

# Architect presents plans for community arts facility

A proposal for a community arts centre at Salt Spring Island received a warm reception at a meeting recently of Community Arts Council directors and various members of the Ganges business community.

Architect Neil Morie outlined plans for an arts facility in Ganges that would include a 200-250 seat theatre, an arts and crafts gallery, a museum, studio spaces and a restaurant and pub.

The proposal formed part of Morie's architectural thesis entitled *Ganges: Opportunities for a Harbourside Village*.

Morie, a Salt Spring resident for the past 10 years, told the meeting

that he wanted to show the community his plans—which included a large number of drawings and a scale model—before putting them away in storage.

In his proposal he notes that there is a need for cultural and recreational facilities of a more specialized nature. He notes that the community is "rich in artisans" and people following artistic pursuits but facilities such as community halls are in many cases not up to quality standards with regard to the level of artistic performance.

"A permanent central location for a community-run playhouse, gallery and workshop facility would give much to the village and community

at large and be a visible storefront for the unique Gulf Island culture."

Morie estimates that construction costs of the arts centre would run about \$3 million. The centre would be composed of:

- A 200-250-seat playhouse designed for live theatre, movies, readings, lectures, concerts and other events;
- an arts and crafts gallery that would display and sell local work and host various activities and exhibitions;
- a separate historical photo-exhibit gallery celebrating Gulf Island heritage;
- at least two large studio spaces suitable for workshops as an

educational resource to promote local culture;

- a bistro/pub/lounge operation;
- a coffee shop/bakery; and
- several spaces for retail stores.

Morie said that ideally such a facility would be built by the Arts Council and a developer. The bakery and coffee shop would help fund the operation of the arts facilities while the developer would see a return on his investment through the retail spaces and the pub.

The architect selected as a site the property where the Salt Spring Lands building now sits.

Morie cited three Vancouver arts facilities as precedents. One of them, the Arts Club Theatre on Granville Island, seats 500 people. While theatre revenues "barely cover" the overhead, said Morie, the facility has a pub to make it economically

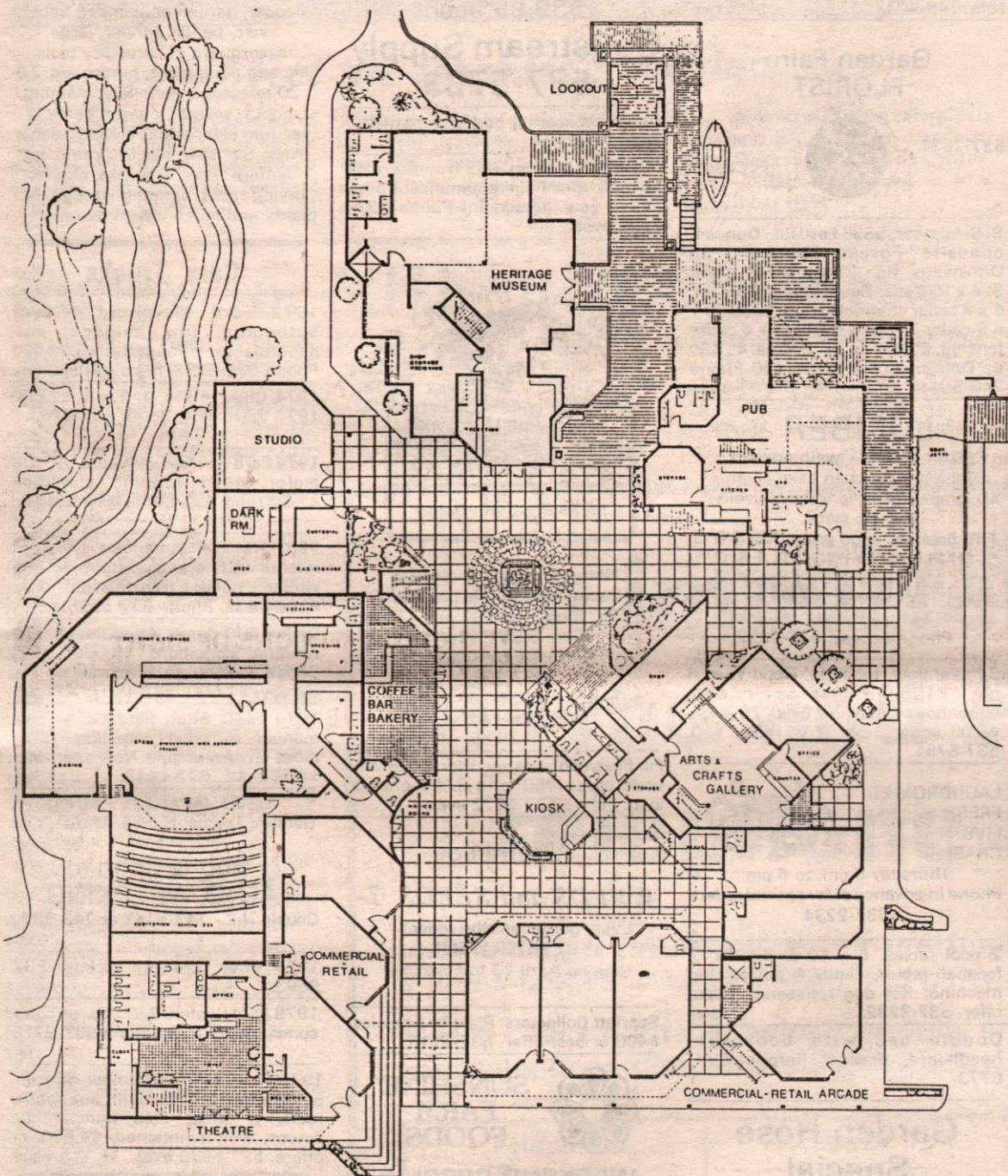
viable. All the theatre staff and actors are professional and therefore on salary.

