Salt Spring dumpsters overflowing

Garbage is being dumped in garbage cans and dumpsters owned by Salt Spring businesses and located in island parks. Many people believe the problem is worse since the Blackburn dump closed.

Mouat's Trading Company president Tom Toynbee said Friday household garbage left in garbage receptacles meant for store customers is costing the company

"A hell of a lot. Garbage charges are more than doubled from what they were last year and we are recycling all cardboard and all recyclable paper."

Mouat's got rid of its dumpster "because it was attracting too much garbage," said Toynbee. He added the mall has always

had a problem with household garbage but the problem has "increased substantially" since the dump closed.

Salt Spring islanders consider themselves part of a group that cares for the environment. However, this is not being demonstrated, said Toynbee.

"Chocolate bar wrappers are our responsibility," he said. "We don't feel soiled diapers brought from home are.'

Harbour House Hotel owner Tracy Combs said the hotel moved its dumpster away from the hotel into a more visible location so people dumping garbage into it can be seen.

Previously, the hotel locked the dumpster "off and on" but doing so was "a pain."

"Now with this new garbage thing we have to lock it. People bring their garbage here."

People have left their garbage laying beside the dumpster when it was locked, said Combs, adding crows would then rip the bags open

and leave the garbage scattered on the yard.

She said the Harbour House has not had a problem for a month or more partly because the dumpster has been moved and partly because "people are getting used to the idea that they have to deal with their garbage.

"It's fixed itself."

Parks and Recreation Commission administrator Tony Hume said garbage being dumped on PRC property has always been a problem "but it is a little bit worse than it was last year at this time. Every

'We felt it negatively impacted recreational values, which was one of the key areas of concern.

Should have heeded solid waste group's advice

Issues become clearer in hindsight.

In October, 1989 Salt Spring Islanders voted overwhelmingly (2424 to 205) against construction of a Capital Regional District transfer station on Salt Spring.

Unfortunately, at the time, the vote became clouded by the moral issue of whether or not Salt Spring should take care of its own garbage. Many of those casting ballots in 1989 believed that by showing opposition to the transfer station proposal, they were indicating disapproval of off-island garbage disposal at Hartland Landfill.

The local solid waste committee — which disbanded following the election — urged the community to vote for the CRD transfer station. The landfill at Blackburn Road was destined for closure, and cost estimates for operation of a CRD transfer station amounted to \$81 per year for the average homeowner.

The committee had been studying the issue for a lengthy period of time and had examined it from all angles. We should have heeded the group's advice.

Following the defeat of the solid waste referendum, the Island Watch Society, which opposed the CRD plan, noted that the no vote had "opened up a whole new set of problems which will have to be dealt with in the next few months."

Well, two and one-half years have passed, two islanders have battled over sites for privately-run transfer stations, the actual creation of a transfer station is likely months away, establishment of an island-based landfill is even further away (as predicted prior to the 1989 election), and, above all, solid waste is still going to Hartland.

Had the issue not become clouded and had we had clearer foresight, we would have voted for the CRD transfer station, had it built for us, had Browning-Ferris Industries (BFI) transporting garbage for close to three of its fiveyear contract and be almost ready, in two years time, to cancel or limit the BFI contract and use the CRD transfer station for a drop-off to our own

Instead, a volunteer organization (the Hospital Auxiliary) which operates the Thrift Shop for the direct purpose

of aiding equipment purchases at Lady Minto Hospital, is stuck with the task of sorting our garbage.



The direct haul to Hartland option



Rejection inevitable

To the Editor.

I wish to respond to public comments by John Stepaniuk, Norman Twa and Kathy Reimer that Diane Cragg's "no-vote" at the May 26 Trust Committee meeting, resulting in the rejection of Mr. Twa's application, somehow deprives him of due process or public input.

As noted in the Driftwood editorial on the decision, rejection of the application was inevitable. To do otherwise would have been inconsistent with Trust policy, contradicted APC recommendations and violated Salt Spring's new transfer station guidelines regarding appropriate uses in areas zoned watershed.

It is the responsibility of our democratically elected trustees to reject rezoning applications which are clearly inconsistent with Trust policy.

To Mr. Twa I would ask, is it the process that is the problem, or simply the fact that the process turned down his proposal? Are there not more appropriate sites he could put forward?

