

Small district an advantage for students

Larry Holbrook feels students get more individual attention

This week's instalment of *The Administrators*, a series of articles on those people who serve in administrative capacities in the islands, features Larry Holbrook, supervisor of instruction in Gulf Islands School District.

Big isn't necessarily better, at least in terms of the standard of education, according to Larry Holbrook, supervisor of instruction for the Gulf Islands School District.

Students in this district are at a distinct advantage to students in larger communities, at least from the standpoint of receiving more individual attention, says Holbrook.


"It's a small district where the educational staff of the district is close to the board, which has got advantages and disadvantages, but I would say that it's more positive than negative," he said.

"I think that a small district is like a small school where there tends to be more involvement."

FOR FIVE YEARS

As an employee of the Gulf Islands School District for the past five years, Holbrook works closely with all levels of the educational structure in this area. Working out of the school board office in Ganges, he sits in on all board meetings, meets regularly with board members, other school board administrators, principals and teachers at the individual schools, and of course sits in on classes where he has an opportunity to meet students on an individual basis.

Born in England 56 years ago, Holbrook had already acquired about five years of teaching experience at a boys' school in his

native Yorkshire when he came to Canada in 1953. He spent many years teaching, mainly art and industrial education, throughout Ontario and British Columbia, before coming to the islands.

IN THE CARIBOO

Prior to his appointment here he had spent five years as supervisor of instruction in the Cariboo-Chilcotin School District.

Holbrook and his wife Jean called Salt Spring Island home until about two months ago when they moved to Sidney from their house on Fulford-Ganges Road and its spectacular view of Ganges Harbour.

Several considerations were weighed in making the final decision to move to Sidney.

"I think that Salt Spring Island is a delightful place to live and I enjoyed it but we mainly moved for my wife's benefit," said Holbrook.

Holbrook frequently travels to the Outer Islands and the fact that there is better ferry service from Swartz Bay to those Islands proved to be the deciding factor.

MAKES IT A LONG DAY

Travelling to and from work by ferry makes for a long day, however, and Holbrook says that it is not unusual for him to put in a 17-hour day.

Time is a scarce commodity in Holbrook's hectic schedule and it affords him few quiet moments during the course of a day. He usually makes it a point to take advantage of time spent on the ferries by catching up on reading work-related literature, preparing reports or completing voluminous quantities of paperwork.

As supervisor of instruction, Holbrook's chief responsibility is improving the quality of instruction throughout the school district.

In doing so, he must keep abreast of the latest curriculum developments from the ministry of education, visit schools on the islands with as much regularity as possible, work closely with principals and teachers and serve as a liaison between schools in the district and the school board.

CONSULTS WITH STAFF

He estimates that a good one-third to one-half of his time is spent calling on schools in the district, where he consults with staff members and offers assistance wherever possible. He often assumes an active role in the classroom by assisting teachers in overcoming any difficulties they may be having.

He also attends frequent workshops, usually in Vancouver or Victoria, put on by the ministry of education.

"I would say that the most

challenging aspect of a position like this is that you're required to be a jack of all trades and it is essential to balance out time so that it is productive rather than non-productive."

Holbrook works closely with his immediate supervisor, Bob Huestis, district superintendent, the man responsible for educational administration in this school district.

REMEDIAL ROLE

"Bob is mainly in an evaluative role and I work in a remedial role. In my position I am not expected to make evaluations such as preparing written reports on teachers," said Holbrook.

"I feel good about what I'm doing because I'm helping people, but of course the best people to judge my performance would be the people receiving the help."

Holbrook, a quiet and thoughtful man, has a deep appreciation of the outdoors and retains an avid interest in natural history, though time no longer permits him to maintain memberships in natural history clubs as he once did.

He continues to raise and train racing pigeons, a hobby he has pursued with a passion and one he inherited at about four or five years of age from his father back in England.

He explains that the sport of racing pigeons has long been a tremendously popular pastime throughout Europe, particularly in England and Belgium.

OWNS 80 BIRDS

Holbrook is the owner of 80 such birds and belongs to the Capital City Racing Pigeon Club in Victoria. For the past five years he has won the Royal Winter Fair championship for the exhibition of racing pigeons. The event, held annually in Toronto, is considered

the premier agricultural exhibition in Canada.

As holder of a challenging and often difficult position, Holbrook accepts the rewards with the disappointments but always tries to keep the interests of the students foremost in his mind.

The controversial establishment of an independent school on Pender Island last September led Holbrook to question whose interests were being best served.

A faction of concerned Pender Island parents advocated creation of a family grouping, or alternative class at Pender School similar to that attended by some students on Salt Spring Island.

