Local heart foundation sets goal for Salt Spring fund-raising drive

The Salt Spring chapter of the British Columbia Heart Foundation is hoping to raise \$10,000 this month during its annual heart fund campaign.

Committee chairman John Crofton said this year's goal is slightly less than it was in previous years. He added, however, he was not sure until recently that the schools would be sponsoring their annual Jump for Heart campaign.

That campaign is one of the larger sources of revenue for the group and will go ahead later this spring.

Like last year, there will be an annual mail-out. Crofton said response to the mail-out on Salt Spring has generally been low. Last year, of the 5,000 donation forms sent out from Vancouver, only 200 were returned.

The focus this year, he said, will be on "Tag Day." The event, scheduled for this Saturday at the firehall, will offer participants an information display. At the same time, volunteers will circulate Ganges, collecting donations for this year's campaign.

The group has also planned a bowl-a-thon at Leisure Lanes Bowling on Blain Road, beginning this Sunday at 11 a.m. Pre-registration is not required and pledge forms are available at the door.

Crofton said the group hopes to attract a large number of families to this event. He noted a variety of prizes will be awarded in several categories.

A spokesman with the heart foundation in Vancouver said heart disease is still the leading cause of death in Canada, responsible for 43 per cent of the deaths that occur in this country every year. The principle cause of heart disease is still smoking followed by high cholesterol intake.

Linda Muller, communications co-ordinator with the Heart Foundation, said \$5.5 million dollars was raised last year in this province for the heart fund. She noted that this year, the foundation plans to change its emphasis from research to prevention.

In the past, 63 per cent of the money raised by the heart foundation was used for research and 20 per cent for education and prevention programs.

This year, however, the amount

of money spent on prevention programs will double with the hope that encouraging people to change their lifestyles, will reduce the incidence of heart disease.

People walked past and others hurried past and the crows went on pecking away at the bits. Suddenly there was a massive exodus as the crows fled. The only person approaching was a very inoffensive lady, but the crows weren't sticking around. The woman wandering across the compound was leading a dog.

Ferry compound crows are used to people and assume them to be harmless. But they just have to draw the line somewhere and that line seems to come down the middle of the dogs. And the truck was gone before the dog was driven away to leave the field clear for the black birds.

Renting my own land

I went to the hospital last week. It was not as a fearful patient, dreading the needle and worse, but as a visitor and more than a visitor, for I knew that I could never be stricken as was my daughter, Jill.

I visited the maternity ward. It was a slow haul.

I drove from Sidney to the Saanich Peninsula Hospital and went to park my car. The parking fee is 50 cents. I went through my pockets and, of course, I had only one quarter. Should I park, despite the warning that the parking area is controlled? Or should I forget my daughter and return home for lack of 25 cents?

My natural fear of authority, coupled with the submission learned from my military training, resulted in my returning to my car and driving away. What would happen otherwise? If my car were stolen by the hospital administration as a punishment for my coming to Vancouver Island insufficiently provided with quarters I could end up with a charge of anywhere from \$25 to \$100 according to the vengeful policy of the hospital region. And I hadn't got two bits!

Not only fearful, I was indignant. For many years I have paid, and gladly, for hospital services. Part of the cost of acquiring that land on Mount Newton Cross Road for hospital, grounds and parking area was paid by me. In some degree that land is mine. And for the lack of two bits I am deprived of its use and denied the opportunity of visiting a patient.

The entire procedure is an imposition by small-minded men and women who identify dollar bills (and quarters) more readily than they recognize logic or common sense. Why should I, and all my neighbours, be required to buy land in order that the people who administer it for us may demand a rental from us for its use?

I have no figures before me, but I would wager that the elimination of the process of charging a fee for the privilege of visiting the sick scarcely makes a dent in the operating costs of the region's hospitals. I would further wager that if the procedure were abandoned, there would be no noticeable increase in the hospital levies which we pay to enjoy all hospital facilities including the privilege of parking a car while visiting patients.

Indeed, I would submit that visitors are a vital part of any therapeutic services enjoyed in a hospital and that it is entirely illogical to permit medical staff to park without a fee while requiring additional taxation, in the form of parking tickets, from other purveyors of healing ministrations.

It makes me mad and it makes me sick! Am I the only fellow who gives a damn?

Everything lossst!

Developers help in local creek project

The Salmon Enhancement Society hopes the Parks and Recreation Commission will support a bid by two local developers to recover some of the money spent to upgrade Ganges Creek last year.

Society spokesman Kathy Reimer says developers spent close to \$100,000 to clean and renovate the creek in the last six months. Part of that work included the installation of a \$25,000 culvert which will prevent serious flooding in the central core.

