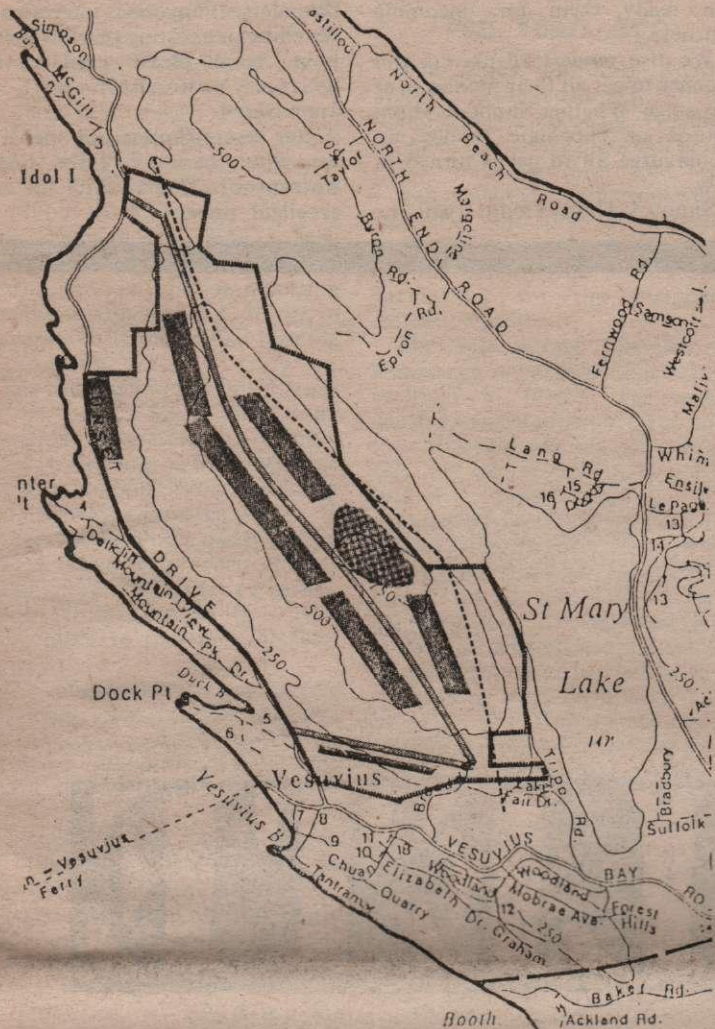


APC hears details of subdivision proposal



Approximate location of Channel Ridge development at north Salt Spring Island. Area covers 1,433 acres and developers are asking for 577 dwelling units with the majority being located on the upland ridge. The watershed, right of dotted line, would be undeveloped and the potential site for the school and recreation area, 30 acres, lies to the left of Broadwell Road in the Duck Creek valley at the south of the property. The main road access would be an extension of Broadwell Road on the south stretching through the subdivision to Sunset Drive. A second access would join Sunset Drive and Broadwell Road across the face of the bluff at the south of the subdivision. Potential population of area would be from 1,200 to 1,500 people.

Details of the proposed subdivision development at the north end of Salt Spring Island were released last week by project manager Hank Schubart.

He came to a meeting of the Advisory Planning Commission last Tuesday to explain the preliminary plans for the project, known as Channel Ridge Properties. Owners of the land, 580 hectares, (1,433 acres), are Victoria lawyers Louis Lindholm and Brian Lawrence.

The developers are asking for greater housing unit density in portions of the property in exchange for dedication of the 110 ha. (272 acres) which sit in the St. Mary Lake watershed.

Under current zoning standards, the developer could put a total of 577 dwelling units on the property. The potential breaks down to 27 units on the 110 ha of watershed, taking into consideration the four-hectare minimum lot size for the area.

There could be three lots on the 20.2 ha in the agricultural land reserve zoned Agricultural 1. The developers had stated that they do not intend to subdivide the farmland and are asking for the possible density to be shifted to the proposed subdivisions on rural zoned land.

That parcel, covering 371.6 ha, bears a zoning possibility of 180 lots with a further 180 units added as duplexes.

The remainder of the property is zoned rural residential 2 and covers 78 ha with zoning for 187 dwelling units.

The proposal put forward by Schubart calls for about 12 ha (30 acres) in Duck Creek valley to be set

aside for community use such as the location of a school and recreational uses.

The valley runs along the foot of the bluff which faces Vesuvius Bay Road. The section to be set aside lies west of Broadwell Road and east of Sunset Drive.

Schubart told the meeting that he and the developers wanted as much public discussion of the project as possible. If the density switches are approved, the land would be developed at a rate of up to 50 sites per year for about 10 years, he said.

Most of the proposed 577 units would be located on the top of the bluff which runs through the land.