WITHDRAWN FROM SCHOOL

A decision by the Gulf Island School Board not to approve establishment of the class resulted in withdrawal of 11 students by their parents from regular classes.

The 11 are now attending privately instructed classes, conducted by their parents.

"It was a very trying time and the people who were losing out were the kids," recalls Holbrook.

"There were some philosophic differences between some parents and some Pender School staff members.

"This doesn't imply that either group is in the wrong because both groups have a lot to offer."

While he is cautiously optimistic that the opposing sides will eventually resolve their differences, it will remain to be seen whether the 11 students will be back in attendance at Pender School this September.


"It's the parents' right to take that action and at that time it didn't seem possible that the two philosophies could come together," said Holbrook.

He says that while most Pender residents support the school staff and the board's decision, a cooling off period is essential, and that only then can the differences be reconciled.

Islanders will recall her feature group of 30 pictures of Coon Bay at last year's Galiano Artists' Show.

Now Dorothy has produced a second collection, *Coon Bay in Retrospect*, consisting of 33 pictures, oils or pastels, to show to a wider circle of art lovers. She has been able to contact several of the original owners and summer residents of the cabins from the Ladysmith-Chemainus area and invite them to the opening of the show.

The many islanders who admire Dorothy's distinctive style are invited to view the new collection which will be on show for two weeks, Tuesday to Saturday, 10 am to 5 pm, and this Sunday, Jan. 25, from 2 to 6 pm.

LOCAL REGISTRY

In the near future you may find in your back yard a person wearing a yellow fire jacket and helmet or the blue uniform of an ambulance attendant, note-book in hand, recording your name, details of accessibility for emergency vehicles, and any other information which would be of help to either organization when answering a

call to your address. As Galiano has no street address system, it has proved difficult in many cases to locate the site of an emergency.

This registry is for the use of the fire department, ambulance crew and doctor only, and the information it contains is confidential and not available to the public.

If you have information which might be of use, such as the availability of stored water (800 gallons or more), would you please point this out to the person doing the survey or phone 539-5778.

FIRE DEPARTMENT

The South Galiano Volunteer Fire Department will hold its annual general meeting in the South End Community Hall at 2 pm on Saturday, Jan. 31:

This is a meeting of the society, not just the volunteer firemen, and is open to the public. MARINE LIGHTING SYSTEM

Financial Post (January 17, 1981) reports that World Oceanic Systems Ltd. will be installing an underwater lighting system as a navigational aid in the approach to Vancouver's Second Narrows. The president of this company, one of British Columbia's high-technology firms, is Jeff Johns of Galiano. Resident here for many years Mr. Johns, an engineer, has designed his house at Georgia Hills to include various solar energy concepts.

The lighting system will consist of a network of sequential high intensity lights anchored to the bottom of the channel and remotely controlled so that they can be switched on at the request of an approaching pilot. The engineering work is being done at the company's base in the Marine Technology Centre at Patricia Bay.



No noise on Outer Islands as directors soften program

Modified noise bylaw will be prepared in committee by the Capital Regional Board for presentation in the next several weeks.

Director Yvette Valcourt, of Salt Spring Island, told *Driftwood* this week that the draft bylaw had been examined last week by the local works and services committee.

Other directors were adverse to introducing legislation which might restrict residential construction, she noted. The greatest concern expressed was for the control of excessively noisy motor vehicles and for the abatement of noise from amplified music in private homes.

Poultry farmers in Central Saanich had been asked to be excused from the restrictions of the noise bylaw where it affects the keeping of animals, reported Valcourt. She had approached the Farmers' Institute on Salt Spring Island to explain the exclusion of such farms from the bylaw.

CONCERN

She expressed concern that any restriction on the loading or unloading of a truck might be restrictive to trade. The bylaw would prohibit such activities between 7

pm and 7 am. The island director was similarly fearful that a restriction on construction, demolition, alteration or repairing a building might be equally restrictive.

Draft bylaw called for a cessation of such activities between 7 pm and 7 am and on Sundays, where the noise caused is "of such volume as to disturb the quiet, peace, rest or enjoyment of individuals or the public."

Board to pick up tab

Capital Regional Board accepted a request last week from the Salt Spring Island Parks and Recreation Commission for \$1,600.

The island commission explained that the cost of planning a recreation centre on Salt Spring Island had exceeded the funds allocated. The board was asked to meet the shortfall from the feasibility reserve fund, in view of the failure of the referendum.