The developers — Leon Aptekmann and Bruce Russell — are hoping to recoup \$30,000 of the money they spent through a GO B.C. grant.

The Salmon Enhancement Society has been working to upgrade the Ganges Creek for the last six years. Last year, the group fed 4,000 chum salmon into the creek and this year, it is planning to upgrade another 500 metres of creek bed from McPhillips to Mouat's park.

Reimer says that by the time the society is done, it hope to have added another interesting tourist attraction to the Ganges' central core.

In the last six months, the two developers working on property near the mouth of the creek above the Fulford-Ganges Road spent more than \$100,000 to upgrade the creek. The work included removing debris from around the creek bed, installing foot bridges and laying rocks along the bank to prevent soil erosion. They expect to undertake other landscaping work around the site this spring.

Reimer says installation of a \$25,000 culvert replaced one which both hydrologists and engineers had agreed was too small for that site. She says that while the culvert could handle normal run-off, it could not have coped with the kinds of flooding conditions that occur in the central core every 100 or 200 years. She said that type of flooding would have destroyed the library and other buildings in the McPhillips area.

Although the federal Department of Fisheries agreed four years ago that a new culvert should be put in, the Department of Highways refused to undertake the job, saying the existing culvert would have been good for another 10 years.

While the department agreed to dig out the site for the new culvert, it was the developers who paid to have it put in.

Reimer says that her group is hoping to encourage the Parks and Recreation commission to send a

letter of support for the GO B.C. grant. She suggests it is that kind of support which encourages developers to "do the right thing." She considers the entire project an example of the kind of positive results that can be produced when the community and the developers work together.

In the meantime, she says more work is expected to start on the Ganges Creek bed later this spring.

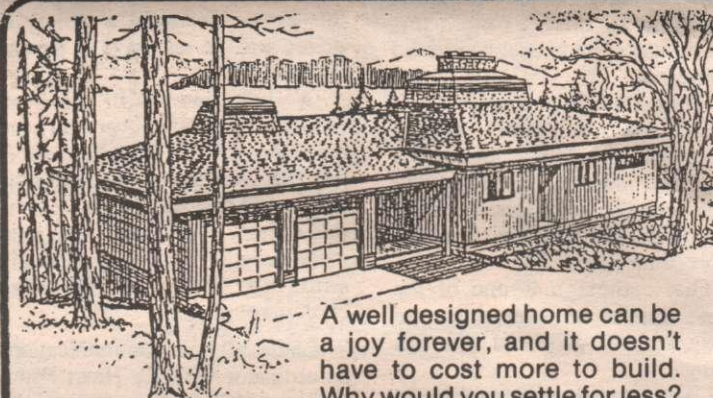

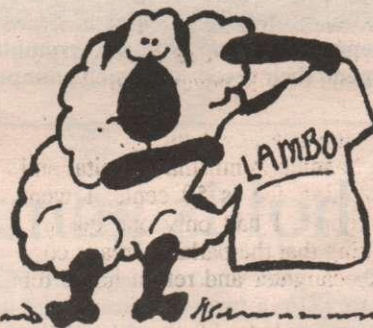

Get a jump on RRSP savings by buying a year in advance

Every year, millions of Canadians spend billions of dollars to buy investments and savings for their registered retirement savings plans.

And nearly all of the money is spent in the first 60 days of the year, to meet the deadline for deductions from taxable income for the previous year. If you contribute \$3,500 to your RRSP by March 1 and your marginal tax rate is 40 per cent, you'll "save" \$1,400 on your 1989 taxes. (You don't really save that, of course; you simply defer payment until after you retire, which is almost as good.)

It's mostly to defer taxes that we usually buy RRSP products, paying scant attention to this money as an investment. Anything that it might earn we think of secondary to the main job of getting a rebate on our taxes. Thus we wait until almost the deadline when we rush to join a mad throng and invest our RRSP money in whatever seems most easily available.

It's a sad mistake, because the investment factor of our RRSPs is usually far more important than the

tax rebate. Over an extended period of time, the interest we can earn on our RRSP investments will amount to much more than the rebates on current income.

But the way to really get a jump on the RRSP savings is to buy at least a year before the deadline. RRSPs are available any time. And by buying early, you'll wind up with substantially larger savings.

So it's important to give careful consideration to your RRSP investments. And the way to do that is to make your RRSP purchase early while you still have time to give it

careful thought, and while your supplier still has time to give you detailed advice and information — not at the last minute when you stand at the end of a lineup of 100 impatient taxpayers.

