Less space between tomato plants increased yields

I suppose that most of us have had the experience of being the last to know, although we were the ones most directly affected. It happened to me again when I found my column missing from these pages last week.

My consternation was threefold: at my unaccustomed and entirely unwarranted fallibility, that my mind had joined the British Union of Minds (BUM's) without my knowledge or consent and that the weekend before last had been declared a statutory holiday for members of BUMs. Long familiar with the temporary, if frequent, absence of my mind for its "coffee breaks", it nevertheless came as a total surprise that it had taken the whole weekend off.

Not until last Wednesday, when a quick scan of the paper for my favourite feature failed to find any trace of it, did I discover my

There's no mistake this week, though, so let's talk tomatoes.

Territorial Seeds had sent us some seed for trial this year, among them "Kootenai", "Oregon" and "Sprinter," the latter a sauce tomato. The only beef we have with these tomatoes is that they are a bit smaller than we would like them to

All of them are extremely prolific, and at present we are literally inundated with vine-ripened tomatoes, although we have only about a dozen plants. The sauce tomato proved surprisingly and deliciously sweet, the earliest to ripen, even after the late start caused by our prolonged spring.

The end of July appearance of the first, ripe tomatoes, firm, fleshy and exquisitely sweet, was therefore more than joyfully greeted and it initiated a ripe tomato binge that has not abated yet. The fruit is about two inches (five cm) in diameter, more than plentiful, on a three-foot (one-metre) diameter plant which tends to sprawl and should be staked, although it is described as a non-staking variety. Next year we will grow it in wire cages, as all the

seen, and the whole plant is so pretty that it would not be out of place even in a flower garden. It is also very dense and compact, a rather beautiful shrub of about three feet in diameter, with an abundance of two to three-inch (five to seven cm) diameter fruit, round, red, crackresistant and delicious.

"Oregon", a new OSU development, ripens about three weeks earlier than "Kootenai", on three-feet diameter, determinate shrubs, which nevertheless do better in cages than unstaked as recommended. Fruit is plentiful, about two inches in diameter, of excellent flavour albeit with a slight tendency to crack, and the shrub is about three feet tall and wide. The compact habit of all three of these tomatoes makes it easy to provide clear, plastic slip covers, especially over simple wire cages, to take the tomato-shrivelling nip out of our cool, pacific nights.

We are growing them among occasionally sheared weeds, save for the clean space within the cages, for several reasons that have become deeply held convictions, and with a stand of broad-leaf parsley between

INCREASED YIELDS

The September issue of Organic Gardening carries an item which may prove of interest to all tomato lovers, and especially for those who grow tomatoes commercially. Researchers at Pennsylvania State University have demonstrated that

tomato yields increased by 41% when grown 18 inches apart instead of the customary 36 inches, and yields increased by 71% when tomatoes were grown in double rows with equally close spacings. A 71% increase in yield combined with a simultaneous reduction of growing area by fully one-half amounts to such an enormous reduction of absolutely all costs of production that we simply cannot afford to overlook it.

It is also an indication of the quiet revolution that questions all of our accepted and traditional methods. and I suspect, rather I know, that there is a lot more to come.



business community. She was here at the invitation of Marion Marks who, if there is sufficient response to the proposal, will become the island's Welcome Wagon hostess.

Narver explained in an interview that Welcome Wagon was founded in Vancouver 54 years ago and has been operating on Vancouver Island for 47 years. Its purpose, she said, is to help new people get acquainted with an area as quickly as possible.

The hostess spends 30 minutes to an hour in the home of newcomers to an area. On Salt Spring Island she would present them with letters of welcome from the regional director, the Islands Trust, the member of parliament, the provincial member, and the presidents of the chamber of commerce and Ganges Centre Association.

The new residents are provided information about the community, concerning topics such as churches, schools, recreational facilities and others. The hostess then goes on to present information about local businesses, spending a few minutes telling the new people about each participating store and giving them a gift from each one.

