Terry Fox Run raises \$2,100 for cancer fund

Despite a TV news error on the time and place of the run, 43 participants (plus animals) gathered at the South Galiano Community Hall Sunday for the annual Terry Fox Run for cancer research.

The success of this year's well-organized event may be measured by the incredible sum this relatively small group amassed in pledges: \$2,100, compared to a previous high of \$950.

Every person, from ages four months to 76 years, who braved

the eight kilometre course is to be thanked for their efforts. Of particular interest are the highest pledges: Marg Prior and Betty Stewart, \$284.50; Fred King, \$238; Ian Hooley Jr., \$229; young Sara Quist, \$215; Bill Ripley, \$177; and Jean Tully, \$125.

Meeting prompts ferry complaints

Pender Islanders are fed up with their ferry service, according to a meeting 30 residents attended last Thursday.

The meeting, called to discuss the proposed winter schedule, covered a number of other topics — including the morning backlog of cars at Otter Bay and an optional evening sailing.

"Sink the Vesuvius. Get us another boat," "the Socreds run everything like a two-bit hardware (store), not a social service" were some of the concerns addressed to Eileen Robertson of the Island Transportation Committee, who was collecting the views of residents to present to ferry officials.

"The corporation is trying," she said, amid protests that the schedule hadn't been changed in 12 years.

For much of the meeting, the discussion centred around the problem of morning backups at Otter Bay. Residents said 20 cars were left behind after the 9:10 am run on Thursday, although corporation spokesman Betty Nicholson said the *Queen of the Islands* left "10 plus" cars behind, and that it was late, leaving at 9:42 am.

Residents said the 7:25 am *Vesuvius* sailing left seven vehicles behind, and then the *Queen of the Islands* picked up only two cars.

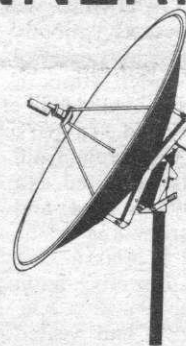
"I couldn't get into town until 12:30," said one man, who took the next boat to Salt Spring and transferred there. "It's a mess," he said.

"Last year they had the police down there after we made a big fuss one day. They thought we

Ocean(s)

The Dandelion Art Gallery is presenting a show entitled *Oceans*, until October 3.

Several Galiano artists have contributed not only their framed windows onto the waters, but a vast spectrum of moods, interpretations of colours and animal life. A constant subject (*Oceans*) inherently emphasizes the variety in individual style, and this variety is strikingly apparent.

Just as striking is the absolute contrast to the variety — a singular ocean seen as a placid, inland water, quiet, forgiving. No crashing violent waves, no storms on the high seas; this is, after all, Galiano, where nature is soft.

Ocean or oceans, this gallery is worth a visit. You may see the waters, often taken for granted, in a new way.

Ahoy

An unusual flotilla of about 20 yachts dropped anchor Thursday, September 11, in Montague Harbour. The crews, mostly husband and wife teams, are all experienced deep-water sailors of the Cruising Club of America.

The vessels and sailors rendezvoused in California from Atlantic and Pacific ports and, as a group headed by Richard and Myrn Philbrick, are sailing up the rugged B.C. coast to Alaska. One couple arrived directly from Hawaii.

Skipper Philbrick had visited Galiano Island recently to check out the facilities in Montague Park. He requested a talk on historic Indian occupation of the area.

On arrival, the group was welcomed by Fred King and his Montague Park staff, then volunteer park host Pat Connelly escorted them through the area. The following morning, Tony Kingscote led the visitors around the various middens, burial and excavation sites. He described the findings of artifacts discovered during digs and what they revealed about the cultures of the people who had occupied this area for three or more thousand years.

Following discussion on pre-history, Tony gave a demonstration on how the sound of the Salish Indian language could be heard for long distances over the water.

After thank yous, Richard Philbrick presented Pat and Tony

with beautiful folding umbrellas. The sails were set, and the group headed into Trincomali Channel to look for petroglyphs on Galiano's southwestern shore. Then it's Alaska-bound.

Weavers and Spinners

The Weavers Cottage of the Galiano Weavers and Spinners Guild was a hive of activity Wednesday and Thursday during their two-day workshop under the instruction of loom mistress Fern Stewart.

Ten members and one guest were taught the art of Ikat dyeing. Ikat is a Malaysian word meaning *to tie*. The warp is dyed after sections of warp threads are bound tightly with plastic strips so the dye will not penetrate these areas. The result is subtle bands of colour going across the finished woven fabric.

If the guild members can bear to part with the finished product (whether they will be in the form of wall hangings, purses or runners), the public will be able to purchase them at their Christmas sale on November 9, 1986.