Time to prepare greenhouse

So, they have done it again. In this week's article I was going to mention that the lovely little winter aconite with its yellow buttercup-like blossoms, and the sturdy little snowdrops, are going to come into bloom soon.

Well they were out by the time last week's article appeared. They beat me to it again. And the ever-green primroses, too. When last week's article was written they were spotty. By the time it appeared, they were out in full force, due to the sunny warm spell in mid-January no doubt; but this is not unusual at all, it occurs quite regularly.

Those who are lucky to have a well drained, sunny and protected spot may try a few radishes, green onions or broad beans in the open. And those lucky ones who have a greenhouse can now seriously plan their greenhouse schedule.

CLEAN-UP TIME

Near the end of this month we will be starting all kinds of things but first we are going to give it a good going over. There is a general clean-up that needs to be done, some things have to be discarded and others to be made ready.

Make sure there is adequate ventilation to prevent mildew and fungus diseases. Lay in a sufficient supply of potting soil. Wash benches, flats and other empty containers with a mild bleach solution. Check for slugs under objects in touch with the ground. Try not to alienate your spiders, they are tireless insect hunters.

We do not heat our greenhouse and it is not insulated either. Also,

it is quite adequately ventilated by two small continuous openings on both ends under the eaves. This allows warmed air to escape and prevents cold air from entering.

Since we do not pay for heating of this warm air there is no loss. In the unheated part of the greenhouse we raise the hardy bedding plants, such as all the cabbages, onions, lettuces, parsley, as well as sweet peas, lobelia (Blue Butterfly), delphiniums and gaillardia. All these require a germinating temperature of 50°F. And the unheated greenhouse provides this easily.

TOOK 31 DAYS

We even germinated "Springset" tomatoes last year in the unheated part. They took 31 days to germinate as compared to five to eight days in the germinating box. This germinating box is the key to energy-efficient and low-cost greenhouse operation.

We used to have two 1,500-watt electric heaters blasting away to bring the greenhouse temperature to an ambient 80° air temperature for a 70° soil temperature. Instead, we now use one five by two and a half-foot insulated germinating box which we built from one sheet of half-inch plywood and one sheet

of one inch styrofoam insulation. The bottom and the sides are insulated.

The top is draped with a clear sheet of plastic and the soil is held at a constant 70° germinating temperature by one 30-foot soil-heating cable consuming only 168 watts per hour. Once the soil is heated to 70° it takes hardly any energy to keep it there, due to the insulation, cover and the soil's own heat-holding capability. And the whole thing is also in a protected environment.

The cost of heating our greenhouse for two months paid for the whole thing: wood, insulation and heating cable. An added benefit are the cool growing conditions provided by the remainder of the unheated greenhouse.

STURDY, BUSHY

Transplants from the germination box grow sturdy and bushy in this environment without any worry of transplanting shock or the attention required to gradual hardening off. Allow an extra week or two though as plants do not grow as fast as in a heated greenhouse.

The plastic cover over the germinating box is also an excellent moisture retainer so vital to freshly germinated seedlings. It also reduces the frequency of watering, which should be done with lukewarm water so as not to reduce the soil temperature. We do this with solar-heated water from our garden hose left lying in the sun.

Further, if you do not have a shelf under your greenhouse bench, put one in. The lower shelf

Three-month jail term for impaired driving

A third conviction for impaired driving has resulted in a three-month jail term for a Ganges man.

Judge D.K. McAdam imposed the sentence in provincial court on Ross Frederick Bell, of Cusheon Lake Road, as a result of an incident last April in which, court was told, Bell twice drove away from police officers who were trying to stop him for questioning.

Const. Ace Mainwaring and Const. Glenn Hanna of Ganges RCMP had been conducting a routine check of an automobile near Cusheon Lake Road April 25 when Bell passed the officers, travelling in the opposite direction on Fulford-Ganges Road.

As he drove by, both officers noticed that Bell's face appeared flushed and that his eyes were glazed. Taking pursuit, the officers managed to pull Bell's car over to the side of the road, about one

quarter of a mile from the spot at which he had passed them.

As Hanna approached on foot, Bell pulled away and drove slowly down the shoulder of the road. The officers gave chase only to have Bell drive away again, they testified.

Following the second instance, Hanna ran after Bell's car and managed to bring it to a halt.

In testimony given during last Wednesday's trial, Hanna and Mainwaring both described Bell as being flushed about the face, speaking in a slurred manner, appearing confused and failing several balance tests conducted by the officers.

Bell also failed a subsequent breathalyzer test at the police station.

