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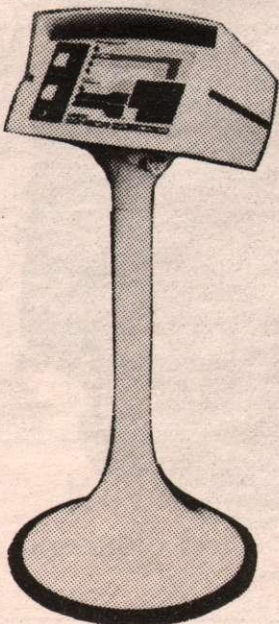

Poet and author moves to mainland

Lorraine Vernon is a remarkable woman and her recently published *An April Journal* is noteworthy on several counts.

Lorraine and her husband, Stan, have owned a house on Sturdies Bay Road for several years and had hoped to retire here. Circumstances have forced a change in plan.

Stan received promotion to a job which interested him so much he deferred retirement by several years. Lorraine developed a heart condition, and living alone on Galiano, during the week when Stan was working in Vancouver, presented too many risks and too much anxiety. So the Vernons have moved to White Rock and that is Galiano's loss.

Lorraine is an author and poet. At first part-time, as she raised a family of five children, her work was published in Canadian little magazines. Her first two books of poetry were published in 1977 and 1978. She has also written plays, criticism and short stories and now intends to concentrate on fiction.

Lorraine will be reading selections from her *Journal* on CBC's *Morningside* daily between April 18 and 29. The subject matter and alternative title of her *Journal* is *Mastectomy*. She deals courageously with the physical and psychological trauma she endured in the month of April, 1979.

Another remarkable fact is that all profits from the sale of the book, on Galiano at the *Earthen Things Gallery*, will go to the Unitarian Service Committee, which for nearly forty years under the direction of Dr. Lotta Hitschmannova, has contributed so imaginatively to the betterment of life for people in the impoverished Third World. Here is a chance for Galiano residents to pay their respects to a courageous member of their community and, at the same time, make a small contribution to alleviating human suffering.

Vandalism and fire fighting

On Sunday, April 17, the Volunteer Fire Department called on its last reserves, the retired veteran volunteers, to brush up their skills on pumper, pumps and hoses to fill the 10,000 gallon tank installed at the school site. ICBC insisted when the new Activity Centre was built that the tank be installed as a fire prevention measure, so that an adequate supply of water will be on hand should the fire department be ever called on to fight a fire at the school. The present replacement value of the school and Activity Centre must now exceed a million dollars, so the precaution seems a prudent one.

The fire department has three

water storage tanks of its own and the Galiano Club has another installed in Bluff Park. MacMillan-Bloedel have a number of waterholes sited around the island to supply water for forest fire fighting.

However, it is disturbing to record that last week some irresponsible person opened the valve on one of these tanks and let 2,000 gallons of water drain uselessly away. Vandalism may sometimes be a form of protest, but it is difficult to imagine what purpose was served by this senseless act.

Art Collectors' Week

From April 18 to 22, inclusive, there will be an exhibition, sale and auction of paintings and sculptures by up to 100 of B.C.'s leading artists, to be held in the Media Centre, 800 Robson Street, Vancouver.

Galiano, with .03% of the population of the province, will be represented by three of its artists, 100 times its ratio.

The Galiano artists who will be showing at the exhibition are painters Jean Beatty and Keith Holmes, and sculptor Enzo von Resori.

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Legion undertakes long list of projects annually

For the Pacific Command of the Royal Canadian Legion, 1982 was another active year, members of the Salt Spring Island branch learned last week.

Pacific Command has 177 branches with more than 108,000 members and affiliates.

British Columbians both young and old benefit from the activities of the Legion.

Since 1956 the organization has sponsored senior citizens in low-rental accommodation with a construction cost exceeding \$60

million and a current value many times that amount.

More than \$150,000 in bursaries was awarded last year, with a further \$14,000 awarded in special education grants.

