Islands Trust gives approval to controversial application

Salt Spring Island's Trust Committee issued a development variance permit Tuesday which allows a Cape Keppel area subdivision to proceed.

The permit waives Section 7.1 of the island's subdivision bylaw, which requires all lots to have highway frontage.

A similar application by the same landowners for a 10-lot subdivision of the Southwest 1/4 of Section 32, South Salt Spring Island was refused by the local committee last December.

The current proposal calls for creation of five eight-acre lots and 10 acres dedicated as park land.

Two of four property owners, Gary and Alan Cunningham, made a presentation at an August 21 public information meeting about the application.

They said they felt the lowerdensity proposal addressed concerns people expressed last year about increased use of Mountain Road through the Cape Keppel Ecological Reserve and preservation of the area in general.

Having five families living even part-time in the area would increase

Storm thunders over islands

Meteor showers are normal for August. But meteors are just a brief sparkling stream across the sky. And they don't often hit the Earth.

Friday's raging thunder and lightning storm was, therefore, unusual.

A whopping 688 lightning bolts hit southern Vancouver Island. And more than five dozen hit Salt Spring Island. Lightning hits in this area are recorded by the B.C. Forestry Service in Duncan.

There were no fires on Salt Spring. A fire on a wood lot on Saturna was doused by the resident caretaker and a fire on Gossip Island was extinguished by a warden.

Most Gulf Islanders suffered minute or hour-long power outages.

But Salt Spring did not escape completely unscathed.

"The power had gone out and we were all standing at the living room window watching the lightning," Thomas Road resident Cathy Ball said. "We were talking about having a surge bar on the computer.

"All of a sudden, as soon as we said that, the television went crack! and it blew the T.V.

"It just went kabang," Ball said.
"It sounded like a big rock hit the window. It probably blew the capacitators or something like that."

No other appliances were affected, Ball said, but they unplugged the stereo just in case.

Hydro poles were also casualties during the two and one-half hour storm. B.C. Hydro district manager John Langston said nothing can be done to protect a pole from a lightning strike.

"It's just such an intense amount of energy," he said. "When it strikes the ground, it fuses rocks, melts sand and turns sand into something that resembles glass.

"I think nine transformers had to be changed as a result of lightning strikes," he said. "It's very unusual to get a lightning storm of the magnitude that we got here on the Gulf Islands.

"Generally we're missed and if there are one or two bits of damage as a result of lightning that would be closer to normal for here."

The biggest threat from an electrical storm is of forest fire, especially in the high-risk conditions we have had all summer. Dennis Walker, duty officer at the B.C. Forest Service, said there had been several fires in the district, but all were out now.

And, Walker said, Salt Spring was fortunate to get a lot of rain

protection of the reserve and surrounding areas, they said, providing "custodial care to an area now unprotected."

"We feel people living in that area will act as more of watchdogs," said Gary Cunningham.

Extensive public beach and Crown lands access would also result from the subdivision, they explained and the lots would be marketed as "water access only"

However, proposal opponent Dennis O'Hara said the "water access only" designation was "a facade" since Mountain Road did provide road access through the Ecological Reserve.

He stressed he was not opposed to the Cunninghams using their rightful zoning as long as new properties were not accessed by that road. He suggested a covenant be placed on the new lots prohibiting use of Mountain Road.

"I'm not against density out there," he said. "But it is wrong to put up the pretence of water access only when you're going to use that road for every single vehicle that goes out there.'

Alice Friedman agreed and said she was especially concerned about properties beyond the Cunningham parcel being developed in future and further increasing Mountain Road traffic.

Friends of Ecological Reserves representative Briony Penn said the revised proposal "seems like the same application (as last year's) cloaked under a different guise."

"We're still debating the same point we've been debating all along," she said. "We are constantly faced with incremental destruction of this habitat."

"I urge you to examine the whole issue of environmental degradation and look at it in the context of global issues as well as the local context."

