### Teacher-librarians review books for children

To mark children's book week, currently being observed in the Gulf Islands School District, teacher-librarians at Salt Spring Island schools have drawn up reviews of books suitable for various grade levels. They are as follows:

• *Have You Seen Josephine?*, by Stephane Poulin, Tundra Books, 1986.

Stephane Poulin is the author and illustrator of this delightful Canadian picture book. Bringing his love for Montreal into this work, Poulin sets the story in its east-end streets and alleys.

Young Daniel wants to know where his cat, Josephine, goes every Saturday morning. The reader will be delighted with the hide-and-seek game Josephine plays until she leads Daniel to the surprise ending.

This book is also available in French as *As-tu Vu Josephine?* and has a sequel, *Can You Catch Josephine?*, in which Daniel takes his cat to school.

• *Polar Express*, by Chris Van Allsburg, Houghton Mifflin Co.,

1985.

Winner of the 1986 Caldecott Medal, this unique Christmas story will appeal to children and adults who cherish the faith and mystery implicit in the season. Van Allsburg's illustrations have a photographic depth and detail yet are slightly hazy, to enhance the dreamlike atmosphere.

The story is a unique approach to the traditional visit to Santa at the North Pole, and the ending will have all those who believe in magic smiling conspiratorially at the lack of imagination in others. A softer book than Van Allsburg's other works, which have tended to the bizarre, it well deserves its international acclaim.

• *Homecoming* and *Dacey's Song*, both by Cynthia Voigt, Atheneum, 1981 and 1984.

These two books chronicle the journey of the Tillerman children, abandoned in a parking lot by their mother, to their grandmother's home in Chesapeake Bay.

Led by 13-year-old Dacey, the children are stubborn, indepen-

dent and determined to succeed in their quest for a home. In *Homecoming*, they learn to accept and defend each other's uniqueness and to stand together against the society that threatens to separate them. When they meet their grandmother, they readily accept her strangeness as well and together they forge a home on the old family farm.

*Dacey's Song*, winner of the 1985 Newberry Medal, takes the Tillerman story a step further. Secure in their new home, the children now have to learn to reach out to other people. Gram has learned some bitter lessons and it is her experience which teaches Dacey, for whom it is most hard, that to love someone means letting them go as well.

Both of these books make for challenging and insightful reading for upper intermediate students.

• *Underground to Canada*, by Barbara Smucker.

Twelve-year-old Julilly and her crippled friend, Liza, escape from slavery on a Mississippi planta-

tion. They go disguised as boys, hiding by day and following the North Star at night. Along the way, brave black and white people hide them at 'stations' of the Underground Railway — a 'railway' whose destination is Canada and freedom.

The novel is at once exciting and thought-provoking, dealing as it does with people's cruelty to people. Recommended for grades six to nine.

• *Red Sky at Morning*, by Richard Bradford.

A wonderful tale of teenage friendship and growing up — and hilarious to boot. The time is the Second World War and Joshua Arnold's father has joined the Navy. Josh and his mother move to their summer home in Corazon Sagrado, New Mexico, a place distant not only in miles but in culture from their home in the Old South.

There is a bitter-sweet quality to the book, the humour balanced

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## " DON'T GET SOAKED BY THE POOL!!"

### What the Pool Society has said:

Annual Revenues are estimated at \$182,500. Of this \$122,500 per year is estimated revenue from swimming based on 70,000 admissions per year at \$1.75 each person.

Total annual cost of the facility:  
 Net Operating Cost.....\$127,500.  
 CRD Cushion.....\$ 12,500.  
 Debt Repayment.....\$121,000.  
 Total Cost to Taxpayers..\$261,000.

Grand Forks and Sparwood each have leisure pools that are financially sound.

### What This Means To You:

(calculations use Pool Society figures only.)

This requires 208 Swimmers per day, 337 days per year. (closed 28 days per year for holidays & maintenance)

This translates to \$774. per day (337 days a year)

Taxpayer subsidy for each swimmer based on;

100 swimmers per day = \$7.74  
 208 swimmers per day = \$3.72

Grand Forks sold a slag pile for \$800,000. and put the \$800,000. towards the construction costs of the pool. We don't have a slag pile.