Schubart noted in a report on the project that "the visual impact of the development, in so far as the larger island community is concerned, will be minimized."

The densest part of the project, on top of the bluff, would not be visible from the surrounding lowlands but could be seen by people living near the top of Mounts Erskine or Maxwell.

Access to the development would be by a northerly extension of Broadwell Road which would run through the middle of the property to emerge at Sunset Drive near McGill Road. A second road would run easterly from Sunset Drive across the southerly bluff to join the Broadwell extension.

The roads in the development would lead to the clustered properties. Schubart is proposing to have 14 clusters of units on land ranging in size from half an acre up to seven acres.

Another cluster of properties would be along Sunset Drive but shielded from the road by a stand of

timber.

In addition, Schubart envisages a village of 309 units of "low-rise garden apartments and attached or semi-attached houses" with each lot being about one-fifth of an acre in size.

To give an idea of the size of the project, Schubart had a map of the Ganges area with the outline of the development superimposed upon it. The northerly end of the development would be near Lady Minto Hospital and it would stretch south as far as a point between Arnell and Salt Spring Ways. The westerly line would take in the Mount Belcher Heights and Hundred Hills subdivisions while the easterly line would traverse Ganges Harbour to Walter Spit.

Schubart estimated the potential population of the area could reach up to 1,300 to 1,500 people depending upon the size of families which moved in.

Potable water would be supplied by the North Salt Spring Waterworks District. To run the water into the subdivision, the district would levy a charge of \$2,000 per unit of the subdivision and stand to gather close to \$1.2 million for use in laying water lines.

Salt Spring Island Fire District officials were also contacted about the plans and Schubart reported that those officials did not think that a new fire station for the subdivision would be needed. Fire hydrants would be installed at various locations for use in an emergency.

In addition, health officials on the island indicated that no new facilities would be needed because of the subdivision. Schubart noted

We also request all players and coaches to get all their monies in at this stage. Whether Shoot-A-Thon, photos or chocolate money we would urge all to get it turned in now.

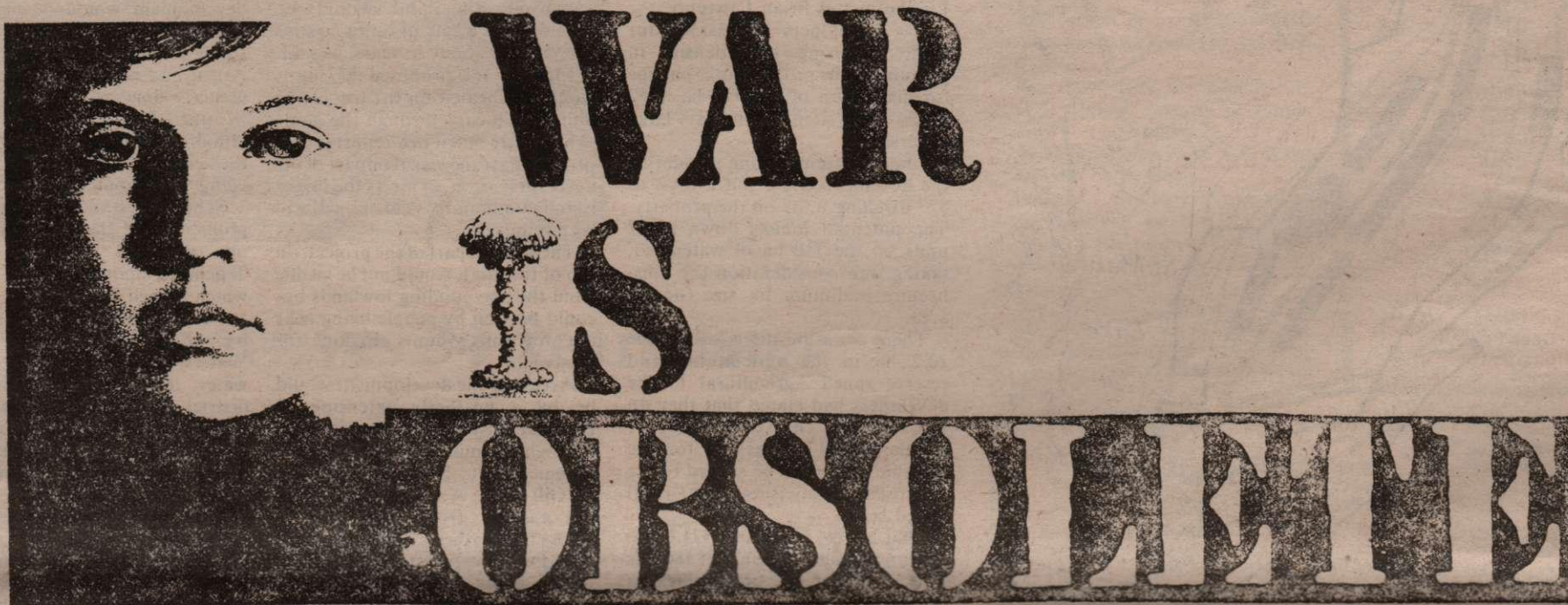
Shoot-A-Thon credits will be

We call upon the leaders of all nations to follow this course. In their dealings, they too must replace the rule of force with peaceful, civilized methods of dispute resolution. They must strive to protect our home—this living earth. They must make war another page of history.