'Frightening name' for friendly approach

Neurolinguistic programming (NLP) is a frightening name for a friendly approach to communication.

Harris Strassner, a Pender Island resident and certified neuro-linguistic programmer, will be conducting a seminar entitled *Personal Communications* Saturday from 11 am to 2 pm in the elementary school library.

The focus of NLP, says Stras-

ner, is in learning simple ways to improve your rapport with, and understanding of, those around you. He says that NLP teaches people to understand how they communicate and to use that understanding to better communicate with others.

It does this, in part, by showing people whether they think more in visual or aural terms, and then how they can use that information to better express themselves or relearn ways of working and functioning that are better suited to them. According to NLP, a visual person may remember phone numbers as the written numerals and will recall them as they appeared on the page. An auditory person will remember the sounds of the numbers.

Listening (or watching) for cues by another person will help you know how best to communicate with that person, says Strassner.

NLP was developed by Richard Bandler, a mathematician, and John Grinder, a linguist, both from the University of Santa Cruz in California. The two men noticed how the use of language affected people, and studied the linguistic patterns that three well-known psychiatrists, Fritz Perls, Virginia Satir and Milton Erickson, used in their work.

Strassner, in a written definition of NLP, describes it as 'the structure of subjective experience (past, present or future), and adds that NLP "makes no attempt at labelling good or bad behaviour. In fact, it assumes that all behaviour has a good intention."

Strassner's seminar will cover the basic precepts of NLP.

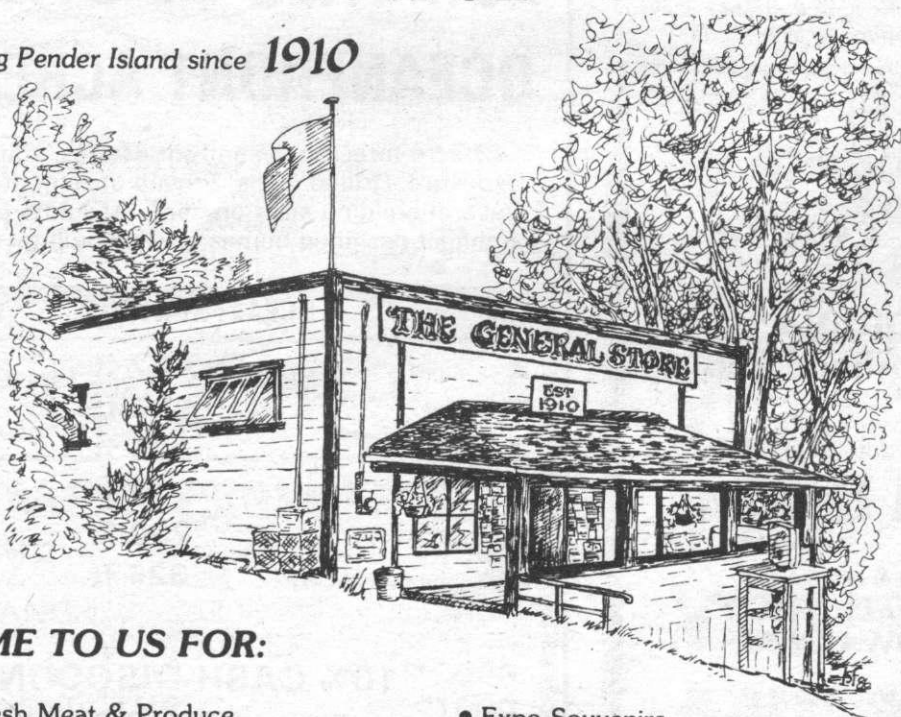

The hot summer brought entries in the class for corn for the first time in three years but the season was not good for fruit and there was a noticeable absence of entries in classes for apples and plums.

Aini Haksi, assisted by Audrey Simas and Margaret Edgar, ably completed the Herculean task of judging the horticultural and floral arts exhibits.

There was an increase of entries and exhibitors in the class for preserves; the standard was high and the variety offered in the entries for relish and pickles was impressive. Margaret Edgar was the judge in this section.

Refreshments were organized and served by Barbara Scoones and Audrey Simas and much appreciated on a hot, thirst-provoking day.