Morie's study looks in detail at each of the components of the local arts centre and their functional relationships.

Total floor area of the centre, not including the retail areas, is about 25,000 square feet.

Morie's drawings and the scale model will be on display next week in the Salt Spring Art Gallery in Ganges. The display will be in the gallery for about two weeks, beginning Sunday.

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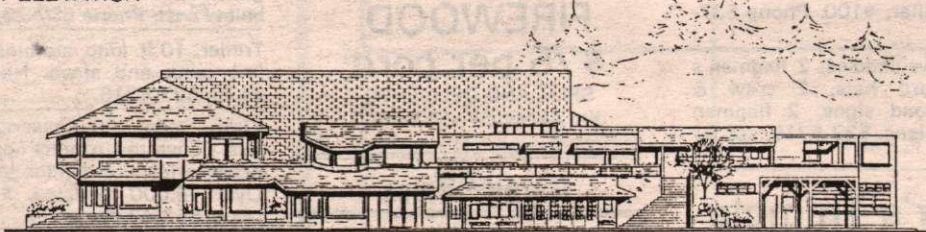


Ground-level floor plan of Neil Morie's Islands Art Centre show various components of facility. Clockwise from building at left are

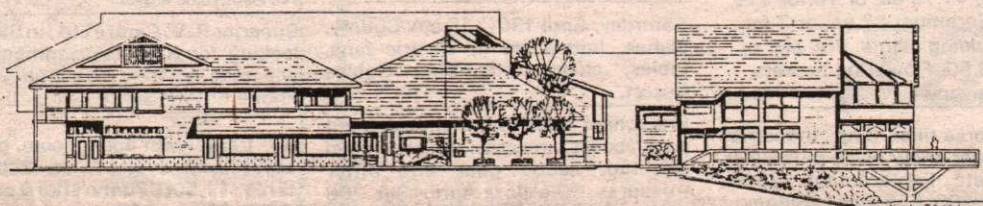
theatre with commercial retail space and bakery/coffee shop, heritage museum, pub, arts and crafts gallery and more retail space.

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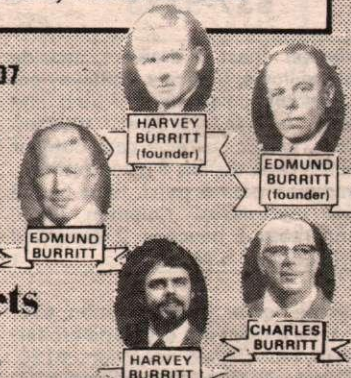

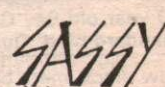

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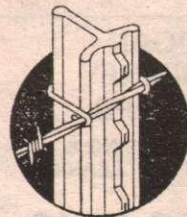

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reasons for increased dance admission prices. It seems that the directors are unpaid, and also that there has been difficulty paying for the Christmas tree at Sturdies Bay. As a further fund-raiser, a hind quarter of beef donated by Steve Oscko will be raffled off.

