Sewer to cost \$2,450,000

FIGURES REVEALED AT BOARD

Total cost of Ganges sewer project will be about \$2,450,000, according to a report from the Capital Regional Board.

Figure was provided for trustees of Gulf Islands School District last week.

According to a regional spokesman, the costs of laying the outfall and secondary treatment plant will be about the same as that of installing the collection system.

Letter sought to establish a basis of usage whereby the cost to the school board office might be calculated.

BUT NOT THE STAFF!

On that basis of usage, the students would account for 17.24% of the total wastes discharged into the system, trustees were told. That did not include the staff. If the school staff were to be included, then this figure would rise to 19.41%.

Regional district assessed hospital water consumption at 6,000 gallons per day. This would be the basis on which the cost of sewers might be allocated.

Spokesman for the school reported that in November and December, the average water consumption was in the vicinity of 2,500 gallons per day.

On the calculations propounded by the Regional District, the school board pay little of the costs

involved in the establishment of a sewer system. Regional plan proposed a payment of between \$279,000 and \$461,000.

Secretary-Treasurer Wilf Peck submitted that any such payment would be considered a tax and no

municipality may tax a school property.

Don Fairweather suggested that the board should make no payment in excess of the cost of installing a separate sewer system on the school property.

Recreation plan for Island to be discussed February 27

The Salt Spring Island Parks and Recreation Commission will be holding its annual meeting on Monday, Feb. 27, in the Elementary School Library at 7 pm.

During this meeting new appointees will be confirmed, committee reports will be tabled and a complete financial statement will be made.

Plans will be announced for the forthcoming months.

One of the main projects for this year will be the hiring of a consultant to prepare a Master Plan for recreational development for Salt Spring Island over the next five years.

This plan will involve the public, inviting their views and

needs; will make an inventory of all recreational opportunities; will list all wants and needs in order of priority so that a capability analysis can be determined; will list specific development projects with a schedule and total cost and will consider staffing, operating budgets and net costs to taxpayers.

OBJECTIVE STUDY

The Commission feels strongly that an objective study of this kind will result in efficient and orderly development of recreation on the island. The cost of the Master Plan will be in the area of \$11,000 and will be funded mainly from the Commission's annual budget. This Master Plan concept will be discussed at the annual meeting.

The Commission will also be active in finishing projects already begun. Fulford Field, Drummond Park, Centennial Park and Portlock Park will all be undergoing improvements in the future months for the betterment of recreation on Salt Spring.

Islanders will be invited to discuss any aspects of recreation on Salt Spring Island at the February 27 meeting.

Dog licenses are checked



They'd be more in municipality

There's no telling the difference when it comes to buying a license. The price of a dog license is the same for male or female.

When Neil Rhodes, of the ministry of agriculture was on Salt Spring Island last week, he outlined some of the problems of dogs and controls. He is the provincial domestic animal officer from the ministry. Most of his time is spent on Vancouver Island.

He is also the government officer responsible for checking that dogs are properly licensed.

Farmers are, generally, he suggested, happy with the degree of control on the islands. He recalled that the number of licensed dogs on Salt Spring Island last year was quite high as a result of checks made by himself.

Rhodes eliminated one misapprehension. Dog licenses expire at December 31. In remote places, where it is difficult to get out during the winter months, a period of grace is allowed and licenses in such places must be purchased by March. The islands are not weatherbound, he reminded readers and licenses must be acquired by December 31.

Fees are for dogs, male or female, over eight pounds, \$8; spayed or neutered, \$3; under eight pounds, \$6. Fees in some municipalities are as high as \$45 he observed. Most municipalities levy

a fee higher than the provincial territories, he noted.

Curtis favours transfer of Vesuvius ferry to ministry

When the Provincial Cabinet came to Saanich and the Islands last week, Premier W.R. Bennett declined to comment on the possible transfer of the Vesuvius-Crofton from the jurisdiction of the BC Ferry Corporation to the aegis of the ministry of highways.

On Monday Municipal Affairs Minister Hugh Curtis was happy to comment.

The Islands member explained that he has spoken of the possibility and supported it in Victoria.