Nearly everybody who comes to live on Galiano does so because of its serenity and beauty. It is up to all islanders to work together to keep it that way. Any positive suggestions to this end would be welcome by the Galiano Chamber of Commerce in letters addressed to Shirley Coulter, secretary of the chamber, at Box 73, Galiano.

An area of particular concern to the chamber is the head of the wharf at Sturdies Bay, which too often looks like a very used car lot. Other Gulf Island ferry terminals have been provided with reasonable parking facilities by B. C. Ferries or the highways department. Our Chamber of Commerce is working to remedy this situation.

St. Margaret's

On Sunday, Jan. 6 five representatives of St. Margaret's Church attended the ordination of the new bishop of this diocese, Rev. Ronald Shepherd. They were delighted to hear that he and his wife have strong connections with the Gulf Islands.

Bishop Shepherd and his wife own a home on Salt Spring and he chose Salt Spring rhododendrite as the gemstone for his bishop's ring. Nocturnal picture

Very few people have much idea of what goes on out of doors in the darkness of night. The late drivers recognize that the pairs of eyes that reflect their headlight beams are deer or, if disappearing low into a ditch, a racoon. The recent snow provided prints of nocturnal movements usually unseen.

That the hunting season spared a reasonable number of deer is confirmed by the frequency of the split-hoof prints, some widely spaced indicating that the animal was running or leaping. Of concern is the multiplicity of dog paw marks, many close to the deer tracks and very far from any house where a dog is kept. One wonders how many wild dogs are on the island.

There are raccoons in plenty making the rounds of the compost boxes, garbage pails and even kitchen doors. Cat tracks are common and one wonders how many of them have homes.

Signs of bird activity are common although these signs are made in daylight. Juncos and towhees are ground feeders and hoppers, so that

their anti-nuclear symbol prints are always in pairs. Crows on the other hand are walkers, so the snow by the compost is pressed down with a confused mess of their prints. Less common are the webbed prints of gulls.

Those who have conscientiously replenished their feeders during the cold spell have been treated to a continuous stream of avian visitors: song and fox-sparrows, juncos, finches, towhees and still the dazzling Steller's jay.

One of those days

Some days it is better to stay in bed. Such a day happened last week to my friend Albert. Of course Albert is not his real name as, for obvious reasons, anonymity is essential. Although retired, Albert continues to freelance in his former profession which requires him to deal with legal documents at the Land Registry Office. He drives a small but classic car in excellent condition but in an unusual firetruck hue.

One recent morning having business in Victoria Albert set out with his so patient spouse. His troubles began at the registry where he was unable to obtain photocopies of the documents he had brought with him. They repaired to the Dowager Hotel where he placed his

By the time he had located one of the staff who could assist him, his frustration level was in the danger zone. Mission accomplished they hurried to the underground parking lot where they had left the car. 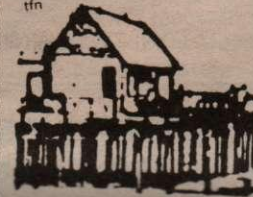
However, their troubles were not over. Having disembarked at Montague Al reached the safety of his own drive without incident.

recent developments in the civil war which has been going on since 1979: what did the elections held last March mean for the people of El Salvador? What does Jose Napoleon Duarte's presidency promise? What hope is there for a peaceful settlement to the country's problems after the recent meeting between the FDR-FMLN and Duarte?"

The goal of the Ten Days program is the creation of "just, self-determining and participatory societies."

"As Canadians, we can and must participate in our own democratic process by making our views known to our elected members of government," said Reid.

Service Friday to begin Week of Prayer for Unity

A service will be held Friday at Ganges to begin the Week of Prayer for Christian Unity, January 18-25.

The Week of Prayer dates back to 1908 when Paul Wattson, an Anglican priest in New York state, suggested a week of prayer for Christian unity between the feasts of the Chair of Peter (January 18) and the Conversion of St. Paul (January 25).

In 1933 Father Paul Couturier of Lyons, France, renamed it "Universal Week of Prayer for Christian Unity," calling on Christians to pray for the restoration of visible unity.

The Faith and Order movement, later part of the World Council of Churches, arose in the early years of

this century to resolve theological differences separating churches. A Faith and Order meeting in 1920 prompted a week of prayer for unity during Pentecost. By 1949, Faith and Order had moved its dates to January, enabling Christians to pray for unity together.