The Legion spends more than \$300,000 annually on physical fitness and sponsoring teams in soccer, hockey, little league, lacrosse and other sports. In addition, more than 5,000 Cubs, Scouts, Guides and cadets are sponsored by Legion branches.

War veterans were assisted last year with \$572,000 raised through

the poppy fund. The Legion also provides a full-time, free provincial service bureau for all ex-service personnel and their dependants.

Hospitals in B.C. benefit through continuing donations of special equipment and furnishings, from television sets to buses.

Teams of Legion and Ladies' Auxiliary members regularly visit veterans in hospital.

Legion funding of \$45,000 a year goes to the support of the department of family practice at the University of B.C., from which 83 family doctors have graduated since

its inception in 1978. Another \$45,000 a year goes to the community geriatric division at UBC.

Attendance by students at the Terry Fox Canadian Youth Centre is also sponsored by the Legion, at an annual cost of \$12,000.

The Legion is not alone in its

efforts.

Ladies' Auxiliaries to the Legion, which number 160 and boast more than 11,000 members in the Pacific Command, raised \$2,327,840 in 1982. They provided support to hospitals, bursaries, the Red Cross, Canadian National Institute for the Blind and other projects.

Planners support vendors

The first item discussed by the Community Planning Association at its April 13 meeting concerned the Lake Maxwell watershed.

Dr. Nordin, of the Resource Quality Section, Water Management Branch, wrote to say it is unlikely that ground water from outside the watershed is entering the lake. The good news that the Minister of Lands, Parks and Housing is to try to negotiate a land exchange with Texada Logging, was followed by the assertion that the Salt Spring Island Water Preservation Society should press for this policy being extended to MacMillan Bloedel. It was also decided to contact the Islands Trust with regard to the housing development practices of Texada Logging.

FARMERS' MARKET

Discussion regarding the Citizens' Committee was tabled. The Farmers' Market was the next item.

It was learned that jurisdiction over the site rests with the Salt Spring Island Chamber of

Commerce by way of a Crown lease.

Proposals from the Vendors' Association were brought forward and discussed, with the Planning Association pledging support to this committee, working in conjunction with the supervising body.

Suggestions include dividing the market into 56 stalls; holding sites for vendors of Island-produced handicrafts and farm produce, and restricting cars from driving through the market area. These proposals were for Saturday use only.

WATER TAXES

The increase in North Salt Spring water taxes was discussed, members agreeing that improved service would justify an increase, although the authority for setting rates was not known.

Photographs of a recycling depot on Lopez Island were produced by Rice Elkington, who said he would make them available to the local recycling supervisors.

The on-going question of bicycle paths is to be discussed at the next meeting, which will be held on Wednesday, May 11.

Persecution of Baha'is continues

The Baha'i Community of Salt Spring Island recently learned of further executions that the supreme religious tribunal of Iran has committed in their campaign of extermination of the Iranian Baha'i Community.

In defiance of world opinion, including a Canadian parliamentary resolution and statements from

both Houses of the U.S. Congress, the clergy continues to imprison and execute Baha'is for their religious beliefs.

Baha'is are enjoined by Baha'i law to be obedient to the laws of the land in which they live and are forbidden from all religious controversy or criticism of any other faith.

Gerald Knight, the Baha'i International Community's representative at the United Nations, announced on March 8 that the commission empowered the secretary-general to appoint a special representative to investigate the human rights situation in Iran, in particular that of the Baha'is.

Today, some 300,000 Baha'is live in Iran, the birthplace of their faith.

The official total of Baha'is executed by the regime since the beginning of the revolution now stands at 137. Approximately 200 are in prison and some 10,000 are homeless.

Although the largest religious minority in Iran, Baha'is are not protected by the constitution as are smaller numbers of "legal" minorities (Jews, Christians and Zoroastrians). Over 20,000 Baha'is have been put to death at the hands of the clergy under the many regimes preceding this one.