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Nick Gilbert leaves position as community school worker

Eager to pursue a lifestyle of independence and self-sufficiency, community school worker Nick Gilbert has left his position with the Gulf Islands School District after five years of service.

The only one of its kind in the province, the position was set up on an experimental and part-time basis with Gilbert filling the post since its conception in December 1975.

Gilbert, who stepped down at the end of last month, has been replaced by psychologist Ralph Miller.

A strong advocate of self-sufficiency, Gilbert, 38, plans to join a friend constructing frame houses on a commercial basis, a trade which he learned while building his own four-bedroom log and frame home on Upper Ganges Road.

CONTINUE FARMING

He will continue to devote a great deal of his time to working the 11-acre farm which he and his wife Mary carved out of the woods, and on which the Gilbert family rest their hopes for achieving self-sufficiency.

On the roughly five acres of land that he has so far cleared by hand, Gilbert estimates that he has planted at least one tree for every one brought down.

He has planted a variety of nut and fruit trees and hopes that one day soon these will provide enough food to meet most family needs with any surplus being sold off for profit.

WAS JOINTLY FUNDED

Though now totally supported by the Gulf Islands School District, the community school worker's position was jointly funded until two years ago by the school district and the ministry of human resources through the Community Society.

"It was a lovely idea for somebody who would like to get involved in the community," said Gilbert.

"There's nothing quite like it anywhere else."

Involved with social work at one level or another for most of his working years, Gilbert looks back on a career which has taken him to Kamloops and as far away as the Yukon.

"I've been doing it one way or another for 14 years now and I guess it's time for a break," said Gilbert.

"My real retirement, however, came when I left the federal government 10 years ago."

ENJOYS INDEPENDENCE

Though hoping to remain involved with social work in some capacity, Gilbert enjoys his independence, particularly the freedom it brings him and his family.

He looks forward to his new career in building and looks back on a challenging position in the community which brought him a great deal of satisfaction.

"I've met a lot of people throughout the islands because of the nature of the job and I'll miss

the contacts I've made.

Exercising a degree of independence and demonstrating responsibility for one's own actions are skills which Gilbert attempted to impart to those he came in contact with in the social work field.

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Down Through the Years With Driftwood

FIVE YEARS AGO

Last week's announcement of new senior citizens' housing on Galiano Island is the result of a Central Mortgage and Housing Corporation loan and contribution totalling \$207,721 to the Galiano Island Housing Society. The 16-unit senior citizens' building will be broken up into eight bachelor apartments renting for \$118.50 per month and eight one-bedroom apartments renting for \$142 per month.

Newspapers, television stations and the department of national defence all appeared on Salt Spring Island last week when a Ganges contractor exposed a small cache of dynamite on a north island building site. Harvey Reynolds was operating the bulldozer on Fort Street near Walker Hook, when the box of explosives was uncovered. There was no indication how the explosives ended up there.

The two-year old struggle for a subdivision bylaw on Salt Spring Island is still being waged, although enactment of the bylaw is just one step away from becoming a reality. The bylaw now awaits the signature of Hugh Curtis, the new minister of municipal affairs. Late last year the newest draft met with the approval of the local committee, the Islands Trust and the Capital Regional District. It was adopted by the region and passed on to Curtis for his signature. The committee was first established in 1974 by regional director George Heinekey to come up with an acceptable bylaw.

Hang gliders were busy on the island last Sunday when exponents of the sport were busy leaping off Lee's Hill. The highly hazardous hobby requires the flyer to propel himself on his feet until wind currents provide the needed lift.

TEN YEARS AGO

The interim zoning bylaw was given its final adoption by the Capital Regional Board on Wednesday last week. Born of bitter dispute on Salt Spring Island, the bylaw was entirely revamped half-way through its course and then suffered a long

delay at the hands of the provincial cabinet.

Winter made a sudden appearance and a quick departure last week. Temperatures dropped sharply at the beginning of the week as the cold snap brought on snow and freezing temperatures. By last Thursday a total of 36 inches of snow was recorded at Ganges by dominion weather observer H.J. Carlin. Motorists and their cars were left stranded when driveways and roads became impassable. Highway crews worked day and night to keep roads clear and wreckers spent long hours hauling cars out of ditches.

Vancouver Island branch of the B.C. School Trustees' Association has warmly endorsed a move on the part of Gulf Islands trustees to name J.M. Campbell a life member. Campbell, a Saturna resident, is a former chairman of the islands district, former president of the B.C. School Trustees' Association and charter president of the B.C. Educational Research Institute.