She also presents them with an invitation from each store to come in and receive another gift.

Narver said the program requires at least 10 sponsors who pay a set fee for every visit made by the hostess. She used Port McNeill on northern Vancouver Island as an example, as the program has just been initiated there. The community is smaller than Salt Spring and Welcome Wagon has 22 sponsoring businesses.

The program, she continued, will encourage people to shop at home instead of going off-island.

"If we reach new people at an early stage, they will find the island can meet most of their buying

If Welcome Wagon goes ahead here, new residents will not be the only beneficiaries. The hostess will also provide a welcome to new babies. In larger communities, such as Victoria, Welcome Wagon offers a bridal program and welcomes new students to university campuses.

The Welcome Wagon will go ahead if the reception is good. Chamber president Dale Codd expressed enthusiasm for the idea, as did Dave Mathews of the Ganges Centre Association.

GALIANO NEWS

16 attend annual meeting of planning commission

The annual meeting of the Galiano Island Advisory Planning Commission drew 16 people to the Community Hall last Wednesday. Elizabeth Ocsko, chairman of the commission, presided.

There was a brief report on the work of the commission. Andrew Loveridge expressed doubts about its usefulness since its advice could be disregarded by the Islands Trust. Pat Weaver suggested that the poor turnout indicated either that the public was satisfied with the operation of the Advisory Planning Commission, or else that it was indifferent to its existence. Bob Knowles and Elizabeth Ocsko defended the work and value of the commission to the community in attempting to maintain the integrity of the Galiano community plan.

There was criticism of the very slow progress being made on the long overdue review of the plan, which is now in its 15th year without any major revision. There was also comment that the meetings of the Galiano commission, unlike those of most other designated islands, were never public. The chairman invited any members of the public who wished to bring any matter to the attention of the commission to contact her or the secretary, Dianne Cragg, in order that an invitation to a meeting could be extended.

The commission consists of five members and in addition the two Island Trustees are members ex officio. Members are normally elected for two-year terms, alternating three in even years and two in odd years. This year there was also an election to fill a vacancy caused by a resignation, this being a one-year term.

Re-elected to two-year terms were Bob Knowles, George Tully and Pat Weaver. Jim Scoones was elected to

Trails

The Islands Trust Committee recently received a report on trails in the Trust area from manager Tony Roberts, who also recommended that each of the 13 designated islands prepare a trail development program and that the Advisory Planning Commissions and any interested parties be invited to participate.

So far there has been no official initiative on Galiano but much private activity. Joe Fleming has cleared trails in Bluff Park and adjoining crown land. The Galiano Club commissioned Shane Blackwood to create a trail from Bluff Road down to the beach on Georgeson Bay, and Dennis Oldroyd has constructed a short trail from the park entrance to the top of the bluff. Gill Allen of Madrona Lodge compiled a booklet describing walking trails in the northern part of Galiano. Andrew Loveridge spent much time and a great deal of red paint blazing trails in the south part of the island during the past summer.

A remarkably fine trail was constructed earlier this year by



Steve Ocsko of Bodega Resort. This is a ridge walk along the southfacing flank of Bodega Hill. The trail, which is clearly marked with yellow surveyors' tape, begins at the office chalet at Bodega Resort. It first crosses the farm section of the resort where there is a new barn and

After passing through a gate the trail bears left and crosses a beautiful artificial lake by means of a plank bridge built on a massive cedar trunk felled for the purpose. Skirting the lake the route briefly follows a logging road, through another gate to a small clearing, possibly once a yarding area as four logging roads meet here. Walkers should search for yellow ribbon on the right side and follow a footpath steeply upward through salal and oregon grape.

