Homemakers part of ministry

Recently the Salt Spring Island Homemaker Service asked several members of the public to sit in an honorary capacity on their board.

On May 14, these honorary members were invited to an introductory meeting to explain Homemaker service.

There has been much confusion in the minds of the public about Homemakers and Home Care Nurses. Homemakers started on Salt Spring Island as a non-profit society, in 1975. Much of the ground work for the formation of service was done by members of Meals-on-Wheels.

The drivers were aware of the need for some type of home care if many of their clients were to be able to stay in their island homes.

The Community Society was also active and these two groups, with assistance from other homemaker agencies on Vancouver Island, can take the credit for Salt Spring Island Homemaker Service.

The service had two types of clients at that time, those who, because of straitened circum-

stances, were eligible for homemaker service paid for by the Ministry of Human Resources, or private clients who either wished to pay, or were unable to qualify for assistance.

However, as of January 1, 1978, homemaker services all over the province were placed where they belong, in the ministry of health.

Homemakers were then recognized as part of the health team. The B.C. government set up training courses to standardize the instruction of all homemakers. The ministry of health also made less stringent requirements for free homemaker service.

If a family, an individual or a doctor feels homemaker service would be beneficial, a nurse assessor for the Capital Regional District can go to the home and assess the

financial and medical needs of the client.

Home care nurses work closely with homemakers but with one major difference. Home care nurses are paid for by the client's B.C. Medical Insurance. This service is available through the local doctors or by contacting the Community Health Services office on Rainbow Road.

Homemaker Service on Salt Spring is still operated by a local board, in much the way the island hospital functions. The board is a volunteer group who hope all residents will be at their annual general meeting in the fall.

In the meantime, if islanders are interested in joining the board or becoming a homemaker, or a client, they may call the Homemaker Supervisor, Mrs. Kaufman at 537-9822 between 9 and 12 am.

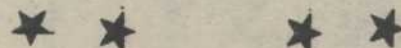

DOUGLAS IN OTTAWA**Election promises...***By Tommy Douglas, M.P.*

There's an old yarn they used to tell on the prairies about a farmer who saw a gang of men surveying a road site near his farm. He watched with interest the rodmen placing their stakes and the surveyor peering through his transit.

Amused by this interest, the surveyor invited him to look through the instrument and asked the farmer what he saw.

The latter replied, "I see an election coming up because this piece of road has been surveyed just before every election for the last 20 years".

A NEW PROMISE EVERY DAY

Canadians generally are developing much the same feeling, as every day brings forth a new promise from the Trudeau government. Projects long refused are being announced with great fanfare.

A glaring example of this occurred recently when a bevy of Federal Cabinet Ministers descended on Quebec City to announce a multi-million dollar expansion of the port facilities. No consultations had taken place with the provincial or local authorities. The federal government announced this huge project on its own as a political plum on the eve of an election.

Similarly, Otto Lang is reviving his old promise to the prairie farmers that Ottawa will rebuild and modernize the obsolete railway system and provide better grain transportation facilities. It doesn't matter that this promise has been made at every election for the past 30 years, it's still as good as new; it has never been used.

Alan MacEachen has just announced that steps will be taken to open a new coal mine in Cape Breton, which is good news, except for the fact that he has made the same announcement at each suc-

cessive election without any beneficial results.

There is hardly a constituency where similar announcements are not being made by Cabinet Ministers or Liberal M.P.s, all of which leads one to the conclusion that a federal election is not too far off.

PUBLIC NOT FOOLED

There may have been times when last-minute death-bed repentances carried some weight, but the public is becoming increasingly suspicious of pre-election promises.

They remember that in 1972 Mitchell Sharp, on the eve of the election, committed the Trudeau government to the construction of the Toronto Island Park, about which nothing has been heard since. And in 1974 in the dying days of the campaign Prime Minister Trudeau pledged \$300 million for rapid transit projects. That, too, has disappeared into the never-never-land of political mythology.

In the Nanaimo area the Liberal candidate is announcing projects under the Salmon Enhancement Programme; which may or may not materialize.

For several years the Fishermen's Union have been requesting action along these lines but they have been ignored until an election is in the offing.

There is no assurance that any of these many pre-election promises will be kept this time any more than they were in previous years.

When I was a candidate in the 1965 election Tom Kent was sent out from the Prime Minister's office to run against me in Burnaby. He inserted page ads in the Vancouver paper showing diagrams and drawings of completely modernized harbour facilities in Vancouver and Port Moody.