Sparwood recieved a gift of \$1 Million from Weststar Coal, and \$1.9 Million in Federal, Provincial and Regional grants. We don't have a coal company and we only anticipate \$500,000 in grants.



### POINTS TO CONSIDER

- \* If the Pool Society does not receive the expected \$400,000 grant and \$100,000 in donations and has to borrow another \$500,000, then the cost per thousand to the taxpayer will be about \$1.15 not \$0.78.
- \* The Parks & Recreation Commission's next TOTAL annual operating budget is expected to be approximately \$125,000. The estimated annual operating cost of the pool is \$261,000. Does it seem disproportionate to you that the annual operating budget for ONE facility is more than twice as much as the annual operating budget for all existing recreational facilities? Would it not be wiser to spend the money to better maintain or expand or upgrade present facilities?
- \* The Pool is estimated to require 6240 gallons of water per day. Many islanders are already concerned about our potable water supply. Can we afford to commit 6240 gallons per day to a swimming pool?

by Josh's acceptance of adult responsibility. Recommended for grades 11 and 12.

• *Dance Me Outside*, by W.P. Kinsella.

Now something of a Canadian classic, this collection of wry, irreverent, tragic and funny stories examines the lives of modern-day Indians on an Alberta reservation. The reader comes away with a new perspective on Indian and white cultures, the latter being revealed as more odd and curious than we might first believe. Recommended for grades 11 and 12.

• *Everyone Knows What A Dragon Looks Like*, by Jay Williams.

When the councillors of the city of Wu pray to the Great Cloud Dragon to save their city from the wild horsemen of the north, each of them is certain that he will recognize the dragon when it arrives.

Naturally, then, when an old, fat and bald man arrives to announce that *he* is the dragon, the councillors are annoyed. After all, the Mandarin believes the dragon looks like a mandarin, the army captain believes the dragon looks like an army captain, and the merchant believes the dragon looks like a merchant.

Only Han, a poor young gatekeeper, treats the old man politely — and in doing so, not only saves the city but sees the dragon revealed in his awesome power. Recommended for primary grades.


• *The Indian in the Cupboard/The Return of the Indian*, by Lynne Banks Reid.

Omri places the plastic Indian in the old medicine cabinet and turns the key, unaware that a magical transformation is about to occur. The toy figure comes to life. Omri is about to learn the burden and the blessing of caring for another person's life.

Little Bear, Bright Stars and Boone are the miniature characters brought from their time and place to Omri's London home. Their conflicts and desires lead Omri and his friend, Patrick, into territory they never imagined — and to experiences they will never forget. Recommended for intermediate grades.

• *Keeper of the Isis Light*, by Monica Hughes.

Olwyn has never loved anyone but Guardian on her beautiful planet of Isis. But now, settlers have arrived and she is drawn to a young man her own age, eager to share his dreams. The story of her subsequent experience with human intolerance is ironic, tragic and profoundly moving. Recommended for upper intermediate and high school grades.

• *Pettranella*, by Betty Waterton. Illustrated by Ann Blades.

Little Pettranella moves with her family to a homestead in the Canadian wilderness. Her most precious possession is a bag of

flower seeds from her grandmother, who was too old to make the journey.

Near the end of the long trip, an accident to a wheel shaft creates an unexpected delay; in the confusion, Pettranella loses the seeds. However, her disappointment is overcome by the wonders of spring in the new land.

On a trip to visit a neighbour, Pettranella unexpectedly finds a patch of flowers blooming beside the road and realizes that they grew from the seeds given by her grandmother. Her promise has been kept after all. Recommended for kindergarten to grade three.

• *Have You Seen Birds?*, by Joanne Oppenheim. Illustrated by Barbara Reid.

A delightful, lyrical introduction to the birds of every season and locale — spring, summer, autumn or winter; woodland, meadow, farm or sea.

The amazing plasticine-relief illustrations bring these birds to life right on the page — and who would have thought plasticine came in so many colours? Recommended for pre-school to grade two.

