbotsford. Mr. DePape is the keynote speaker of the conference, and is the person responsible for establishing the million dollar agriculture education

program sponsored by the B.C. government. This program will provide many opportunities for young people of the Lower Mainland, Vancouver Island and the Gulf Islands who wish to further their education in the field of agriculture.

Other panel members are John Farrow of Northern Lights Agriculture College, Dawson Creek; James Muir of the B.C. Institute of Technology; Dr. Ross Bulley, Department of Bio-Resource Engineering, UBC; Mike Verge, Curriculum Development Co-ordinator for Agriculture, Ministry of Education; Mac Taylor, agriculture teacher at South Peace Secondary School; and John Baumbrough, principal, Pleasant Valley Secondary School, Armstrong.

Moderator for the panel will be Mr. Jim Zsednai of Armstrong.

## FOUR FROM GANGES

This year, four graduates of Gulf Islands Secondary School are furthering their education in agriculture at Northern Lights College, B.C. Institute of Technology and Camosun College. These students are enjoying their programs and are being very successful in their studies, Driftwood was told. There are many opportunities in the field of agriculture for both academic and vocational students.

The question period planned to follow the panel will provide an opportunity for parents to find out more about what is available for their youngsters after leaving high school.

The agriculture elective of Gulf Islands Secondary School is one of the 32 agriculture programs in B.C. Mac Taylor and John Baumbrough will provide insight into what is happening in high school agriculture in other areas of the province.

An up-to-date agriculture curriculum is presently being formulated for high schools by the Ministry of Education. Mike Verge will provide answers to the direction in which the new program will take.

"I feel that the Thursday evening program will be of interest and concern to all members of the public," said Mike Byron this week.

## Dieters too few for class

Several people have responded to the recent article to determine the demand for a Weight Watchers' group in the Gulf Islands. So far, there are not yet enough to warrant the expense of setting up a class in Ganges, says Virginia Newman, Continuing Education Co-ordinator for the Gulf Islands School District.

Pamphlets outlining the program can be borrowed from the School Board Office, by prior arrangement with Mrs. Newman. Prospective dieters can form a Gulf Islands class with an instructor from Victoria.

A second "Stop Smoking" class has just finished in Ganges, and over-eating is just as dangerous and just as difficult to cure, says Mrs. Newman.

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# Day-care provides service for working parents

The Salt Spring Island Day-Care Centre is a "dream come true" as far as the three people involved in the project are concerned. The Day-Care Centre opened on February 21 and its object is to provide a service for working parents.

Barb Aust, Heather Crosthwait

and Cathy Mazzei operate the centre, which is located in the former home of Lindsay and Dorothy Kyle on Ganges Hill.

The centre's reasons for being are the 16-odd children who spend five days a week there, anywhere between the hours of 7.45 am and 6 pm. Licenced by the government

for a maximum of 20 children, the centre provides the service for \$140 a month per child and, depending upon the means of the parents, the government will subsidize the cost, up to 100%. The children are aged three to five years.

A Canada Works Grant was obtained to start the operation

rolling. It is helping to pay the wages of the three operators and expires after six months. After the grant's expiration, the centre will continue as a non-profit society, says the sponsors.

Barb Aust moved to the island from Victoria in October. She and her husband already knew some people living on the island and they came, as Barb put it, for the serenity the island offers. She has been involved with day-care for four years and owned her own day-care centre in Victoria.

## IT'S IDEAL

The Salt Spring Island Day-Care Centre is ideal, Barb feels.

"We have a good house instead of the auditorium-type of building we had in Victoria," she explained.

Heather Crosthwait has been on Salt Spring for just over one year. She lived in Montreal before, where she worked as a photo-lab technician. She visited the island to see her sister, liked what she saw, and stayed. She did some full-time babysitting for a while and then it occurred to her, why not open a day-care centre?

Cathy Mazzei was in Victoria for six years before she moved to Salt Spring a year ago. She had known Barb Aust in Victoria and had gone to her for advice about opening a day-care on the island.

"After working with computers for a year, I decided I didn't want to do that any more," she recalled.