Also at the Friday public information meeting, O'Hara said Friends of Ecological Reserves called for the resignation of Bob Andrew as one of two wardens of the reserve. The other warden is Paul Linton.

Andrew told the Driftwood he did not intend to resign because he felt the subdivision would provide a "net benefit" to the reserve. Having residents in the area could solve "the real problem" of the reserve which stems from abuse by dirt bikers and hunters, he reasoned, and 10 acres of park dedication will also be of value.

"The whole integrity of the land in the long term is what I'm trying to look at.'

"If two years down the line because of this decision there was a negative impact, I would resign," he added.

"I'm convinced this kind of development will encourage people who live in the area to take care of both the reserve and surrounding areas," Andrew said Tuesday.

He also said an environmental impact consultant informed him the impact of the Cunningham subdivision would be "negligible."

Trustee Stepaniuk complimented everyone involved in reaching a satisfactory resolution to



Pathways "excited"

Salt Spring's bicycle path advocacy committee was pleased to see Art Charbonneau's smiling face and message in the Driftwood last

The provincial government's transportation and highways minister announced a bicycle policy was being developed by his ministry and responded to the 400 Salt Spring residents who sent Island Pathways cards to him asking for a safe bicycle and pedestrian path policy.

Charbonneau also confirmed that highways ministry and Islands Trust representatives are working on an agreement for "cycle route plans.'

Island Pathways spokesman Bruce Grey said "we were very excited about it and encouraged that he or his office would take that amount of time to write out a specific letter responding to our letters.

Charbonneau could not do that "idly," added Grey. "You can't just forget about it in a year."

He said he was also happy with the high return rate of the Pathways mailout conducted on Salt Spring in June. The 400 cards sent to Charbonneau represent more than 12 per cent participation, when two to three per cent is usually expected.

The committee has been trying to affect government policy on bicycle paths for the past few years.

"We were getting a bit disgruntled thinking maybe we can't make a difference," said Grey. "So this is really encouraging thinking we might be onto something here."

He said two other positive bike path developments have been in-

The committee is negotiating on a proposed donation of some offroad trails for community use and hoping a Kanaka Road extension through to the new school site will result in safe access for cyclists and

The Kanaka Road matter has been brought to the attention of the Gulf Islands school board, he said.

Trust's lack of notice disputed

Salt Spring's Trust committee was accused of trying to push through approval of a controversial development variance permit by not giving opponents time to "or-

Dennis O'Hara lambasted the Trust at a public information meeting Friday for providing only 48 hours of the meeting on a proposed Cape Keppel subdivision via an advertisement in the August 19

'This meeting is a farce," said O'Hara, noting two days was not enough time for people to express their feelings about the revised application.

He said he was deeply concerned about "the lack of process in allowing less than 48 hours notice for a public hearing thereby ensuring most citizens would not even have heard of the meeting let alone attend. No opportunity has been given for off-island property owners or the many people on holidays to have input into such a serious precedent that is being considered here today."

Although the five-lot subdivision is dubbed "water access only," O'Hara believes increased use of Mountain Road through the Cape Keppel Ecological Reserve would be inevitable.

A similar public information meeting was held December 17, 1991 to allow applicant Gary Cunningham of Saanich to explain the previous proposal and hear people's concerns about it.

The local Trust committee refused Cunningham's request for a development variance permit, citing extensive public opposition to increased traffic through the ecological reserve as the reason.

Thirteen days notice was given before the packed December meeting via a Driftwood advertisement.

O'Hara said granting of the development variance permit is "a fait accompli unless by some remote chance (Trust committee members) are going to have a change of heart from the three people who are in this room because of a lack of notice."

Mountain Road resident Alice Friedman and Friends of Ecological Reserves member Briony Penn also spoke against granting of the development variance permit at Friday's meeting.

Bob Andrew and John Stepaniuk agreed to issue the permit Tuesday.