After a few hundred yards this comes out on top of the pallisade which forms the flank of Bodega Hill. The view of Trincomali Channel is spectacular. Wallace, the Secretaries, Kuper, Thetis, Valdez, Gabriola and many smaller islands are spread far below. Beyond lies Salt Spring and Vancouver Island with many familiar landmarks such Fernwood, Crofton and

At times there is an almost vertical drop of 100 feet or more on the right of the trail which skirts the edge of the bluff for more than five kilometres. This terrain is the natural habitat of the hairy manzanita, a shrubby relation of the arbutus which it resembles in many ways. Almost invariably a soaring eagle patrols the ridge using the rising air current to perfection. Grouse and a night hawk may make off noisily if disturbed.

After about six kilometres the hiker may choose to return to Bodega Resort back along the ridge trail or if he continues for another kilometre he will arrive at the top of Cottage Way which winds down to Porlier Pass Road, along which he can return to his starting point.

Steve must have done a lot of hard work with chain saw, machete and spade to carve out this trail and he deserves commendation and thanks for his effort.



Changes to planning procedures concern region too

Capital Regional Board is the second local administration to express concern over the elimination of the community plan from provincial planning procedures.

Two weeks ago the board endorsed the stand already taken by the Islands Trust. Directors also agreed that the matter would be examined at the meeting of the Union of British Columbia Municipalities.

In May the minister of municipal affairs, Bill Ritchie, announced that when considering applications for bare land strata developments the approving officer will not be guided

by community plans. He also hinted that the same procedure is to be adopted in all areas of planning.

Local concerns for land use regulation will be observed only by following zoning bylaws and subdivision bylaws.

When the Capital Regional Board examined the minister's rejection of community plans it was following the recommendation of its planning and zoning committee. The committee called the attention of the board to the manner in which community plans are prepared. They are developed, said the committee report, at great expense and with considerable community

"Plans often provide much more direction to the approving officer than the zoning or subdivision bylaw," ran the report, "and are often more reflective of the community's aspirations.' DISMAY

The Trust had expressed dismay at the policy of the government in regard to planning.

Chairman Mike Humphries had told the Trust council, "During the past four months the provincial government has set back local planning by a decade."

The Trust was discussing not only the new ministerial instructions

regarding approval of development plans. Ministerial rejection of plans, bylaws and amendments had recently been attributed to the trespassing of the Trust into policy areas. The Lasqueti Island community plan was rejected by the minister on the grounds that policies set out to preserve and protect the environment were inappropriate because they addressed such issues as Crown land and forestry.

The Trust had called on the minister to reconsider these measures.

"An intact community planning process is a vital and healthy function of community govern-ment," Humphries told the Trust. "If the government proceeds, the official community plans will be rendered meaningless and local autonomy will have lost its strongest guiding light."

Dog owners warned by police

Dogs on Salt Spring should be under control at all times, warn Ganges detachment RCMP.

The warning comes about as a result of two incidents recently where children have been bitten by dogs running loose.

The Capital Region dog bylaw prohibits an owner from allowing a dog to run loose. The bylaw also notes that "a dog known to ... attack or viciously pursue a person" should be confined in a building or a secure enclosure.

Violation of the dog bylaw carries a penalty, upon conviction, of a fine of not less than \$50 or more than \$100 for the first offence. The second conviction under the bylaw carries a possible fine of \$100 or not more than \$1,000.

The dog can also be destroyed.

What can I say, she was my very good friend. Not many friendships last through the years and this one

"She had a sense of humour, that's what keeps people going through life, isn't it? She was very interested in people, what they were doing mattered to her. She was an open and outgoing and loving person. Her family was important, she liked having them around her.

"I never had a sister, but she was a sister to me. She was kind. She had good values instead of opinions. She hated unkindness. She never aged in the sense of changing. I don't think Marie would like to hear anything flowery. She was my friend and we had a lot of fun together. Granmarie? I think Sam Crooks named her to keep the grandmothers straight.'

Lorraine Campbell: "Marie was a great person, a fun person, a person with a sense of humour. I don't think in all the years I ever saw Marie angry. Doing anything with