Other projects in the works include construction of an emergency helipad and the erection of a memorial to "Sparky" New at the foot of Clanton Rd.

The problem of parked cars at Sturdies Bay was brought up. Apparently, the department of highways and the B.C. Ferry Corporation each feel that ferry parking should be provided by the other. Shirley also filled in for an RCMP officer unable to come over to speak about Neighbourhood Watch. This crime prevention system can be set up through meetings of three or more neighbours. Also, any crimes, no matter how small, should be reported to 537-5000, since Galiano will not be assigned a permanent police officer until the amount of crime warrants it.

Don Macdonald discussed the imperilled state of the Islands Trust. It is the Trust's job to control land use through zoning and subdivision laws formulated by locally-elected trustees.

Residents are urged to protest the removal of the Trust's autonomy.

A representative of the Galiano Island Visitor's Association also spoke, but GIVA matters will be reported next week.

A resolution was passed that one day a year be designated Galiano Clean-up Day.

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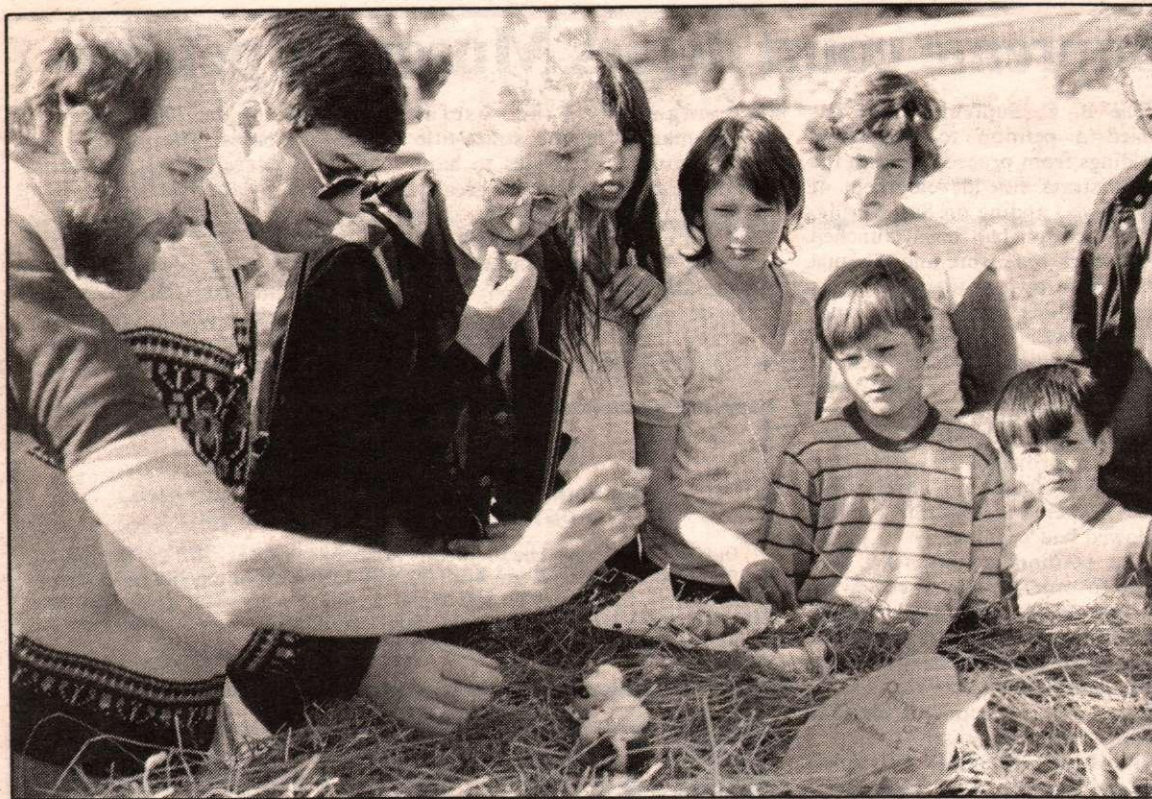

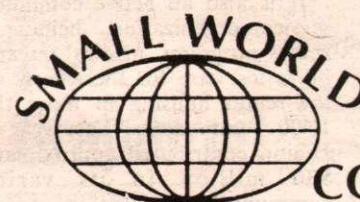

## Legion selling tulips to mark anniversary

Bright red tulips will be blooming across Canada during the spring of 1986 as part of the 60th anniversary celebrations of the Royal Canadian Legion. And local Legion members are hoping to see the flowers blooming in the islands as well.