Trust planning technician Linda Adams said Monday the committee is not required by law to give any public notice of the development variance permit application, except to property owners living within 100 feet of the property subject to the permit. All surrounding land is owned by the Crown, she said.

Terms of notice are outlined in the Municipal Act and the local Trust committee's bylaws.

"We took this extra step of putting a notice in the paper and having the meeting because we knew it was of interest to people," said Adams.



Trust should have given adequate notice

Opponents to a controversial development variance permit for a tion, Trust members cited public Cape Keppel subdivision are justified in their anger at the Islands through the ecological reserve as a Trust.

Island resident Dennis O'Hara lambasted Salt Spring's Trust committee at a public information meeting Friday for only providing 48 hours notice of the meeting at which input for the subdivision was gathered.

O'Hara called the meeting a farce, stating the two-days notice (contained in the Wednesday edition of the Driftwood) did not provide enough time for opponents to express their feelings concerning the proposal.

The Trust rebutted by noting it was not required by law to give any public notice of the development variance permit application, except to property owners living within 100 feet of the property subject to the permit. All land surrounding the parcel belongs to the Crown.


We believe that if the Trust is going to take the step of giving notice, it should allow enough time for all interested parties to become informed and respond. Off-island and holidaying residents should have time to let their opinions be known.

Adequate notice was especially important in this specific instance as the Trust did not give approval for a similar request last year due to extensive public opposition.

Thirteen days notice was given prior to a public meeting in December, 1991, at which a similar application for a development variance permit was made for the same Cape Keppel property. The December meeting was packed with opponents to the proposal.

In deciding against the applica-Only three opponents to the revised application attended concern over increased traffic Friday's meeting. They expressed concerns similar to those given in December.

In approving the application, the Salt Spring Island Trust Committee has done so without receiving all the public input it would have obtained, should it have given adequate notice.

Invitation given

To the Editor,

I'm not at all sure that the pages of the Driftwood are an appropriate forum for theological debate, but Pastor Rick Hill's letter in the August 5 issue cries out for a response.

I should point out, though, that quoting the Bible at me will have no effect whatever. The Christian Bible is merely one of a vast num-ber of alleged "holy books", all supposedly divinely inspired - the Vedas of India, the Upanishads, the Tibetan and Egyptian Books of the Dead, the Talmud, the Koran, Oahspe, Urantia, the book of Mormon... indeed, the Bible is perhaps one of the least impressive, riddled as it is with contradictions, absurdities, and atrocities.

However, down to specifics. Was Jesus a "perfect Man," as Vivienne Crowley proclaims? This fellow who cursed a tree for not bearing fruit out of season, and who destroyed the livelihood of a group of poor swineherds (Mark 5:13,14)? I wonder.

The book of Job (which is quite a long way from being the "oldest writings of the Old Testament," incidentally, Mr. Hill) does not mention "the Devil" at all. The Hebrew word satan simply means "adversary," and Chapters 1 and 2 of the book of Job demonstrate very clearly that Satan was merely one of God's minor functionaries, charged with the unpleasant but avoidance of having to deal with necessary task of testing the faith of God's Chosen People. All the ills inflicted on Job and his family were ordered by God. It was very much later, during Mediaeval times, that "Satan" was given horns and cloven hooves and turned into the Prince of Evil and Lord of Hell, by Christian theologians.

Pastor Hill's reference to Reginald Scot's Discovery of Witchcraft would be most amusing if the book itself wasn't so ghastly. For the most part, Scot was reporting confessions extracted under torture from suspected witches. I

imagine that if some sadistic inquisitor was busy jabbing red hot wires up under your fingernails (one of the more printable procedures regularly used), sooner or later you are going to tell him whatever he seems to want to hear. Crushing someone's joints in a screw press doesn't seem to me to be a very effective way of discovering the truth...