FIFTEEN YEARS AGO

Cablevision service will be introduced to Salt Spring Island this spring with initial service being limited to the central part of the island from the terminal on Cranberry Road to the Lady Minto Hospital and including all of Ganges. Service will later be extended to the Vesuvius area with further extensions depending upon demand.

A Ganges woman chose five days in jail rather than paying a \$25 fine after being found guilty of a charge of speeding along Lower Ganges Road. The woman stated in provincial court last Friday that the summons she received from the RCMP indicated that the offence occurred on January 7 and not January 9. It was suggested by the magistrate that it was a case of a poor carbon copy or that the original had been made to read January 9 and had been written over.

A recent Victoria newspaper story reports that the B.C. Ferry Authority is considering new transportation links to the Saanich Peninsula. The report suggested that the Ferry Authority was studying removal of the Swartz Bay terminal to Deep Cove for the Salt Spring Queen run, in conjunction with a move of the Salt Spring terminal to Isabella Point.

TWENTY YEARS AGO

All reports indicate at press-time that a Port Alberni company plans to re-open the shale plant at Welbury Bay on Salt Spring Island. According to reports, the plant has been sold to Holdfast Natural Resources Ltd. which has vast holdings of pozzolan deposits, a substance found in certain types of shale, in the Port Alberni area. Sources indicate that the new company plans to barge the pozzolan rock from Port Alberni to the plant on Salt Spring Island for processing. It is not known when modifications will begin at the plant.

A public meeting to hear the recommendations of the special committee regarding problems at the Salt Spring Island golf course has been called for Saturday, Jan. 28 at 8 pm. Anyone interested in golfing or belonging to a country club is urged to attend.

George Heinekey was re-elected as chairman of the school board at its regular monthly meeting on January 12. A supporter of Heinekey, J.M. Campbell of Saturna Island, urged the board to adopt a policy of rotating the chairmanship in the future.

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New swimming beach is sought at Cusheon Lake

New swimming hole is proposed at Cusheon Lake by the Salt Spring Island Recreation Commission. The commission is investigating the establishment of public bathing facilities at the public parkland at Cusheon Lake.

The 30-acre property was given to the community by McMillan Bloedel in 1937 and was contingent upon its use for recreational purposes. The site would require parking and toilet facilities, explained commission spokesman Glenn Woodley. Salt Spring Rotary Club is being courted to take up the facility as a club project, he noted.

The matter might be tabled awaiting an impact study, suggested chairman Russ Lazaruk. "You table it now and it's that

much further down the road," commented regional director Yvette Valcourt.

POTABLE WATER

Planner Dean Strongitharm warned that the lake is a designated potable water lake and serves as the source for the Beddis Waterworks District.

Trustees agreed that unless it can be demonstrated that there will be no damage to the water quality it might be imprudent to agree to recreational use of the land.

On the motion of director Valcourt the proposal was approved in principle.

Recreation Commission is looking at 15 picnic sites, change rooms and toilet facilities.

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
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
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
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A clinical assistant takes a specimen in order to test and segregate tubing for cross-matching during Monday's blood donor clinic.

Blood clinic fails to make its target

auxiliary conducting registration, assisting technicians and nurses and providing refreshments and cookies.

Bingham praised the efforts of both donors and volunteers, and also extended congratulations to *Driftwood* for assistance with promoting the clinic.

"I've been doing this since 1973 and the response this year has been superb," said Bingham.

The numerous volunteers had already spent weeks in preparation when the Red Cross blood recruitment team rolled into town.

TWO MOBILE TEAMS

There are two mobile blood recruitment teams continuously on the road throughout the province, in addition to two permanent clinics in Vancouver. The two mobile units, consisting of about 15 members each, manage to hold an average of two clinics per day or about 700 clinics per year. Each team consists of three drivers, two registered nurses and about 10 aides.

Mitchell, a member of the blood donor recruitment for the past five years, says that the Red Cross requires between 600 and 650 pints of blood per day just to keep up with demand in the province.

While it rarely runs out of blood, it is occasionally required to step up promotion campaigns, especially after long holiday periods when stocks run dangerously low.

She says that people are quick to

respond to calls for donations but that a small percentage of the population in British Columbia is carrying the load.

"It's a small percentage doing a large percentage of the work," said Mitchell.

SUPPLIERS NUMBER FOUR PERCENT

About three to four percent of the population is keeping hospitals in the province adequately supplied with blood while about 38% of the population is actually eligible to do so. The Red Cross would like to see more people involved in the drives to meet the all-important demand for blood.

"When we are in your community it's you that are supporting the whole of the province for the next few days," said Mitchell.

"You're not really donating blood to us, you're donating it to somebody else and we're just the middlemen."