The Legion's goal is to sell millions of tulip bulbs to corporations, institutions, service clubs and individuals across the country. Many school children will also be given some bulbs to do their own planting.

The Darwin Hybrid Tulips, which grow to 24 inches in height, produce large flowers immediately after early tulips. According to the Legion, they are hardy and easy to grow and will last for many years if left in the ground.

The bulbs will be delivered in time for planting in the fall and instructions for their care will be

included with each order.

The Royal Canadian Legion was founded in 1926 to help veterans of the Boer War and World War I to re-adjust to civilian life. The Legion has grown to more than 600,000 members. Prime purpose of the Legion is to help veterans, and their dependants, receive fair pensions, disability allowances and adequate medical or rehabilitation treatment.

It is also an active community service organization, helping in sports programs, medical research, bursaries, care for the elderly and low-rental housing in more than 1,600 communities. Last year the Legion contributed approximately \$30 million in its various communities.

Cost of the tulip bulbs is \$2.50 for 10, or \$25 per 100. They can be ordered through Legion members or at the Legion Hall in Ganges. Order deadline is May 31.

## Supreme court denies Musgrave petition

The B. C. Supreme Court has denied a petition to stop Rico Holdings from proceeding with the 24-lot strata title development at Musgrave Landing on Salt Spring.

The petition had been launched by Robert Makaroff and Shauna Little, who own property adjacent to the 200-hectare Rico Holdings land, as well as Robert Kellogg, Payne Kellogg, Sheila Kellogg Gaines and Thomas Foster, who also own land in the area.

Justice Kenneth Meredith ruled that the approval of the subdivision by the department of highways had been proper and that the process followed had been valid.

The petitioners had asked the court to order a judicial review of the approval decision handed down by highways officials last year. They also argued that the changes to the bare land strata title regulations violated the provisions of the Salt Spring community plan.

But Justice Meredith also ruled that the changes to the regulations were valid.

"In my view," the justice wrote in

his judgment, "the useful implementation of the strata-title concept, even as it relates to bare land development, would be greatly inhibited (or nullified) if lot sizes could not be reduced to permit the economic and practical installation of common facilities."

The developers propose to put in 24 waterfront lots of approximately one-quarter hectare each with the

remainder of the 200 ha property left as one parcel. The proposed split allows the development to conform with the bylaw stipulation of an average lot size of eight hectares.

Work on the development is under way. The sewer lines have been put in place and the sewage disposal field is under construction.

The petitioners are considering an appeal of the decision.

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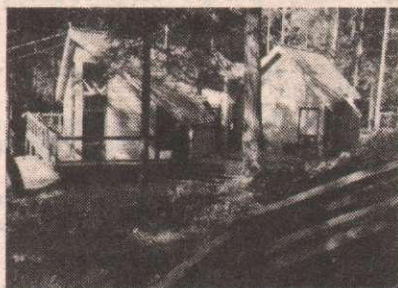
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# Down Through the Years with Driftwood

## Twenty-Five Years Ago

The Salt Spring Credit Union had loaned close to \$50,000 during the previous year and declared a 3 1/2% dividend for the members. That report was heard at the annual general meeting of the group held at Mahon Hall. Elected to serve as a director was M. Gardner. The supervisory committee would be composed of W. Rogers, Earl Kaye and D. Deacon. The credit union had been formed 2 1/2 years before.

A Silver Gloves Tournament held at Fulford Hall featured 16 boxing matches. Boys from Salt Spring won five matches. Morry Akerman took the runner-up spot with two wins. Henning Satermo, John Campbell and Danny Akerman also won their fights.

The men of St. George's Parish put on a bean supper and 150 people attended. Proceeds from the supper would go to the repair fund for the church. Dr. L.C. Lambert of Vesuvius offered a slide show of his trip to Mexico.

The new manager of the Ganges branch of the Bank of Montreal would be John West. He took over from John Frederick who moved on to Kelowna. West had served at various branches of the bank in Ontario before becoming assistant general manager in Vancouver.

The Cy Peck fished a bright red tow-target out of the water off Beaver Point. Gwen Ruckle had reported seeing the object drop from a jet plane.