• *Naomi's Road*, by Joy Kowaga. Illustrated by Matt Gould.

This is the story of a young Japanese-Canadian girl, Naomi Nakane, and her experiences growing up in B.C. during the Second World War.

The resettlement of Japanese-Canadians into internment camps is examined through Naomi's eyes, as she grows up in the midst of hardship and prejudice. Yet the story is a joyous one as well, celebrating the Japanese culture and the possibilities for friendship.

This book is based on the author's award-winning novel for adults, *Obasan*. Recommended for grades three to five.

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
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# Assault conviction draws jail term

Don't Get Soaked  
by the Pool

**VOTE NO!**

A Ganges man was sentenced to 14 days in jail after being found guilty in provincial court on a charge of assault. Scott Fraser will also pay a \$100 fine.

The 23-year-old pleaded not guilty to assaulting Allan Coombs on May 30 at the close of a Grade 12 dance held at Fulford Hall.

Coombs testified that he was a chaperone at the dance whose job was to eject 'rowdies' and prevent liquor from entering the hall. He said that just after midnight, he encountered three males drinking beer outside the hall. One of the three he identified in court as Fraser.

Coombs told the court the three males attempted to push past him and enter the hall, and that they refused to leave or to give up the beer in their possession.

One of the last things he remembers about the incident, Coombs said, was reaching for Fraser's beer. He said he received a sharp blow to the temple and fell against the door. On regaining consciousness, he recalled, someone was on top of him, striking his head. He had blood in one eye and was unable to identify the assailant.

Coombs received three stitches to a cut above his left eye and his clothes were soaked with beer, court was told.

Crown Counsel Derek Lister said the evidence suggested Coombs was struck by a beer bottle. Witness Gerald Kurz latter added substantiation, testifying that he saw Coombs' assailant holding a beer bottle in an unusual manner — grasping it at the top instead of around the body.

John Speed, the third witness for the Crown, identified Fraser as the person on top of Coombs. Speed, who helped to separate the two, said Fraser removed himself readily and without force.

Speaking in his own defence, Fraser said he was leaving the dance when he met two friends outside and accepted a beer they offered. He had not been drinking previously, he said.

Fraser testified that Coombs told the three to leave and, when they wouldn't, grabbed his shirt, tore it and tried to haul the accused towards the building. Fraser said he struck twice but denied using a beer bottle, maintaining that he handed it to David Cates, a friend.

Under cross-examination by Lister, Fraser admitted his two friends had been harassing people as they left the dance.

Fraser then called Cates to the stand. The witness supported Fraser's account of the events, including the passing of the beer bottle.

Cates also denied making remarks to people leaving the building, which Lister suggested

in his summation left Cates' credibility in question. He said the exchange of the beer bottle was a concocted story.

In handing down his verdict,

Judge R.E. Hudson said he was satisfied with the evidence given by Coombs. Whether he had been hit by a bottle or not, the judge said, the blows struck were

unjustified.

In passing sentence, Judge Hudson ruled that the 14-day jail term would be served intermittently on weekends.

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**Reform movement convention leaves bitter taste**

WINNIPEG — A reform movement that held considerable promise for Western Canadians — in that it was designed to take the West into Confederation — drew 300 people to Winnipeg in late October. But today, many of the delegates who attended the founding convention of the Reform Party of Canada are left with unhappy memories, bitter disappointment and serious questions about the future.

For the campaign team of Reform Party leadership contender Stan Roberts of Vancouver, the affair came to an end when the integrity of not only Roberts but party co-founder Dr. Francis Winspear was brought into question. For most delegates, Roberts' campaign ended when he officially withdrew from the leadership race on Sunday, November 1, the final day of the conference.

It was not, as other media sources have hinted, a case of grapes gone sour. It was the realization by Roberts' supporters that this new party, whose followers had placed such a high value on integrity, was no different and could be no different from any other.

We were, to put it bluntly, ex-

ceedingly naive. But our hopes for offering a viable political alternative to Western voters were strong. Our vision of a better Canada was clear. Perhaps our mistake was a failure to recall that power corrupts.

