Donation boxes will be replaced

Donation boxes for local cancer victim Darlene Kopp will reappear in Salt Spring business locations this week.

The donation boxes, which along with the efforts of several local organizations raised more than \$8,600 for Kopp's cancer treatments, were removed last month pending the 35-year-old's next move.

Kopp recently returned from a second visit to the Mayo Clinic. While it was expected Kopp would undergo internal treatment for a bronchial tumour, doctors there said external treatment in Victoria had left her slightly improved; they therefore cancelled the treatment.

Tests conducted at the Mayo Clinic did, however, indicate Kopp's cancer has spread to the lymph glands.

Kopp's condition has remained about the same since her first trip to the Mayo Clinic some seven weeks ago. She will be undergoing chemotherapy at the cancer clinic in Victoria.

Donations to the Darlene Kopp Trust Fund can be made at local stores, the Legion or to Dawn Byron at the Bank of Montreal.

Full colour parade kicks off ceremony

A full colour parade, accompanied by marching tunes and followed by a dedication and ribbon-cutting ceremony, marked the opening Saturday of the newly-constructed Royal Canadian Legion Hall at Ganges.

Saturday's ceremonies welcomed a number of off-island dignitaries and drew a substantial crowd to Branch 92's new Blain Road building. The parade arrived from the government buildings at close to 2 pm, and was followed by a moment of silent consideration for those war veterans who have passed on.

The ceremony honoured Bevis Walters as the only World War I

veteran present.

Pacific Command president Derek Eyles paid tribute to the memory of "foresight and generosity" of the late Ted Meaden, who "led to our being here today." Meaden left the Blain Road property to the Legion branch in his will.

A ribbon-cutting ceremony and dedication of the building was followed by day-long festivities and entertainment.

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Phone rates to drop?

If a recent application made by B.C. Tel is approved, Gulf Islanders will spend less money making off-island phone calls.

B.C. Tel filed a proposal with the Canadian Radio-Television and Telecommunications Commission (CRTC) May 6, requesting a reduction of most long distance calls placed within B.C.

With CRTC approval the average cost of long distance phone calls would be reduced by 7.2 per cent for calls within B.C., by 15.6 per cent for calls to Alberta, 11.4

per cent east of Alberta, and by 8.6 per cent for calls to the United States.

The only calls not affected by the rate reduction would be those placed overseas, to Alaska and Hawaii, or to those areas in northern B.C. serviced by NorthwesterTel.

The proposed reductions would come into effect April 1, 1989.

In a prepared statement, B.C. Tel said it believes rates charged for long distance telephone calls are "significantly higher" than their costs.

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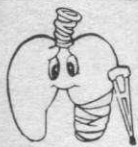
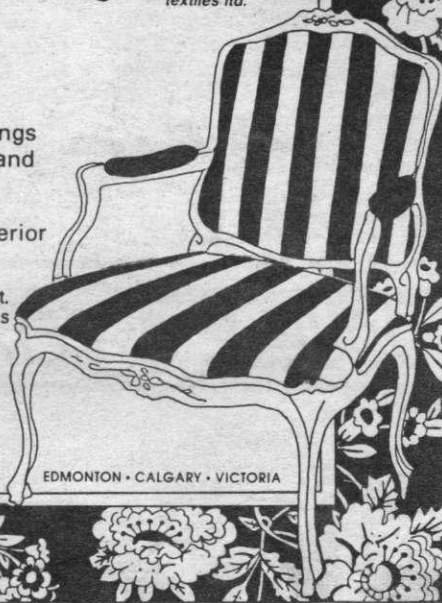
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Horst Klein to pull out of search and rescue

"I've reached the end of the line!" said Horst Klein from his seat at the *Queen of Storm's* galley conference table. It was a sunny day — mid-week — and the 82-foot rescue vessel floated gently at her Otter Bay dock on North Pender Island. "I haven't lost my commitment to search and rescue — I've just run out of personal resources with which to subsidize the activity."

On April 21 Klein appeared before a plenary session of the Search and Rescue Advisory Council meeting in North Vancouver and at that time said he had decided to stop subsidizing search and rescue in British Columbia. "I've decided that, as an individual, I can no longer try and fill the deficiencies in official search and rescue policy or equipment by providing resources from my own pocket."

"For 13 years," continued Klein, "I've pursued the cause of search and rescue with a single-minded devotion. I have maintained my home on the water so that I could be instantly available for emergency calls. I equipped this vessel (*Queen of Storm*) with elaborate electronic communications gear which has been monitored on a continuous basis. I provided a fast auxiliary rescue boat so that I could respond to calls both directly from distressed mariners and indirectly via the Rescue Centre."

Within the past 60 days Klein has sold his personal pride and joy — an 18-foot whaler — and has placed the *Queen of Storm* on the market. "Maybe I'll buy a piece of property and build a house on shore ... or I could buy an RV and travel around a bit. I'm not sure at this point. One thing is for sure though — I will have a VHF radio with me!"

"I've always been involved somehow in helping people. During the war — I was only 11 when it started — but later when Germany was being bombed the men were all gone and fighting and I was left with the women and older people. I remember people running for cover in basements and many of them not knowing where to go or what to do. I just took charge and filled the void."