Needless to say the transporta-

tion facilities at Vancouver and Port Moody are as obsolete as ever.

In 1968, when my old friend Colin Cameron passed away, we had a by-election in Nanaimo-Cowichan-the Islands. During the campaign, the federal Minister of Public Works committed the Liberal government to the construction of a \$1.5 million breakwater at Chemainus.

It was badly needed and still is, but when the by-election was over the promise was forgotten.

PUBLIC MORE SOPHISTICATED

Fortunately, the public has become more sophisticated about pre-election pledges. They know that most of them are like a station platform, something to get in on and then forget about.

Moreover, decent people are becoming incensed about the moral aspect of trying to bribe the Canadian people with their own money. There is a growing conviction that if harbours, public buildings or any other projects are needed they should be built irrespective of how people vote; and if they aren't needed, governments have no right to squander public funds for political gain.

One has only to examine the annual reports of the Auditor-General to see how many ports have been built and never used and how many buildings have been erected and never occupied. The public resent these attempts to buy them with their own money.

ALL THE TIME

If democracy is to survive, elections must be fought on the basis of policies and programmes, and not by attempting to buy votes through political patronage.

It was because he believed in the good sense of the people that Abraham Lincoln said, "You can fool all of the people some of the time, and some of the people all of the time, but you can't fool all of the people all of the time".

I believe Lincoln was right and that the average citizen is too intelligent to be fooled for a prolonged period of time. Many of them will agree with the American philosopher, Emerson, who said, "What you are speaks so loudly I can't hear what you say".

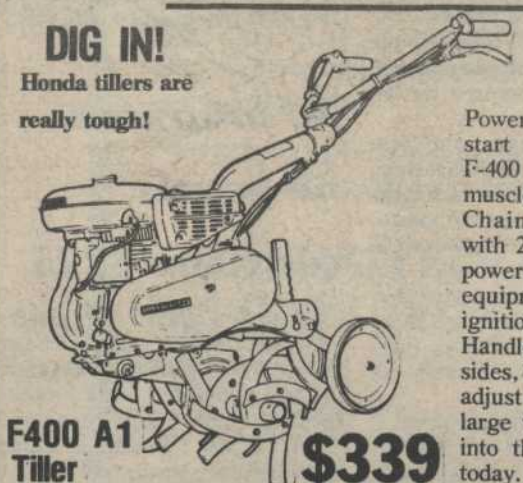

Kitchen Korner

For several weeks, fresh local asparagus has been available - it is a wonderful blood purifier and kidney stimulant, and as it is very perishable should be purchased or cut for immediate use only. The cut ends should be wrapped in a damp cloth or paper and the tips kept dry, and stored in the coldest part of the refrigerator. The following recipe for asparagus soup is my mother's - a deliciously satisfying meal.

ASPARAGUS SOUP WITH MEAT DUMPLINGS

1½ lbs fresh asparagus
6 cups salted water
¼ cup butter or margarine
3 tbsp. all-purpose flour
1 cup (½ pint) light cream, or half & half, scalded
1 cup hot chicken stock, or one chicken bouillon cube dissolved in 1 cup boiling water
3 egg yolks beaten with 1 tbsp cold water
Meat Dumplings (recipe follows)
...Clean asparagus, then cut off & discard tough woody portion, about ¼ inch from bottom of stalks. Cut off tips about ¼" from top and set aside. Cut remaining asparagus into 1" pieces.
...Simmer tips and pieces til tender. Set aside tips.

...Place asparagus pieces and some of the cooking liquid in blender. Puree and return to saucepan. (Puree can be made ahead & frozen)

...Heat butter in a medium sized saucepan: Stir in flour and cook til bubbly, about one minute. Gradually stir in slightly cooled chicken stock and cream. Stir over low heat 7 or 8 minutes or til thickened and bubbly.

...Beat egg yolks in a medium-sized bowl. Gradually beat in 2 cups of the hot sauce. Pour all back into strained asparagus soup, stirring thoroughly. Add salt and pepper to taste.

...Drop in Meat Dumplings: Heat, but do not boil as eggs will coagulate.

MEATBALL DUMPLINGS

1 lb. ground beef round
¼ cup flour
2 eggs, slightly beaten
¾ tsp. salt
1/8 tsp. pepper
...Combine all ingredients lightly but thoroughly with a fork.
...Shape into tiny balls (1 level tbsp.), then drop gently into rapidly boiling salted water. Cook until they puff up and float to surface, about 7 minutes.
...Remove with slotted spoon to

bowl. Keep warm. Serve 3 or 4 in each bowl of soup.
...(Meatballs can be made ahead & frozen, to be added to soup after cream sauce is made. They are delicious with any meatless soup.)

