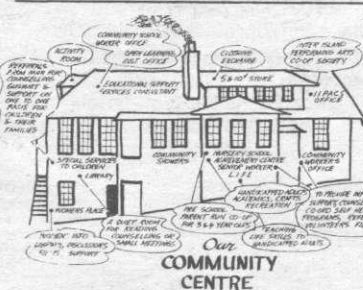

Abbott arrives in England Sunday

Ex-Salt Spring Islander Jack Abbott is sailing on the *Canberra* to England, and will arrive at Southampton on Sunday.

Seventy-eight-year-old Abbott has had a difficult time during these past few months. As a resident at Stanley on the Falkland Islands, Abbott, according to neighbours in Stanley, refused to budge an inch for the Argentines.

The Argentines invaded Stanley and gave the British task force the impression that the civilians had been herded into the large cathedral in Stanley.

The civilians had not been herded anywhere, reported Mrs. Dot Othen, a friend of Abbott's, when she spoke to *Driftwood* from her home in Surrey, England.

Jack Abbott had communicated very infrequently since the curfew had been placed on Stanley. However, Abbott did on one occasion venture out of his large home in Stanley to visit neighbours.

When Abbott returned to his home overlooking the harbour in Stanley, the Argentine soldiers had shot the lock off his front door and had, with gunfire, ruined other parts of his home. When he entered his sitting room he found a gun sighted at the harbour.

At the Falkland Islands office in London, spokesman Alistair Cameron told *Driftwood* that Abbott was well and on his way.

But, said Dot Othen, "Jack reports he's in a pretty battered state." According to Othen, the last two days in Stanley were insufferable. The naval bombardment and the violence shattered the civilian community on the Falkland Islands.

From a letter Dot Othen received sent from the *Canberra*, Abbott reported that he was receiving first-class treatment being the only civilian on the British naval vessel.

Abbott's family is meeting the ex-islander at Southampton and a party in Surrey is being prepared for his arrival.

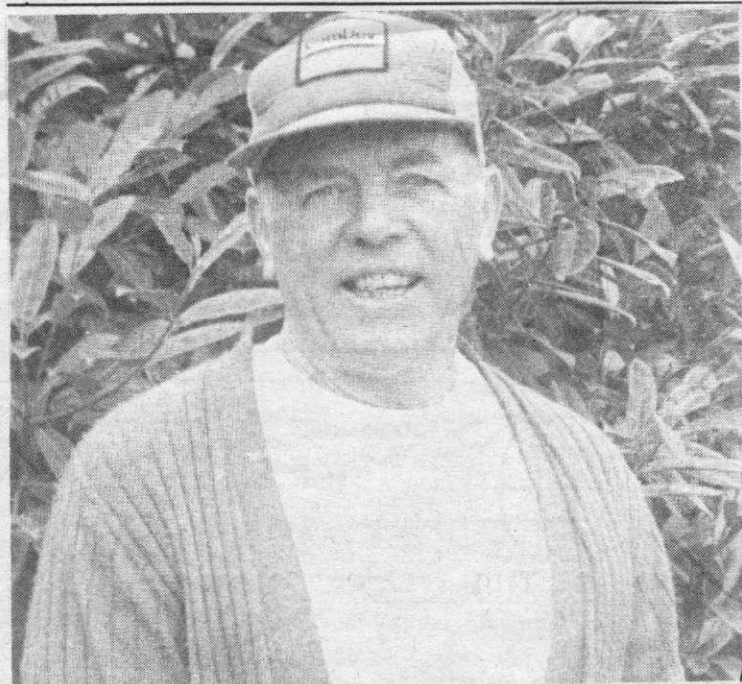

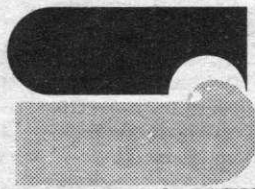

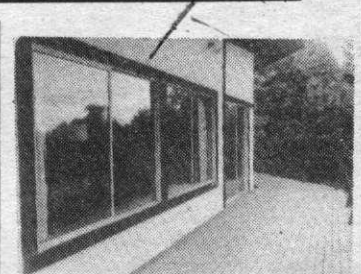

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Queen of the Islands always late

Ferry service is 'terrible' say Pender Island residents

Pender Islanders may be waiting until September before they can sail with the ferries on time.

The wait goes on at Otter Bay. While some early risers prepare for a day in Victoria at 5.30 am they whistle down to Otter Bay to board the 7.10 am ferry and their time is wasted. Often the wait goes on until as late as 9.30 before a ferry arrives to fetch them. Such a test of patience on daily terms isn't good for business.