"After the war ended and things started to return to normal I became involved with ADAC — the German Auto Club. There was this volunteer comradeship service. You took a pledge to help people stranded along the roadsides and you would send in the reports to a main office. They would give out awards — bronze, silver and gold — depending on how many people you helped. I was a young guy and had a motorcycle at the time. I was the first one to get all three awards."

When the war ended and the American occupation of Germany was in full swing, Klein worked with the 388th MP Battalion as a driver and translator for the battalion commander. "I was walking down the road one day near the base when he came by in his jeep. He had his driver stop and they hollered to me in English. I got the gist of it and responded. They told me to get in and that was that."

"I knew I wanted to come over to North America and travel to the States but the red tape for immigration was so great I ended up coming to Canada," continued Klein, "where I began work as an electrician and plumber. And that is what I do today — when I'm not out with search and rescue."

"I've resolved more incidents and saved more lives than any other individual in Canada," says Klein, "and in the process I have greatly influenced the course of search and rescue. But, in the process I've been criticized, ridiculed, persecuted, threatened and generally abused by the system. Yes, I've been outspoken, but many of the improvements you see today have come as a direct result of my outspokenness."

That outspokenness and Klein's dogged determination to pursue a cause at all cost have tossed the well known Gulf Island mariner into the centre of several storms currently swirling over B.C. waters.

The largest of the storms centres around the Pender Island-based B.C. Lifeboat Society. The society was formed in November of 1981 as a private non-profit rescue support group. "The Coast Guard was understaffed at that time," says Klein, "and there was a Coast Guard auxiliary which we were a

part of. But there were those of us living and working on the water who felt that a private volunteer group similar to those set up in the U.K. could do a better job. And so we set up the BCLS."

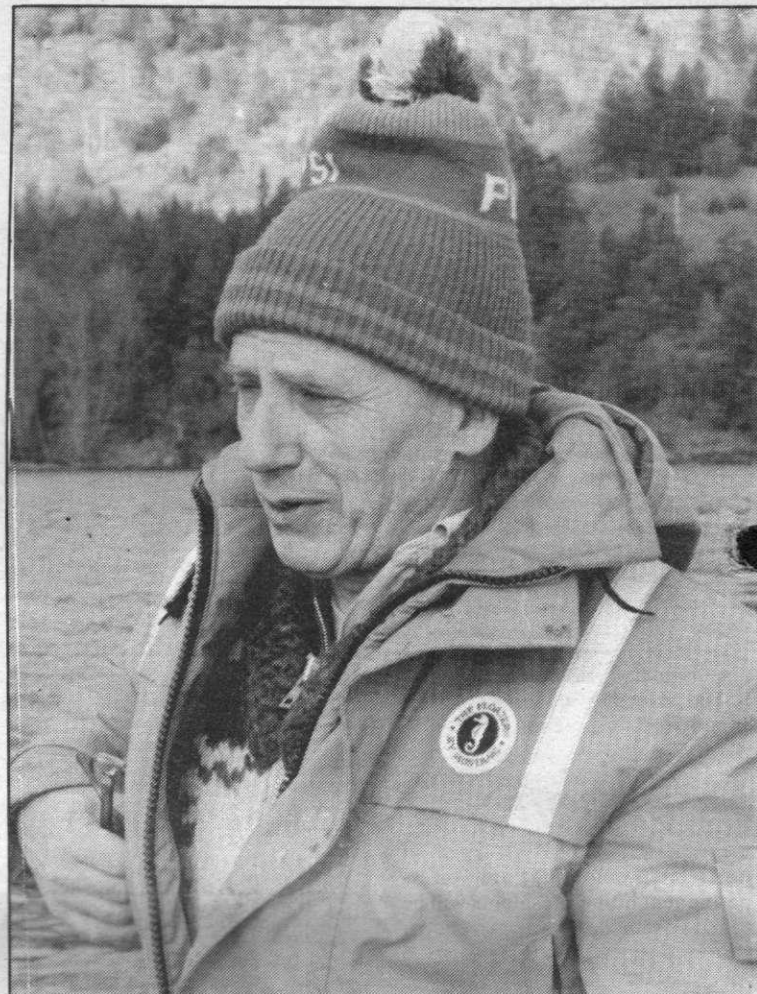
It was Klein's vision that the society grow to the point where there would be a string of volunteer-staffed lifeboat stations up and down the B. C. coast with members who were able to respond to distress calls at any hour of the day or night in a matter of minutes. By 1987 there were stations in North Vancouver, Prince Rupert and Gibsons plus the main station at Otter Bay on North Pender.

"We knew from the outset that the Prince Rupert group was pretty independent and were prepared to accept the fact but you have to have a common purpose," says Klein. "It got to the point where Prince Rupert was doing its own thing and then the station on the North Shore began doing its own thing. No one was listening to the society's board of directors."

In April Finance Minister Mel Couvelier requested an investigation of the BCLS under section 85/1 of the Society Act. It comes on the heels of a shoving match between Klein and the North Shore group which has seen the latter make a bid to wrest control of the BCLS from Klein.