## Twenty Years Ago

Dr. Francis' private hospital in Ganges would be closed by mid-month. Dr. Francis said the closing had been forced by government policy towards such private institutions. The 17 patients would be transferred to a nursing home in Saanich.

The Inter-Island Trap Shoot was taken by the team from Pender. The Galiano team came second while the Salt Spring team of Ken Stevens, W. Cogswell, G. Scarff, H. Bradley and A. Kaye came third. Ellen Bennett and Mrs. L. Anderson organized the food.

The weather for March offered more sunshine for the month than in any year since 1913. The high temperature for the month was 68 degrees while the low was recorded at 25. There had only been 1.32 inches of precipitation.

The new minister for the Salt Spring United Church would be Reverend Ernest McQuarrie. He had been army area chaplain stationed in Edmonton. Rev. Nora Hughes was to leave the island in the summer.

The Red Cross fund-raising efforts in Ganges and at the north end of Salt Spring netted \$1,100 during March, reported organizer Mrs. Lazenby.

The Guild of Sunshine held their annual Daffodil Tea and Sale. Guild president Mrs. W. Norton opened the event held in the lower hall of the United Church in Ganges. The ladies raised \$98.46.

## Fifteen Years Ago

Drummond Park at Fulford Harbour was being prepared as a centennial project for Salt Spring Island. Ray Simard was in charge of the work crew. The area was being leveled and a sea wall was being installed.

The blood clinic held at the Legion Hall in Ganges attracted 230 people who came to give blood. The Red Cross accepted 176 pints of blood from the donors. The line-up continued past the scheduled

closing of 9 pm and donors were just finishing by 10:30 pm.

The Galiano Rod and Gun Club held a meeting to allow members to approve changes to the constitution and bylaws of the group. Club president Hank Knudson chaired the gathering which approved a bylaw prohibiting the sale of the club's land or timber. The club owned 50 acres of land.

The wrecked sailboat had been rescued from Trincomali Channel and a subsequent search failed to reveal the owner. A ham radio operator from Salt Spring had related the story to a ham operator on Thetis and found out that the boat had broken away there during a storm.

March was the driest it had been since 1965, reported Ganges weather-watcher Howard Carlin. Only 2.97 inches of precipitation had been measured. The lowest measurement had been 1.32 inches. High temperature reached 60° with a low of 29°.

## Ten Years Ago

The subdivision bylaw for Salt Spring was ready for public comment. The Capital Region had given the document first and second reading and it would be available for anyone to read and comment on. The bylaw was based on the community plan and had been put together by a group of island residents.

Papajohn reported from Saturna that 180 people had gathered at the community hall to enjoy a pig-roast. Jim Campbell and Jim Money had cooked the 166-pound pig and when everyone had his fill, there was no pork left. Art Walton conducted the music for the dance after the Saturnalia had ended.

The bridge tournament held at Mayne Island was won by Bill Hortie. He edged out Foye Miles by 40 points. Three-time champ Johnny Goodman lost gracefully.

The dragster had been built by Dave Laughlin of Galiano Island and he took it to Seattle to test it

out. The racer would reach speeds of up to 200 miles per hour and the motor could develop 1,000 horsepower.

The drama festival had been held at Ganges and four awards had been won by members of the Salt Spring Players. Lanny Howard took best actor award while Alf Howell was best supporting actor and Margaret Howell was best supporting actress. The best visual award was taken by a Players production of *The Bear*.

## Five Years Ago

Delays in construction of the sewer in Ganges were costing taxpayers up to \$40,000 per month, said Capital Region chairman Jim Campbell of Saturna. A 10% escalation factor on the \$4 million price tag as well as such costs as pumping out septic tanks was adding to the bill, he said.

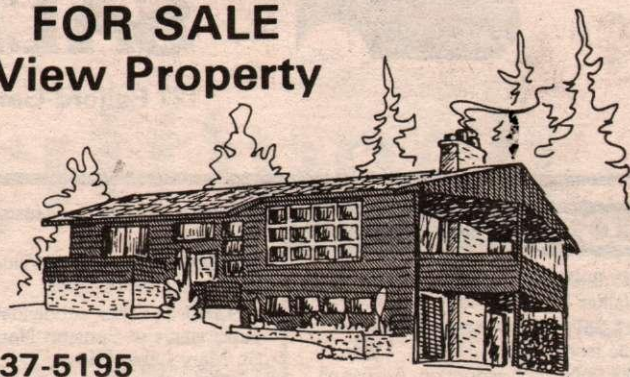