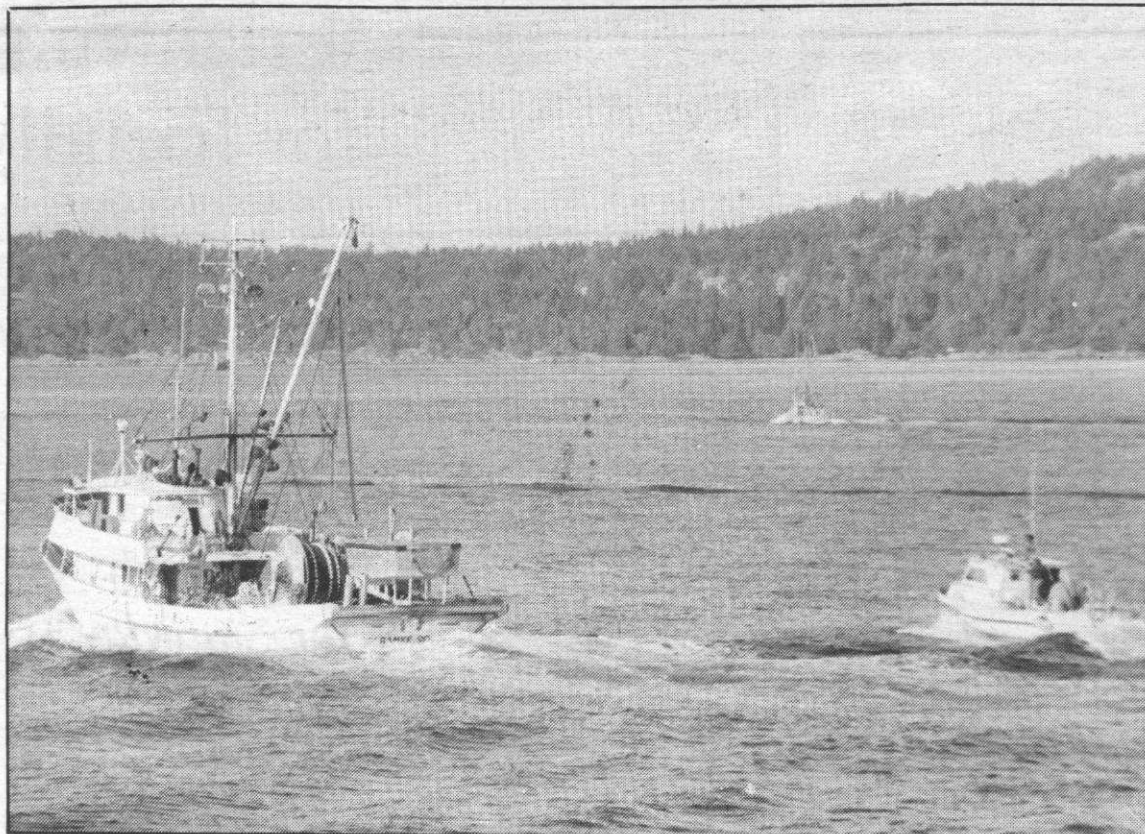

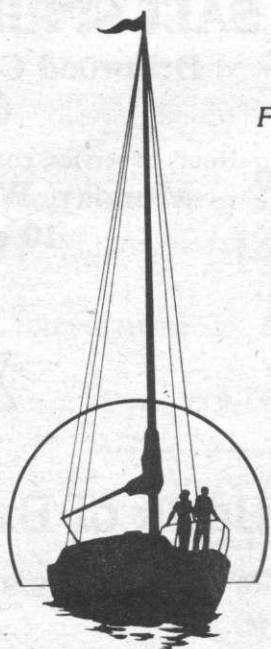



were going to start a riot," said one woman. "But they had another boat on."

The proposed schedule for October 14 to June 17 offers a direct *Vesuvius Queen* sailing to Swartz Bay on Tuesdays and Thursdays at 9:25 am, as well as its regular 7:25 am run. The sailings would cater to Pender Island only.

"The *Vesuvius* isn't seaworthy," "it smells," and "it only holds 30 cars" were some of the reactions. "We have 90 to 100 cars down there every morning," added several people.

The new schedule would also see the *Mayne Queen* stop at Pender after making pickups at Saturna, Galiano and Mayne at approximately 8:30 am and once again around noon every day.

"But you never know if you'll get on that," said one woman. "They might only take two cars."

The afternoon schedule includes a daily 3:30 pm sailing of the *Mayne Queen* from Swartz Bay. On Tuesdays and Thursdays, it would stop at Pender Island first; on all other days it would make the rounds of the other islands before stopping at Otter Bay.

In addition, there would be a daily 6:30 pm direct from Swartz Bay to Pender. This would be a boat for Pender Islanders only, and is indicative, says Robertson, of the corporation's sincere efforts to try to alleviate the island's problems.

Those present agreed that it was a step in the right direction, although there were protests that the morning schedule is the problem, not the afternoon.

At one point during the discussion, almost all present agreed that if there was one large ferry picking everyone up once in the morning and coming back once in the evening, the problems would be solved.