I have a great deal of difficulty with Mr. Stepaniuk's role in the transfer station controversy. He promoted the acceptance of Mr. Twa's application knowing full well that to do so would allow him to continue operating illegally. He proposed the deferral of a decision on Twa's application (effectively providing more time for Twa to continue illegally) until new transfer station guidelines were

However, when the new guidelines clearly precluded a Blackburn site, he refused to endorse them or abide by them. Also, Mr. Stepaniuk has publicly stated that Mr. Twa deserves consideration simply because he has provided longstanding and commendable service to islanders.

I am concerned that Mr. Stepaniuk seems to see his role as a trustee as acting as an advocate for individuals rather than upholding the "preserve and protect" policy of the Trust. I would be interested in hearing Mr. Stepaniuk's views on this.

Finally, I have serious questions about Kathy Reimer's objectivity in the transfer station debate. She has consistently put forward the view that Mr. Twa's proposal will have no environmental risk despite the fact that it is in an area zoned watershed because it supplies drinking water.

On the other hand, she argues that the Rainbow Road site represents some kind of ecological nightmare (in an area already zoned for commercial and light industrial uses) because of its perceived threat to relatively minor fish habitat.

I find it irresponsible for a person with her acknowledged credentials to apply contradictory and exaggerated standards to these proposals.

VICTORIA — One day, about a year ago, Bruce Hutchison, author, editor emeritus of the Vancouver Sun and Canada's foremost journalist had lunch at Victoria's venerable Union Club, when Ted Hughes walked past him towards another table.

That, Hutchison said to his lunch guest, is the most important man in British Columbia today. How right he was.

Hughes, who had been appointed acting Conflict of Interest Commissioner by the previous government in September 1990 and was confirmed in that position by a unanimous vote of the B.C. Legislature on May 23, 1991, was at the time investigating former premier Bill Vander Zalm's involvement in the sale of his Fantasy Gardens theme park to a Hong Kong billionaire.

It was Vander Zalm himself who had asked Hughes to do the investigation. We'll never know why. Perhaps Vander Zalm truly believed that he had done nothing wrong; perhaps he thought Hughes would do a white-wash job on him.

Whatever the reasons, the outcome had dramatic results. Hughes found that the premier had been in violation of his own guidelines, a verdict that would ultimately force the premier's resignation.

Still acts as a big shadow

Today, Hughes may no longer be the most important man in British Columbia, but he still casts a big shadow. As the province's conflict of interest watchdog, Hughes makes sure that our elected officials conduct themselves properly.

Like the Maytag repairman, Hughes hasn't been inundated with work. His very presence, reinforced by a fairly good Members Conflict of Interest Act, seems to have the desired effect.

Not only does the existence of the conflict of interest commissioner's office discourage deliberate shenanigans by our elected officials, but it encourages them to seek Hughes' advice before they can get into trouble inadvertently.

When the cabinet of the newly-elected Harcourt government discussed amendments to the Compensation Fairness Act, introduced by the previous government, some ministers asked Hughes for input.

A number of cabinet members had spouses who could potentially benefit from any changes to the act. They wanted to know whether that placed them in a conflict of interest. The long and the short of Hughes' ruling was that it didn't.

Personal lobbying prohibited

In his first annual report, released last week, Hughes makes a number of interesting points with regard to MLAs assisting constituents who seek remedy or redress from a commission, board, agency or other tribunal established by the government.

Hughes stressed that the Members Conflict of Interest Act doesn't prohibit any activities in which members engage on behalf of their constituents, but he does draw a line.

Cabinet ministers, he ruled, aren't allowed to personally lobby any commission, board or other government agency on behalf of a constituent, no matter what ministry such bodies operate under.

"A minister acting in such a way would always be seen as a minister of government and that is a position he or she cannot shed at will and it would be improper to appear in an advocacy role of this kind," he said.

On the other hand, Hughes added, there was nothing to keep constituency assistants in a minister's office from giving advocacy help to constituents, provided his boss isn't in charge of the board or commission in question.

Constituency allowance handling

Hughes' latest assignment is to look at how MLAs have been handling their constituency allowances. Every MLA gets about \$3,600 a month to operate a constituency office. The money pays for rent, salaries and office supplies and equipment.

Over the years, a number of NDP MLAs have been using the Nanaimo Commonwealth Holding Society to disburse the constituency allowances on their behalf.

The society, which has long-standing and intimate links with the New Democratic Party, has been accused of funnelling bingo profits into its own coffers rather than giving them to outside charities.