And "as for the suggestion (sic) that witches do not believe in hell" - the use of the word "hell" in the Witches Rune is in my opinion unfortunate, since it can lead to precisely the kind of confusion we have here. "Hell," in this context refers, not to the Christian concept of a place of eternal torment and punishment, but to the Pagan Underworld, Abode of the Dead, an important part of the Path of Initia-

Also, which Book of Shadows is being referred to here? In fact there are as many books of shadows as there are witches, since this is the term used to refer to each witch's own personal record of rituals, spells, mythology and philosophy.

Pastor Hill's reference to "lives shattered by sexual and emotional abuse," is truly ironic, coming as it does so soon after the revelations of widespread sexual, emotional, and physical abuse of hundreds of young people by Christian caregivers, at the Mount Cashel orphanage and elsewhere. Blaming the Devil for such atrocities is mere the all-too-human repression and

"Perfect love and perfect trust," are indeed the passwords of Witchraft. Many of us find it quite difficult, though, to "love and trust" some of the proponents of Christianity, a religion with a long history of war, genocide, torture, oppression, and the destruction of non-Christian peoples. Some of us, however, are still trying very hard to find common ground. I invite Pastor Hill to participate in the upcoming Interfaith dialogue in October, and meet some of the

representatives of the many non-Christian faiths on Salt Spring, including witches.

Great offense

I take great offense to Mary C. Williamson's response to Phyllis Tatum's letter of July 29, 1992. I do not know Mary and I did not attend the Comedy Night performance in question, however, I do know Phyllis and I trust her perceptions.

Our society is based on a hierarchical structure of disrespect. Only those at the top of the hierarchy: the wealthy, white, male, heterosexual, human, are deemed worthy of respect and all others are found to be worthy of varying degrees of

disrespect.

Those disrespected include women, children, people of colour, gays, lesbians, the elderly, the handicapped, all animals, and our environment.

To find humour in this societally-imposed disrespect is to find humour in rape, torture, starvation, isolation, helplessness and death.

As a survivor or witness of all these things, I know there is little real humour in pain and that we use humour only to hide our own pain, fear and shame. I applaud Phyllis Tatum's courage in speaking out and continue to be ashamed of a society that cannot hear her.



VICTORIA — Sexual abuse on Native reserves should not be used as an argument against aboriginal self-government, says Andrew Petter, British Columbia's aboriginal affairs minister.

On the contrary, self-government is much more likely to form part of the solution than the problem of sexual abuse on Native reserves, the minister said.

Petter was responding to a column in which I had criticized him for his rather weak response to a series of articles in the Victoria daily, detailing the nightmarish lives of abused Native women on four Saanich Peninsula Indian reserves.

The articles told a horror story of fear, shame and self-loathing with which the victims of the abuse lived. But it also showed the courage of some of the victims who had decided to speak up.

The controversy sparked by the series caused a Native women's leader to argue against Native self-government. Sharon McIvor, a B.C. lawyer and acting speaker for the Native Womens' Association of Canada, said her group was appealing to politicians not to abandon Native women to the mercy of the men who govern band councils.

While I never believed Petter wasn't horrified by the revelations, I found his response somewhat lukewarm. It seemed to me that he was more concerned about his agenda of Native selfgovernment than the plight of the victims of sexual abuse on

Implies racial basis for such abuse

Maybe Petter had second thoughts, too. In his response to my criticism, he said he cares deeply about the plight of aboriginal women, "and indeed all people, who are victims of sexual

He stressed that to assume sexual abuse on reserves was an aboriginal problem was to imply a racial basis for such abuse.

"The 1984 Badgley Repot estimated that one in two women and one in three men in Canada have been victims of unwanted sexual acts. And the problem is likely much worse in communities with a history of poverty and social deprivation," Pet-

Nor was the use of pressure and intimidation to silence victims of sexual abuse unique to any culture, he added, pointing to a recent national study which concluded that nine out of 10 sexual assaults in Canada aren't reported to police.

Inability of justice system is main reason

"The pressure that inhibits victims from speaking out are rooted in the very power relations and systemic attitudes that give rise to such abuse," Petter said.