"The ferry is always late. It's just hard to keep appointments," explained Manfred Burandt of Pacific Coast Lands. "Ordinarily it was a good service but the *Queen of the Islands* is always at least an

hour late."

The present schedule at Otter Bay was incorporated into the ferry service on June 21 to run until September 14. So far, the *Queen of the Islands* has, according to Pender Islanders, a very poor record.

"Well, the problem comes when we send two men and two trucks down to the ferry slip at 7:10 am," said Kelly Scott at Pender Island Lumber and Freight. "We end up paying for two trucks and two men to sit at Otter Bay drinking coffee for two hours until the 7:10 am arrives after 9. We have enough traffic on Pender to warrant or deserve a ferry that can give us sufficient service....the ferry service isn't an adequate one and hopefully, optimistically, the problems will be solved."

"I have a doctor's appointment tomorrow at 3 pm," Don Keating told *Driftwood*. "I can either be late and catch the 12:45 pm sailing or take no chances and be six hours early."

"The service is absolutely terrible. To be safe for a 3 pm appointment I have to leave home at 7:10!"

And even the 7:10 doesn't arrive at 7:10 am.

From his Salt Spring Lands office on Pender, Keating told *Driftwood* that the *Queen of the Islands* had been on time once.

On one occasion, the trip to Tsawwassen had to be cancelled because the boat was so late. For Dave and Florence Davidson at Roesland Resort on Pender, negotiating schedules with the ferry corporation is common practice.

"At one time the schedule was very damaging to us as a resort," Florence Davidson reported. "The schedule now has only been in effect for one week and it's been a disaster. We don't leave the island in the summer very much but our first guests this month had a 2½-hour wait because the ferry was late."

A meeting of the scheduling department at the B.C. Ferry Corporation office in Victoria was in session when *Driftwood* called Tuesday.

"...I believe they're working on the Pender Island problem," spokesman for B.C. Ferries, Betty Nicolson, told *Driftwood*. She said she believed a revision of the schedule was planned.

The schedule was to remain in effect until September 14.

New laundromat uses recycled water

Another business opened on Salt Spring Island this week and the back-up to the operation proves interesting.

The Salt Spring Coin Laundry has opened its doors in the Valcourt Centre, and the washers are fed by recycled water. Partners in the venture, David Frank and Ross Miller, plan to have 12 washing machines and 12 dryers when the operation hits full stride. They also offer public showers.

The recycled water results from pumping the wash water through a system which is unique in Canada. The recycling system, designed by Culligan Water Conditioning, can cope with up to 11,000 gallons of water.

When the wash cycle on the machines ends, the dirty water is pumped to a receiving tank where chlorine bleach and aluminum sulphate are added automatically. The bleach cleans the water and the aluminum aids in coagulation of the dirt.

INTO SETTLING TANK

From the receiving tank, the water is pumped into a settling tank to allow the chlorine and aluminum to work. From there the water flows through a series of filters to clean it.

The first set are called cyclone filters. The second set are depth filters and the third are carbon filters where the bleach and any colouring are removed. The water

goes through a set of micron filters which catch any particles missed by the other filters.

The filtered, clean water is then pumped into a large holding tank for reuse in the washers.

The system of filters automatically backwashes itself for cleaning. Each filter comes equipped with a timing device which can be set to control the number of backwashes as well as the length of time between them.

While the entire system uses, under normal conditions, up to 4,000 gallons of water, only about 200 gallons per day are lost in the clothes.

The final step in the recycling is a large water tank which maintains the pressure in the system at about 45 pounds.

CONTROLS FLOW

Each tank has an automatic valve system which controls the flow of water through the tanks to prevent an overflow.

The receiving tank and a back-up receiving tank as well as the holding tank are large concrete bunkers which measure more than seven feet high and nine by nine feet square.

Price for a clothes wash is 75 cents per machine while the dryers cost 75 cents for 30 minutes.

The showers cost \$1.50 for 8½ minutes of hot water. Towels can be rented and the soap is supplied.

"The system is expensive," said landlord Phil Valcourt, who installed it, "but I'm proud of it."

The program is funded by the government through the Community Centre.

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Island beaches are cleaner, report shows

The waters at five beaches on Salt Spring Island are as clean as any beaches in the Capital Regional District.

A report of the faecal coliform counts at 79 beaches in the CRD released July 2, shows Vesuvius beach with a count of 36 while Drummond Park beach gave a reading of 12 and Booth Bay beach read three.