Today, questions remain about the finances of the party's founding organization, the Reform Association of Canada. There were no financial statements presented at the convention. But there was a story of gross discrepancies in the spending by the group's provincial offices, with the one in Edmonton leading the way at more than \$10,000 a month. The Vancouver office, meanwhile, cost about one-fifth of that to operate.

Not only did the finances appear irregular, but Roberts' leadership opponent, Preston Manning, was given extra opportunities to address delegates more than once — opportunities which he used to advantage in his leadership bid. The Manning team obviously had a hand in drawing up the agenda.

The integrity issue surfaced after delegate registration was closed without notice on the convention's second day. The printed agenda noted that regi-

stration would open on both the first and second days but no reference was made to it on the third day. That was taken by many would-be delegates to mean that the desk would close late in the afternoon of the second day. When it was announced before midday that only delegates who had pre-registered would be allowed a vote, Roberts and his team discovered that the rules were being written as the meeting proceeded. And whoever was writing the rules was not working on Roberts' behalf.

When Francis Winspear presented a motion to the convention that would have allowed late registration, it was read by many delegates as an attempt by Roberts and his team to stack the meeting for the leadership vote. It was pointed out that delegate registration was supposed to have taken place at organized constituency meetings. While that may have happened in a handful of ridings, most notably in Alberta, most delegates were there because they shared a concern for the west's future, not because they were duly elected by Western voters. If the convention had had to rely on organized delegate selection in each of the West's 80

ridings, there would have been no convention. So Winspear's motion was rejected and the slurs on integrity began.

It is doubtful that Stan Roberts' withdrawal from the leadership contest will have much effect on the new party's future. Early in the convention it became apparent that its policies and goals would have a fundamentalist, right-wing flavour. Indeed, among the policies supported by many Winnipeg delegates were support for capital punishment and the halting of any further bilingualism in the West. It is highly unlikely that such policies would endear the party to the majority of Western Canadians. Hence, it is also unlikely that Preston Manning's goal of winning 40 seats in the next federal election could ever be realized.

Winning those 40 ridings — and thereby obtaining the balance of power in Ottawa — would not have been impossible had the new party attracted the moderate support that could have steered it down the centre of the political road.

The concept of a new Western party began with a meeting in Edmonton of Roberts and Winspear. Their decision one year

ago to proceed with plans to lay the foundations of such a party was born of the frustration and disenchantment many Westerners feel over the current federal system. It was fueled by the belief that a system of representation that took regional concerns into consideration would spell a greater role for the West in Confederation. For most Reformers, a Triple-E Senate was the answer to representational imbalance.

To those Winnipeg delegates who remain firm party supporters, an effective Senate remains a priority. But to those who became disillusioned early, its attainment now seems unlikely.

The Reform Party earned its credibility at a conference in Vancouver last May. Representatives from all over Western Canada met to determine what the West required and how those requirements could be met. Delegates examined several options and eventually chose to form a party. Another choice was to form a lobby group that would present concerns to the existing political parties.

For those who saw the party's credibility lost in Winnipeg, the second choice may be the only viable one left.

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

Trees are a crop, just like wheat or corn, except that on the B.C. Coast they take 50 to 120 years to mature instead of a few months. Today, MB continues to manage the forests to ensure that we will never run out of trees.



"The trees we are planting and caring for will not mature in my lifetime," says Gabrielle Sartisohn, an MB Forester in the Port McNeill Division. "It gives me great satisfaction to know the next generation will benefit from the forest resource as much as we do today."

**2 We asked:** The term "NSR" refers to land that has been logged and not sufficiently restocked with seedlings through planting or natural regeneration.

About what proportion of the land that MacMillan Bloedel operates on do you think is "NSR"?