Today, the Week of Prayer is widely observed around the world. Friday's service will be held at 2 pm at St. George's Church.

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Seatbelts unsafe on buses, board learns

Seat belts for use by children riding the school buses in the Gulf Islands do not add to safety and won't be used, the Gulf Islands School Board has decided.

Several parents on Galiano Island had written to the board expressing concern because there are no seat belts on the buses. They wondered why the school district neglected the safety of the children by not insisting upon the use of seat belts on the buses.

Mike Marshall, district superintendent of schools, told the school trustees that he had been compiling information on the subject for several years. Research has shown that the use of seat belts

for school buses adds to the potential for injury to children, he said.

"I'm convinced it's not a safe way to go."

The seats on school buses are close together, he reported, and when children are secured in their seats with lap belts, they could hit their heads on the seat in front during a collision.

The research from across Canada, he said, shows that lap belts do more damage than no seat belts at all.

The bus drivers are equipped with lap and shoulder belts but the use of shoulder belts for the children is not feasible, the school trustees were told.

Four-month-old business grows, markets sprouts

What type of food is equal to or better than meat in terms of protein, is still growing when you purchase it so none of the goodness is lost through processing and contains no chemical additives whatsoever?

The answer is alfalfa sprouts and the more of them we eat, the happier a young Salt Spring Island entrepreneur will be.

Bill Child, 24, began growing alfalfa sprouts about four months ago in his North End Rd. home. He started off selling his sprouts through Sunshine Farm Foods in Ganges and today they are available in nearly every grocery store on the island.

And you can't miss the attractive and distinctive label that identifies the wares of Salt Spring Sunrise Food Products.

Child moved to Salt Spring Island a year ago from Ontario where he had been in the landscaping business for a year and a half. Before that he worked for three years at the airport in Markham, Ont., where he ended up becoming assistant manager. He also got his pilot's licence there.

He began his training at 13

of 13. By the time he was 21 he had his own snow plow and a number of snow-clearing contracts, the Markham airport among them.

"It was all learning," is how he describes his early business experience. While working for small companies he used to watch managers and supervisors, taking note of their mistakes and learning as he went along.

At present Child is taking a business management course through the Open Learning Institute.

So how does an ex-airport manager, snowplow operator and landscaper get into growing alfalfa sprouts? He does a market survey with a view to growing mushrooms.

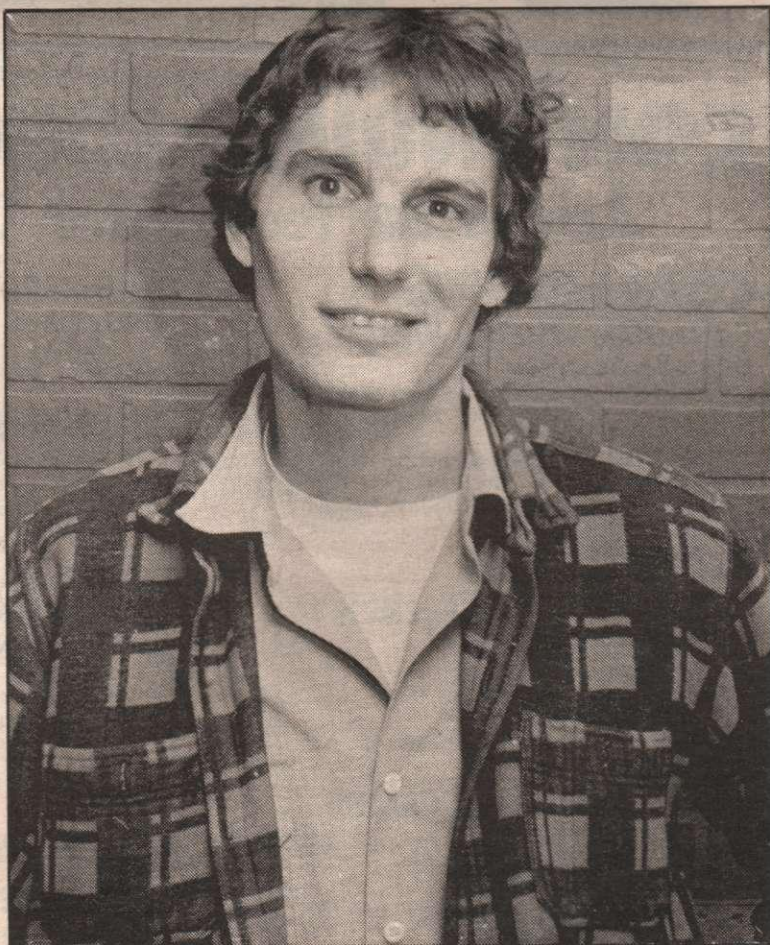
Child had moved to the island and was looking for something to do to make some money. He'd hit upon the idea of growing mushrooms and decided to do a market survey. And having read a magazine story about growing sprouts he included them in his survey. His findings told him to forget the mushrooms and go for the sprouts.

