

New procedure

Next notice of property assessment to be out in September of 1984

Values used in the assessment of properties this year are the market value at December 31, 1982 instead of the custom of referring to the end of the previous year. This use of a value no longer current has been a source of confusion to some of the appellants appearing in the past week's courts of revision. The property owner seeking to establish the value of his property is often unable to relate its value more than a year ago to present-day values.

The use of the previous year's valuation will become standard pattern in provincial assessments after this year. In future, assessments will be brought up to date every second year.

The provincial government has instructed the Assessment Commission of British Columbia to

prepare a new assessment notice to be distributed in September of this year. Under the new legislation, assessment notices will no longer be issued at the beginning of the year. Assessments will be based on the value at July 31, instead of December 31. With notices in the mail in September, the appeals to the court of revision will be heard in November.

VALUATION DAY

On July 31 of this year, the new valuation day, market values and market trends will be completed, and the new assessment notices will be prepared in accordance with those valuations.

In 1985 the same assessed values will be used and a new market value will not appear until 1986.

The procedures will be unchanged as far as appeals are concerned. Courts of revision will hear appeals and the board of appeal will hear appeals against the

ruling of the court.

In past years the assessment notices were issued immediately following valuation day which has been for many years the last day of the year. Assessors were obliged to anticipate the market trend after properties were valued in order to establish a value for December 31.

ALLOWS CORRECTION

The new procedure allows time for correction of values in accordance with the known market trend and reduces the speculation in establishing values.

There is no indication of where assessments might be by the middle of the year, but it is generally expected that assessed values in September in respect of next year's assessment and taxes will be lower than those already received by property owners for 1984.

Another change in assessments this year has been the \$10,000 deductible from commercial assessments. One assessment in each commercial parcel enjoys the relief.

Students happy with service

Saturna high schoolers were generally happy with daily water taxi service to attend school at Salt Spring.

The Gulf Islands School Board ran the service for Saturna students for January on a trial basis.

John Money wrote a letter to the board when the experiment ended to urge continuation.

"I believe daily transportation is workable," he wrote, "and feel it should be used for the rest of this school year."

Saturna students leave home early Monday morning for school and board in homes on Salt Spring. They return to Saturna on Friday afternoon.

Money noted, "Saturna Island students should have the right to choose boarding or daily transportation as do all the other students in our school district."

The school trustees have agreed to use some surplus money from the 1983 budget to realign the water taxi schedule for Outer Island students. The trustees will be taking a close look at the service for September.

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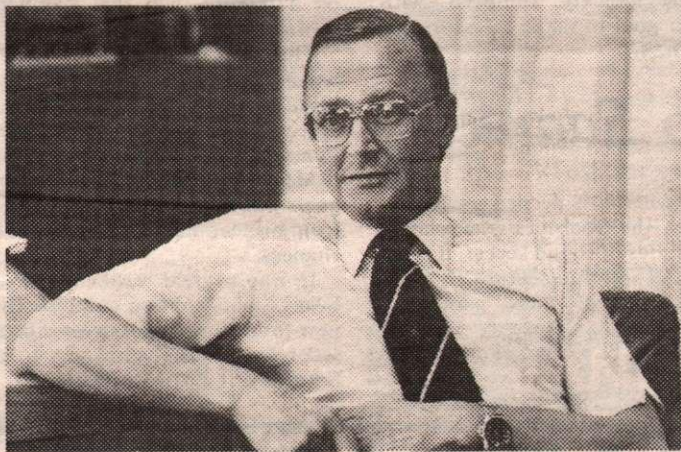