"The transfer would be a good move," he told Driftwood, "and I have said so to the minister of highways and to Sam Bawlf."

If anything should come of the proposal it would not be an imminent decision, he warned. He sees it as a "short to medium term decision."

He also explained that he is speaking from the point of view of the Islands member. He has not had any opportunity to discuss it with members of the ship's crew, he added. His view could be influenced by such a discussion, he admitted.

ONLY ONE

The Vesuvius-Crofton service is the only one that could be transferred without any problems, he said. It is the only vessel using the wharf at either end. Transfer of the

other minor vessels in the islands would necessitate some negotiation for the use of Ferry Corporation wharves.

Curtis looked up the coast and listed the ferries between Vancouver Island and the small islands which are served by the highways vessels.

Originally mooted by the Salt Spring Island Chamber of Commerce as a way out of Ferry Corporation strikes, the transfer might offer other advantages to the islands, such as easier fare schedules and improved service.

Electrical short blamed for fire



Kitchen Korner

By Marianne Goodrich

Last week we had dessert pastries, and now for the main-dish pies. They're wonderfully savoury with or without meat, nutritious and the perfect way to stretch your food dollar.

ENGLISH PUB PIE

A make-ahead chicken and ham pie to be served cold in nice thick slices. Wonderful for a party or to serve on a busy day.

2 whole chicken breasts, about 12 ounces each

1/2 pound piece cooked ham

1 can (6 oz.) chopped mushrooms

1/2 cup chopped parsley

1 tsp. salt

4 hard-cooked eggs, shelled

Flaky pastry (recipe below)

1 egg

1 1/2 cups water

1 tsp. salt

1/2 tsp leaf tarragon, crumbled

1 envelope unflavoured gelatin.

...Pull skin from chicken breasts; using a small paring knife, cut meat away from rib bones with quick little strokes, feeling the way along with fingers. Cut raw chicken into tiny dice; reserve skin and bones for later.

... Cut ham into tiny dice; combine with chicken in a large bowl. Fold in mushrooms and liquid, parsley and 1 tsp. salt until well blended. ...Roll out three-quarters of Flaky Pastry to a 16" x 12" rectangle. Fit into 9 x 5 x 3 loaf pan, pressing pastry evenly into the bottom and sides of pan.

...Spoon one-third of meat mixture into pan; layer a row of hard-cooked eggs down centre of filling; spoon remaining filling around and on top of eggs.

...Roll out remaining pastry to a 10 x 6 rectangle. Cut out two 1/2" vents near the centre of pastry. Arrange pastry over filling; trim to 1/2"; turn under and flute edges to make a stand-up rim.

...Beat remaining egg with 1 tbsp. water in a cup; brush pastry with egg;

...Bake in moderate oven 350 for 1 hour and 40 minutes, brushing with egg after 1 hour, or until pastry is golden and filling bubbles through vents in pastry. Cool in pan on wire rack.

...While pie bakes, combine chicken bones and skin, water, remaining salt and tarragon in medium-size saucepan; lower heat; simmer 45 minutes. Strain broth into a 2-cup measure; skim off fat as it rises to the surface. You should have 1 cup of broth. If not, add water. Chill.

...After pie is baked, sprinkle gelatin over chilled broth to soften. Pour mixture into a small saucepan; heat until gelatin dissolves. Gradually pour broth through the two vents in pastry. Cool pie on wire rack 1 hour; then refrigerate 6 hours, or overnight.

...To serve: Run a long, thin-bladed knife around sides of pan, tipping pan from side to side to loosen bottom; unmold pie and place on serving plate. Cut into slices with a sharp knife. Serves 12. ***

FLAKY PASTRY

3 cups sifted all-purpose flour

1 tsp. salt

1 cup shortening or lard

6 tbsp. ice cold water

...Sift flour and salt into a large bowl. Cut in lard or shortening with pastry blender or two knives until mixture is crumbly.

...Sprinkle ice water over, a tablespoon at a time; mix lightly with a fork, just until pastry holds together and leaves the side of the bowl clean. ***

CLAM PIE

Pastry for Top Crust only.