**B.C.'s opinion:** 42% of MB land is N.S.R.

**What we're doing about it:** Virtually all MB land is reforested within a planned and prescribed period of time, within an average of two to three years after harvest. On occasion, it takes longer where natural seeding is expected and there are no brush problems. At any given time about three per cent of MB productive forestland, although classified as NSR, is in the process of being restocked. However, people driving by often don't notice that we've established a new forest because it takes about five years to see the "greening up." The next time you drive by an MB clear-cut, we invite you to stop and see if in fact there are seedlings growing. If you don't see any, ask us about it.



**3 We asked:** "Would you say MacMillan Bloedel commits more or less funds to research and planning compared with other forest companies?"

**Raeside production earns top marks**

*Rose Red and Snow White*: A presentation by the Salt Spring Players. Words and music by Joan Raeside. Produced and directed by Sharie Lomas.

Tired of watching sex and violence, not to mention violent sex? Jaded by scenes of sadism, masochism and sado-masochism? Bored with portrayals of satanism, witchcraft, vampirism and werewolfery?

You are? Then the current Salt Spring Players production of Joan Raeside's sixth musical is for you — or rather, it was, because it has now finished its run, to full houses. No doubt Mme. Raeside's musical fantasy will be along presently, and you will now make a note to get tickets before they're all sold out.

*Rose Red and Snow White* was adapted from the story by the Grimm Brothers, and we all know that they, as well as Hans Christian Andersen, sometimes featured bad persons, like Rumpelstiltskin and the Wicked Queen, who kept maidens locked up, or dispensed poisoned apples. They usually came to a bad end.

But let me reassure you about this version; it is totally upbeat, suitable for not only the most tender-hearted child, but even for innocent parents and grandparents.

I will thumbnail the plot for you. *Rose Red and Snow White* are highly decorative children who live in the woods with their equally decorative mother. Their happiness is not complete, because Father has been away for a year — he went off to the mountains to find enough gold so that they could live in comfort — but they carry on, selling milk and eggs from their cow and chickens (in that order, of course).

Also in the woods is a band of three dwarfs, who are apprenticed to Garndorff, a bearded nogoodnik who is teaching them villainy. They think up such vile deeds as hiding squirrels' nuts and agitating young birds when the mother is away, but when they spy *Rose Red and Snow White* gathering wood in the forest, they get even nastier. They turn the chicken and the cow loose, and when the children venture deeper

into the woods looking for them, they confuse them until they are thoroughly lost. The rascals, whose domestic skills are nil, are hoping to make the girls keep house for them.

A bear is also present, whose den, it is known, is full of gold. The dwarfs, after getting the girls, plan to follow him home and steal the gold. Not only will they be rich, but they'll get regular meals.

Well! At first crime pays — the children are netted by Garndorff — but the bear arrives and frees them, whereupon we learn that it is really Father, who had been put under a bear-spell by Garndorff, who now returns to gloat over his captives. But, with the help of a very fetching chorus of squirrels and rabbits, he is overpowered, and it is decided to punish him.

An axe is raised. We in the audience shudder — surely they

won't ... ? No they don't. Only Garndorff's beard is cut off, but since he was very proud of it, it is a fitting punishment. We are all relieved (especially Garndorff).

All rejoice as the family is reunited. The dwarfs and their master give up their lives of crime, and so forgiving are *Rose Red and Snow White* that they agree to visit them regularly to teach them cooking, dishwashing and the elements of deportment. After this happiest of endings we filed out into the pouring rain as if it were a sunny day.

Since it was all so beautifully done — performance, scenery, lighting, everything — I would be reluctant to single out any of the Players. So, on behalf of the audiences, I will applaud all of them in the person of Joan Raeside, the composer-lyricist-pianist.



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

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# Prime bulb planting season ends in three weeks

At this time of year the soil is still warm enough to promote root callousing and development, enabling the plants to settle in and root out well in advance of any moisture stresses that will come next summer. Amazingly, fall-planted fruit trees, shade trees and roses will have put out up to four inches of fresh new roots by mid-April, all in readiness to procure and serve up moisture and nutrients for the expanding buds.

For all your bulbs (except tulips), the next three weeks are all that's left of the prime bulb planting time, as those daffodils, narcissi, etc., out in the garden have already put out two to three inches of root growth. Prepare the soil deeply, and don't forget the bonemeal or bulb food.