Hughes' job of examining whether the NDP members should or should not have been disbursing their allowances through that society got a bit of a nasty spin when a Socred member decided to question the conflict of interest commissioner's qualifications to do so.

Socred party leader Jack Weisgerber said in the House that Hughes was deputy attorney general when the attorney general's ministry refused to lay charges against the Nanaimo Commonwealth Holding Society a few years ago.

Hughes, not very amused by the attack, invited Weisgerber to state details of his innuendos outside the Legislature rather than

hiding behind the immunity the House gives members.

Senate reform

The following is an open letter to the Honourable Moe Sihota, Minister responsible for Constitutional Affairs.

As a new British Columbian, and a bit of a political junkie, concerned about the proposals for a reformed senate, I am sending the following suggestions along.

I am sending them at this late hour because although I have great respect for your abilities I feel you are not pressing B.C.'s proposal for an equal five region senate strongly enough.

I am also alarmed that the ridiculous proposal for equal representation from each province seems to be up for serious consideration.

There are three principles which should guide any proposal for a reformed senate.

1. We should respect the Fathers of Confederation wishes for equal representation for all regions albeit recognizing that 128 years later there are now five regions,

This third E - equality for all regions - should be adhered to unless there are compelling reasons to the contrary. (see below).

No province should be asked to have fewer seats in a reformed senate than it has in the present one.

3. No province with a larger population (Sask., Manitoba) should be asked to accept fewer senators than provinces (N.S., N.B.) with smaller populations.

If these three principles are adhered to we would have two regions, Atlantic Canada and the Prairies with six more senators than the other three regions but this should be acceptable for reasons of history and numerical equality respectively.

A reformed senate would look

as follows:

Atlantic Canada - 30 (Newfoundland, 6; Nova Scotia, 10; New Brunswick, 10; Prince Edward Island, 4).

Quebec - 24. Ontario - 24.

Prairies - 30 (Manitoba, 10; Saskatchewan, 10; Alberta, 10).

West & North - 24 (British Columbia, 18; Yukon, 2; Nunavut,

Since each province and territory have an even number of senators I would propose a fourth principle.

4. Each province should have an equal number of men and women senators and slates of equal numbers of each gender could be voted on by all citizens. If there are imbalances in the present senate none is as great as that between men and

MARKET VENDORS ASS. **Driftwood Contributor**

We wish to see the continuation of a diverse market with a broad public appeal; a family oriented market with something for everyone.

It is not possible to remove one element of the market without negatively affecting the whole.

Craftspeople

Local craft vendors are by far the largest growing component of the market, indicating the steadily growing reputation our market has for interesting and quality items.

Indeed the numbers of craft vendors has grown so much in recent years, that some people see the market becoming "just another craft fair." Others with an opposing attitude see the non-craft vendors as "undermining the quality."

The Market Vendors Association is happy to see an increase in market use by craftspeople especially as it has developed naturally in accordance with customer demand. Artificially directing the market by the use of restrictions is quite another matter.

Once the idea of "restrictions" is accepted, all terms must be defined. What is "handcrafted"? The marketplace would require ongoing scrutiny and conflicts about which products were acceptable would arise. Eventually, a jury system would have to be instituted. Such a system would be at extra cost to craftspeople and necessitate a period of time to allow for adjudication. Inevitably the essential vibrant energy of our market would diminish.

While competition is stiff for craft vendors in the market, few wish to see restrictions placed upon visiting craftpeople. These people add variety to our market and provide an information exchange for local craftspeople.

Salt Spring is indeed Canada's craft island and significant numbers of Salt Spring Island craftspeople regularly attend craft fairs, and markets off-island. They feel discriminating against craftspeople from elsewhere is not only unconscionable but could also damage their welcome at these offisland venues.

Farmers

During the late 1980s local produce all but disappeared from the "farmers" market. The small scale farmer/gardeners we expected to find at the market was the group most seriously affected by the unregulated staking out of space that occurred during those years.

When the permit system was implementedy after the 1990 season, the vendors voted unanimously to reserve the centre aisle of the market for farmers and nonprofit groups. The 1991 season saw a definite increase in local produce as people realized they could pick in the morning and arrive at the market to catch the crowds.

Most of the produce available has been high quality organic as the market particularly attracted members of the Natural Growers Association. The Market Vendors Association expects further increases in farmer use of the market and encourages it by attention to their needs.