HAM AND ASPARAGUS ROLLS

...Roll 3 stalks canned or fresh cooked asparagus in thin slices cooked ham.

...Place in baking dish, then pour Cream Sauce over (recipe below), and sprinkle with cheese and buttered crumbs if desired.

Sauce:
2 oz. butter

2 oz. arrowroot

Juice from a tin of asparagus or, Liquid drained from simmering fresh asparagus till tender.

1 cup milk

1 oz. grated cheese

dash of nutmeg

Salt & pepper

...Melt butter in saucepan.

...Separately, mix arrowroot with asparagus liquid. Add to this mixture the milk, and gradually pour into melted butter, stirring constantly till thickened.

...Add cheese, nutmeg, salt and pepper. Place under broiler till cheese is melted.

ASPARAGUS-CHICKEN CASSEROLE

1 - 3 lb. chicken or pieces

Flour

2 oz. butter or margarine

1 tbsp. oil

1 onion

½ cup plain flour, extra

1½ cups water

1¼ cups milk

½ cup dry white wine

1 lb. fresh asparagus

2 chicken stock cubes

1 tsp. Worcestershire sauce

¼ tsp. tyme

salt, pepper

4 oz. mushrooms

3 shallots or green onions

2 tbsp. chopped parsley

...Cut chicken in serving size pieces, coat chicken in flour.

...Heat butter and oil in pan, add chicken pieces, saute on both sides until golden brown

...Remove from pan, put into large ovenproof dish. To the same pan add peeled and chopped onion, saute until tender, add extra flour, stir until golden brown.

...Remove from heat, stir until sauce boils and thickens, simmer 3 minutes; pour sauce over chicken, mix well.

...Bake, covered, in moderate oven 35 minutes, remove from oven. Add sliced mushrooms, mix well.

...Bake, covered, further 15 minutes or till chicken is tender. Remove from oven, stir in chopped shallots and parsley. Serves 4.

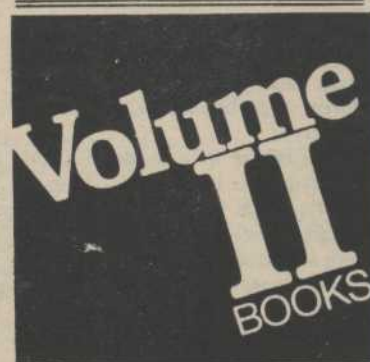

There is still hope that one day Canada will have its own merchant navy.

The hope was expressed on Wednesday evening last week when Ted Dandy, of Nanaimo District Commander of Canadian Power Squadrons, spoke in Ganges.

Dandy was outlining the aims and objectives of the Power Squadrons and he noted that the graduates of Power Squadron navigation and other courses are able to take proper charge of small vessels.

The hope for a merchant navy was expressed by the same group in earlier annual banquets of the Salt Spring squadron.

In the course of his attendance at the island graduation and change of watch banquet, he formally installed the new watch: Commander, John Watson; Executive Officer, Jim Napper; Training Officer, Peter Bingham; secretary, Joe Stewart; treasurer, Harold Helm; public relations, Don Clarkson; supply officer, Rolf Dammel; Marep officer, Ted Coombes; First Lieutenant, Frank Cunningham. SINCE 1914

The Power Squadron is not a new organization, explained Dandy. Canadian Power Squadrons are an offshoot of the original squadron in the eastern United States. It all started in New York in 1914 and spread across to the Great Lakes. From Detroit, the interest reached Windsor and the first Canadian squadron was formed.

There are squadrons in every province across Canada, with the exception of Saskatchewan, noted the District Commander.

It is a non-profit organization and no financial reward is payable to members for their instruction or other services.

Only reward is a gold bar on the sleeve of the jacket.

There are 17 squadrons on Vancouver Island, including the Gulf Islands, ranging from Victoria to Port McNeil and it is hoped that a new squadron will soon be formed on Pender Island.