Petter sees the inability of Canada's justice system as the main reason for the failure of sexual abuse victims, including aboriginal victims, to speak out.

"Many victims are loathe to subject themselves to criminal proceedings in which, more often than not, they are the ones placed on trial," he said.

The minister makes a valid point. Even though the system has somewhat curtailed the latitude of defence lawyers trying to place the victim of sexual abuse on trial, it is still a traumatic experience many women would rather not go through.

On the other hand, it is infinitely more difficult for Native women to publicly confront their tormentors than it is for non-Native women. Reserves are tightly-knit communities than can exert far greater pressure on their members to conform with the

As Sandra Douglas-Tubb, executive director of the Victoria Native Friendship Centre, pointed out, there is almost a "psychology of enslavement," on reserves because the women are dependent on the band for their housing, their food, their utilities, even their clothing. Anyone breaking the code of silence pays a price, she said.

Not all arguments stand up to scrutiny

Finally, Petter rejected any suggestion that a Native justice program, designed to deal with offences by Natives in their own traditional ways was in some way exacerbating the problem of sexual abuse of women on reserves.

"Clearly, the project is not implicated in the causes of sexual abuse. Nor can it be argued that the project poses an substantial barrier to obtaining justice in sexual abuse cases," he said.

"Such cases are seldom eligible for diversion and even then, diversion can occur only if the victim consents and if recommended by the police and Crown Counsel," he added.

Well, minister, I give you full marks for coming up with a better response than the off-the-cuff one a while ago. I also don't doubt that you care. But not all your arguments stand up to closer scrutiny.

Studies have shown that sexual abuse is far worse in Native communities than in the rest of British Columbia. And while sexual abuse is rooted, to a great extent, in poverty and despair,

Sheep targeted

I went to the trailer and asked the woman there if the sheep were always down on the range. She asked "is there was a problem?" and I told her I was concerned about the sheep being hurt.

She informed me that you couldn't hurt the sheep because of the wool coat and hard heads that sheep have and that that (pointing to my leashed, sitting dog) was more dangerous to the sheep than golf balls were . . . and don't worry, we take good care of our sheep!

I would like to take issue to that I don't think subjecting an animal to excessive, unnecessary fear, shock and injury is taking

I grew up next to a large golf course and daily would look for balls, and resell them. I was hit by a ball (luckily a weak hook) and it was pretty serious. I've seen two others hit, and it was almost fatal. I think that if a sheep was hit on the nose, the eye, the ear, behind the ear, the elbows, or legs, it could do damage (it would certainly hurt physically, and mentally I'm sure it's no picnic).

Maybe hitting balls at sheep at the driving range is good for business, I don't know, but I think it is pretty tacky, and it should stop.

Timely question

To the Editor,

The Driftwood's question of the week in the August 12 edition, "Do you think there should be restrictions on logging on private land," is very timely.

Those of us who thought the controversy about private land logging was behind us because there are no more large pieces of land to clear-cut are sadly mistaken.

Recently, we learned that 500 acres of the Hollings' land is up for sale. Included in this property is a 100-acre parcel adjacent to the Ecological Reserve near Mt. Tuam.

It is my understanding that Weldwood, which owns about 700 acres in the Fulford Valley, is also looking to sell or trade its property, after rejecting such offers from the community two years ago.

There must be rules of some kind governing logging practices on private land to avoid the recurrence of abuses on Salt Spring and other Gulf Islands. These abuses are generally not occurring on farm

holdings but on so-called "managed forest land" or land being developed for subdivision.

Mr. Ken Byron voiced some legitimate concerns of farmland owners in the August 19 issue of the Driftwood. For example, new regulations could be unfair to farmers and could backfire if they force the sale or subdivision of large land holdings.

But the proponents of private logging rules have always argued that clearings below a minimum size, for legitimate farm use should be exempt from regulation. Also, rules would encourage, not penalize, the selective cutting methods Mr. Byron refers to in the article.