Farm produce supply can only Why does the Market Vendors increase with a corresponding in-Association wish to see the con- crease in demand. Lack of custinuation of a non-juried public tomers deters more fully than lack of space! Most farmer/vendors agree that a diverse public market with authentic local appeal is necessary. Tourists like to see field worn locals with luscious local produce but they generally don't pack away many vegetables.

Used goods

Perhaps the most surprising aspect of attempts to "regulate" the market is the desire to eliminate used goods from the market. Surely, in 1991, recycling and reusing are socially worthwhile goals universally.

Not so long ago it was commonplace for islanders to attend the market with a handful of possessions they no longer needed or simply wanted to turn into cash. Some individuals even developed small scale businesses by refurbishing such items as tools or small appliances.

Mothers sold their children's out-grown clothes and used the money to purchase the next size up from the parent down the market


Whether as a result of parking restrictions, booth size policies, or incessant nose wrinkling criticism, these islanders and their merchandise have almost disappeared from today's market.

The Market Vendors Association regrets this and will, in the future, be looking for policies designed to enable Salt Spring Islanders to once again conduct a used goods exchange.

Thrift Shop used as garbage dump

Bags of unusable goods left

People are leaving worthless clothes at the Lady Minto Hospital Auxiliary Thrift Shop in Mouat's Mall.

One day, 13 bags of unusable clothes were left at the store, auxiliary volunteer Daisy Gear said Friday.

"It's getting worse now, ever since the garbage dump closed."

Previously, on an average day the Thrift Shop would throw out two bags of clothes, now they are throwing out an average of six or seven bags per day, she said.

"It's just a case of take it down to the Thrift Shop. They will get rid of it and we won't have to take it to the garbage," Gear said. "That is what it is."

"People won't pay for it."

Thrift Shop volunteers take longer to sort through clothes because of all the "junk" they have to go through including torn clothes, shoes, and broken toys.

"We can't keep up with it. It is disheartening, really dishearening."

People drop bags off before the shop opens at 10 a.m. so noone can see them leave the clothes, she said.

"They are smart Just come by drop their bag off and they

"They are smart. Just come by, drop their bag off and they are gone."

Gear believes the problem has "definitely" arisen because of the closure of the Blackburn dump.

"After a garage sale it is bedlam" in the shop, she said. "Everything they don't sell they dump it on us."

Currently, Mouat's Trading Company pays for the removal

Currently, Mouat's Trading Company pays for the removal of Thrift Shop garbage. She said Mouat's pays \$3 for each garbage bag taken away, which may in turn lead to a raise in rent for the Thrift Shop.

Less money raised by the Thrift Shop will be available to be used for hospital equipment expenditures, she stated.

bit of garbage cost us twice as much as it did last year."

The PRC sent letters to people three times in the last year warning them not to dump their garbage on PRC property again or they will face charges.

Centennial Park suffers most from garbage disposal and bags of garbage are occasionally dumped at Arnell Park, he said.

"We've always had a problem up there."

Vesuvius Pub assistant manager Lee-Anne Gordon said the pub put locks on its dumpster and people leaving garbage there "is not really a problem anymore."

However, people still leave garbage outside of the dumpster "for the crows to chew up."

Fulford Marina manager Flo Beaumont said a padlock put on their dumpster about a year and one-half ago has cut the number of people dumping garbage there "considerably."

Ganges RCMP constable Rod Holland said fines for littering range from \$50 to \$500 but police have not received any complaints. If the person who left garbage can be identified "then give us a call."

"For us to issue a ticket we need the person complaining to be willing to go to court over the matter."

Islands Trust financial books ended fiscal 1991-92 with a \$77,392 surplus.

While costs incurred by Trust Council and its executive committee were \$28,576 more than anticipated, Trust committees on each island and general operations cost \$59,906 less than budgeted.

Trust Fund Board administration also produced a \$46,062 surplus, with \$15,151 of that remaining from 1990-91.

Trust operations manager Doug Levell told a June 6 Trust Council meeting that "through a fair degree of work and realignment of the budget the financial report has provided us with a surplus.

A potential deficit was predicted earlier in the 1991-92 budget year. Total expenditure for the year was \$1,826,014.

Finance committee chairman Phil Clark also noted the Trust had received a clean audit from accounting firm Peat Marwick Thorne.

That designation gives "a message that management has represented the affairs of the Trust relative to the budget."