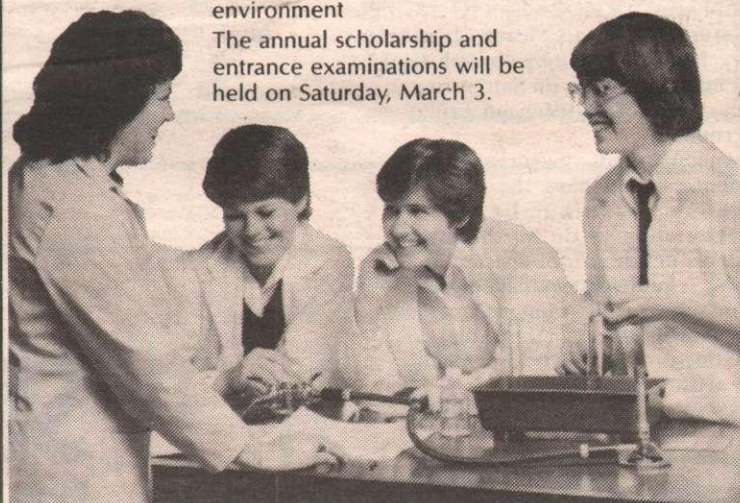

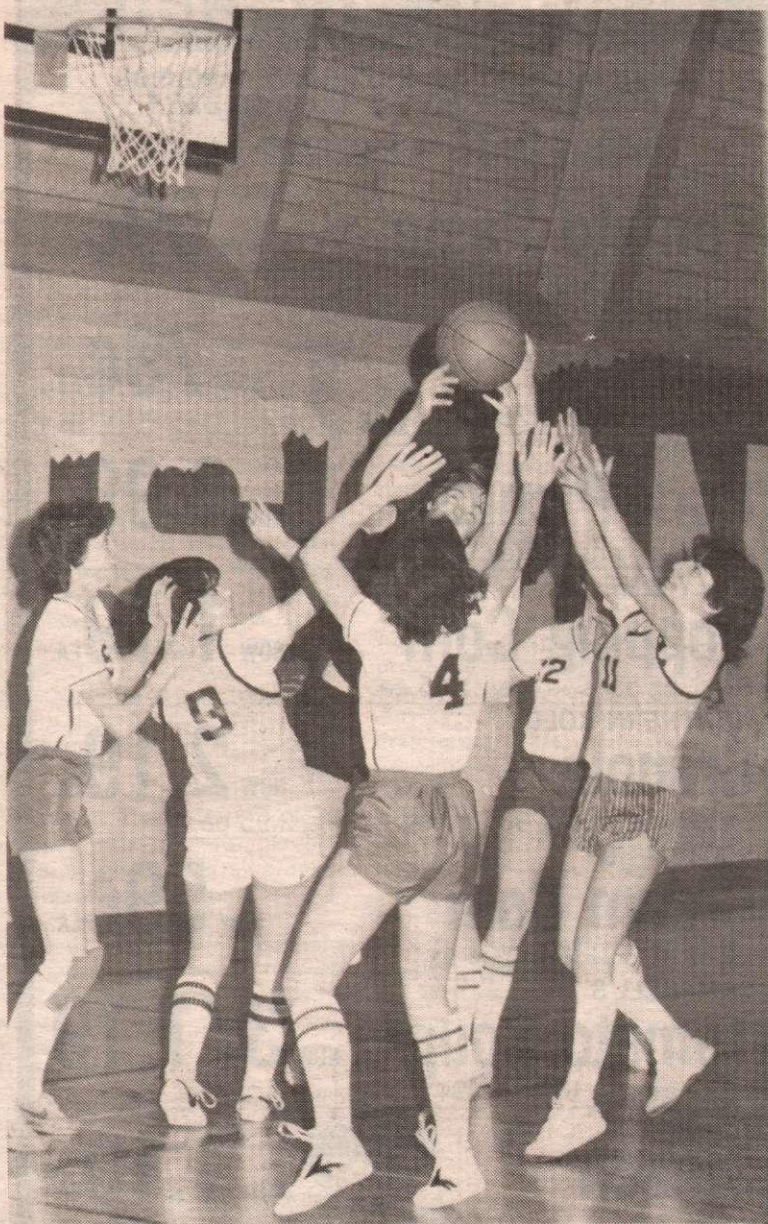

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CAPITAL REGIONAL DISTRICT

Pursuant to Section 769 of the Municipal Act, the following By-law No. 1217, cited as "Noise Suppression By-law No. 2, 1984", is hereby published as at third reading and prior to submission to the Ministry of Municipal Affairs.