"We discovered toward the end of 1987," says Klein, "that the North Shore group had formed a second society called the North Shore Lifeboat Society and were operating it on their own but using equipment and fund-raising materials that belonged to BCLS. Money had been raised by the BCLS and a 20-foot Whaler purchased for use on the North Shore but the boat was out of the water and there were fuel bills owing on it and the insurance had lapsed. We (BCLS) were not quite sure what was going on. The man who was owed money for the fuel had the vessel impounded and turned over to a bailiff."

Klein subsequently travelled to West Vancouver and paid off the debts owing on the boat and the bailiff released the vessel to Klein as president of the BCLS. And it was at that point that West Vancouver-Howe Sound MLA John Reynolds became involved in an effort to keep the vessel in West Vancouver and asked Couvelier to

order an investigation.

"I haven't lost my commitment to search and rescue," says Klein. "I have just run out of personal resources with which to subsidize the activity. So, from now on I will be responding to rescue calls if public support keeps the British Columbia Lifeboat Society afloat. But I won't be using my own money for this task. Instead, I will be using my scarce personal resources to try and meet the massive debt which Revenue Canada claims I owe."

And that is the second storm front facing Horst Klein. "The income tax people are telling me

that the personal money I've spent on search and rescue is not deductible. They have the notion that what I've been doing out here is just a hobby and they want me to pay \$20,000 in additional tax."

"I can't afford this. I'm not independently wealthy. I'm not even a public servant on a tax-supported salary and pension. I'm just a small businessman who was willing to devote his time and energy to search and rescue and was naive enough to think that the government might view that as something to be praised rather than something to be penalized."

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One fire number will ring in eight island homes

NORTH GALIANO — With the arrival of longer days and warmer weather the need for extra care with fire becomes extremely important. Outdoor fires are now prohibited, although burning permits may still be obtained for small fires in known conditions. These may be obtained from North Galiano Volunteer Fire Chief Ted Waterman, or his second in command, Dale Lyon. North Galiano permits must be obtained from one of these two gentlemen. It is no longer possible to obtain one in South Galiano for use here.

Our firemen announce another change and a very important one. In place of the old chain-phone system of reporting fires things will henceforth be much simpler. To report a fire, residents simply dial 539-2122 and the phone will ring in eight different south Galiano homes. Those answering will gather information about the location, type and seriousness of the fire and immediately pass on the alert to the north Galiano contacts. They will also alert the forestry department if it is thought necessary.

Residents are asked to note the new number and to change it on their phone label and phone directory. New phone labels will be distributed as soon as possible.

The North Galiano firemen plan to try out their new fire siren at noon on Sunday, May 29 and will install the siren temporarily at the fire hall for this test. They hope to check its effectiveness from this location and will later try it in other areas before deciding on its permanent home. Residents will be asked to listen for the siren on the 29th and report what they hear (or don't hear) to the firemen.

Fire practices are now held every Monday evening at 7 pm at the firehall. The fellows feel the continuity gained through meeting weekly, rather than bi-weekly, is worth the extra time spent.

Stitches and the Expert

The St. Margaret's Needle Guild held its last regular meeting for the season this week and members have their homework ready for the summer. The group has on hand two completed baby quilts and seven more on the way. In addition, many of the members have personal projects they are working on. Another job under way at the hall is new 12-foot front stairs and a railing for the deck. An open canopy of cedar (egg-crating) is to be constructed over the deck and it is hoped it will be completed in time for July 1. In case of rain on Jamboree Day it will then be possible to cover the canopy with a tarp and so give some protection to events centred in that area. 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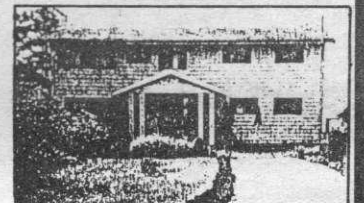
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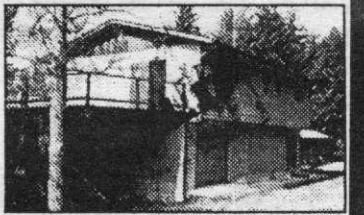
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Exchange brings Lakehill students on return visit

South: Spades - K, J, x, x, x, x; Hearts - A, Q, x, x; Diamonds - none; Clubs - K, Q, x, x. West: Spades - none; Hearts - x, x, x, x, x; Diamonds - A, K, J; Clubs - x, x, x, x, x. North: Spades - A, Q, 10, x, x; Hearts - K, J, 10, x; Diamonds - none; Clubs - A, J, 10, x. East: Spades - x, x, x; Hearts - none; Diamonds - Q, 10, x, x, x, x, x, x, x; Clubs - none.

This combination of cards allows for an extraordinary range of results from seven Diamonds doubled and redoubled made by East, to seven Spades made by North. Seven Spades by South fails against good defence and seven No Trumps by West went down 13. The historical characters playing these hands bore a striking and non-coincidental resemblance to some of the bridge players present.

Presentations were made to Audrey Cook for her work as convener and director and to the Von Hausmanns as scorers-in-chief. The prize for best attendance went to Bill Cook, despite a strong protest by Donald Macdonald who insinuated that bribery,

coercion, psychological pressure, influence-peddling and patronage had been used to achieve this result. He was reprimanded for introducing politics into what should have been a purely social occasion.