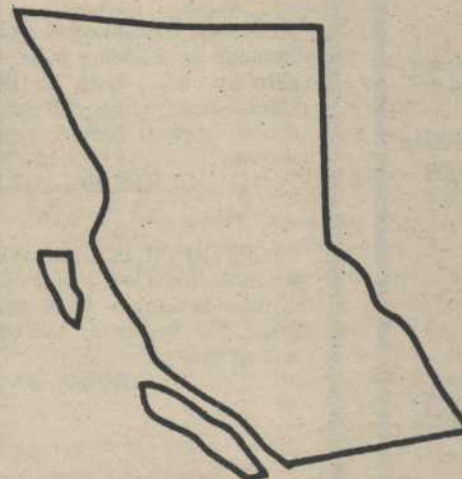

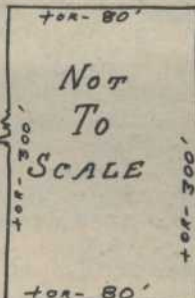

An impressive candlelight vigil lasted all night, and soon after dawn a selected number climbed over the fence and encamped on a slope inside the base.

Security men, armed with riot gear and clubs, stood by until the signal was given for the protesters to be dragged away into the buses lined up for the purpose.

There was only passive resistance.

Three hundred people were arrested, but, according to late reports on Sunday, only five were arraigned.

The rest plan to return to the base, their objective being to fill the local jails and clog the machinery of so-called justice.

Strange justice, which arrests peaceful demonstrators and sanctions weapons which could destroy humanity!

The other side of the coin

An anglophone visits Quebec to speak another language

Before ever I had gone to Quebec I perceived Canada as a coin with only one face. Then I discovered the obverse.

When you live in British Columbia you don't comprehend the immensity of all the other provinces which build up our country, Canada.

How surprised I was when I first arrived in Quebec to learn how helpful the people are when you try to speak French. They are warm and welcoming. In British Columbia many people just turn their backs and turn up their noses when people whose first language is not English visit.

And I ask, "why is it that we, in our isolation, separated as we are by geography cannot accept something different?"

I thought Canada was a country we could all share and enjoy together. Not of course that every English-speaking person has this

lack of receptiveness but these are the ones who are most vocal.

One evening last February I went into a store near the Motel Miami in Cap-de-La-Madeleine adjacent to Trois Rivières and asked the lady in my halting French for a chocolate bar. However I had not pronounced a word exactly correctly and so the lady helped me. She smiled and spoke a little English and she asked where I was from. I told her I was from British Columbia and started talking to her in what little French I knew. It was hard but fun.

I visited the Seminaire de Trois-Rivières, a boys' school in the old Trois-Rivières. I was nervous at first because I had not been around French-speaking students of my own age. I was with a group of school friends which helped a lot. We were paired up, two anglophones with one franco-phone.

At first I hardly spoke at all.

Then I realized that this was not what I had come for. I had come to improve my French. The boy I was paired with was also quiet.

So I finally broke the ice and started asking him questions about the school and himself. During the

course of the evening I learned a lot about his school and the Quebec culture. I told him about British Columbia and about living on the West Coast. The evening was a happy, sharing experience for all of us.

Sitting in the cafeteria in the University de Trois-Rivières is a great experience for anyone. Here I met several interesting and warm people.

I met a student from Arabia, a student from Africa, a student who is a communist a university cook and local students. It was easy to start a conversation because the tables were close together and the people were so willing to talk and pleased by our efforts to learn French.

Canada has two languages, French and English. It is a constitutional monarchy. These two facts make Canada different from most countries. Canada is also a commonwealth country.

I really do not want Quebec to become independent of Canada. Some people think French is being pushed on them and that they already have a language, English. But how can you say it is being pushed when Canada is a bilingual country? Maybe we are pushing English on them.

I would wish that those living in Canada have the opportunity to speak both French and English, and respect those who do. Canada should not just be an English country and not just a French country. It should be both.

I recall two people talking at school referring to Quebecers as a "bunch of frogs". I think that is as bad as telling racial jokes involving Newfoundlanders. Any jokes involving generalizations about race or religion demonstrate intolerance, disrespect and ignorance.

People talking in this way are destructive to the togetherness of Canada.

I feel Canada should stay as a whole. If I could change one thing in this country I would ensure better communications between the two cultures of Canada. People who know each other, understand, appreciate and respect each other.

It does not matter which government runs your country, as long as it is your country. Nationalism in Canada is swiftly being replaced by provincialism. Perhaps even communist rule would be better than a democracy at war.

This author is not suggesting that Canada should become communist. She is merely suggesting that we stop and take the time to sit and learn about our fellow countrymen before we condemn them.