The best way to ensure that rules are appropriate is to develop them through consensus, with full participation of those affected.

The time to work on the issue is now - not when we are in the midst of another crisis. The Trust should revisit this issue in developing its new policy.

As part of this process, our local trustees should appoint a committee with a balanced representation and with a clear mandate to develop recommendations regarding private land logging regulations and practices on Salt Spring.

Weather report

There could be a substantial ozone depletion loss if certain weather conditions prevail, as of next spring, according to a former NASA director. He was ordered to suppress the information but decided it was sufficiently important to inform the public so he released it and resigned.

The federal government has disregarded this information, and declared a state of environmental emergency.

But as of June 22, the Standing Committee on the Environment— a three party parliamentary committee—confirmed this report.

One of the main sources of ozone depletion is space shuttle takeoffs and other military operations. Use of halons is responsible for about half of the depletion. For more info on this, call Bruce Torrie, 477-0555.

As far as other climate change factors, pulp mills in B.C. produce around half the greenhouse gasses and automobiles around one third, and it is believed that around 40 per cent of this is absorbed by the ocean. There has been a proposal to build a megacomputer to measure these effects by Dr. Pat Moore of the Carbon Project.

My feeling is that we must decentralize the department of the

environment and make information more accessible to the public. Our climate obviously concerns all of us.

Finally, what you can do to help prevent illness is eat plenty of garlic (preferably raw), shitake mushrooms (which are cultivated in the rotting oak and birch trees) and lobby government to stop CFC production before 1995 and wear protective clothing.





Local tells Harcourt she's bappy with Act

An adult victim of child sexual abuse is praising the provincial government for its plans to implement the Limitation Amendment

The Salt Spring resident wishes to remain anonymous but would like people to know the value of the proposed act and the depth of devastation on victims of sexual

If the act passes, there will no longer be a time limit for launching civil suits against offenders. The current limit is two years although there is no limit for pressing criminal charges.

In writing to premier Mike Harcourt to express support for the bill, the woman says "I believe that the two year limit on civil legal action against the offender should be removed, because I and thousands of other British Columbians could not possibly know or understand the damage done until years after

"Imagine a child of, say, 13, understanding the ramifications of this type of abuse and bringing legal action against the offender. Many people, in fact, do not even remember the abuse until they reach the safety of middle age."

The letter writer suffered sexual abuse from the age of three through 11, followed by "intermittent violent beatings" through puberty.

Children in and outside the family unit were also affected.

"No doubt the list is longer than anyone but he knows.

'As a victim of this debilitating crime I can attest to the horrendous havoc it wreaks in the victim's life. It is indeed life- threatening, and the term survivor is literally ac-

"Countless people have died as a result of this crime, through suicide and through a complete lack of self-value, leading to involvement with people who repeatedly victimize the victim, until a misfortune closes the gap between a brush with death and death itself." The woman says that despite a happy marriage and therapy "I still suffer daily from the continuing effects of this crime. I suffer from insomnia, anxiety, depression, tension, lack of concentration, loss of memory and fatigue."

She tells Harcourt she is not sure if she would consider pressing charges against her father but says "for the sake of others, if not myself, I do appreciate your bringing this issue to the fore.

"I see this new bill as a very positive and necessary step towards righting a terrible injustice to countless thousands of victims and also as a definite deterrent to those who perpetrate this crime.'

Harvesting is closed from Long Harbour south on the east side of Salt Spring and from Vesuvius Bay south on the west down to and including Saanich Inlet and Satellite Channel, the Victoria fisheries office said Monday.

The area includes all of Mayne, Galiano, the Penders and Saturna and smaller islands in the area.

Closures have been in effect for about three months.

Public beach areas should be posted with the red tide warning, said the fisheries spokesman, but that is not always the case.

Consumption of even small amounts of shellfish contaminated by saxitoxin, the algae which causes red tide, can lead to swift death through paralytic shellfish poisoning.