Hornby Island trustee Cathy Howard requested a copy of the auditor's "management letter" which outlines suggestions for improvement. Clark explained it was not "normal practice" for directors of a board nor politicians to view that document because it was intended for management only.

Trustees voted down a motion made by Howard which would allow them to see the letter if they

Land control sought

Islands Trust Council will pursue local control of island Crown lands after hearing presentations made by Hornby Island residents at last weekend's council meeting.

Council gave itself the task of looking at mechanisms which could give community residents more decision-making power over the fate of provincial Crown lands in their area.

Hornby Island Forest Management Society chairman Norm Walton explained Crown-owned Mt. Jeffrey, not logged for about 60 years, formed the centre of his small island.

"For many years the residents of Hornby Island have been concerned that logging of the Crown land would be authorized and that a wood lot licence would not necessarily be awarded to a careful and environmentally-aware logger."

The primary concern as explained further by former Hornby trustee John Fletcher is that logging could endanger fragile community water sources for the island's 1,200 residents.

Walton said locally-administered sustainable silviculture practices could aid the local economy while conserving the ecologically healthy state of Mt. Jeffrey.

The driving force behind the community's request for stewardship of its Crown land "lies in the belief that this forest must be treated as an environmental and

A "make sense" budget wanted

School district 64 officials have "makes sense."

Gulf Islands Teachers Association president Jack Braak, schools superintendent Mike Marshall and school board chairman Charles Bazzard outlined problems faced by this and other school districts at a "day of concern" about education funding held May 27.

Braak explained a major problem was the NDP government's holding back of between \$85 and \$120 million in funding until September for dispersal when actual student enrolment figures are deter-

When school boards do not know how much money they will have for a school year until it starts, realistic planning is impossible, said Braak. They ask "how do we budget when we don't have all of the money and don't know how much money we are going to get?"

Funds have always been held back — about \$44 million last year - but the new government's larger figure has compounded the problem.

Braak said some changes needed for an overhaul of the education funding system include returning property taxation authority to school boards and ending public funding of private

He noted boards do have the option of holding a referendum asking taxpayers for more education funding, but the time frame between making the decision and holding a referendum makes it an unworkable prospect. The system dictates school boards must request approval to increase property taxes for school funding before people see the rest of their tax bill for that

Board chairman Charles Bazzard said the district was in an "untenable position." Eighty-four per cent of its costs are for salaries and benefits, which "we are not being fully funded for." The 1992-93 funding level is \$7,019 per pupil, he noted — the same as it was two years ago.

Accounting for increased costs, joined others province- wide call- that translates to a 15 per cent or \$2 ing for a funding system that million net decrease in funds to provide service, he said.

> Some areas he cited as lacking adequate funding are preparation time for teachers, Year 2000 program implementation, professional development dealing with technological and societal change, legal expenses, lunchtime supervision and transportation.

Marshall reiterated Bazzard's and Braak's position.

'We desperately need re-establishment of a funding system that is going to make some sense," he said.

He also confirmed the district would operate with fewer staff next

"We are looking, at this point in time, at a reduction of about eight teacher positions." He stressed that did not necessarily mean eight people would be laid off.

Marshall said what really concerns him is that the provincial government is not making changes needed to distinguish itself from its Socred predecessor. A "legacy of non-integrity" is not disappearing under the NDP banner.

The problems in funding and integrity do not belong to this government," he said, but later added "I'm getting really worried they are going to let it slip.'

By acknowledging funding inadequacies and being honest about the figures it uses, the government could help restore some of the lost integrity.

"Please be really as suspicious as I am of all the figures you read," he advised.

Braak presented a table indicating British Columbia provided less money per pupil for education than all provinces except Nova Scotia, Newfoundland and Prince Edward Island for the 1991-92 school year. He also urged those attending the meeting to express education funding concerns by phone, fax or letter to Saanich North-Gulf Islands MLA Clive Tanner and education minister Anita Hagen.



Defense lawyer Mayland McKimm said Winston, by his own admission, is an alcoholic and needs professional counselling.

Judge Mackenzie imposed a \$700 fine and suspended Winston's driver's licence for 16 months.

 A Salt Spring man pleaded guilty to impaired driving in Ganges court June 2, although the Ganges RCMP detachment's breathalyzer machine was not working and could not obtain readings at the time he was charged.

Colin Ward, 21, was escorted out of a local pub at approximately 11:45 p.m. October 4, 1991.