As Thomas Hardy once pointed out:

"Yes; quaint and curious war is!

You shoot a fellow down
You'd treat if met where any bar is,

Or help to half-a-crown."

In a country rich in both intellect and resources there is no excuse for prejudice, especially when that prejudice is turned against your brother.

It was only the back wheels...

THE REST OF THEM STAYED ON THE CAR!

What did the man say? When you bought your car?

It didn't matter whether the second-hand car came from a dealer or a private seller, the proud new owner listened to a summary of the car's delights and made a deal.

Granddaddy did the same thing about his horse. He would spend an hour or so haggling over a 1 hp. Bay, two-seater, leather seats and drive it home. If the horse fell dead next day he went after the vendor, whether he was a horse trader or a private rider eager to unload.

In those days, the government took no notice of what was going on. The aggrieved purchaser could bury his losses and drown his sorrows. Or he could pick up his Winchester and start out after the vendor. In the first case, he might be picked up as a drunk and in the latter case a single Mountie might be hunting him down.

Otherwise the law didn't care what was going on.

It's so different today.

YOU BUY IT

You drive into the big city and you see a particularly sharp red sports car. So you forget all your good intentions and you splurge. Back home you drive, full of enthusiasm and misgivings.

If the back wheels fall off, there's no need to drown your sorrows or add to the long list of widows.

You do a quick back-check. Did the guy who sold you the car tell you the back wheels dropped off? Did he tell you they didn't?

And no matter whether he's a dealer or a fellow on the next block, he better be clean or the consumer laws will get him.

You got an old Edsel? Keep it! You got an old heap and you want out? OK, but watch how you advertise it. So it was made in the back end of 1966. But that sounds kind of old, so you advertise it as a 1968 and hope the guy who comes to look at it doesn't know the difference.

You are in trouble! You tell him it belonged to your brother and he bought it new. The new owner finds out that it did 90,000 miles as a police cruiser before it came into your family and you got more trouble.

COME CLEAN!

The law says you have to come clean when you sell a car and it had better be good.

The dealer will agree with the law on this. But the dealer will very bitterly oppose a regulation like one that might be coming up in British Columbia. The dealer will have to guarantee the car whereas a private vendor doesn't. The dealer must disclose that a car has been in an accident. A private owner doesn't have to tell.

You figure that one out.

You're a dealer and you have a dealer's license. A two-year-old Ford comes to you and you put it on the lot. The day after you got it, you learn that it has been in a front end collision and repairs amounted to \$2,300. You have to disclose this to your customer.

But I have an identical car and it, also has been in a fight. But if I want out, I don't have to disclose the damage. So you look at both cars. You pay me \$1,000 more because the other car has been damaged.

And I'm not pulling for the dealer. I've heard so many half-truths and untruths about cars that I've bought or nearly bought that I

trust nobody until the odometer has run up 50,000 miles. By that time it's too late to care.

But fair is fair.

SHOULD BE SHOWN

In my book every car that is damaged and repaired should be clearly identified. I drove a Chevrolet station wagon that had a twisted frame. I had it for two years and it wore me out keeping it on the road. If provincial regulations had required the vendor to disclose the fact it had been involved in a crash, I might never have bought it. I could easily have had it corrected. I didn't know it was the frame gone until I sold it and had another dealer indignant with me.

That's one of the proposals of the B.C. government. A dealer must disclose the fact that a vehicle has been damaged if the damage exceeded \$1,000. Which is excellent. But it only applies to dealers. Which is absurd.

Why so? It is reported that ICBC objects to the maintenance of a data disclosure system on the grounds that it would cost too much. Maybe it would be costly. But the public would benefit. At least, those members of the public whose cars were not involved in an accident would benefit.

You sell a damaged car. No matter how well repaired it is, the record is there and the car is worth that much less. Which is tough. But the way it is now, you sell off the damaged car like granddaddy sold off his horses. Better you lose than the innocent buyer carry the can!

There's another angle to all of this.

HE'S HANDY

Guy in the next block is handy with his hands and he's got a nice set of tools. So he picks up a heap, works on it and paints it. Then he sells it. Why not? There's no law that says he can't. And he isn't a trader, so he doesn't have to mention the fact that the car was a mess when he got it. And when that one's sold, he can go down the street and pick up another. He can buy a wreck from ICBC and put it together again. Then he can go to any small town, have a mechanic sign that the car is usable and ICBC will insure it again. Even if it ends up with only three wheels!