A BY-LAW TO PROVIDE FOR THE ABATEMENT AND CONTROL OF OBJECTIONABLE NOISE IN THE ELECTORAL AREAS OF THE CAPITAL REGIONAL DISTRICT

WHEREAS the Capital Regional District pursuant to Section 932 (c) and (d) of the Municipal Act is empowered to regulate or prohibit the making or causing of noise or sounds as specified therein within the Electoral Areas of the Capital Regional District;

AND WHEREAS the Capital Regional District was granted Supplementary Letters Patent dated 3rd September, 1981, to exercise the powers of a Municipal Council in respect to the powers set out under the above sections of the Municipal Act;

NOW THEREFORE the Board of the Capital Regional District in open meeting assembled, enacts as follows:

1. In this by-law:

"Animal" includes a dog, cat or other domestic animal but does not include a farm animal.

"Electoral Areas" mean that portion of the Outer Gulf Islands Electoral Area consisting of Mayne Island and including all foreshore.

"Foreshore" means that area of the shoreline between the mean high tide mark and the mean low tide mark.

"Bird" includes ornamental bird, pigeon, dove and show-bird, but does not include poultry.

"Person" includes a corporation, partnership or individual.

2. Within the Electoral Areas:

(1) No person shall shout, use a megaphone or make other noise in, or at, or on, streets, wharves, docks, piers, railway stations, or other public places which disturbs or tends to disturb the quiet, peace, rest, enjoyment, comfort or convenience of the neighbourhood or of persons in the vicinity thereof.

(2) No person shall make, cause to be made, or continue to make, any noise or sound in or on a highway or elsewhere in the Electoral Areas which disturbs or tends to disturb the quiet, peace, rest, enjoyment, comfort or convenience of the neighbourhood or of persons at or near the source of such noise or sound.

3. Without limiting the generality of the prohibition contained in Section 2 hereof:

(1) No person shall play any radio, phonograph, television receiving set, tape, cartridge, musical instrument or sound amplification device whether in or upon private premises or in any public place in such a manner or with such a volume as to disturb the quiet, peace, rest, enjoyment or comfort of individual or the public.

(2) No person shall keep or harbour any animal or caged bird which by making frequent or loud noise disturbs or tends to disturb the quiet, peace, rest, enjoyment or comfort of individuals or the public.

(3) No person shall operate on private property any automobile, truck, motorcycle, trail bike, bus, motorized hang glider, or other vehicle which by reason of disrepair, lack of a sufficient muffler, or any other cause, creates noise or sound tending to disturb the quiet, peace, rest, enjoyment or comfort of individuals or the public.

(4) No person shall operate compressor, steam engine, or internal combustion engine which, through lack of sufficient muffler or any other cause, creates noise or sound tending to disturb the quiet, peace, rest, enjoyment or comfort of individuals or the public.

(5) No person shall load or unload any truck, wagon, or motor vehicle in or upon any public or private place or premises in such a manner as to disturb the quiet, peace, rest, enjoyment or comfort of individuals or the public before the hours of 7 o'clock in the forenoon or after sunset or 9 o'clock in the afternoon, whichever is the latest.

(6) No person shall construct, demolish, alter or repair a building, or excavate or fill any land in such a manner or with such volume as to disturb the quiet, peace, rest, enjoyment or comfort of individuals or the public before the hours of 7 o'clock in the forenoon or after sunset or 9 o'clock in the afternoon, whichever is the latest.