Local pioneer, activist dies at South Pender

"To those who are operating marinas, hotels, shopping centres and beer parlours; tearing down trees and tearing up land; progress is represented by financial success, and in fact this sort of development has come to mean progress. And in the process, what is happening to the development of men's minds? As we become more and more involved in mechanical and scientific progress, what is happening to the human personality and character?"

The observations and questions are those of Eve Grey Smith, born on Samuel Island in 1904, the daughter of Winifred Higgs and Ralph Grey.

The local pioneer and activist died Sunday at her home on South Pender Island following a lengthy illness that saw her confined to her bed for almost two years.

Confined is a poor choice of words, though, for there was no way to confine the spirit of Eve Smith, which resided in a small cabin with large windows overlooking Drummond Bay, just north and west of South Pender's Gowlland Point. The cabin was home since 1952 and housed scrapbooks and pictures and memories piled high and stuck to walls, testimony to a life of crusading and caring.

Writing in the *Gulf Islands Patchwork*, Eve observed, "...when there is all this talk of progress and development we should bear in mind that where business excess and expansion is achieved at the expense of the beauty of the countryside, there is in no sense progress. It represents the dissolution of the best values we have. There is an urgency in the

need for us to recognize the interrelation of all living things."

The memory of Eve Grey Smith will survive on South Pender in the hearts of cousins Jiggs Pender Christy, Ann Pender Henshaw, Art Pender, David Spalding and brother-in-law and companion John Smith.



Two theatre workshops scheduled

"I come from a teaching background," says Christa Warrick, "and have moved into theatre because of the opportunity it offers to develop and empower people."

"When children first start school we tend to invalidate all they have learned up until that point — telling them right and wrong ways to do things. They do need to learn the way systems work but they also need to learn how to explore that marvellous world inside themselves. And that is one of the reasons I'm so high on improvisation in the theatre," continues Warrick.

Warrick was involved in the recent Pender Island production of *Treasure Island*, operating as an

acting coach and consultant. "I'm extremely excited about a couple of new ideas being tossed about," says Warrick. One concerns the formation of a Gulf Islands Theatre Association that would work together to further productions on all the islands. The second idea would involve the formation of a Gulf Island Theatre Festival that could bolster tourism and local employment.

"The islands are a hot bed for the arts with an extremely large number of writers and artists of every variety."

"One of the things I like best about the islands and Pender in particular is that they are intentional communities in the sense that people for the most part are here by choice — living in an

atmosphere that allows them to explore worlds of new ideas."

Warrick will be conducting two Gulf Island Theatre workshops this month as a prelude to the Vancouver and Victoria Fringe Festivals. The workshops will focus on the Greek drama *Oedipus Rex* and will allow participants to explore the director's and producer's concepts regarding music, poetry, costuming, acting style and movement.

A first workshop will be held on Mayne Island on Saturday afternoon. A second — a three-day workshop — will be held on Pender Island the weekend of May 27, 28 and 29. For more information or to register call Christa Grace-Warrick at 629-6528 or Leigh Milne at 629-3422.

Islanders want Mayne development under control

Approximately 120 people attended the Islands Trust public hearing at Mayne Island on April 23. General response from the audience to three bylaws involving commercial zoning was to keep commercial development under control, and in appropriate locations on the island.

Bylaw 45, to permit a pub adjacent to the Village Bay ferry terminal, was met with a petition from 110 Village Bay residents, of whom 75 signed against the proposal. A counter petition contained 38 names. Members of the audience expressed concern about traffic safety, noise, detrimental effects on nearby property values, and rezoning for quick sale.

In the face of strong opposition, Bylaw 45 was turned down by the Mayne Island Trust Committee. Bylaw 46, to rezone adjoining

property for a restaurant and real estate office, was also rejected. The real estate office in question can be expanded on its present site.

An intense series of presentations requesting compromise or outright denial were heard concerning Bylaw 42, which would rezone a home occupation in a single residential zone to commercial status. In 1986 an amendment to the home occupation section of the Mayne Island zoning bylaw permitted a small food service not exceeding 25 square metres. The business on the property in question, known as The Treasure Chest, has now exceeded these limitations.

Despite the fact that The Treasure Chest, which also included a nursery and gallery, was a highly attractive enterprise, and favoured by many people, members of the audience also expressed concern that a dangerous precedent would be set

if home occupations on residential property were allowed to expand. Property owners should have the security of knowing that their investment was protected by the zoning bylaws, and that no sudden development would occur without public participation. Petitions for and against were also presented.

A compromise solution, permitting expansion under the designation cottage industry, had been sought by the Trust, and was rejected by the owners of The Treasure Chest.

Decision on Bylaw 42 was held in abeyance until May 6. Following a meeting of the Mayne Island Trust Committee in

Victoria on that date, a letter to the owners of The Treasure Chest will be prepared, explaining the committee's position in the hopes

of resolving the situation. The Treasure Chest may continue to operate as a home occupation, if the owners so desire.