Police observed his pick-up truck leaving the pub. The truck was wandering in its lane, made numerous jerky movements, and the tires went off the road to the right, said Crown counsel Anne Wallace.

Police pulled Ward over, and he fumbled while looking for his insurance and needed to steady himself when he was standing, she said.

Ward, of Lautman Drive, did not have any previous impaired driving convictions but he did have a driving record for other offences.

He was fined \$450 and had his licence suspended for 12 months.

Salt Spring resident Spencer Dean LaFortune, of Trincomali Heights, pleaded guilty to charges of impaired driving in Ganges provincial court June 2.

Crown counsel Anne Wallace said LaFortune's van was one of two vehicles which sped out of the parking lot of a local pub onto Upper Ganges Road March 14 at 1:16 a.m.

The van was pulled over by police and when officers approached LaFortune they could smell liquor. LaFortune's speech was blurred and his eyes were bloodshot, said Wallace.

Police had LaFortune provide breath samples which showed he had 200 milligrams and 180 milligrams of alcohol in 100 millilitres of blood, which is over the 80 milligram limit.

Judge Mackenzie fined La-Fortune \$400 and prohibited him from driving for the next 12 months. The charge was LaFortune's first impaired driving offense.







Topsoil being moved from the new high school site to island homes has resulted in an increase in truck traffic on Salt Spring.


Fulford couple found

Inter-faith education discussed

Salt Spring residents Rev. Barry Cooke, Terre Flower, Linda Popov and Manson Toynbee joined more than 250 people gathered at Lester B. Pearson College of the Pacific for a conference on "Inter-Faith Education in Schools: Enhancing Multi-Culturalism," sponsored by the World Inter-Faith Education Association (Canada).

Other participants included people from across Canada, England, Italy, Japan and the USA, administrators, teachers, students, and members of many faith communities, consulting in Canada's two official languages.

The group struggled with the rationale and methods for offering inter-faith education in the schools, based on respect and appreciation for the varied faith traditions in Canada.

It was agreed that courses should be presented to deepen students' understanding of human culture and to support their own search for meaning, rather than for the purpose of conversion.

Flower, who co-coordinated the conference, felt that "the people we met, the ideas we shared and the contacts found for the future made the meeting invaluable.'

Toynbee, a board member of the World Inter-Faith Education Association (Canada), said "What impressed me was the spirit in which the discussions were carried on, free of animosity. No one was trying to score points for his or her own view."

Popov was asked to make a special presentation on the Virtues Guide, an inter-faith handbook on values and virtues, authored on Salt Spring. It was enthusiastically


A "tax tip" from a person she met made the win even better.





Gulf Island Fabricreations is fashion bit at arts show

Margret Wesemann of Mayne Island made fashion news at the recent B.C. Creative Arts Show in Vancouver.

Assisted by the Ministry of Economic Development, Small Business and Trade, Wesemann premiered her "Gulf Island Fabricreations" at the wholesale trade show. As many as 7,000 commercial buyers attended the show, looking for product lines to supply retail outlets throughout North America.

Through its home-based business program, the ministry helps 125 home-based artisans and gift producers to participate at the biannual trade show. It provides small scale arts and crafts producers with an opportunity to introduce their product to the international marketplace.

The next B.C. Creative Arts Show will be held August 23 - 25 at B.C. Place in Vancouver.

"Home-based businesses represent a wealth of talent and ingenuity, and make a substantial contribution to the provincial economy," said Small Business Minister David Zernhelt in a prepared statement. "The B.C. Creative Arts Show helps these small business people tap markets that may otherwise by beyond their reach.'

For Wesemann, the show generated \$1,300, considerably more than she expected.

"I thought the show was really exciting and well organized," she said. "It brought me into contact with other craftspeople and I felt I had support. It convinced me to continue in this direction.'

Wesemann's design career took shape when she was unemployed.

"I'd been sewing and creating all my life. It was a hobby that grew into something more out of neces-

"I first began by reading books and experimenting. I had never even touched a dye before and the first things I made looked awful," she said.

Wesemann now buys pre-dyed fabrics and concentrates on the silkscreening in her home studio. Her bags, jackets, and T-shirts are produced in cottons and silks, in keeping with the natural images they bear.

The shot at big league marketing was only part of the help Wesemann received through the creative arts show. Small business experts were on nand to provide seminars and workshops on tried and proven business management