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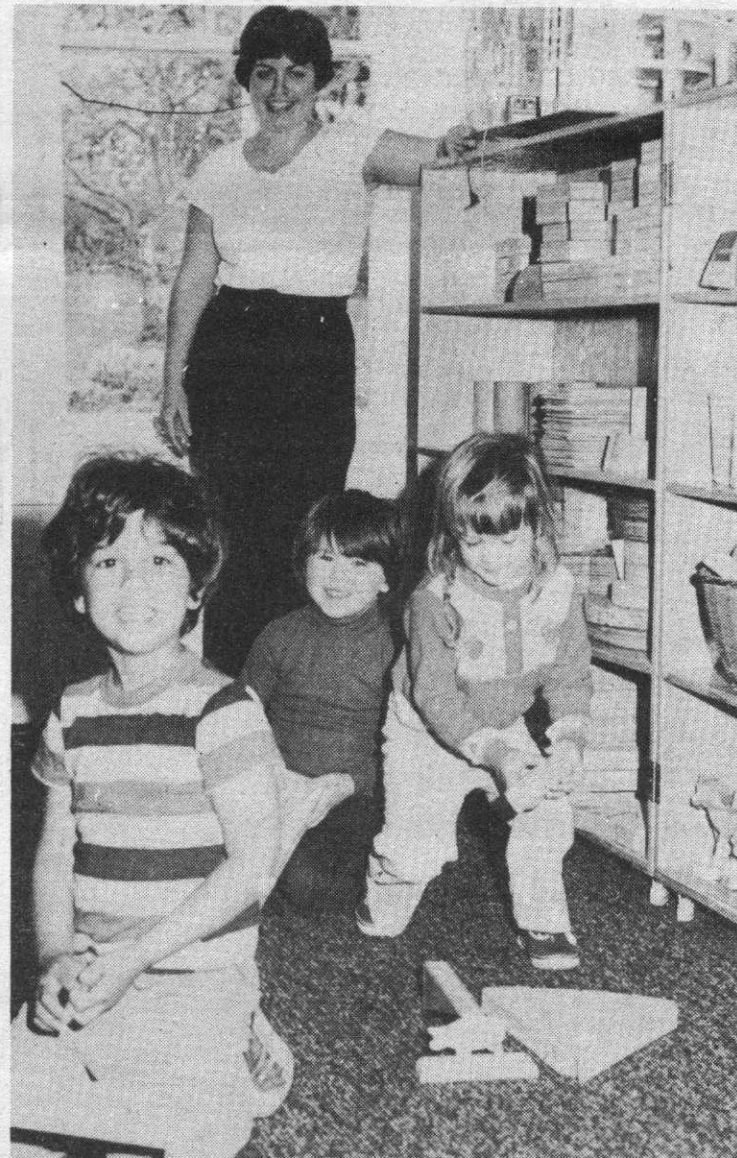

Mr. Siska enjoyed the kind hospitality of Jim and Lou Money, for an overnight stay here.

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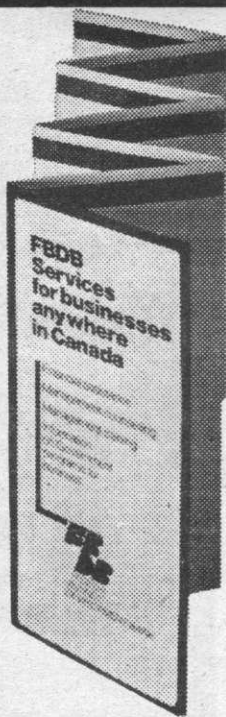
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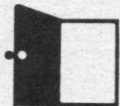

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# Reform of the constitution

## Delegates express their views at conference

What are the aspirations of the various regions of Canada.

Speaker at the Canada Alternatives Conference in Banff last week readily identified them. With his tongue in his cheek, Dr. Robert Painchaud, of Manitoba, suggested that Alberta wants anything; Quebec wants everything; Ontario wants what it has now; the Prairies want what Ontario has and the Yukon just wants to be.

The Winnipeg University historian went on to explain the problems as seen from Manitoba. He explained them in both English and French.

Painchaud was one of the speakers in a panel on regional aspirations when the Canada West Foundation invited delegates from all parts of Canada to consider a paper prepared on the reform of the Canadian constitution.

Some 300 delegates from Newfoundland to British Columbia and from the northern territories were invited to consider the proposal to eliminate the Senate and to replace it with a House of Provinces as originally proposed during the federal-provincial conference in Victoria.

The conclusion of the conference brought a spokesman from each of the main regions of Canada to summarize the needs and the hopes of those regions in relationship to the national government.

### ENDANGERED

Introducing himself as one of the endangered species, Senator Paul Lucier assured the assembly that the Yukon is not yet ripe for identification as a province. With an area equal to that of the four maritime provinces and a population close to the number of faculty and students at the University of Alberta, Yukon is not ready for provincehood, he admitted.