2 medium potatoes cooked in skin, peeled and cut into 1/4" slices

4 slices bacon

1/2 cup milk

1/4 cup butter or margarine

1 large onion, sliced (1 cup)

2 cans (8 ounces each) minced clams

2 tbsp. flour

3/4 tsp. leaf savoury, crumbled

1/2 tsp. salt

1/4 tsp. pepper

...Cook bacon until crisp, remove and reserve. Add sliced onion to 3 tbsp. of the bacon fat and cook till tender.

...Drain liquid from clams, measuring liquid into a 2-cup measure; add milk to equal 1 1/4 cups liquid; reserve.

...Add clams to onions, crumble in

...Arrange potato slices on bottom of a 9-inch pie plate; spoon clam mixture over potatoes.

...Roll out pastry to an 11" round; cut out several slits near centre to let steam escape; cover pie. Trim overhang to 1/2"; fold under flush with rim; flute to make a stand-up edge. Brush top of pie with remaining clam juice or milk.

...Bake in a very hot oven 450 for 25 minutes, or until golden. Let stand 15 minutes before serving. Makes 6 servings.

Fair entries near double





Farmers' Institute will look into buying land

The Salt Spring Island Farmers' Institute is going to investigate the possibility of purchasing a parcel of land.

The suggestion was made by Pat Lee at the institute's annual meeting Thursday. Mr. Lee will head a committee to look into the proposal.

He said the institute could use the land for the annual fall fair, in addition to such events as horse shows and dog trials. He also

suggested it could be a future location for the Farmers' Market.

Marguerite Lee told the meeting that land was the only problem facing the institute with regard to a museum.

Over 250 signatures were taken at the Fall Fair from people who wanted to see the development of such a project.

She explained that she had been looking into the idea since the fair took place. It would have to be a

concrete structure in order to gain official recognition, she had discovered.

"There is a wealth of material from Salt Spring at the Provincial Museum in Victoria," said Mrs. Lee. "It would come back to the island if we had a recognized museum."

Agriculture is where the island began, she noted, so there is a connection between the Farmers' Institute and such a project.

Autoplan 1978 rewards the safe driver

Nine out of ten British Columbia vehicle owners will not pay any more for auto insurance in 1978 than they did in 1977. And most will pay less because of the expanded Safe Driving Discounts.

The overall average premium rate increase is 6%, but the full impact of this increase will be felt only by the vehicle owners who fail to qualify for the Safe Driving Discounts.

The premium increase is primarily to take into account the substantial and rapid growth in payments for bodily injury claims.

Safe Driving Discounts.

The discount program benefits the better drivers;

25% is deducted from your premium if you have a two year claim free record between October 1, 1975 and September 30, 1977.

15% is deducted from your premium if you have a one year claim free record from October 1, 1976 to September 30, 1977.

90% of all vehicle owners will not pay more for their insurance in 1978. Discounts on this year's premiums are earned by many motorists whose records are free of claims for which any payment has been made for collision, property damage or bodily injury. (No-fault accident benefit claims do not affect Safe Driving Discounts.)

In addition to the Safe Driving Discounts, there's good news for the Under 25 Single Males. Vehicle owners or principal operators in the category who are claim free and have not accumulated more than five "Point Penalties" between January 1, 1977 and September 30, 1977 will be entitled to a 25% Safe Driving Incentive Grant.

A completed application form must be submitted before April 1, 1978.

New Features of Autoplan

Gun Control. Working together to save lives.

The majority of Canadian gun owners have traditionally supported gun control in Canada.

Many of these people are sports hunters, target shooters or collectors, and others use their guns to hunt or trap in order to support their families. Generally, they are Canada's responsible gun users.

There is a small but growing group of people in Canada, however, who make criminal use of guns. For example, armed robberies increased 38% from 1974 to 1976. It is this group that the new gun control legislation will deal with through longer, mandatory prison sentences and prohibition powers.

The misuse of guns is increasing as well. Last year approximately 300 people were victims of homicide with a gun. Many in an impulsive moment of violence among family members or friends. New court-ordered prohibitions, police search and seizure powers, and higher gun safety standards will reduce the needless toll of deaths and injuries.