4. The provisions of this by-law shall not apply to:

(1) any vehicle of the Police or Fire Department or of any other public body, or any ambulance or any public service or emergency vehicle while engaged in a service of public convenience or necessity;

(2) the sounding of a horn or other signalling device where such sounding is properly and necessarily used as a danger or warning signal;

(3) the use, in a reasonable manner, of any apparatus or mechanism for the amplification of the human voice or of music in a public park or square in connection with any duly authorized public meeting, public celebration or other public gathering;

(4) the use of bells or chimes by churches, schools or any public body;

(5) the operation, in a reasonable manner, of farm equipment.

5. (1) No person, and including but without limiting the generality hereof, no owner, tenant or occupier of private premises, shall do any act or suffer or permit any act or thing to be done in contravention of this by-law.

(2) Every person who contravenes this by-law by doing any act which it forbids, or omitting to do any act which it requires to be done, is guilty of an offence and is liable, on summary conviction, to a fine of not more than \$500.00. A separate offence shall be deemed to be committed upon each day during and in which the contravention occurs or continues.

(3) The penalties imposed under subsection (2) hereof, shall be in addition to and not in substitution for any other penalty or remedy imposed by this by-law or any other statute, law or regulation.

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BOOK REVIEW

Procrastination without guilt

SIDETRACKED HOME EXECUTIVES, by Pam Young and Peggy Jones. Published by Warner Books. 157 pages.

I've been waiting for a good read to come my way—one of those books I couldn't put down and would review the minute I finished it. And I found it: *Sidetracked Home Executives, From Pigpen to Paradise*. The authors, Pam Young and Peggy Jones, liked the title so much they trademarked the acronym S.H.E.

And how could I not like it too, for there I am on the cover wearing scuffy slippers and rollers in the hair and standing in a kitchen with dirty dishes piled so high it makes the place a hard-hat area. You can almost hear the baby crying and feel her, my despair.

But the other half of the picture shows a perfectly coiled and gingham-bloused mom and youngster striding confidently from a Father-Knows-Best living room into a morning bright with promise. If you identify strongly enough with poor slob, you are certain to find yourself in the pages that follow.

Don't be put off by the page of dedication, page of special thanks and two full pages of acknowledgements. They struck me as drippy sentimental remarks like "Jim Bosley...whose humour outshines the top of his cute head." You had to be there on the set of *AM Northwest* to appreciate that one, I guess.

Pam and Peggy, two desperate and disorganized sisters with kids, finally "reached their bottom". They were tired of the self-created clutter and confusion around them. With each other's help they set out to develop a system for improving their home lives. What endeared them to me was the fact that neither loved housework, but they did love the serenity that comes with an orderly home.

They advise reading straight through the whole book to capture the feeling for the pigpen-to-paradise transformation they experienced, then returning to Chapter 4, *We Change Our Lives With 3X5's*. All those dull and boring and thankless tasks are relegated to file cards. Even the three-year-olds in the family have their jobs and their very own cardex.

The operation even allows for procrastination (without guilt, however). A particularly onerous job simply gets re-filed and it's as good as done. Mind you, there are rules for how many times this sidetracking can go on.

At \$8.50, *S.H.E.* is a far cry from the 49¢ Dell, *How To Organize Everything*, my sister sent me. For some reason I just carried that around in my purse and didn't change a thing. Perhaps it was that *How To...* advocates lots of lists, whereas Pam and Peggy say no list-making because "with a list of 10 things to do on Monday, we'd do three, carry over seven. Tuesday add 10, do three, carry over 14, do two, and by Friday we'd have a list of 16,000 things." Sound familiar?

As far as literary merit goes, the whole book could itself be reduced to a 3X5 card. The gross Americanisms and outrageous pseudonyms adopted in Chapter 1 (Mava Dinette and Waynette Crystal meeting at Eddie's Villa del Weenie) required forgiveness on my part.

But the next minute I was laughing and phoning my friend who lent me the book to ask her if she had ever thought of spraying deodorant on dirty socks then throwing them in the dryer on

"fluff". This is the same spirit of collusion between neighbouring sisters that led to the writing of *S.H.E.*

I tried out the suggested three steps for starting this new life before I'd made it through the book once. I got up (not half an hour early, having chosen to spend that time in bed contemplating my next moves), got dressed (slippers are not allowed) and made the bed before dinner as prescribed. The third step, to cut out soaps, was easy as they make me depressed anyway.