But the way to really get the jump on RRSP savings is to buy at least a year before the deadline. You don't have to wait until January or February of 1991 to buy your 1990 RRSPs; they're available any time after this January 1. And by buying early, you'll wind up with substantially larger savings.

Suppose, for example, you wait until next year to make your 1990 RRSP purchase, you invest \$3,500 every year and it earns 9 per cent annual interest. Twenty-five years from now you will have accumulated \$296,453. But if you invest that \$3,500 now, instead of one year from now, and keep on investing \$3,500 per year at 9 per cent, then in 25 years you'll have \$323,134. That's nearly \$27,000 in extra pre-tax savings.

RRSP: experts feel most people should have one

A Registered Retirement Savings Plan (RRSP) is a government approved plan through which you can save for your retirement. Your contributions into the plan are tax deductible and the interest you earn is tax sheltered as long as it remains in the plan.

Financial experts agree that almost everyone should have an RRSP, especially individuals who do not make contributions to any other registered pension plan. The rationale behind an RRSP is that you save money during your peak earning years in order to have a source of income when you stop working. RRSPs also allow you to defer paying income taxes on your contributions until you terminate the plan. It is difficult to overestimate the financial benefits of an RRSP. For example, annual contributions of \$1000 at constant interest of 9 per cent will accumulate to \$150,000 over 30 years.

RRSPs are available from most financial institutions, including your bank, trust company or credit union. Anyone can contribute to an RRSP, according to specified limits. For the 1989 tax year, the maximum contribution you can make to an RRSP is 20 per cent of your income, up to a maximum of \$3500, minus any contribution you have made to a registered pension plan. If you do not contribute to a registered pension plan, then your RRSP contribution is 20 per cent of your income, up to a maximum of \$7500.

You can contribute to a plan until you turn 71. At that time you must close the RRSP and begin paying taxes on the money that has accumulated in the plan. But since your income will likely have dropped considerably by then, you will be in a lower tax bracket. Your RRSP withdrawals also will be taxed at the reduced rates.

Just like most other investment vehicles, RRSPs provide you with choices. There are three investment options for your contributions: guaranteed funds, mutual funds and self directed plans. The plan you select depends on your willingness to assume risk.

A guaranteed fund is similar to a

savings account or a term deposit. Your investment is guaranteed by deposit insurance. There are variable rate guaranteed funds, which means interest rates fluctuate, and fixed rate guaranteed funds, which means the interest is constant for the duration of the term deposit.

A mutual fund RRSP means your contributions are invested in mutual funds. Your plan can increase or decrease in value depending on the volatility of the stock market. There is no guaranteed rate

of return on your money and administration fees are common. You should be aware that if the market takes a downturn, you could be placing your original contribution, not just the interest, in jeopardy.

A self directed RRSP allows you to make your own investment decisions but a trustee performs all the administrative work for you. Administration and transaction fees commonly are applied. Unless you have the investment experience and the time to devote to a self directed