With the continued support of Canadians for gun control, we will reduce the criminal and irresponsible use of guns.

In short, we'll be working together to save lives.

"I own my own guns. How does the new Gun Control legislation affect me?"

If you own only hunting rifles and you store them safely, it won't affect you at all. However, certain other guns will be either restricted or prohibited. Basically, all centre-fire semi-automatics with a barrel length of less than 18½" are now restricted and must be registered. Handguns have been restricted since 1934. Sawed-off rifles and shotguns, guns with silencers and fully automatic weapons, are now prohibited, except those fully automatics registered to collectors before January 1, 1978.

"I'm glad you're getting tougher with criminals using firearms. What happens to them?"

Anyone convicted of using a firearm while committing or attempting to commit a criminal offense will be sent to prison for not less than one year and not more than 14 years. This sentence cannot be suspended. As well, maximum prison sentences for other firearm offences have been doubled.

"Is it true that police officers have new, extended search and seizure powers?"

Yes. Police officers can now seize firearms without a search warrant if they consider them hazardous to the immediate safety of any individual. They will then have to justify the grounds for the search to a magistrate.

"I now own a prohibited weapon. What do I do?"

It is against the law to be in possession of a prohibited weapon. You should contact your local police as soon as possible in order to turn the weapon over to them or to make other arrangements for its disposal. Failure to do so could result in your being prosecuted.

"What does safe handling and storage of guns have to do with Gun Control?"

Last year in Canada, there were over 120 accidental deaths due to the careless use of firearms. Under the new legislation, gun owners are responsible for the safe storage of their weapons. For example, if your gun is used in a criminal action, you could be charged with careless storage if such is decided in court.

"My rifle is now on the restricted list. How do I register it?"

Contact your local police immediately and register the gun with them. Failure to do so is punishable by a prison sentence of up to five years.

"How do you plan on keeping guns out of the hands of people who aren't able to use them safely?"

Through Firearms Acquisition Certificates and the courts' prohibition powers. The provincially administered F.A.C. system will come into effect January 1, 1979. It is designed to prevent unfit and incompetent persons from acquiring guns. The new prohibition power allows the courts to take guns away from dangerous persons.

"Why is Gun Control so important?"

Ultimately, to make Canadians safer from the misuse of firearms. Last year alone over 1,400 people were killed by guns.

Through tighter firearms control, safety education and the encouragement of responsible gun ownership and use, we will be able to reduce the level of firearm violence.

"I would like to learn more about the safe and proper use of guns, and more detail on restricted and prohibited weapons. Who should I see?"

Small Hall Ball sounds last call



Extension of Islands Trust not on his books at present says Curtis

A number of islanders have mooted the transfer of administration from the Islands Trust to an Islands Regional District.

On Monday afternoon Municipal Affairs Minister Hugh Curtis was on Salt Spring Island and the question was addressed to him by Driftwood.

Could he visualize such a change in the affairs of the islands?

The Islands Trust is on trial, he replied. The next several years will prove its efficacy. Until the Trust has proved itself he was not looking for further responsibilities. He reviewed the circumstances which led up to his decision to place land use controls in the hands of the Trust.

He was faced with three options he recalled. He could leave everything as it was, with a vast duplication of responsibilities; or he could revert to the original state and cancel out the Trust. He chose the third course and placed the greater responsibility on the Trust.

If he were planning an overall administration he would look for a central point in all the islands and he couldn't find one. Communications would be difficult, he agreed and the problems of a regional hospital would be almost insurmountable. The only hospital in the 13 Trust islands is Lady Minto.

MUST SHOW RESULTS

A future municipal affairs min-

ister could write off the Trust if it does not achieve its goals, he admitted.

The ministry of municipal affairs is already playing its part in the game of hurry: His ministry has pared a long period of time from the passage of documents from office to office. In addition, he is maintaining a constant status report which shows every application or other routine document and the rate of progress.

Every British Columbian is entitled to a prompt answer to his application, said Curtis, and he is gearing up for as prompt an answer as his ministry can handle.