People can contact Fisheries and Oceans at 363-3252 for up-to-date information on red tide closures.

Hunting regulations reviewed prior to season

Warm August days may not stir images of fall hunting season, but that time has almost returned.

Hunting season runs from September 12 to November 29 inclusive this year.

In an attempt to avoid or reduce the kind of conflict between hunters and residents experienced on Salt Spring last fall, environment ministry conservation officer Ken Broadland took some time recently to review hunting regulations with the Driftwood.

Private property rights and the Trespass Act will be covered in a future article.

We want to advise people of the regulations so they'll be more knowledgeable about what hunters can and can't do," said Broadland.

Hunters need a handful of licences to legally hunt in the Gulf Islands.

They must have a Resident Hunting Licence, which will only be issued to persons with a Hunter Number Card which may be obtained by adults in one of two ways. They must complete the Conservation Outdoor Recreation Education (CORE) program safer firearms handling test and written examination or another North American government sponsored hunter safety training program.

A Hunter Number Card can also be obtained by applicants who can prove they once held a valid hunting licence in North America while over the age of 14.

Youths between the ages of 14 and 19 can apply for a hunting licence in the presence of a parent or guardian and a junior hunting licence may be issued to parents on behalf of their children 10 to 13 years of age. No one under the age of 10 may hunt or carry a firearm.

A Firearms Acquisition Certificate is required and may be obtained from a firearms dealer or the RCMP.

A Gulf Islands Special Licence is mandatory and it includes liability insurance.

A story about a classic Volkswagen van disappearance had a happy ending before its purchaser experienced too much agony.

thing," he said. On Sunday he received a call from the Ganges RCMP informing him the van had been found in the possession of a local garage whose operators thought authority had

A species licence is also required for each species sought. Fees are outlined in the 1992-93 **Hunting and Trapping Regulations** Synopsis.

There are limits on the number of deer hunters can kill in a hunting season.

"They are allowed to shoot three deer, one of which can be antlerless or three bucks," explained Broadland.

A buck or "antlered" deer is one which shows "visible bone," he said. Having skin-covered bumps on its head does not qualify the animal as "antlered."

Antlerless season is from November 7 to 15 this year and is usually the busiest week for hunting on the Gulf Islands.

Shotguns only may be used in the Gulf Islands and they must use shot size "SG" or larger. A new regulation states shotguns must be plugged and cannot be capable of carrying more than two shells. One may be in the breech and two in the magazine of the firearm.

It's the hunter's responsibility to make sure it is plugged," stressed Broadland.

It is illegal for firearms to be loaded while in or on a motor

Firearms cannot be discharged within 25 metres (82 feet) of the travelled portion of any paved or unpaved road on the Gulf Islands, said Broadland.

Discharge is also prohibited within 100 metres (328 feet) of buildings occupied by people or domestic animals, e.g. a chicken coop or barn.



Hunters must also cancel their species tag licence as soon as possible upon killing an animal. The licence should be kept with the animal at all times although Broadland said some discretion is allowed by conservation officers in certain circumstances.

"It is always best however if the deer and species tag licence stay together," he advised.

Broadland stressed that Fish and Wildlife Branch conservation personnel will be regularly patrolling the Gulf Islands and especially Salt Spring this year.

Matheson said the Legion doesn't get the chance to thank everyone in the community for support of the November "poppy appeal," but it is appreciated.

In 1991, B.C. Legions awarded more than \$250,000 in bursaries for higher education and a further \$12,500 in special education grants. The Ladies' Auxiliaries raised more than \$3 million last year for deserving charities like the Red Cross and education and health care in B.C.

The Legion gives \$110,000 per year to support the Department of Family Practice and a community geriatric division at the University of British Columbia.

More than \$300,000 went to support local sports, including sending young B.C. athletes and coaches to a national athletic camp.

Islanders Karen and Eva Pedersen have recently received several requests from Yusef - who is now married and living in Jeddah, Saudi Arabia - for financial aid to help his family still in war- torn and drought-stricken Somalia.