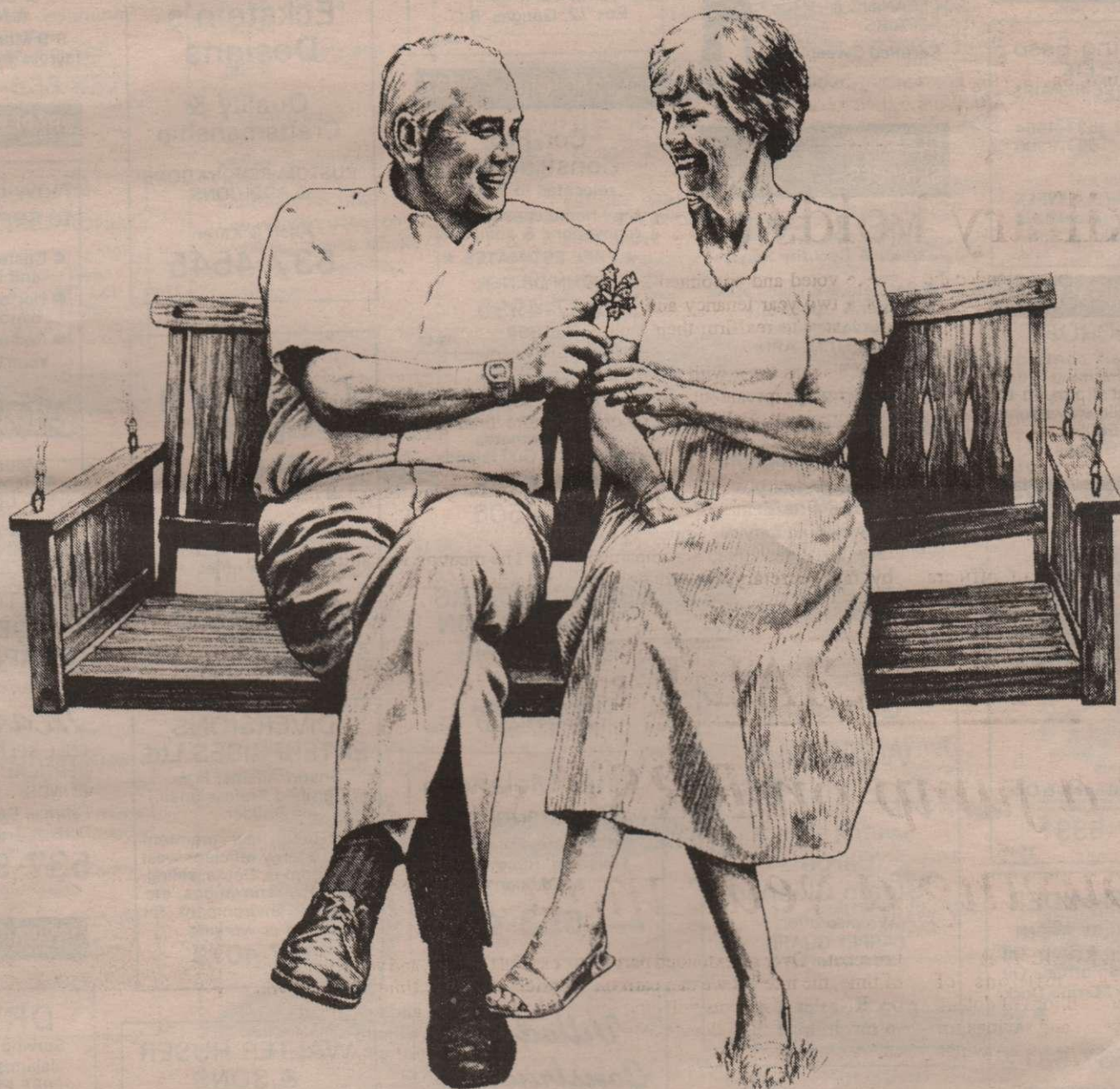
plan, you should proceed with extreme caution.

While RRSPs are considered attractive investments, there are some factors that you should examine before making a purchase. The first factor is risk. If you want a high return, you must be prepared to accept a higher risk. A guaranteed fund, for example, is extremely safe but it tends to yield lower returns than a mutual fund RRSP. Assume a level of risk that makes you comfortable.

Consider the fees that may apply to a plan. They can reduce your investment. Decide if you are comfortable with locking your money into a plan for an extended period of time. If you prefer a short-term investment, make sure your plan can be terminated quickly at no cost. However, don't forget to examine the tax implications of such a move.

Lastly, ask about insurance protection on your funds. There is no insurance on mutual fund RRSPs nor on most self-directed plans.

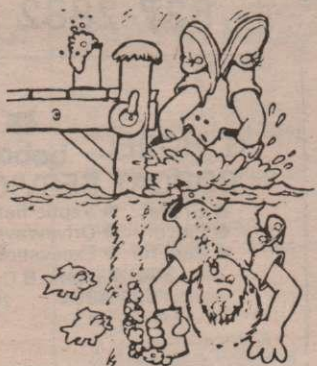

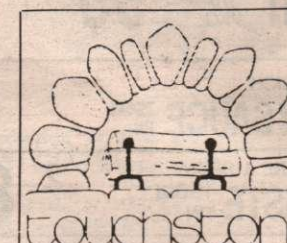

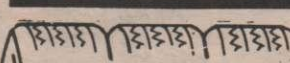

Of course people volunteer their time and energy to projects from which they will derive some satisfaction, i.e. people who like swimming will work for a swimming pool or people who want forests and a clean environment will work for that. There were certainly other members on the Windfall Advisory Committee with a supposed "conflict of interest" who have not been similarly accused.

The Artspring Board of Directors have volunteered many long hours of their own professional skills and time towards the planning and design of this Centre, and are prepared to give even more of their time and energy to see it through. And as for this red herring regarding the potential tax burden from operating costs, neither the CRD nor the GICAC have any responsibility towards the operating costs of the Centre, as it will legally be a separate and autonomous body.

Many artists are coming here to perform for free so the proceeds can be contributed to the Arts Centre. What does this say about us and them? I only wish those people in the community who are obviously in favour of this project would come forth and publicly demonstrate their support, otherwise this project looks like it may fade into oblivion (as our CRD Director appears to wish), while the movers and shakers of this community move into more self rewarding activities.