Frank Simon, author of the Pender Island Ferry Service Review Committee report, objected, saying that the 30 people at the meeting did not adequately represent the island population, and that in a survey he had conducted last year, 82 per cent of the population surveyed had opted for a shuttle service.

He added that there are many business people who want to make short trips to the island and not be forced to spend the day, and that some islanders want to be able to go to town for a doctor's appointment and return right after.

The group, largely composed of seniors, disagreed. "We're islanders," said one man.

Robertson summed up the discussion by saying she doubted the corporation would give the island a large boat at this time, and that residents would have to work with what was offered.

She reminded the group that the corporation had to deal with an eight-hour day. "In the union, a 31-minute period is equal to 60 minutes of overtime pay."

"We're victims of overtime," said one person.

At the end of the meeting it was agreed that Robertson should go to the corporation with the statement: "The supplementary service (the Tuesday and Thursday 9:25 am run of the *Vesuvius Queen*) is unacceptable as it stands. If the corporation will put the *Queen of the Islands* on the run instead of the *Vesuvius*, we will hope that we do not recreate backups at the terminal."

If the situation is not improved by those changes, Robertson says they will go back to the corporation for another solution.

The *Queen of the Islands* holds 10 more cars than the *Vesuvius* maximum of 30. Robertson said she hoped people would divide themselves evenly for the morning sailings, and not have everyone lining up for the popular *Mayne Queen*.

In addition to the vote on the morning schedule, those attending had to decide on an optional 10:10 pm sailing Tuesday and Thursday evenings from Swartz Bay. The late sailing would pre-empt the 6:30 pm boat on those days, meaning commuters wouldn't be able to get home until 11:00 pm, said Robertson.

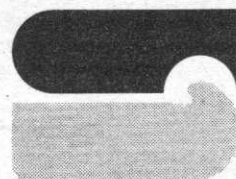
Choosing the 10:10 boat would also mean that the number of Pender Islanders allowed on the 3:30 pm sailing from Swartz Bay would be limited to give people returning to Galiano and Mayne a ride home that day.

"You can't go to a show and be back for a 10 o'clock ferry anyway. It'd have to be at 11 or 11:30 to do any good," said one islander. Others agreed, voting almost unanimously to stick to the 6:30 pm schedule.

Robertson said the Gulf Islands area is the only one in the province with scheduling problems. She added that the ferry corporation is listening, and offered as evidence the 6:30 evening sailing.

Robertson also asked residents if they would support the committee, in concert with other island committees, making an application to the government for help. Simon said that perhaps it was the time for more action and suggested a petition. It was agreed that a petition would be a good course of action, along with letters to MLAs. Robertson asked that a copy of all correspondence or suggested actions be sent to her committee so it would be informed of the community's activities.

Robertson concluded the meeting by saying she believed they would see direct service for each island "in our time."

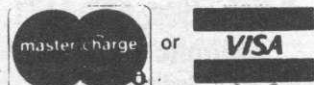

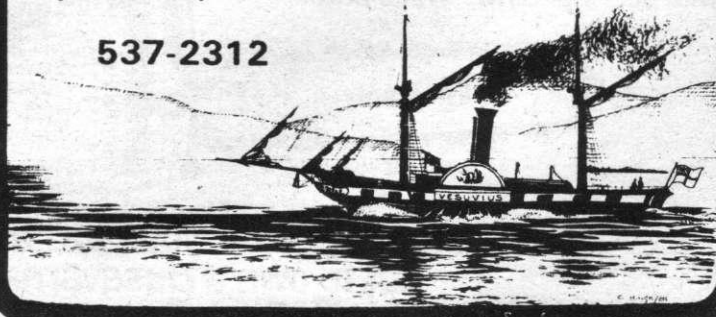
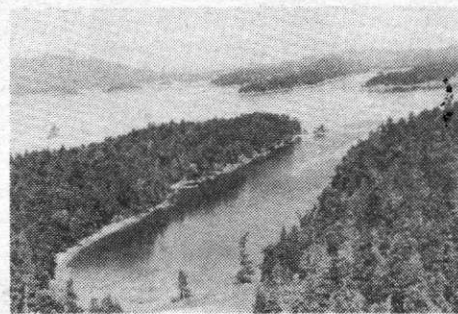

The cause of North American wildlife conservation was given an added boost last week when the Salt Spring Island committee of Ducks Unlimited raised \$11,000 at its recent banquet.

A cheque in that amount has been sent to Ducks Unlimited's head office in Winnipeg.

Local committee chairman Dwight Brainerd said he was comforted to see a large and enthusiastic turnout at this year's fund-raiser.