ICBC hasn't time to check on itself and there's nobody else about to check. Every heap sold this way helps to shine up the balance sheet, so who's going to kick?

A car is part of modern living. If the automobile were to disappear, North America would go into a depression from which there would be no recovery. The continent would collapse into poverty and famine.

But the gas buggy is here in everybody's garage. It stands there, shining and comfortable and oh, so vulnerable! One little blow and it's crippled. One sharp blow and it's destroyed.

EVERY BLOW

Every blow should be recorded on every car so that the future purchaser knows what he is heading into. And it shouldn't depend on the dealer. It should be recorded on the dash license. You buy a car and you have temporary papers. The day your dash license comes it tells you when the car was damaged and how much it cost. That way you keep the vendor honest and you set a sliding scale of value. The market value of a damaged car should be less than the undamaged one.

If you don't accept that, run into a tree tomorrow and see whether the car is improved after it's fixed up.

Nail the dealer if you want to. After all, he has to pay a license and a bond before he goes into

The spokesman for the association did not say whether he was aware that firemen have set up road blocks in past years, permitting drivers to pass through after a small message on the campaign.

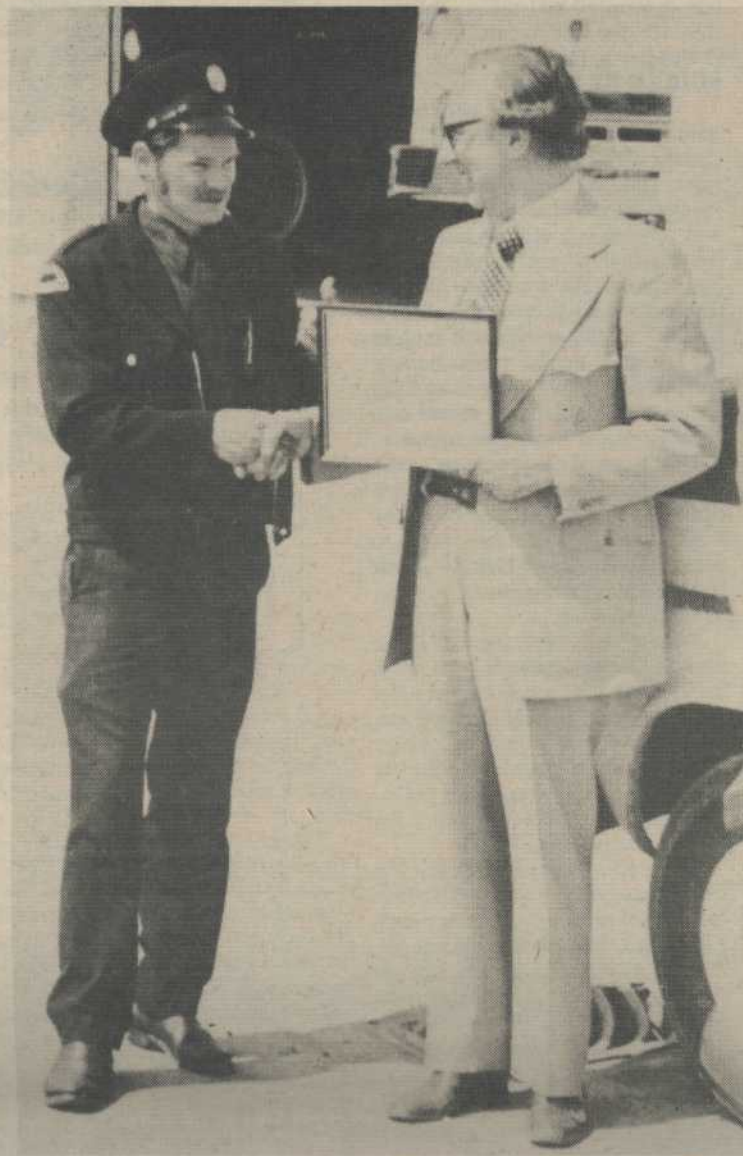
COMMENDATION

Village status for Ganges to be next issue

The Ganges Plan was discussed briefly at the Islands Trust meeting at Ganges last week, as was incorporation of Ganges as a

village.

Trust planner Chris Foord observed that once the plan is finalized, the next issue to be

studied would be incorporation.

There would be lots of freebies and a little more say in what's going on, said Chuck Longueay of the advantages of such a proposal.

"He might well be able to add a fair bit of input," added the Salt Spring trustee.