A factor in his favour, Child feels, is that there's a feeling in the islands about locally-produced goods. He's cashed in on that feeling to get his business going.

Merchants receptive

The young businessman has been impressed by what he describes as "great community spirit." Local merchants, he notes, have been extremely receptive to his product.

Child says that despite the uninspiring economic situation the community spirit here, like that of pioneer days, "will support a way for stability and growth through local goods for local people."

Although the statement sounds like it came right out of an Island Futures brochure, Child started his operation without any help from that organization. He felt his initial investment, of about \$2,000, was quite small in relation to what Island Futures would be interested in looking at.

Child expects it will be a while before his business starts paying him any wages. He intends to get into "bigger things" and feels the operation has the potential to develop into something more than

simply growing alfalfa sprouts.

He looks to the future with a positive attitude, and compares today's economic climate with the pioneer days.

"Our frontier is the local economy," he says.

With the same determination seen among the pioneers of old, Child says we can stabilize and strengthen that frontier. And to would-be business people Child advises they take a look around and they will see opportunity.

As far as the sprouts themselves are concerned, they really are quite tasty.

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Fulford School

Official opening next week

When the official opening of the Fulford Elementary School takes place later this month, the Gulf Islands School Board will help cover the cost of the reception.

The event will take place January 26 from 2 pm until 4:30 pm and the school trustees had agreed to pay for a commemorative plaque to mark the construction of the school.

But when they discussed spending money for the reception, there was a

difference of opinion at the board table. Joy Ridley of Pender Island said the parents' group of Fulford School should pay for it.

Salt Spring school trustee David Eyles countered that the school board built and paid for the school and will take credit for it. He said the school board should help pay for the reception.

He suggested that the school board express willingness to help

cover the costs of the afternoon reception but other school trustees were not willing to support that idea without having a specific amount mentioned.

The motion called for the school board to chip in \$200 towards the event.

Mike Marshall, superintendent of schools, reminded the school trustees that the Fulford community had put in time and energy to "create a good little school" and the school board should not "get chintzy" with the official opening.

Bus routes examined

School bus routes on Salt Spring are under scrutiny by the Gulf Islands School Board.

The school trustees have decided that a bus won't be going down Isabella Point Road until at least September. Parents of school children living down the road had requested that the bus go as far as the Lacey Corner but the school trustees had looked at the turn-around at that point and decided it wasn't large enough for the bus.

At the same time, the school trustees considered a request from parents of children living on Beaver Point Road to have the bus route extended to the Ruckle Park gates.

The trustees will look at the number of children to determine the benefits of extending that route. A change in effect immediately is that the school bus will no longer reverse into Bridgman Road to pick up children.

The bus will stop on Beaver Point Road to pick up the children and

then back into Bridgman to turn around.

At the north end of the island, the Fernwood School bus routes are being looked at as well. The scheduling of that bus is being considered so that children do not have to spend so much time getting to and from the school.

At Vesuvius the children gather to catch the bus at the same time as traffic for the morning ferry goes through. Concerns about safety for the 11 children who catch the bus at the corner of Sunset Drive and Vesuvius Bay Road have been expressed.

The parents had asked the school board to urge the department of highways to install signs warning motorists that the children cross the road to catch the school bus.

The parents also requested that the school board arrange for the RCMP to monitor the situation and if at all possible to rearrange the scheduled pick-up to a time when there is no ferry traffic.

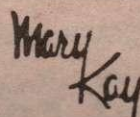

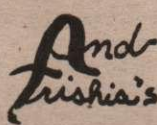

Laughing all the way from the garden to the bank

I really do not know how a bacterium can tumble. They are just a bit of membrane surrounding a bit of cytoplasmic juice, with some genes, some mitochondria and a few other yet unidentified immigrant bits floating around in there.

Yet there they are, a million to the square millimetre, tumbling like so many miniature acrobats, and each has his own style.

How can they do this without muscles? Even tiny ones? That they are male and female, just like us, is now beyond question, but where does the impulse come from to tumble, to rest for a bit, and then to tumble again. That sexual difference and individuality exists at this primitive level of life, I can live with; but intent, or impulse? This boggles the mind.

Perhaps some day I will meet a bacterium who can explain all this to me; in the meantime, as a whole clan of these bacteria have developed the knack to take nitrogen from the air and pass it on to plants—for the manufacture of my protein—I can, at least, make life as pleasant as possible for them. This is the least I can do in exchange for all the free nitrogen I could wish for.