"It's also reassuring to know that the money we raised will be funneled directly into critical wetland habitat restoration programs in this province and other areas of Canada," he added.

Brainerd went on to congratulate and thank members of the community who donated time and merchandise to guarantee the banquet's success.

In a final statement concerning the future growth of the organization, Brainerd said Ducks Unlimited has grown at a rate of 25 per cent compounded annually for the past 15 years in the U.S., and has enjoyed a 75 per cent growth rate in Canada since 1980.

"Since such growth is essential to the well-being of the waterfowl resource, the Salt Spring Island committee is already planning to make next year's banquet a record-breaker," he said.

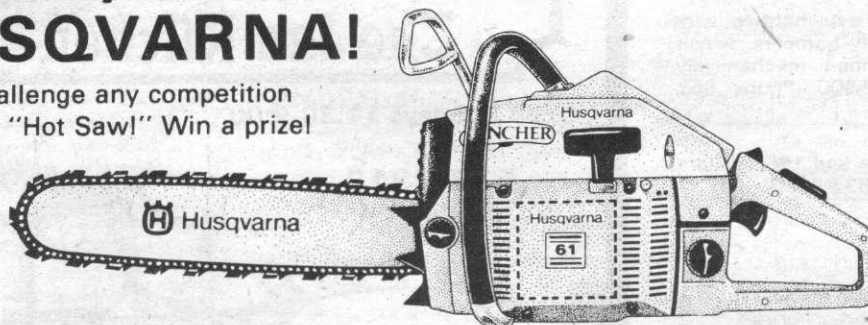

Pending bylaw promises stricter control of animals

An animal control bylaw awaiting provincial government approval will put into law the already-perceived requirement for Gulf Islands animal owners to keep their pets and livestock under control.

Once the law comes into effect, every form of animal — excluding wildlife — must be kept under control by its owner.

Livestock found ranging loose, or pets wandering in public or causing trouble on private land, could cost their owners money if someone complains and any of three deputy animal control officers catch up with the animals.

"The bylaw is just reflecting the changes in the community that have already taken place," chief animal control officer Miles Drew said in an interview last Wednesday. The animal bylaw is "a complete rewrite" giving Drew and his deputies control over all domestic animals.

The constant problem of dogs getting into sheep enclosures and wreaking havoc continues to be a concern for sheep owners.

This year was a lucky one, with very few incidents. Claims for compensation for livestock injured or killed by dogs in the Capital Regional District (CRD)

electoral areas have reached only \$500 this year, down from about \$7,000 last year, Drew said.

Another factor improving the situation is that people are now more likely to phone when a dog is a nuisance, rather than waiting until it has caused damage, Salt Spring Island deputy officer Howard Byron said.

There is also an onus on the livestock owners to keep their animals fenced in. If the animals get loose and cause damage, or the dogs are drawn to the property by inadequate fencing or animal carcasses lying around, the owner has failed to take precautions against the damage.

Byron is at work finishing an enclosure which will let him impound three dogs at a time. He hopes to prevent incidents with loose dogs by holding the offending canines before they get into trouble.

Dog owners must keep their pets confined to their property unless the dogs are under "the effective control" of someone. Once the dog is on its own, it can be picked up. That costs the owner \$28 for a licensed dog, and \$73 for an unlicensed mutt.

Licences are \$10 for spayed or neutered dogs, \$20 for others. They are available at various

stores on the islands.

The part-time deputies don't spend all their time chasing dogs. Most of their dog-catching duties are as a result of complaints received. Once the new bylaw is in effect, they could also be picking up cats if they receive complaints.

"We've had an indication there is a cat problem," Drew said, adding the public will have to get involved if they want help battling bothersome felines. An animal control officer will come pick up a cat that has been trapped, but not nuisance cats that are still loose.

A cat that moves into the crawlspace beneath a house and has kittens could be a real problem, Drew said. The new bylaw will give the animal control officers a mandate to deal with the problem.

The bylaw has been given third reading by the CRD, and will come into effect when provincial government approval is given.