Although that was only one day, it was a good day in my life as

homemaker, and it gave me hope. Please allow me some more time for all the ideas to filter through before you come over for a house inspection; after all, it took the originators some 18 months before they had homemade pie and coffee and a clean couch to offer a surprise morning visitor.

"What we all want is more free time—time to do those things we were uniquely created to do...When the house is a mess and you're running off to take the kids to school in your nightgown, you certainly are not in touch with the best that is in you." Amen.

Director withdraws motion for clarification

The Capital Regional Board last week approved the allocation of \$100 to the Salt Spring Island Transportation Committee, but did not offer immediate support for a resolution concerning the ferry fares.

When director Hugh Borsman asked for a grant-in-aid of \$100 for the committee, the grant was approved without demur.

A recommendation from the electoral area services committee that support be given to Salt Spring and Outer Islands residents in requesting consistent rules in fare increases to all routes was sent back to the committee to be checked.

Borsman had moved the resolution and he subsequently withdrew it when J.D. Watts was uncertain of the wording. The same rules could not be applied to the islands services and the Vancouver-Swartz Bay run, said Watts, because the proportion of costs borne by the user are not the same.

The Salt Spring Island director explained that the motion referred to a comparison between north Vancouver Island fares by ministry of highways ferries, where fares are one-third of those paid by the southern Vancouver Island services by the B.C. Ferry Corporation.

Wording will be clarified by the committee.

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Down Through the Years with Driftwood

Twenty Years Ago

The pink seagulls reported to be flying around Salt Spring had been traced to Seattle. A group from that city had dyed the birds as a means of tracking their flight paths.

The Salt Spring Library needed \$2,000 to meet capital expenses but did not intend to raise the \$1 per year membership fee. The board of directors planned to introduce a \$5 per year sustaining fee. Overdue book week was coming up and the library staff hoped to get back up to 200 books which were not in on time.

The Pancake Race had been run on Shrove Tuesday, February 11. Beverly Gibson won the ladies' event while Lorne Earwaker took the men's division. The Bank of Montreal won the inter-club trophy. The race marked the seventh year it had been staged.

The IODE would celebrate its 64th birthday on February 13. Plans to mark the occasion were being made by 976 chapters across Canada. The organization had begun as a small group supplying clothes for Boer War soldiers and had grown over the years to being able to raise more than \$1 million each year for charitable causes.

Fire destroyed an historic house on Upper Ganges Road on Salt Spring. The house was once the home of Henry Bullock.

Bea Hamilton noted the appearance of the Beatles on the Ed Sullivan Show. She was flabbergasted by the sight of their hair. Her comment was, "Oh England, England, what HAVE you let loose amongst the young people?"

Klondike Night was held at the Legion Hall for the enjoyment of 75 people. Flu kept the star, Klondike Kate, away from the event.

Dr. W.T. Lockhart celebrated his 96th birthday. He had retired from a medical practice in Vancouver 16 years before and had moved to Salt Spring at that time. Lockhart was an avid golfer and cribbage player. He regularly went for long walks and drove his own automobile. He had been born in England and educated as a teacher but later went back to school to become a doctor.

Fifteen Years Ago

The member of parliament for Nanaimo, Cowichan and the Islands would be Tommy Douglas. The national leader of the New Democratic Party took the bye-election which had been called to fill the vacancy in parliament caused by the death of Colin Cameron. The margin of victory surprised most observers. He beat Eric Winch, Liberal, by close to 7,000 votes. The Tory ran a poor third.

A call for late evening sailings of the Fulford-Swartz Bay ferry was put to the ferry company by the Salt Spring Chamber of Commerce. The request for late night service was sent through island terminal agent Bob Anderson. The company had

shown a profit in the previous year of close to \$2 million and could afford the late ferry, the chamber claimed.