Recycle and reclaim

To the Editor,
We must eliminate two words from our language: Garbage and Dump - - they go against the new philosophy of Recycle and Reclaim, a new way of thinking about all the things we use, which will have a profound effect on our whole society.

Serious questions are being asked about the products we use,

for if they cannot be reclaimed, should they be purchased in the first instance?

The on-island efforts to bring waste management under control are coming along, but of course things can always be better. Looking ahead, the new area being considered to replace the Blackburn Road site should be planned as a total Recycle & Reclamation Centre, specific areas being set aside for tin, glass, paper, plastic, cardboard, aluminum, etc. Furthermore, large items — refrigerators, stoves, cars, et al. could be dismantled there too.

There is money to be made from all of these materials, lots of it, and there are steady employment possibilities too. The operational revenue for the jobs would be raised from the sale of the materials reclaimed. (A specific instance of revenue potential in waste is created by the construction industry. Drywall, wood, iron pieces, should be collected and resold to the home handy types, who don't need large amounts, just "a little bit.")

What is left: garden toxins, oil, tar, road metal, paint, household food waste. Most of these items can be recycled and reclaimed, and the toxins can be disposed of through appropriate waste centres. And in the case of household waste, a good look at that shows that at least 50 per cent of it can be returned to the earth as compost. A consumer boycott approach to unacceptable packaging would definitely help the overall situation.

The waste disposal area in my mind consists of a large flat space with bays for specific waste items, covered sheds and work area, all surrounded by a good fence. Though the rains may rain, nothing would leach away to damage deep water.

Creative use of space in the kitchen can make the control of materials for recycling very easy. In the same way as we make areas for dishwashers, microwaves, etc., we should also design areas for our reclaim/recycle requirements.

We have come so far, let's go the whole way on this island. We are in a very favourable position to keep control of our waste management and avoid complex arrangements with other agencies. We must overcome the psychology of "If it is in someone else's yard it is not our problem".

A thought — when we are through trashing this planet, where do we plan to go next?

The Island Spirit captures Galiano Islanders' interest

New fishing vessel

One of Galiano's best fishermen Lloyd Baines has bought a new seiner. His family recently issued an invitation for islanders to visit them on the vessel — to toast, to nibble, and to ogle.

Over a three to four hour period people came and what they saw impressed them. *The Island Spirit II* is of all aluminum construction and was built by Alu Craft of Surrey. With a length of 64 feet and a beam of 21 feet it is the largest of its kind built by the company.

Including the stern ramp the overall length is 73 feet. Empty, the vessel draws to a depth of nine feet. The two holding tanks have a capacity of 80 tons of salmon or herring and are cooled by ice produced on the vessel. Two baffle walls are in each tank to prevent load slippage in heavy seas. *The Island Spirit II* is powered by a 34-12 Caterpillar diesel engine while an Isuzu motor provides power for the hydraulic system and a Genset for the vessel's 110 volt requirements.

The vessel provides bunks for seven, the crew requirement needed for herring seining. A crew of five will be aboard for salmon fishing. All from Galiano, the crew has the latest in radar, navigation and sounding equipment to help them in their work, and an entertainment centre to keep them amused during quiet times. Cook, Don Oliver, en-

joys all the conveniences of a modern kitchen plus the best view imaginable while he works. Engineering duties are shared by Lloyd and his son-in-law Ben Maberley. The ship's design is relatively new, only three having been produced so far.

Western Fisheries Magazine is featuring an article on Alu Craft vessels in an upcoming issue according to Baines.

The launching of the vessel in Surrey was marked several weeks ago by a large gathering of family, friends and workers. *The Island Spirit II* took 10 months to build.

One of the founding members of the Galiano Rod and Gun Club in the 1950s was honoured and remembered at the Club house on Saturday, January 27.

At the dock where Lee had moored his boats for many years, his son Mike stepped aboard John Georgeson's tug *Grapple* and John slowly moved the vessel a few yards into the bay where Lee had spent many of his recent years working.

It was this writer's honour, as heads were bowed in respect, to read Tennyson's *Crossing the Bar* and then Mike Lee committed his father's ashes to the sea. The lives of many friends were enriched by having known Ed Lee. He will be long remembered.

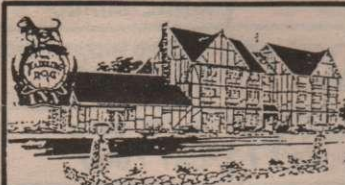