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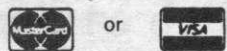

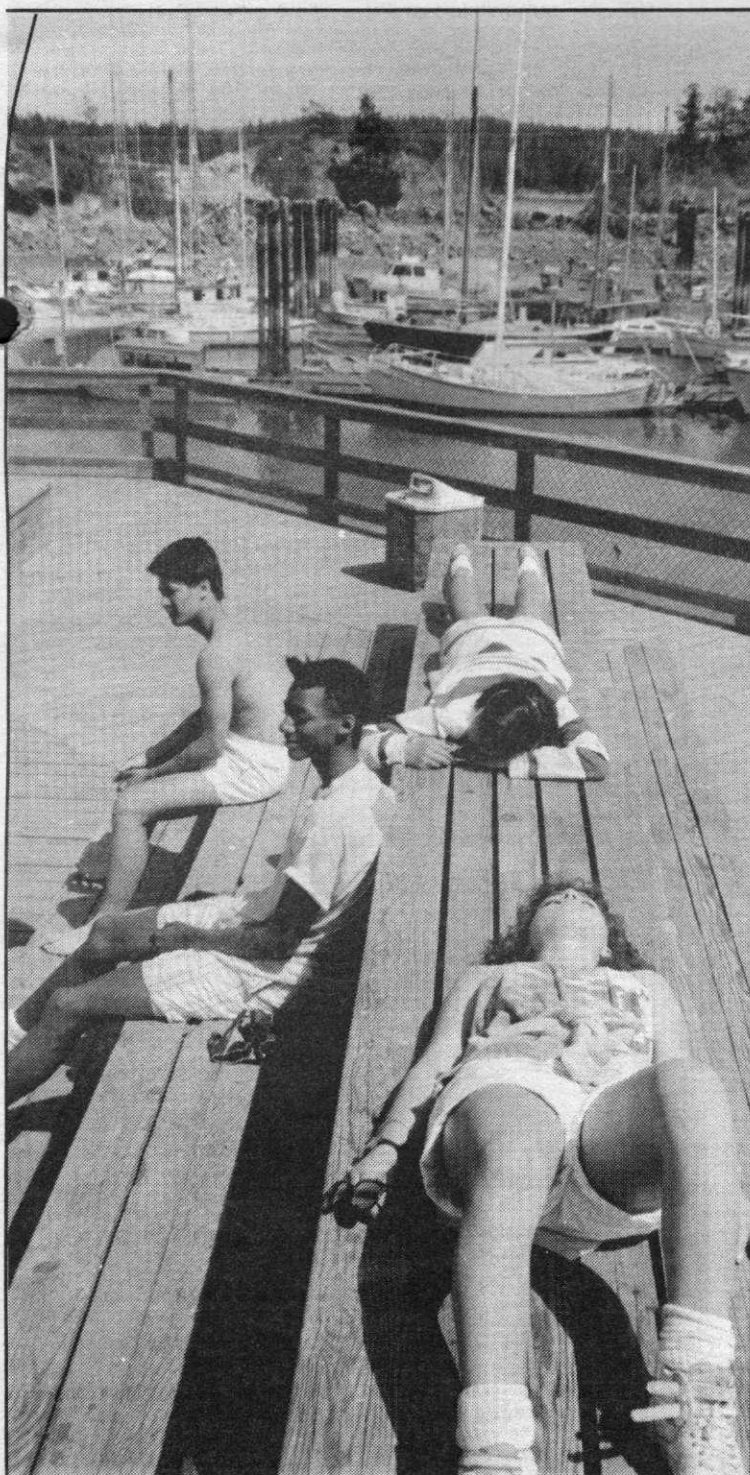

Ganges barber pole is biggest in Canada

It's the biggest barber pole in all of Canada.

It's the pole outside Gary Lundy's barber shop in Ganges.

Carved out of a log and standing 35 feet high, the pole is located next to the Driftwood office at the head of Ganges Harbour.

A rumour that the Lundy pole might be the tallest in the world was dispelled by a quick reference to the Guinness Book of Records. The tallest pole in the world is to be found in New York and it stands 75 feet high. That one, however, is made of steel which leaves it open to some conjecture that the Salt Spring Island pole may still be the tallest wooden barber pole in the whole world.

The pole was carved by Art Hopping of Dogwood Lane on Salt Spring Island.

Customers have asked Lundy who twisted the wood like that, but the pole looks like three trees grew together and were intertwined.

Traditional barber's pole is a pole painted white with a red band running spirally up the pole. Beneath the pole is a gilt knob at the end. That traditional pole dates way back in history to the time when the barber was also the surgeon. The red spiral is the bandage tied around the white arm preparatory to blood-letting. The knob represents the bowl into which the patient was bled.

When the surgeon became a recognized member of the medical profession the barber directed his razors and tools to the cutting of hair and removal of hair. But he kept the familiar pole, probably because more people would seek a barber than would be looking for a surgeon.