Most urgent matter facing the Yukon is settlement of the Indian land claims. The aboriginal rights must be settled before any progress can be made in the territory, he warned.

"It is important to accomplish this and do it in a fair manner," he told the gathering in the Eric Harvie Theatre at Banff Centre. He warned other regions of the gravity of this problem.

"I know that the French-English

problem is very important, but land claims are going to be a very important factor in all of Canada."

The Yukon decision will set the pattern for the rest of the country, he forecast.

Yukon wants a lot more say in its own destiny, he urged, and it is going to introduce party representation into its election scene.

"I believe the west has been given the short end of the stick. It has always gone to Central Canada, hat-in-hand, the poor cousins. You have resources and the rest of Canada knows this, and if they don't, they damn well better!"

He would like to think that the north is going to be in the same position one day as the west is now, he told them. He hoped that when the time comes, the north will not be treated as the poor cousins of the west.

"Look at the map of Canada. When you look up, it's not to Heaven...it's to the north!"

### BRITISH COLUMBIA

Melvin H. Smith, deputy minister for constitutional affairs in B.C., looked back on history. It is set apart from the other provinces, he suggested, because this province was developed by a migration from the west. It was put on the map by Capt. Cook and Capt. Vancouver, 200 years ago.

In its early days British Columbia immigration was from outside Canada. Its financial support was from London and San Francisco, not Toronto. Even today, the exchange of goods is on a thin basis with respect to the rest of Canada. For every \$5 spent in Ontario and Quebec, B.C. sells back goods to the value of \$1.

Ottawa sets the national tariffs and quotas and all Canadians pay more for the benefit of Central Canada. Many federal policies are unfavourable to B.C. although beneficial, in some cases, to the nine other provinces.

"Federal policy frequently fails to recognize regional interests," said Smith.

He subscribes to the view that the nation needs a reconstituted upper house to be a voice of the provinces in law making.

"A reconstituted upper house," warned the British Columbian, "will not solve all our problems, but it could be the vehicle to achieve some of them!"

### MANITOBA

Quebec has evolved at a more rapid rate than elsewhere, suggested Dr. Painchaud, and they want to get on with the job of living.

The original fault lay in the guarantee of cultural rights, he suggested although that province

needs no language guarantees today, they have Bill 101.

The move towards a reconstituted Quebec is nothing new. Dr. Painchaud recalled the organizations of the '20's and the development of the present movement in Quebec.

### ONTARIO

"Ontario is as popular here as the Philadelphia Flyers in the Montreal Stadium," commented H. Ian Macdonald, president of York University.

He was referring to the historical references during the conference on the sapping of the early west by Ontario.

Ontario is facing the pressures of a falling employment and the demands of a consumer society. There are greater attitudinal changes in Ontario than anywhere else in the country, perhaps even more so than in Quebec, he reported.

He admitted that Ontario has been inclined to see itself as the beneficiary of federal politicians.

Macdonald referred to the two-language question. The attitude in the province is changing rapidly, he stated.

"Many parents in Ontario are now determined that their children be completely Canadian in having two languages," he observed.

Ontario is not Ottawa. And vice-versa.

He called for a greater communication between all Canadians.

"If we are to understand each other better, we must know each other better," he urged.

### QUEBEC

If the Parti Quebecois were to go, if Premier Levesque were to go, the province of Quebec would still remain, said Dr. Arthur Tremblay. There is no value in assessing the likelihood of Rene Levesque losing the government. The province of Quebec is still looking for recognition.

Tremblay, of the University of

get off the dole. McNiven referred to the \$3.4 billion that is represented in equalization payments. He saw the treatment of the Atlantic provinces as a "benign neglect"

"There must be more advantages to being in Canada than simply the right to pay high prices through tariff walls," he told the audience.

He also suggested that constitutional change is not fundamentally related to the basic national problems.

There are many women on Salt Spring who feel isolated or depressed and want to have a group of women friends to meet with regularly for emotional support, said a spokesman for the workshop. They hope that the concen-

tration provided by the workshop will set a tone that will make it possible for the participants to continue on their own.

Any woman registering should seriously consider committing herself to an on-going bi-monthly women's group for six months, she noted.

Women who are serious about their personal growth, developing their potential and taking full and thoughtful responsibility for their lives are encouraged to join in this endeavour.

There will be a fee, but finances need not be a problem, explained the sponsors. Information may be obtained from the Family Centre.