Travellers travelling to the mainland on the Long Harbour ferry would pay only \$1 for the trip if they went on Tuesday, Wednesday or Thursday. The normal price for the trip was \$2.

School children from North Galiano Island got as far as the mud hole. The bus became mired and had to be towed out. The bus driver refused to drive the bus until the road connecting north and south Galiano was repaired to a usable state.

The Mayne Queen continued to stop at Long Harbour on the morning run through the Outer Islands. But only five high school students were taking advantage of the trip. The ferry's schedule had been rearranged to allow the students to get to Salt Spring Monday morning instead of Sunday afternoon.

Membership in the Galiano Chamber of Commerce stood at 97, the annual meeting of the group was told. Fred Robson was elected president for the coming year. Highlights of the year's activities included installation of a street light in Sturdies Bay and purchase of a stretcher for use on the north end of the island.

January on Salt Spring was cold, reported Howard Carlin, the Ganges weather-watcher. The temperature stayed below freezing for 27 days. High temperature hit 51 degrees with the low registered at 13 degrees. Precipitation measured 5.31 inches and included 29 inches of snow.

Ten Years Ago

An intermediate school should be created for the Outer Islands, a meeting of parents agreed. The group met on Saturna Island with the Gulf Islands School Board. The parents also agreed to call for daily water taxi service so that Outer Islands high schoolers did not have to board on Salt Spring. The only dissent came from Pender Island parents.

Herring ran. The boats catching the fish were independent fish boats. Unionized herring fishermen were on strike and were not part of the fleet in Gulf Islands waters.

A public hearing was to be held by the Pollution Control Board concerning an application from the Capital Region to discharge treated effluent from a sewage treatment plant into Ganges Harbour. The meeting was to be held in Fulford Hall.

The house on Walker Hook Road on Salt Spring had been destroyed by fire. The only thing not burned had been the stack of firewood. Someone stole the two cords of wood.

Malcolm Muggeridge would take part in the service at Ganges United Church. He would offer a dialogue on *God and Caesar*. The notable

British writer and commentator was living at Vesuvius Bay.

The annual meeting of the Salt Spring Library Association heard that the library had \$3,721 in the bank. Circulation for the previous year had been 25,691 and membership stood at 648. The library had purchased 300 new books and 392 books had been donated, to bring the total to 8,690.

Mary Hawkins Memorial Library would be the new name of the Salt Spring book-lending facility. The annual meeting of the library association had approved the name to commemorate the work which Hawkins had done for the library.

The throne speech in the legislature in Victoria promised added protections for the Gulf Islands.

Five Years Ago

The school budget had been cut by close to \$107,000 by trustees. The Gulf Islands School Board would be spending \$2,922,483 in the coming year. When the cutting had started, original spending estimates stood close to \$3.1 million.

The wind howled through the Gulf Islands at 65 knots. Hydro service was out on Saturna, Pender, Salt Spring and parts of Mayne Island. Repair crews were out in force to fix the damage caused by the 2½-hour storm.

Crown land in the Islands Trust area should not be developed. The Trust council agreed to ask the provincial government to maintain the land as open space. There was close to 10,000 hectares of crown land in the islands.

Sewage disposal was a problem at the new Fernwood School. The ministry of health would be sending an engineer to study the problem and come up with a solution.

Opposition to the proposed three-cent tax on gasoline to pay for transit in the Victoria area was growing in the Gulf Islands. The Capital Regional Board denied responsibility for including the islands in the transit area. The directors said it was a result of a ruling by the Urban Transit Authority. Islanders argued that buses did not serve the islands and therefore islanders should not be expected to pay.

Empty gas tank syndrome had struck Saturna Island. Residents complained about finding their vehicles empty of fuel. Two theories were put forward: either the island was being supplied with gas which evaporates quickly or someone was taking advantage of free fuel.

Contract talks between Local 788, Canadian Union of Public Employees and the Gulf Islands School Board concluded with a two-year agreement. The support staff members would receive a 12.8% wage increase over the life of the contract. Vacation allowances were also adjusted to give each employee three weeks holiday after a year of employment.