Of course, it stands to reason that the more of these little fellows, and ladies, there are, the more nitrogen there will be, as they do what comes naturally to them. They just live, and love—it's true—multiply and proliferate at alarmingly astronomical rates. And this is where I can help them.

What they need is moisture, to tumble in and to absorb their food from, and half-rotten vegetation as a source of food, along with some oxygen for breathing purposes. To simplify matters further, this half-rotten vegetation, when mixed into the soil, holds its own water, like a sponge, so I do not have to go out there daily and take precise measurements of moisture conditions. In fact, with sufficient half-rotten vegetation in my soil, I

can let this go, for weeks on end, until an urgent message arrives from some desperate bacteria. These particular nitrogen-fixing bacteria work in partnership with clovers, beans and peas, with what we term legumes; although there is another bunch, if a bit more independent, that work with grasses.

Consequently then, legumes and grasses are rich in nitrogen, and hence the well known high nitrogen content of grass clippings. Therefore, in order to get nitrogen to all the other vegetables that do not have a partnership agreement with the nitrogen-fixing clan, I need to get some of those nitrogen-rich greens into the soil. To make matters easier again, for me, I can grow a bunch of peas, harvest the peas to sustain me while I am doing this, and dig or till the plants into the ground.

A week later, I can sow some beans, harvest the beans when mature, to sustain me some more, and dig the plants into the ground too. That gives me two harvests, from the same plot, in the same season, and two nitrogen-rich green manures for non-leguminous plants, plus lots of organic remains to enlarge the living room for the little life. If this can be done before September 1, usually with time to spare, I can follow these with yet another edible greens crop, the cold hardy and delicious corn salad.

This can supply us with fresh greens almost to the end of the year and early next spring, plus yet another green manure in spring, this one rich in phosphorus and potash. All the while our phosphorus is also provided, free of charge and at the same time, by mycorrhizal fungi. These like the same living conditions as bacteria, live cheek by jowl with them, and have quite intimate partnership agreements with practically all plants.

On top of all this, the mycorrhizal fungi fend off the dreaded nematodes, and the virus diseases carried by them, or compensate plants fully for any nematode damage. It is enough to make one laugh all the way from the garden to the bank. Who would have thought that one can grow one's own edible fertilizers, at three harvests per season and improve and enrich one's soil so simply. It boggles the mind, especially when one thinks of the expensively complicated way we have devised, for some obscure reason, to thwart a process as simple as it is natural, and beneficial, all around.

Laxton's improved progress bush peas, at 55 days to maturity, followed by Blue Lake bush beans at 54 days to maturity, or other varieties with as little as 40 days to maturity, like contender, are my favourites. From as late as May 1 to September 1 gives us a total of 123 days, into which the 109 days of the suggested varieties fit quite nicely. Raised beds help with faster warm-up and better drainage in spring, and may be flattened for beans through the summer months.

To grow one's own edible fertilizers then, divide the garden area in half, or add some more

garden area, grow the pea, bean, corn salad succession for one season, then switch sides the next season. This succession is so fertile that it will sustain annual rotation

with cabbage and corn, our heaviest feeders, indefinitely, while still increasing the organic content, the living room of the little life, at a rapid rate.

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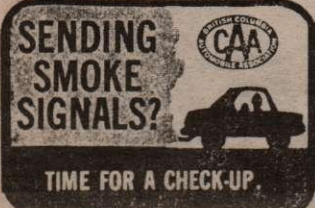

Down Through the Years with Driftwood

Twenty Years Ago

The new high school to be built on the hill at the Ganges school property on Salt Spring would cost close to \$35,000 more than anticipated, said architect R. W. Sidall of Victoria. He told the Gulf Islands School Board that he would do a cost analysis to determine where savings could be made.

HMS Ganges Chapter IODE held a meeting chaired by regent Mrs. F. K. Parker. The group had given out 24 Christmas hampers with a value of close to \$177. Mrs. H. C. Carlin and Mrs. Gavin Mouat would be on the nominating committee with Mrs. B. E. Hardie in preparation of the annual meeting of the group.

The chairman of the Gulf Islands School Board, for a third term, would be Jim Campbell, school trustee from Saturna Island. George Heinekey, of Salt Spring, would act as vice-chairman for the year.

Investigations were under way on Mayne Island into reports of dogs killing sheep. The roaming dogs had killed 15 to 20 sheep and efforts were being made to find the dogs and destroy them.

The cougar was causing problems with loggers at Cowichan Lake and Ted Akerman took his dog Pearl to the hunt. When the big cat was caught, it measured 7½ feet in length.

Construction of the new ferry terminal at Swartz Bay on Vancouver Island was in high gear. The area was "a sea of oozy, sticky mud" and travellers were hesitant about leaving their vehicles while waiting for a ferry. The work was scheduled to be completed by spring.