The mean log averages from a report issued in June showed the Vesuvius water reading at 12, Drummond at 11 and Booth Bay at three.

Two fresh water beaches were also monitored. Green Acres beach on St. Mary Lake had a consistent reading of three for both months as did the public beach on Cusheon Lake.

The worst offenders in the CRD for both reports were Ross Bay at 243 for the July report, down from 290 in June. Shoal Bay had a coliform count of 354 in July compared to 203 in June.

Both beaches are at the southerly end of the Saanich Peninsula in Victoria. Gonzales Bay, located between the two offenders, showed a July reading

of 27, up slightly from the June report of 20.

The report noted, "Standards for swimming areas is that the mean log average for faecal coliforms should not be greater than 200 over a five-week period."

The report also notes an increase in the number of cases of swimmer's itch at various fresh-water lakes in British Columbia.

Swimmer's itch occurs from a parasite which clings to the skin. The parasite can generally be found where ducks and geese are in abundance. When the swimmer comes out of the water and the skin dries off, the parasite burrows under the skin and a red spot develops.

Any person who develops a case of swimmer's itch is advised not to scratch. Rubbing the affected area could lead to skin infection. The best way to avoid the parasite is to stay away from the water.

Thorough drying of the skin immediately after leaving the water may lessen the effects.

Swimmer's itch causes severe skin irritation in some people but is no more of a health hazard than mosquito or flea bites, noted the report.

Pet sales to be prohibited

The Saturday morning market in Ganges was subject of discussion by the Salt Spring Parks and Recreation Commission this week.

The commissioners accepted a recommendation from the Capital Regional District deputy animal control officer, with backing from

the SPCA, to prohibit the sale or giving away of animals such as dogs or cats which would be considered as pets.

The problems of space were also discussed. Some vendors in the market take more space than others. The area will be measured into reasonably sized areas and the

expectation is that the vendors will police themselves.

The commission had received many letters with the majority calling for a clean-up of the "flea market" aspect of the sale. A petition was also received by the parks board calling for enforcement of the no parking rules at the boat launching ramp.

Most of the commissioners supported the idea of cleaning up the market to bring it back to the original intent of selling produce and crafts. The problem confronting them is how to do that without destroying the market.

"The commission doesn't want to be in the position of destroying what has become a social institution," Dr. Hugh Borsman told *Driftwood*.

They are considering a proposal to move the flea market stalls to another area and will be discussing the suitability of various locations.

The commission is also concerned about vendors moving into the Centennial Park car lot earlier in the week. While such vendors as Friar Tuck and Eunola Ice Cream have used the lot during the week, other vendors have taken to setting up shop as early as Thursday to get a jump on the weekend.

The consensus on the board is that vendors should not use the parking lot as free space for making money in direct competition with other businesses in the village.

Fishermen protest parking near ramp

Another voice has been added to the debate about the Farmers' Market in Ganges.

A group of sports fishermen have presented the Salt Spring Parks and Recreation Commission with a petition containing at least 50 names. The group is concerned about the parking situation at the boat launching ramp near the market.

The problem as they see it stems from the lack of space in the area because of the "flea market approach" which has developed.

"Our objections to the flea market are that most dealers take up more space than they need, necessitating the public to park in the only area designated for sports fishermen to approach the only launching ramp in Ganges," said

the group in a covering letter to the commission.

They pointed out that the ramp had been rebuilt in 1980 with funds from the department of fisheries and labour donated by sports fishermen.

With a suggestion that members of the commission patrol the area to see first-hand the parking problems, the group recommended that the market be held at a specified time each Saturday morning. The time, between 9 am and 1 pm, would allow the fishermen access to the ramp before the market opened.

"...This would give the sports fishing public till 9 am to launch their boats without the risk of life and limb or damage to vehicles," they said.

The no-parking signs in the area should be respected, said the group, and police should enforce the restrictions and issue tickets for illegal parking.

"May we ask your support," they said in the letter, "in keeping that area that is designated for boat launching absolutely clear."

Ganges Hill scene of accident

The Toyota pickup was turning left at the top of Ganges Hill near Hillbank Sawmill and when the Ford van attempted to pass on the right, it ended up in the ditch.

William Lux, of Ganges, was issued a traffic citation for following too closely as a result of the incident on June 29 at 7:45 pm.

Robert Tully, a passenger in the van, was treated for minor injuries.

Damage was estimated at \$401 to the van which lost the windshield in the tumble into the ditch. Driver of the other vehicle, Sam Marcotte of Ganges, escaped without injury or damage to the pickup.

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