Board has two motions for B.C. school trustees meeting

When the B.C. School Trustees Association (BCSTA) holds its annual meeting, trustees from the Gulf Islands will put at least two motions forward for the assembly to consider.

The trustees agreed to the motions at the school board meeting last week.

They will ask for an amendment to the School Act to remove school administrators from the B.C. Teachers' Federation (BCTF).

Gulf Islands representatives made a similar motion to the BCSTA meeting last year without success.

The School Act states that any teacher employed by a school board "shall be, or immediately become, a member of the (BCTF), and it shall be a condition of his employment

that he be and continue to be a member."

Night school teachers, substitute teachers and vocational teachers are exempt.

Each of the principals of the Gulf Islands schools also teaches in the classrooms.

The second motion to be presented asks the minister of education to reinstate taxing authority to individual school boards.

Under the provincial government restraint program, the authority of school boards to impose local taxes to boost budget money was taken away. School boards are told how much money can be raised locally and are not supposed to exceed that amount in their budget.

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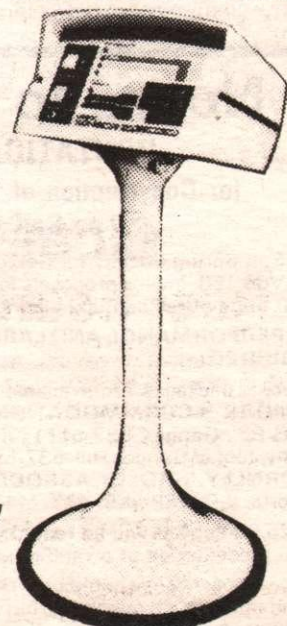
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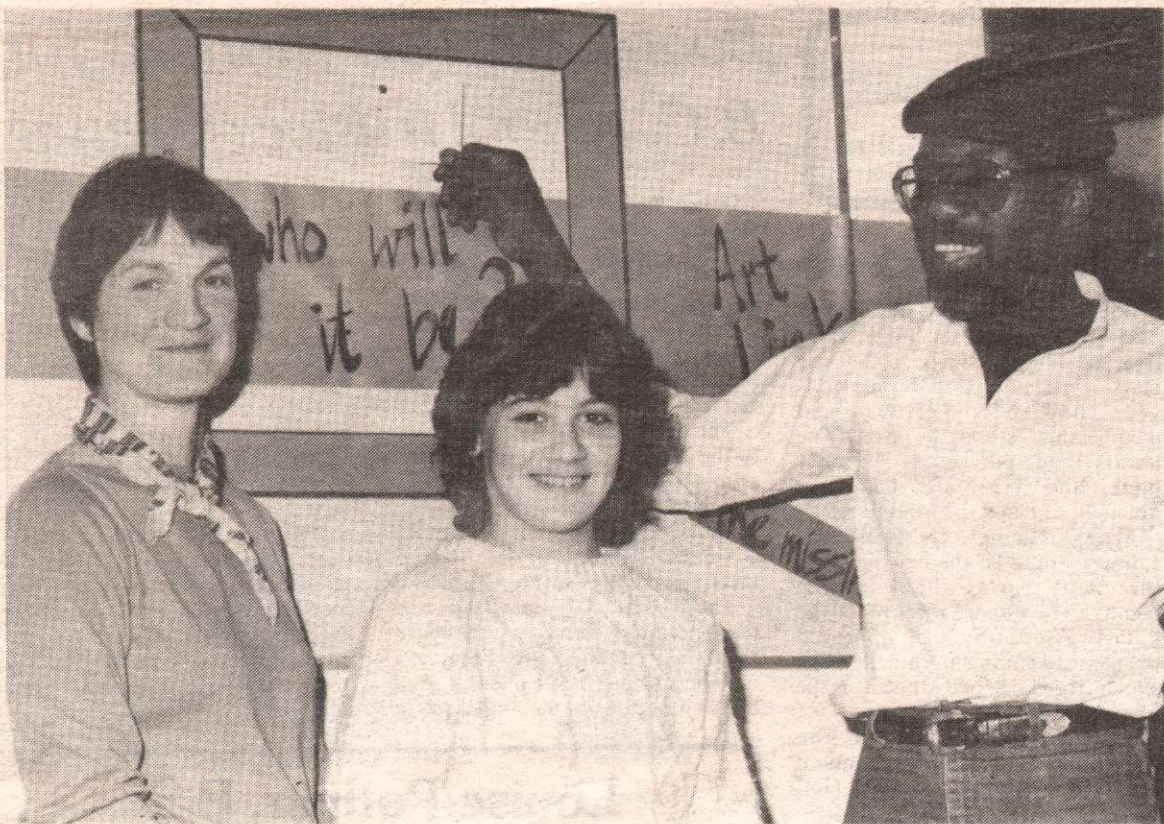