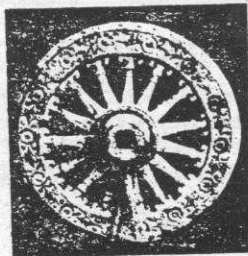

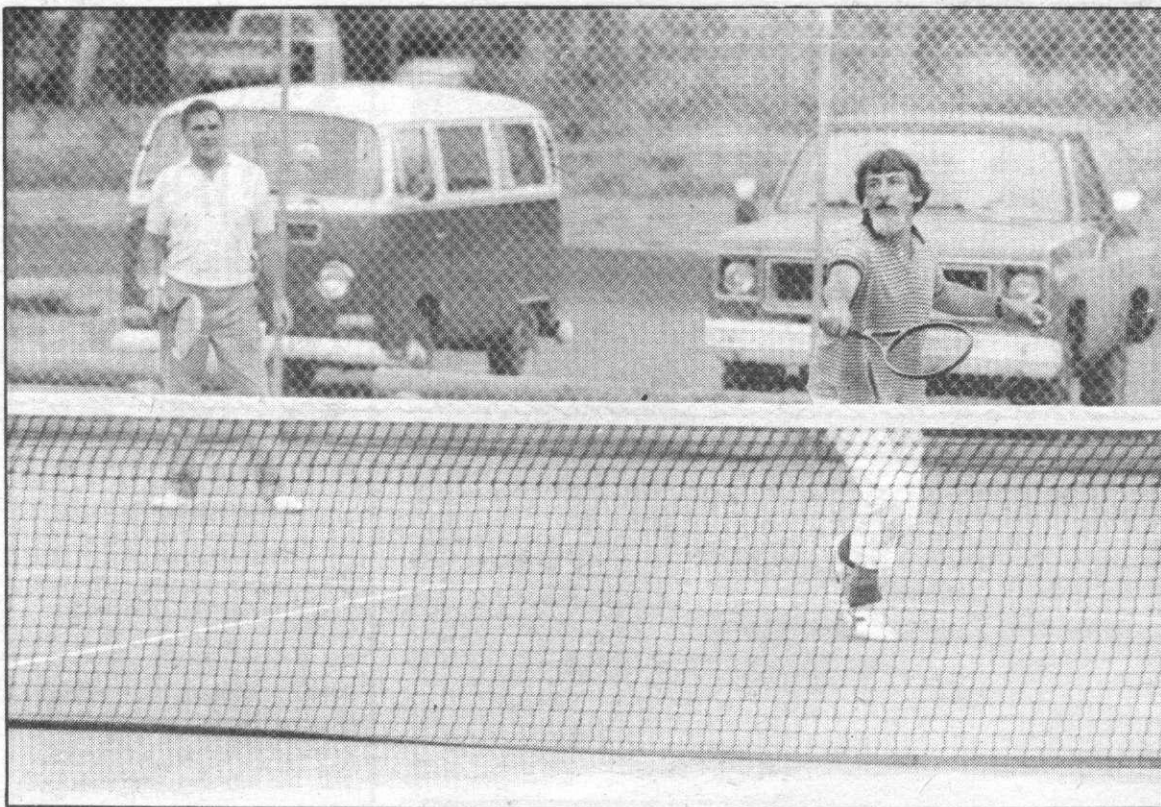

Health Fair to discuss Alzheimer's Disease

Editor's note: On October 4, the Salt Spring Community Centre and the local chapter of the Registered Nurses Association of B.C. will sponsor a health fair in Ganges to discuss various aspects and methods of care. Each week between now and then, an aspect of the fair's agenda will be covered in the following column, submitted by the Community Centre.

Alzheimer's Disease is a specific neurological disorder and not a normal part of aging. It causes severe loss of memory, intellect and insight in the patient, and has devastating effects on the family and friends.

Families and other caregivers have formed support groups throughout the province to provide a forum for discussion of concerns. Come to the Health Fair on October 4 to learn more about them.

Multiple sclerosis is a disease of the central nervous system which interrupts the brain's ability to control walking, talking, seeing and other important functions. It causes extreme weakness, shaking of hands, loss of balance, numbness or loss of co-ordination. Recreation such as swimming, educational sessions, and counselling, plus the loan of specialized equipment, are provided by the Multiple Sclerosis Society, which will be at the Health Fair on October 4.

Parkinson's Disease is another disorder of the central nervous system that begins with a slight shaking of the hand or arm. Some experience head shaking as well. Tremor is most common when the patient is at rest or under emotional stress. Some patients have stiff muscles, change in facial expression, loss of balance. Talk to the Parkinson's and Epilepsy Society at the Health Fair. Know the symptoms and find out what help is available.

The Arthritis Society is planning an addition to its treatment centre on Richmond Road in Victoria in an effort to provide their many services to an ever-increasing

number of patients. Come to the Health Fair on October 4 and find out what facilities are available.

The Canadian Diabetic Association, the Canadian Cystic Fibrosis Foundation and the Psoriasis Clinic will also be in attendance with up-to-date information and help.

The Enterostomy Therapy Centre will also be here with important information for enterostomy patients.