Fifteen Years Ago

The provincial cabinet turned down an appeal against the discharge of sewage into Trincomali Channel. Opponents on Salt Spring of the sewage disposal idea had appealed to cabinet to have the permit revoked. There would be 20,000 gallons of sewage per day from the Maliview Estates subdivision piped into the channel.

The Gulf Islands School Board agreed to borrow \$175,000 to pay expenses for the first three months of the year until money raised through taxes had been collected and distributed. The trustees had, in the previous December, voted not to borrow the money. Only George Lampier, the Fulford school trustee, opposed the motion.

The Salt Spring Library Board re-elected George Wells as chairman. Mrs. C. W. Carlson would be treasurer while Norman Porter would be secretary. The library would be open six days per week from 11 am until 3 pm except Wednesday and Saturday when the hours would be from 11 am until 1 pm.

Papajohn reported from Saturna that the news media from Vancouver wanted to know about the oil drilling rig situated between Mayne and Saturna. He figured out that someone, spotting the *Essington* with a piledriver aboard, had mistaken it for a drill rig. The *Essington* had been in Lyall Harbour repairing the wharf.

The Galiano Rod and Gun Club met for its annual meeting and election of officers. Hank Knudson would be president with Fred Robson as vice-president. W. H. Day would be secretary-treasurer.

RCMP at Ganges were investigating a series of break-ins at five businesses in the village during

the night of the last day of the old year. The thieves also tried unsuccessfully to enter a sixth establishment. About \$200 was reported missing from the various businesses.

Ten Years Ago

The Cubs on Salt Spring presented a cheque for \$70.25 to the island Lions Club. Aage Villadsen accepted the money on behalf of the Lions. Cubs Ken Marr and Sean Logan made the presentation which was half the amount gathered during the annual bottle drive held by the Cubs. The money was earmarked for the proposed recreation centre.

The Salt Spring Chamber of Commerce would be holding supper meetings in future. The group decided to meet for dinner, and hold their business meeting afterwards. The first dinner meeting would be held at the Ganges Crest.

Papajohn reported from Saturna that he had missed the last meeting of the Lions Club on the island. He asked the secretary what had happened but the secretary had missed the meeting also. He sought the president but he had had to leave the meeting early for a ferry. Tom Davidson had taken the minutes of the meeting but Papajohn reported that he was laid up with the flu.

The efforts to close Kanaka Road, which bisects the play fields at the Ganges school, gained support. The Gulf Islands School Board would be joined by the recreation commission in that effort. For 10 years, the school board had received no encouragement from the department of highways in the matter of closing the road.

Pupils at the Pender Island school won prizes in a national contest. Renee Bellemare, Chris Fairweather, Debbie Auchterlonie and Blair Baxter had won prizes for essay writing and handwriting. Danny Pelkey had also won a prize but had moved from the island. The school itself won a prize for the high level of participation of pupils.

The Mayne Island Lions Club held a charter night. Guest was former district governor for the Lions, Tom Portlock of Salt Spring. Representatives of the Lions Clubs on the other islands also attended.

Five Years Ago

The motion to the Capital

Regional Board by Salt Spring director Yvette Valcourt was defeated. She had moved an amendment to a previous motion to the effect that occupancy permits not be issued until after February 6. The credit union was to move from the Valcourt Centre to a new location in the village. She expressed concern about the use of holding tanks for sewage from the building.

RCMP on Salt Spring were investigating a series of acts of vandalism. The department of highways reported that 17 road signs had either been damaged or knocked down during the previous weekend.

The Capital Region warned that taxpayers in Ganges would be liable for \$260,000 if the sewer were not built. That money represented what had been spent on the project to date. Cost to taxpayers, after government grants were calculated, would be \$450,000 for a completed sewer system.

The Galiano Ladies Service Club met at the lounge on Page Drive for the first meeting of the year. The ladies had donated \$600 to various charities the previous years with money going to such efforts as UNICEF and the Salvation Army among others.

District-governor Colin Mouat had travelled to Campbell River with his wife Anne for a meeting of the Lions Club there. The Lions presented him with a burl clock in recognition of his work for the Lions Clubs of the district.

A proposal to create a curling rink on Salt Spring might be dropped due to lack of response, said Don Macdonald. He had been pushing the idea for several years and was the president of the Salt Spring Curling Club. The capital cost of the proposal had been set at \$271,400 with yearly maintenance costs of approximately \$25,100.

Interest in physical fitness was growing on Salt Spring. The Adult Education program was sponsoring various classes and co-ordinator Virginia Newman said that more classes were planned if space could be found.