'Half of report belongs in garbage'

The Campbell Report on the Capital Regional District is raising the hackles of directors.

Outer Islands director Vern Roddick said last week that half the report belongs in the garbage.

He said there are so many things in the report that it does bear looking at. But when the directors ask questions about the meaning of some sections, all they get are vague answers, he said.

Roddick said the report should have been a learning experience for

Dan Campbell, who had been commissioned by the provincial government to look at regional districts across the province. Campbell had been minister of municipal affairs when the districts were formed.

Roddick gave an example of what bothers some directors. The CRD was told that it should use a computer which the water board has.

The computer, said Roddick, was a desk-top model which an

employee of the water board had brought to work from home to help him in his job.

"The CRD has a \$30 million budget and we're told we should use that computer," he said.

"That's the mentality of that report."

The report also mentions the Islands Trust in reference to land use. The two forms of government are different entities. Many of the items mentioned cannot be handled by the CRD, noted Roddick, because they require legislative changes.

"The minister, I'm sure, is embarrassed by some of the stuff in there."

High winds halt ferries

High winds and heavy seas brought most ferries to a halt Saturday morning, leaving travellers stranded for up to eight hours.

The winds hit speeds of up to 40 knots, throwing up seven-foot waves in the Strait of Georgia.

The Long Harbour ferry bound for Tsawwassen did not leave Salt Spring until the 4:30 pm departure time. Similarly, the vessels running between Swartz Bay and Tsawwassen did not get under way until the 3 pm sailings.

The southeast winds created docking problems for the ferries at the mainland terminal.

The *Mayne Queen* went out through the Outer Islands for the early run but stayed in Swartz Bay until 3:30 pm after the 9:30 am trip was cancelled.

By 1 pm, according to the weather office at Victoria airport, the winds had shifted direction to the northwest and had slowed to about 25 knots.

The *Quintisa* maintained her schedule for the day but ran up to five minutes behind on several trips between Fulford and Swartz Bay.

Meanwhile, the *Salt Spring Queen* plied back and forth between Vesuvius and Crofton with no problems.

Ticket dispute successful

The argument proved successful when the judge ruled that an accident was not caused by speed.

Michael Wier of Ganges went to court last week to dispute a traffic violation notice for driving at a speed that was excessive for road conditions.

He had been driving his van up Mount Belcher Heights December 5. The road was slushy and wet and slippery in spots. When he tried to negotiate a curve the van skidded into the ditch.

Marks in the slush, Judge R.E. Hudson was told, showed that the van skidded 10 feet on the road before travelling another 10 feet into

the ditch and coming to rest against a tree.

Wier told the judge that a neighbour had earlier attempted to drive up the hill but became stalled at the curve where the accident happened.

A sanding truck eventually came up the hill but had to move into the other lane to avoid the stalled car. It was the unsanded spot which caused the accident, said Wier.

Judge Hudson agreed with him. He noted that the skid marks on the road indicated a slow speed and that the other marks in the ditch "were just gravity".