The Baha'i World Community has set aside April 28 as a day of prayer and the Salt Spring Baha'is will be joining universally in offering special prayers on that day.

Salt Spring Island excluded from regional fire function

Capital Regional District is to seek an amendment to its letters patent in order to undertake fire protection in electoral areas. Under the new clause the region will be empowered to initiate new fire districts and to adopt regulations pertaining to fire protection.

The new function will not apply to Salt Spring Island.

When Regional Director Yvette Valcourt asked trustees of the Salt Spring Island Fire Protection District for guidance, the board was not in favour of Salt Spring Island taking part in the new policy.

At last week's fire board meeting trustees moved that they would only support such a measure if it might be demonstrated that the regional move would provide an improved service at a reduced cost.

The Outer Islands are included in the terms of the new measure.

NO COMPULSION

Director Vern Roddick told *Driftwood* that the new measure does not place any compulsion on islanders. The region will only assume administration of existing fire departments if that is the

expressed wish of the community. There will be no interference with those departments already in existence.

The new measure will be a welcome asset to the islands in regularizing burning seasons and permits, he noted. Instead of accepting the control of the forestry ministry and local fire chiefs, the regional board will be able to direct the opening and closing dates of fire seasons and other general aspects of fire fighting, Roddick told *Driftwood*.

Valcourt had already assured fire trustees that she would accept their recommendation.

There are voluntary fire departments, financed by local improvement districts on the Penders, Galiano, Saturna, Mayne and Salt Spring Islands.

Volunteer week all this week

Week of April 18 to April 24 will be observed all over North America as "Volunteer Recognition Week."

The Capital Regional Board, last week, agreed to go along with the event and to accept the tenet that volunteerism is a pursuit open to all. And that's what this week is.

The regional provision adds greater powers to the fire-fighting function.

The region may, on the Outer Islands, regulate the conduct of persons near a fire and control the handling of combustibles. Under such a regulation, the region may exert control over the burning of slash and debris from logging and over the installation and use of gas and oil pumps.

Many of these functions are already handled by the fire district and the fire chief on Salt Spring Island.

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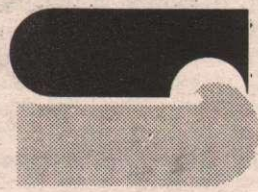

Council names Artcraft manager

Marilyn Strongitharm will be the new manager-coordinator of Artcraft '83, the summer-long show and sale sponsored by the Gulf Islands Community Arts Council.

The appointment was announced by president Gerry Layard at the annual meeting of the C.A.C., March 29. Assisting Mrs. Strongitharm will be Beth Cherneff.

In making the announcement Mrs. Layard paid high tribute to Ilse Leader, retiring co-ordinator of Artcraft. She said "much of the success of Artcraft is due to the efforts of Ilse Leader who has given so much volunteer effort over the past three years. We appreciate her contribution very much."

Mrs. Layard said that at a special meeting of Artcraft contributors it was agreed that the board of directors should proceed with the hiring of a manager-co-ordinator and an assistant co-ordinator.

TWO PERCENT HIKE

The contributors also agreed to an increase of two percent in the commission charged for the sale of their works at Artcraft to help meet the additional expenses that would be incurred with the hiring of the two management personnel.

The president also announced that Ann Leigh-Spencer has again agreed to handle Artcraft publicity and that Bunty Gonzales will be in charge of finances. Both positions are voluntary.

In her report to the annual meeting Mrs. Layard said that in an effort to make both the members and the community at large more aware of the activities of the C.A.C. an information booklet had been prepared and was distributed at the meeting. She said also that a very successful "Open House" had been staged in December and was well attended.

GROUP MEMBERSHIP

The meeting also endorsed a proposal to introduce group memberships to the C.A.C. In outlining the details of the group membership Mrs. Layard said "There are several good reasons why it is recommended." Included is the fact that requests for financial grants from the provincial government must be substantiated by requests from member groups. Also a group membership would be a prerequisite for groups to apply to the C.A.C. for financial assistance. And while it would not provide individual membership in the C.A.C. for members of the groups, it would give the group the privilege of booking Mahon Hall free of charge for a non-profit reason. An annual group membership fee of \$10 was approved by the meeting.