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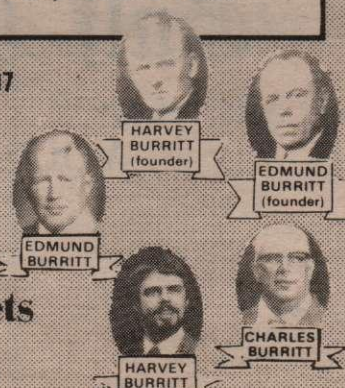
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Island firm offers two fund-raising programs

 - adds a new zoning classification "Comprehensive Development (2) Zone", "CD(2)", which provides for uses such as hotels, including licensed public houses, motels or other transient accommodation, restaurants, marinas, rentals, and retail uses and accessory residential use. The by-law also establishes regulations regarding building height, setbacks and site coverage for the new zone. It also establishes a site density for commercial accommodation use of 700 m² (7,500 ft.²) floor area for any parcel in the Comprehensive Development (2) Zone. Nevertheless the by-law also permits one additional accommodation unit for each 0.04 ha (1/10 acre) the parcel exceeds 0.4 ha (1 acre) in area;
 - changes the zoning classification of Lot 1, Plan 31313, Section 3, Range 4 East, North Salt Spring and a portion of the Westerly 15 chains of Fractional Section 3 and Section 4, Range 4 East, North Salt Spring Island, except that part thereof included within the boundaries of Plans 11177, 21925, 27785 and Plan 31313 from the Industrial 1 Zone (I1) to the Comprehensive Development (2) Zone, CD(2), and from the Agriculture 1 Zone (A1) to the Comprehensive Development (2) Zone CD(2), and from the Industrial 1 Zone (I1), to the Agriculture 1 Zone (A1) as shown on the plan attached to the by-law;
 - designates the land described above as a Development Permit Area pursuant to Section 717(3) of the Municipal Act.
- Proposed By-law No. 116 cited as "Zoning By-law No. 2, Salt Spring Island, 1978, Amendment By-law No. 20, 1984"
 - amends Section 2.1 to provide a new definition of "transient accommodation".

Card arrives 34 years later

Edith Cantrill finally got that Christmas card which had been posted in 1950.

The Salt Spring Island resident received the card on Christmas Eve and expressed pleasure in hearing from friends after all those years.

The card had been posted in 1950 and the envelope bore a 1¢ postage stamp bearing the likeness of King George.

But several pieces of mail got hung up in a postal chute and remained there until last fall. Dave Scott, of Richmond, was in the process of renovating the old post office for his restaurant, Dave's Fish and Chips.

The mail slot had been covered over and as workmen dismantled the wall, the lost letters were discovered.

Scott said that in addition to Cantrill's card, there were two

letters bearing 7¢ postage and another bearing a 5¢ stamp from 1966. Another letter had been chewed by mice and was worthless, he said.

Scott went about trying to find the people to whom the letters were addressed. He could have dropped them in the lap of the postal authorities but decided to trace the people himself.

"I don't trust the post office," he said.

He was able to track Cantrill down at Greenwoods and sent the missing card to her by special

delivery.

Near the turn of the century some of Scott's relatives, the Rains, had lived on the island although he has never been to Salt Spring.

But that's going to change, he said. When he has the opportunity he intends to come to Salt Spring to meet Cantrill.

that with the density proposed for the village area, "it is hoped that some kind of clinic facility can become part of the scheme, especially for local care of the elderly."

As part of the preliminary study of the area, Schubart had the geotechnical consultants, Piteau and Associates of Victoria, look at the properties to identify areas suitable for ground disposal of sewage.

The engineers identified up to six areas which seemed to contain suitable soil for disposal fields. Schubart told the APC meeting that the subdivision, at full capacity, would produce up to 100,000 gallons of sewage per day and would require an area of between 18 and 20 acres in size to accommodate the flow.

The large lots could be served with septic tanks and drain fields on site, the report noted, but a community sewer system would be needed for the denser portions of the project.

The engineers suggest "drainfield and exfiltration pond methods have the greatest potential..." The engineers added that "more detailed studies will be made after a preliminary approval of the general

planning scheme has been given."

In a letter accompanying the Schubart report on the project, Lindholm stated, "Without regard to existing zoning, but in conformance with the community plan, we are requesting adoption of a Comprehensive Development Plan and ultimately the needed rezoning, development permit and such other approvals as may be needed to proceed with construction of the project."

Another part of the report prepared by Schubart shows that only slightly less than 180 ha (443 acres) of the property would be used in the development. That would leave 400 ha (990 acres) of open and reserved land.

The overall density of the site, the report also notes, would be a dwelling unit for each hectare (2.48 acres).

The system of ownership of the various properties has not yet been worked out.

The developers are considering various options such as fee simple under a condominium style of ownership or some form of resident controlled corporation.

"One of the important aspects of ownership will be the matter of continuing environmental, land use and design controls," he wrote in the report.

The project will be discussed at a public meeting to be held in conjunction with the Salt Spring Island Trust Committee meeting on January 23.