When planting your trees and shrubs, loosen the soil over a wide area. But there is no sense in digging deeply into inhospitable clays or hardpan, as roots that grow into the excavated "well" will only suffer from flooding and subsequent rotting over the course of the winter. Spade or fork to the depth that will be required to place the roots in naturally, with no kinked, spiralled, recurved or balled-up roots.

Try to have the tips pointing downward, and spread, in a balanced pattern to give long-term stability to the plant. Prune back any broken, split or damaged roots, mix in at least 3/4 lb. of bonemeal or rock phosphate, and water the plant well, to settle the soil and ensure good root contact.

Unless you are planting in a very windy location, or the roots are severely reduced, I would not recommend staking or tying, as a bit of "wind-rocking" stimulates a stronger stem and root system. If still warranted, use a sturdy low stake, driven in before planting, and fasten the tree approximately two feet above the ground level, using wire and a rubber hose protector or "T" lock tree ties. One

final consideration is deer protection, if needed.

Peach trees will need some attention this month. A dormant spraying with fixed copper, lime-sulphur-dormant oil, or Ferbam will help to control Peace Leaf Curl. This fungal disease, if left unchecked, causes leaves to thicken, curl and discolour, often becoming so useless to the plant, that they are dropped. This loss in leaf area, coupled with the need to make a second, healthy set of foliage, is exhausting for young plants and often kills them. For best results, spray your peach trees now with fixed copper and again in February with lime-sulphur-dormant oil.

Spraying apples, cherries, and

most pears as well as the peach trees with fixed copper will also help to control a whole host of fungal and bacterial diseases, including bacterial gummosis on cherry trees as well as ornamental cherries and peach trees, coryneum blight on all Prunus species and cultivated varieties, as well as European canker on apples. Follow label directions carefully, exercise caution when spraying, and always wear protective

clothing.

Another important practice in controlling diseases in your garden is proper sanitation. Regular, thorough cleanup of all diseased or infected leaves and stems will reduce the chances of fungal spread.

This mild weather has left many of our gardens untouched by frost, and thus we still have the opportunity to save those tender geraniums, fuchsias, etc. — if you haven't already done so. Before it starts to freeze up, you should also drain and winterize your outdoor water lines, hoses, sprinklers, irrigation systems, and concrete bird baths.

Any time from now through to spring is a good time for applying lime to lawns and gardens where

needed. For acid-soil lovers such as rhododendrons, azaleas and camellias, this is a good month for topdressing with peat moss, barkmulch and leaf mold. Seaweed and manures can also be top-dressed on beds and around plants serving both as a frost-protective mulch and, by spring, a good source of nutrients and organic humus.

If you want another good source of organic matter for your garden, turn to your garden pool. The muck and debris from the season's growth should be raked or shovelled out to ensure that the water stays clean and safe for the fish over the winter months ahead.

Well that about covers things for now — until next week, happy gardening.

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

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# Aquaculture freeze lifted in Islands Trust area

The provincial government has lifted its moratorium on new fish farm licences in the Islands Trust region.

The freeze was removed in early November following release of a review grading all potential fish farm sites in the region.

The review, prepared for the provincial ministry of forests and lands with input from various interest groups, classifies shoreline areas according to the degree of aquaculture each can support. It also adds to the regular approval process a number of conditions applicants must meet before a fish farm can proceed in some areas.

The aquaculture development areas are defined as follows:

- **NORMAL** — normal application procedures will apply. Development restrictions include a three-kilometre spacing guideline between sites, and approval of plans by key federal and provincial government agencies.

Gulf Islands sites identified as *Conditional* include a long stretch

of northeastern Galiano Island, much of the northeast coast of Samuel Island, short strips on the northeast and south coasts of Saturna Island, and two pockets on the east coast of North Pender Island.

- **LIMITED** — "enhanced" referral procedures will apply. These areas have been identified by user groups — including recreational and industrial concerns —

as suitable for aquaculture provided conflicting interests are reconciled by the applicant.