AWARDS AND GRANTS

A total of \$6,978.65 in awards and grants for the years 1982 and 1983 were made by the C.A.C., Merle Box, awards and grants committee chairman, told the meeting.

A total of 23 groups on Salt Spring, Mayne, Pender and Galiano Islands, benefited from the awards which, in the case of the 1983 allocations, showed a 50% increase over the previous year.

In addition to the grants Mrs. Box said that two \$500 bursaries will be given in June, one to a graduating high school student and one to a post-secondary student or to an individual re-entering a program in the field of fine arts.

MAHON HALL PROJECT

Hugh Cummings, chairman of the Mahon Hall restoration committee, reported that a total of \$35,000 had been raised to finance the work of his committee. He said the projected works programs are just about completed and that it is expected his committee will be disbanded in June, just two years after its inception.

Brief reports from ten other groups who had received grants from the C.A.C. were also presented to the meeting.

Down Through the Years with Driftwood

Twenty years ago

The mill rate for school taxes in the Gulf Islands went down. The rate had been set at 19.63 mills, a reduction of .27 mills from the 19.90 mills paid the year before. Across the province, the average mill rate stood at 21.54 mills. The school budget had been reduced by \$1,158 and was set at \$268,101.

Fire at a home at Welbury Point destroyed a guest room and the garage. The owners were away at the time and prompt action by their eight-year-old son was credited with preventing further damage.

The Salt Spring Science Club decided to create two study groups in the coming year. The first group, 0 to 6, would study the active development of children between the ages of one month up to six years. The group would meet every second week. Another group, education for the future group, would hold monthly meetings. The members would look at ways of preparing for the future. Membership in the club would be limited to 20 persons.

An island logger suffered a broken leg when a log rolled over him. He was clearing land for a subdivision on the north end of Salt Spring when the accident occurred. The mishap occurred on his birthday.

Trustees of the Gulf Islands School Board voted to remove the large rocks from in front of the school board office and seed the area with grass.

With an increasing number of tourists wanting to see the salt springs on the island, a suggestion to satisfy their curiosity and make money had been put forward. The brine springs were on private property but innovation could succeed. A spring could be built using a pump and seawater and tourists could be enticed to throw coins into the spring.

Fifteen years ago

A meeting on Mayne Island heard two new applications to discharge sewage into the water around the island. A proposed subdivision at Village Bay and another at Georgeson Shoals would dispose of sewage into the sea. Plans called for septic tanks on each property to allow the sewage to settle before being discharged.

The Lions Walkathon between Fulford and Ganges attracted 300 entrants. The event gathered at least \$2,000 for the Lions.

Resort owners in the Gulf Islands were concerned about ferry service. The holiday weekend saw the mainland ferry crowded and many visitors were left behind. The *Queen of Sidney* had replaced the *Queen of the Islands* and although the ship had a larger capacity, it couldn't cope with the demand. The resort owners were worried about the summer season when visitors, unable to reach the islands, might go elsewhere.

The public hearing concerning

the application to discharge sewage into Trincomali Channel at Fernwood was postponed a week.

The department of highways should either improve the road to Mount Maxwell or close it. The condition of the road was criticized by various people on the island and the choice of action was urged. The view from the top was notable but visitors often could not reach the peak because of the poor road.

Playoffs in the roller hockey league were under way. The Fulford Warriors took the pee wee series in two games from Ganges Mounties by scores of 9-4 and 9-2. In intermediate league play, the Fulford Cougars won two games, 7-6 and 8-5, to take the playoffs from another Fulford team, the Warriors.

Chilly weather settled on the Gulf Islands with the arrival of spring. Frost and snow covered the ground during the previous week.