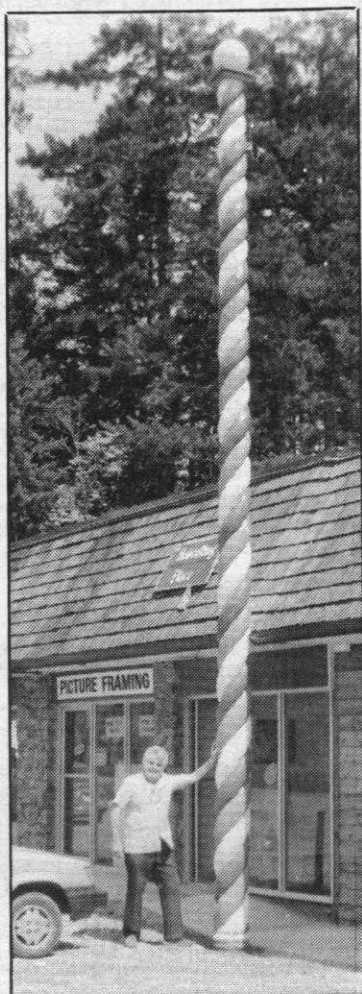
But the haircutting and shaving business was famous for scandal long before the first barber was called upon to make the first incision.

That's where all the news was revealed and a lot of it invented. Even the Roman, stiff-necked and patriot-proud, 2,000 years ago, was aware of the barber shop as the centre of gossip.

The Ganges barber pole missed out on the record height, but the Lundy shop has a second claim to distinction. It may well be the only barber shop in the country where a piano takes pride of place. It is surely the only barber shop in the world with a piano inside and a 35 foot pole outside.

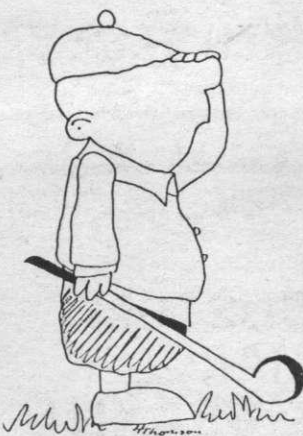
Lundy is l'Un of Les Three and is in demand on the island for his skills as a professional musician. His skills are particularly followed by the Driftwood staff who are regularly entertained as the Lundy piano solos provide music while they work in the same building.

Reporters, meanwhile, are still considering how they might cut a hole in the wall of Lundy's shop so as to stay abreast of local gossip.

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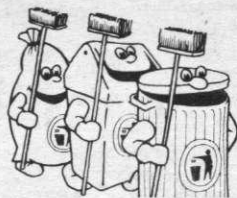
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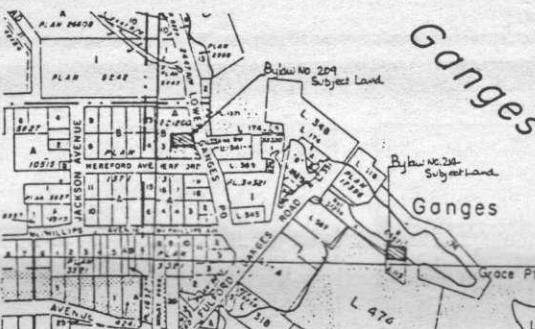

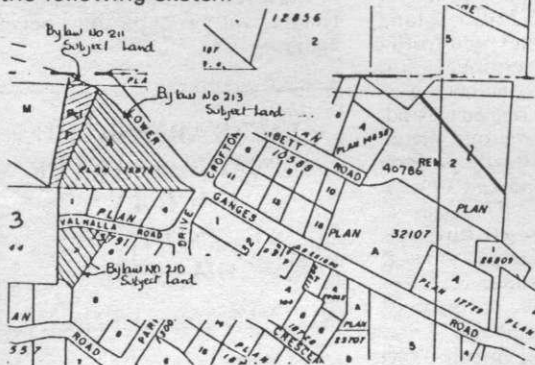

Woodpecker announces intentions with incessant rooftop drumming

Spring madness pulsated through our Salt Spring Island home as a sex-crazed woodpecker drummed on the barbecue. The jack-hammer rat-tat-tat of his beak vibrated through the house as his activated libido revved into "the rite of spring."

The frenzied drumming by the Red Shafted Flicker Woodpecker, 500 or 600 times a day on our roof, trees and barbecue, rang in mother nature's spring delirium of mating and nesting. Once the woodpecker's sexual clock starts by his passionate drumming, it will not stop until he flies off to the nest with his bird.

The incessant drumming is to communicate to the forest his intentions, which are to build his long urn-shaped nest, to stake out his territory, to entice the female, and to search for food.

One morning, confetti-like sawdust rained down on my head as I stood by the front door. The perpetrator of this outrage, who was obviously responsible for the mysterious sawdust on my car for a week, was the forest carpenter woodpecker. He cleaned the wood chips out of his tree nest, high above the car, by puffing up his neck and swinging it from side to side.

The woodpecker pecks out two or three new nests or remodels old ones each spring, so that his lady bird can have her pick. He chisels a great deal.

While the two-week constructing stage goes on, he also entices the female and stakes out his territory by doing all this rat-tat-tatting.

Then, abruptly, a two-day

mating dance commences. The red mustached male's rigid stance, with his weight on his tailfeathers and his head thrown back, was for all the world that of a Spanish dancer. He strutted round and round the fir tree, his four stout claws stamping on the tough bark like a dancer's black boots. The brown spots on his back feathers undulated with the rhythm of castanets. Round and round the tree he careened, a dancer gone mad.

Nearby on the same tree was a downy brown spotted female. She darted, thrust and weaved in a most provocative way, splaying her tailfeathers like a Japanese fan, gracefully waving back and forth.