Gulf Islands sites identified as *Limited* include much of the southwestern portion of Salt Spring Island south of Sansum Narrows, all but the western shore of Prevost Island, most of the southern coast of Saturna Island, a portion of the northwest shore of North Pender Island,

the northwest tip of Mayne Island, and portions of the western side of Galiano Island.

- **NO OPPORTUNITY** — no applications for aquaculture developments will be accepted for sites in these areas. Most of the Gulf Islands' shoreline is classified as *No Opportunity*.

In categorizing sites in the region, the ministry says that while its guidelines were de-

signed with fish farms in mind, "other types of aquaculture have the potential for similar conflicts with other users. Consequently, the study map and guidelines may be applied to aquaculture proposals involving floating structures and improvements."

Copies of the study map and guidelines are available from the lands and forests ministry's Vancouver Island regional office at 851 Yates Street in Victoria.

## Ministry: no new applications in Islands

Although a moratorium on new fish farms has been lifted in the Gulf Islands for approximately two weeks, the provincial government reports no interest in applications for sites in the region.

John Bones, manager of the forests and lands ministry's Vancouver Island office, said his staff has received no new site bids since the freeze ended.

"I guess the word is out — this is not an easy area to be established in," he said, indicating that fish farm interests have

been looking to locate elsewhere since the Gulf Islands became known as a region where their plans would face resistance from other foreshore users.

Bones said his staff is now explaining the region's new aquaculture guidelines to "one or two" applicants whose bids were frozen pending the lifting of the moratorium.

"We've told them that unless they can get the objections of other groups overturned, they will have no opportunity to establish fish farms here."

## MacMillan-Bloedel reopens bidding for company's Salt Spring property

MacMillan-Bloedel is inviting new bids for its Salt Spring Island properties.

The forest company had been considering an offer for its 4,800 acres of island land but was unable to complete a deal before a set date. Since then, MB has contacted other parties interested in the properties and invited them to submit offers.

At the same time, the company said last week, the original bidder has been invited to submit another offer.

"I've told those parties that I am now free to accept new offers," MB's Gary Kadatz said Saturday.

Kadatz said "other parties" expressed interest in the company's Salt Spring properties while MB was negotiating with the first bidder. When a deal failed to materialize, the company was free to turn to other prospective buyers.

"The other buyers have not opened negotiations yet, but they've expressed interest in making an offer," Kadatz said. "I've told them to make me an offer."

MB's Salt Spring properties cover seven blocks in the central and southern portions of the island. They have been up for sale since mid-1985, when the company decided the land was too scattered for effective forest management.

MB has entertained several offers and while none has proved acceptable, Kadatz said the market is changing. "One thing that has changed (since 1985) is the market outlook — there's more interest in the lands now than there was before."

The properties, which MB says will only be sold as one unit, held a \$5 million asking price when they were first placed on the market. Indications are bids re-

ceived to date have been for about \$3.5 million.

Earlier this year, when there were no offers in for the land, MB struck a committee of six local residents to assess the Salt Spring properties and recommend land-use options.

The move was considered a prelude to rezoning applications which would cluster housing densities on one parcel and possibly leave the remainder as community woodlot or recreational land.

In late August, the six-member committee submitted its interim report to MB. Kadatz said Saturday he is "pretty well marking time with the report" pending sale negotiations.



## Chambers hold joint discussion

Members of Chambers of Commerce from four Gulf Islands met recently on Galiano to discuss issues of common concern.

Gary Greico, who attended from Salt Spring, said the meeting was designed as a way for separate Chambers of Commerce to share expertise and information on matters of mutual interest.

Among the topics discussed at the meeting, Greico said, were memberships, dues, the region's ferry transportation system and its impact on the economy, and tourism.

Surprisingly enough, he added, the representatives of the various chambers found that they share the same problems and challenges.

"We just discussed our mutual concerns and looked at ways we could share resources," Greico said. However, he added that the meeting should not be perceived as the establishment of a joint chamber covering the entire Gulf Islands.

"No one wants an amalgamation or even a structured group."



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