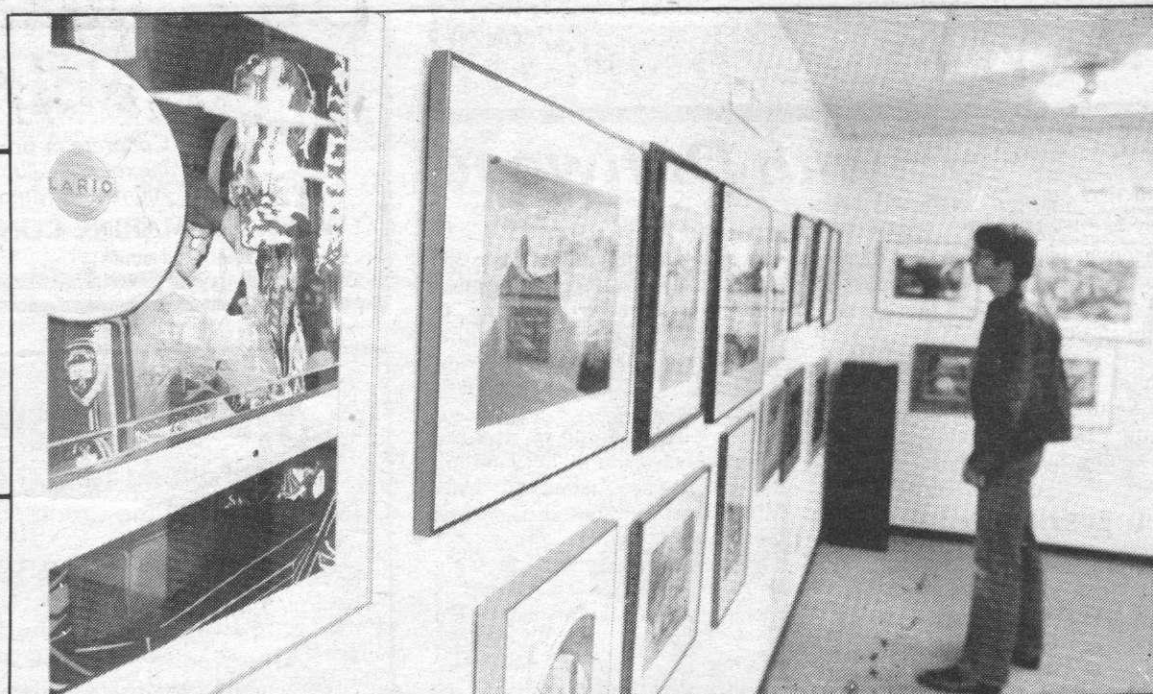

Fringe Festival

Variety of acts, venues offered

Arts festivals, as most islanders know, offer some unique advantages over regularly scheduled events.

From the audience's point of view, the variety of approaches or styles — whether it be theatre, film, music or dance offers the opportunity to gain experience and knowledge and intensive environment. One cannot help but to compare technique and performance qualities and must inevitably become more appreciative of artistic merit.

From the artist's perspective, such festivals encourage contact with peers, thereby permitting cross-fertilization of ideas and information. Festivals also give less-well-known artists an opportunity to gain exposure to cosmopolitan audiences and to perform in the company of more established artists.

The Vancouver Folk Music Festival is typical in this respect and it seems that if well-designed, the combination of audience enthusiasm and the chemistry of artistic activity can result in a truly great festival atmosphere. One must not forget that festivals often offer bargains in admission charges.

As this column reaches you, the Vancouver Fringe Festival will already be in full swing, starting on September 12 and concluding September 21. A copy of the *Georgia Straight* provides the official program for the festival.

Well, you ask, what is the Fringe Festival? Well, he replied, it mostly has to do with theatre, but as Joanna Maratta, festival producer states: "The Fringe is no ordinary festival," there will be "shows to make you laugh, cry, think and keep you craving for more ... classics, new works, multi-media and cross discipline works."

All nine venues are within a 10 or 15 minute walk in the area centered on Main and Broadway.

art seen

Shows may take place at any time of day and many are repeated several times.

For example, you might find yourself at the "Main Dance Place" viewing *Persephone and Hades*, an audience interactive performance of the Greek myth of Persephone's yearly return to the underworld; or at the Anza Club watching *The Beggar or the Dead Dog* and *Tux in Tenenbris* — two obscure one-act plays by Bertolt Brecht; or at the Western Front to see *Asa and the Ogendengbe Drummers*, so familiar to Salt Springers.

The venues include neighbourhood houses and halls, galleries, private clubs and theatres. Perhaps at next year's festival of the arts on Salt Spring, local restaurants, halls, pubs and community facilities could allow flexibility in the quality of space available to varied events.

In a small way Salt Spring will

benefit from the Fringe Festival. On September 25 the Community Arts Council and the Salt Spring Festival Society will bring direct from Vancouver, Great Britain and Germany, the play *Dylan — Portrait of a Poet*.