The ceremony continued for hours. At one point, the male was so demented that he rushed off and started drumming on our metal barbecue. His head feathers were askew, but on he pecked until I feared for his life. This was a human fear, of course; the bird was fine. Woodpeckers' skulls are not rigidly joined like those of other birds — they have a spongy connective tissue that is elastic. He returned in fine shape, finished the dance and flew off with the female to her chosen nest.

The drumming stops, the forest settles down. Nature's clock is running down.

The male woodpecker, a liberated bird, alternates staying with the eggs, helping feed the young and cleaning out the nest. The parents only look after healthy young chicks; deformed or sick ones are left to die.

Foraging for food takes a lot of the woodpecker's time as the young must be fed about 37 times a day. The Flicker's interesting

prehensile tongue is used for holding and grasping like a hinged monkey's tail. It shoots out harpoon-like, with lightning speed and sticks to the prey of larvae, beetles and ants. When the Flicker can't find his usual kill, he picks up nuts with his sharp beak and shoves them between two branches that work like an anvil. He splits the shell with his beak and frees the kernel. He will also shove a pine cone into the same position, tear off the scales and eat the seeds.

Nature's pulsating clock slows down further as the young take off and the parents enjoy the freedom of the forest separately — until the second spring explosion begins again.

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Saanich dispute raises questions about agricultural practices

Probably the most startling administrative furore has occurred on the Saanich Peninsula, where a battery of aldermen faces a phalanx of school trustees.

Trustees have elected to build a school in a pleasant, rural area, surrounded by farms and all the healthful contribution of British Columbia's own agricultural communities.

"Let us build!" say the trustees. "Let us not!" warn the municipality's aldermen.

Dispute is a part of British Columbia bread and butter. It is gratifying to see our masters at each others' throats. How else would we know that they were human? The very perversity of this perverse debate is enough to shake the earth.

The location is hazardous, shout the municipality's leaders. The dangers to children are too great!

The concern arises from fears for the well-being of students exposed to the scents and perfumes of agricultural sprays. Fruit farm sprays could be unsuitable in the near-vicinity of a school, according to the aldermen.

"Thank God I'm a country boy," sang John Denver.

Thank God I'm an old boy!

I grew up in a city. Population of the conurbation around my old home (old, not ancestral) is variously estimated at 13 million or 20-something million. I never

stopped to count. I knew the stench of industry and I recognized the activity in a community by the colour of the smoke belching from industrial chimneys. While the smoke and haze and the fumes and the stench never actually reached our back yard our dotting parents took us out at weekends for picnics and outings whereby we might breathe God's pure country air and rid our already mottled, rotting lungs of the contaminated atmosphere of the nation's second largest city.

Little did my folks know that they were exposing us to far greater hazards. As I look back I could see another phase in that picture of domestic contentment. It would have represented the trip back home in the back seat of a Morris Oxford tourer, into the bathroom, gargle, strip, bathe in disinfectant and dress in clean clothes. After a trip to the country I obviously needed these precautions.

I am an old man and I am a simple man. I find it startling and somewhat fearsome that the process which produces my food is a potential threat to my grandchildren, were they living in a country setting and attending a school that might be subject to spraying.

What has happened to the rural countryside I once knew? And the

hayseed happily flicking the reins as he made his way through field and furrow?

I only hope he hasn't fallen victim to his own practices!

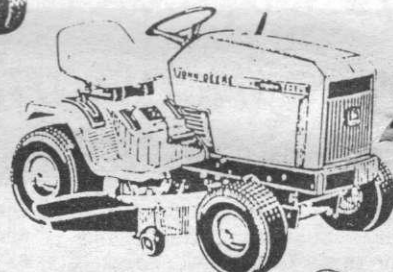
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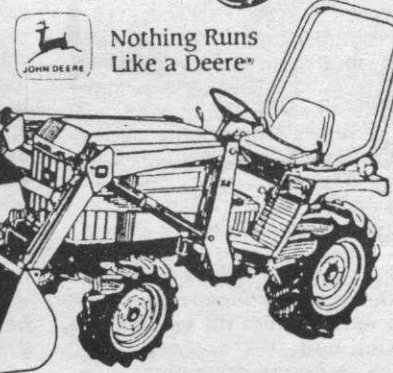


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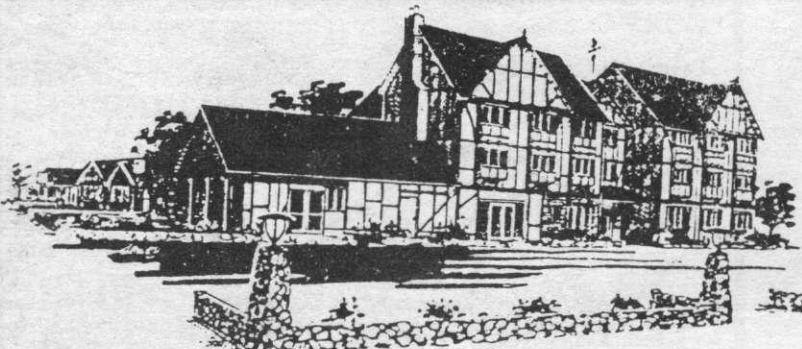
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Twenty-five years ago

- A Salt Spring Island resident was one of 25 people injured when a jet dropped close to 800 feet in stormy weather. Charles Marcotte was on board the plane, heading for Edmonton, when it flew through the turbulent air.