The Walkathon was such fun that two people who completed the event one-way decided to turn around and walk home the other way. They made it.

Ten years ago

Community plans for the Gulf Islands remained on the desk of the minister of municipal affairs. He had not approved the plans despite the urgings of islanders to do so. Capital Regional District board chairman Jim Campbell of Saturna wrote to the minister to explain the CRD position. He said the plans had been prepared and approved by island residents with only technical help from the CRD planners. The plans should be approved to allow control on development in the islands he told the minister.

Residents of Salt Spring Island donated more than \$1,000 to the World Relief fund. They gave by supporting the tea, the bake sale and by dropping money in collection boxes in stores around the island.

Galiano Island would be throwing a party in August. The Lions Club planned a festival on the grounds of the Galiano Lodge. A salmon barbecue, sports, games and entertainment would be featured.

The coroner's jury completed investigation of the fire-death of an island resident. The verdict was accidental death with no negligence involved. The resident died in a fire which destroyed a home.

The automobile and the horse met accidentally. The horse was unhurt but the auto suffered \$200 in damages.

The church committee of St. Margaret of Scotland at Galiano decided not to charge for burial in the church cemetery. The land had been given by Henry Georgeson in 1928 with the stipulation that no charge be made for burial. The committee decided to abide by the wording of the Deed of Trust.

Five years ago

Construction of the Fernwood School would begin. Approval for the project had come from the ministry of education and work had been scheduled for start within 10 days of the announcement. The school would cost about \$500,000.

The Captain Cook Bicentennial would be marked on Salt Spring Island with a three-day festival called Sea Capers. Highlight of the event would be a bathtub race in Ganges Harbour. The complete program for the festival was being finalized.

The meeting had been arranged for the public to express opinions about election reform. When the commission reached Ganges only seven people showed up. A suggestion that the Gulf Islands be a separate riding did not meet with the approval of the commissioners.

Water used in the North Salt Spring Water District amounted to 58.7 million gallons the previous year. The information came out at a meeting of the district board. The increase came about due to 40 new connections to the system. Plans were announced to improve the system with larger delivery pipe and better connections to the Maxwell Lake supply. A new storage tank in Mobrae would be built to replace the old wooden one at a cost of \$20,000.

The Gulf Islands Intermediate and Personal Care facility in Ganges would have to bear a cost of up to \$40,000 to install a septic system and disposal field. The facility would be in operation before the proposed sewer system was in place.

Street lights on Salt Spring Island cost \$5,397 for the previous year. The lights were the responsibility of the Fire Protection District and the costs showed an increase over the 1977 total of \$5,017.

Green light for project

Curtis brings \$333,000 to seniors housing luncheon

Senior citizens' accommodation on Salt Spring Island has been given the green light. On Monday Finance Minister Hugh Curtis attended a meeting of the Salt Spring Society for Seniors' Accommodation with an assurance of the provincial share of the project's cost.

The provincial grant amounts to \$333,000. The remaining amount will be raised by a mortgage, guaranteed by the federal government and with interest largely paid by the federal government.

The housing will be rented to occupants and the rents will be set against the repayments.

Curtis took part in the luncheon meeting in Hastings House Hotel and explained the provincial government's approach to senior's housing.

All projects of this nature were traditionally concerned with the large urban centres, he recalled and only in the past several years has the attention of government been turned to the rural communities.

The same trend has seen the style of accommodation for older people geared down, he recalled. Large apartment blocks have been replaced by smaller, more compact structures. High rise projects are out.

ABOUT 1,000 CALLS

There have been about 1,000 applications for assistance towards senior's housing, said Curtis and

about 600 have been approved.

Society chairman Fred Brookbanks reviewed the different levels of care and assistance for the elderly, ranging from home assistance, enabling the elderly to live at home with some visiting help; through the various forms of housing to the extended care facilities.

It is to the credit of the society, commented Curtis, that even today he has not been advised of the proposed location of the project.

Brookbanks took up the same theme, explaining that revelation of the property sought might lead to speculation.