This play, to be presented once only at Mahon Hall, was written by Cyril Royston and is performed by Ray Jones. It condenses Dylan Thomas' 39 years of hard life on earth into one two-hour-long monologue. Jones has appeared in over 70 plays and musicals and has been involved in productions at the Royal Opera House, Covent Garden and the Queen Elizabeth Hall. He has also performed in several BBC radio plays.

Although not yet formalized, Marc Suess has indicated that another of the 100 different groups performing at the Fringe may find their way to Salt Spring and Off Centre Stage. Stay tuned for details.

In any case if Vancouver is your destination this weekend, have a look at what's going on at the Fringe Festival.

with Driftwood

Twenty-five years ago

- Salt Spring Island's Mouat Park was officially opened by the Hon. Earle C. Westwood, minister of recreation and conservation. The park site, which now falls under the jurisdiction of the province, was donated by Gavin Mouat.
- The school board offered its regrets and said the Centennial Museum site could not be used for anything other than educational endeavours. The site was the centre of discussion concerning the best possible location for a new firehall.
- A feature article in the *Brandon Sun* extolled the virtues of living on Salt Spring Island, but the glowing account, written by a reporter who visited here, has not produced a mass exodus of seekers of the good life.

Twenty years ago

- The provincial election ushered the Social Credit government back into power, but with no additional seat gains. Of the three new seats, added through redistribution, the NDP took two, and the Liberals picked up the third.
- Lady Minto Hospital raised over \$1,300 at a bargain sale, held at Mahon Hall on Salt Spring.
- The voters of the Gulf Islands have been asked to support school board plans to add an industrial education wing and three classrooms to the secondary school, as well as a teacherage for Pender Island. Each item is to be a separate decision for the voters. While the cost of the classrooms has not been determined, the other additions will have a \$67,500 price tag.

Fifteen years ago

- Saturna Island residents rejected the proposed interim bylaws for zoning in the Gulf Islands. The group has asked the minister of municipal affairs for permission to secede from the Capital Regional District. The group claimed Saturna bylaws should be made by Saturna residents. They said they did not want to accept zoning regulations designed by outsiders.
- Centennial memo — Arthur E. Kennedy, the third governor of

Vancouver Island, once said there were but two classes of people here: "...convicts, and those who ought to be convicts."

- The lead editorial takes the Capital Regional District board and Saturna residents to task for acting "rather like children" in the zoning bylaw dispute.

Ten years ago

- The new members of the Islands Trust have been announced and Marc Holmes of Salt Spring Island was named chairman. John Gaines of Saturna and George Boulton of Gabriola were also appointed to the Trust. Holmes, an original member of the Capital Regional District board of directors, was also an original member of the Islands Trust, formed two years ago.
- The Ganges recycling depot ran into problems over the weekend when the volunteer worker did not show up. The depot, at the parking lot at Mouat's store, is used to store recyclable goods such as paper, tin cans and bottles for shipment to Victoria.
- Enrolment in the various Gulf Islands schools totalled 1,029 students, with Salt Spring Elementary School accounting for 458 pupils. Three hundred and forty-five student are enrolled at the secondary school.
- The regional health officer, Dr. A.S. Arneil, expressing concern over facilities on Salt Spring to handle a disaster or epidemic, urged the school board to arrange emergency plans for use of school facilities.
- "I am particularly concerned with planning for outbreaks of contagious disease," the health officer told the board.

Five years ago

- An annual head count of students enrolled in Gulf Islands schools shows an increase of only three pupils over last year's figures. The 1981 numbers show 1,087 enrolments, compared to 1,084 last year.
- Salt Spring Elementary School again leads the way with 375 students, 50 of whom are in grade one. Fernwood School attracted 131 students, including 20 first-graders.

- A crowd estimated at over 300 people attended Burgoyne United Church on Monday afternoon, to pay their last tribute to long-time Salt Spring Island resident Clifford Roy Lee, who died in a logging accident.

Lee, while logging on Isabella Point Road, was hit by a falling tree. He was rushed to Lady Minto Hospital, but died before reaching the facility.

- Lady Minto Hospital is facing a problem with bed space and is seeking approval for expansion plans. Approval would mean the addition of 75 beds to the hospital. To that end the board of directors has adopted a role statement, which is currently in the hands of the Capital Regional District and the British Columbia ministry of health for consideration.

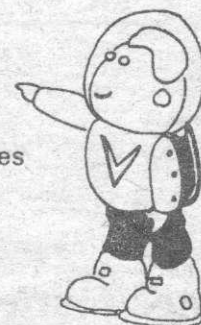