Howard Carlin, Ganges weather observer, said April was drier and colder than April of the previous year. Carlin reported 1.98 inches of precipitation for April 1963, compared to 3.51 the year before. Fahrenheit temperatures stood at 61 (high) and 34 (low), compared to 68 and 36 in April 1962.

- The rummage sale held by the Royal Canadian Legion Branch 92 raised \$650 for use in constructing an addition to the Legion Hall.

Twenty years ago

- A public meeting, called by the director of pollution, heard islanders voice their opinions on dumping partially treated sewage into Trincomali Channel from the Maliview housing project.

At least 200 residents showed up at the meeting, which ran for four hours.

- The department of housing denied responsibility for flooding problems in Ganges.

A department spokesman said the high water resulted from land drainage and followed the natural flow of water. The chamber of commerce, meanwhile, claimed highways crews worsened the situation when drains and ditches were placed beside roads without alleviating the village's problems.

- The Lions Club approved a plan to gather support for a recreational facility for Salt Spring Island. The centre would house a skating rink, curling rink, swimming

pool, and other facilities for sports and recreation.

- A survey conducted for Lady Minto Hospital called for expansion to the Gulf Islands health facility. The study recommended the addition of 20 extended care beds, plus six acute care beds.

Fifteen years ago

- The mill rate for Gulf Island school taxes stood at 22.38. The new rate had dropped from 26.53 the previous year.

The local school district's budget sat at \$883,020, with island taxpayers covering \$843,089, and the government paying \$39,931.

The new mill rate was 10 mills less than the provincial average of 32.76.

- Tommy Douglas visited Saturna Island to talk to his constituents. About 20 people turned out for the informal get-together.

- Engineers completed a study of Ganges Harbour in preparation for the proposed sewer installa-

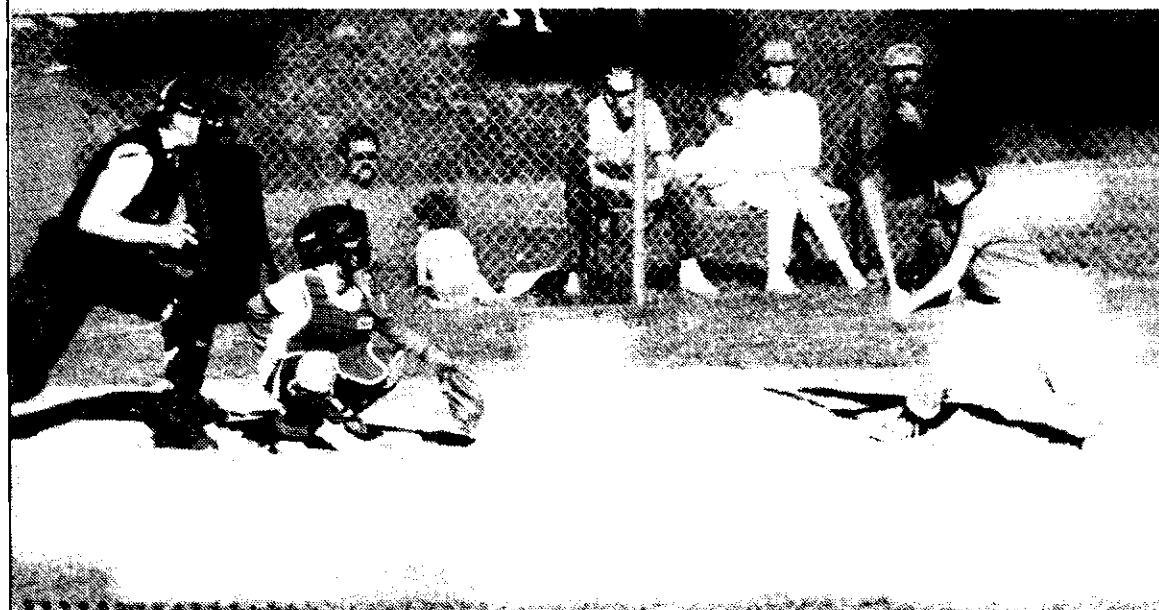
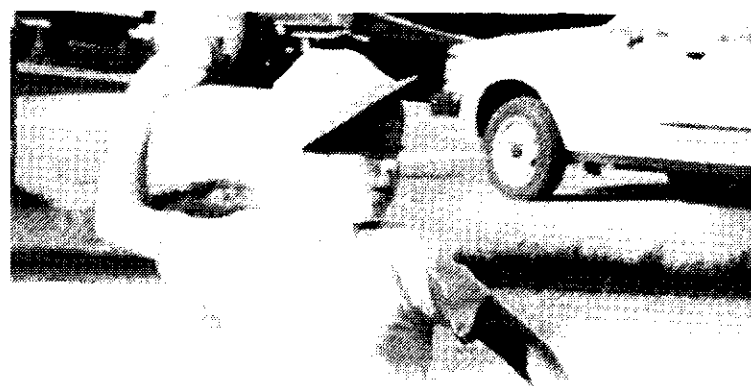
Five years ago