... Dears, sure the situation life of my family are in the worst. They are dying because of hungry — they get drought because of the war," wrote Yusef.

"Believe me, my father had get blind for without food, others, they eat the green leaves - disaster!

"For that, today I really need your helping. So I am kindly requesting you to convey my needs to all my friends that I have on the island in order to send me money.

The Pedersens have investigated options for getting funds to Yusef and believe the best way is to telegraph money through Western Union in Victoria.

Eva Pedersen said Yusef also sends greetings to all the people he met here in 1984.

Recycling depot donates glass

There is no coloured glass glut left at the Salt Spring Recycling

Fifty-three tons of crushed glass or six dump truck loads — has been transported to the new secondary school site on Rainbow Road in the past couple of weeks for use as drainage material in site prepara-

"It was our donation to the new school," said depot coordinator Rick Laing Friday after the last truckload was gone.

The glass is being used to improve drainage under the future parking lot and playing fields.

But as the September I date for raising overdue fines at the library approaches, due notice must be given. The bad news is that from that date onwards an overdue book will cost 20 cents per day per book.

At last - change of subject. The Bessie Dane Foundation whose volunteers provide such selfless and valuable hospice service on the island, has donated several books on the subject of death, dying, grief and how to talk to people in those situations. These books are most gratefully received by the library and are already being borrowed regularly. To find them look under the subject heading "Hospice" in the card catalogue.

Belated congratulations to islander Phyllis Webb for her recent award for her contribution to Canadian poetry. The library was intending to display her work and found all her books were out.

A recent Driftwood article featured Olive Clayton, honoured for her many contributions in the arts field on the island. The article did not mention that Olive has also been a library volunteer for many years. You guessed it - in charge of the art books. Well done, Olive.


A Saturday morning 10 a.m. to noon class will explore stretches, isolations and isolation dancing, along with some free dancing.





It happened off Coal Island which is just east of the tip of Saanich Peninsula, one morning in early August.

Mowbray, who keeps his 18foot inboard-outboard powered boat at the Fulford Marina, headed over to the area to try to catch a spring salmon or two, reputed to be running in the strait. Soon after he settled down to do some quiet trolling, a moderately heavy, low fog rolled in.

Remembering his training, Mowbray kept his eye on his compass and maintained a steady course at trolling speed. Suddenly he spotted a yellow object floating in the water some distance to port.

Closer examination revealed it to be a person wearing a life jacket thrashing around in near panic.

Mowbray quickly reeled in his line and altered course to approach the individual.

As he got closer he cut the motor (as he had been instructed to do) and quickly unshipped a collapsible boarding ladder — a piece of equipment he purchased following advice he received from the boating course instructor.

He also put on his life jacket. By

this time he had drifted close to the individual who was floundering around in the water. He instructed him to put one foot on the base plate of the motor and swing the other foot onto the ladder.

In short order, the youth was over the stern and into the safety of the cockpit, a soaking, shivering very frightened 10-year-old.

As Mowbray helped him strip off his wet clothing, gave him a quick rub down and wrapped him in a warm blanket the young fellow explained he had been helping his father on their sail boat when somehow he slipped over the stern and into the water.

As the vessel was under power it quickly disappeared into the fog and because the motor was running his parents had not heard him shouting for help. It was very frightening. He estimated he had been in the water for a very long 15 minutes when Mowbray spotted

Once the young fellow was calmed down and warming up, Mowbray attended to his boat, starting the engine and checking the course. Fortunately, although the fog was still around, it was low on the water and he spotted the tip of a mast with a radar device.

He headed towards it, hoping it belonged to the vessel from which the young fellow had fallen.

In a short time he was along side and delivering the boy to a couple of highly distraught parents. Their gratitude was overwhelming.

While the mother whisked her young son below decks for a change of clothes, and a hot drink, the father explained they were near panic when they discovered their son missing. They didn't know