Total cost of the project will be in the region of \$1.2 millions.

COMMUNITY CONCERN

The society was formed as a result of community concern for the provision of adequate housing for residents who find the maintenance of their properties too demanding but who wish to continue living on the island. Taking part in the society are the Salt Spring Island Branch of the Royal Canadian Legion, Salt Spring Island Lions Club and the Rotary Club of Salt Spring Island.

Directors of the society who have worked to bring the project to its present standing are chairman, Fred Brookbanks, vice-chairman Stan Sage, treasurer Jack Potheary, secretary J.H. Fisher, Santy Fuoco, Pat Harrison, Bob Nicholson, David Rainsford and W.H. Wenzel.



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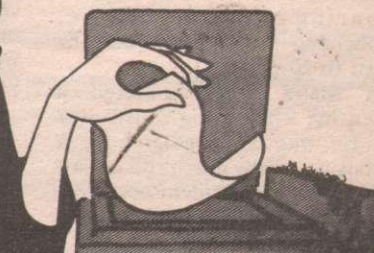
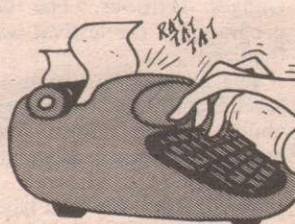
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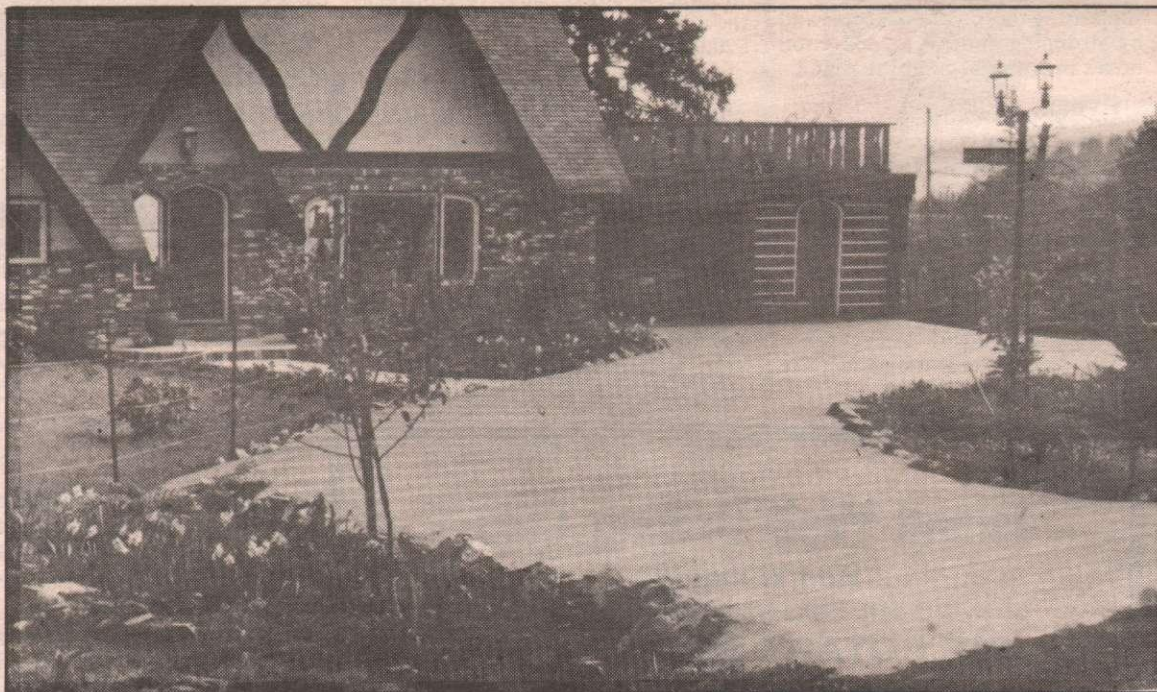
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
