

School of Fine Arts opens doors on island

Salt Spring has a new school opening this week - the School of Fine Arts. The school is actually a natural expansion of the School of Sculpture which has been running courses since March 1991.

Simon Henson is director of the new school, and feels the time is right for the expansion. For the last two seasons, the School of Sculpture has been offering courses in three-dimensional modelling and carving in wood and stone.

But, Henson said, as interest in the school grew, so did a need for anatomy classes and instruction in

"People who use clay do make drawings. We established a course," he said, "to help people who came to learn how to use clay.'

The courses arose from the needs of the students learning about

"We had to provide a wider perspective," Henson said. "We were already on our way to becoming an art establishment.'

In many ways, Salt Spring Island is an ideal location for a new art-instruction facility

The community has an incredible creative reputation," Henson said. "There are well known and talented people from every discipline here.

There are also people who want to use their time creatively or continue their studies from the past, he said. "Put these together and you have an art institute.'

There's a void in the educational system, he said. "A lot of students have had basic training. They are renewing their creativity and going in new directions." They are also pursuing their art allied to other interests and the set-up on Salt Spring is a convenient place to pursue those combined interests.

The school can synchronize students' time requirements. Classes are held during the day, in the evening and even on Saturdays to accommodate both students and instructors.

There are people out there who want this kind of instruction, Henson said, and the school is a platform for it.


Henson has been involved in teaching at the college level and in summer program and workshop environments both in England and in Canada. He has strong feelings about teachers of art being working, creative artists.

"I am prepared to put my fulltime energy, my time as a practising artist and my enthusiasm for art to work," he said.

But he is not alone doing this. At least half a dozen island artists will be involved in the school. Henson said his role was one of facilitating and coordinating the energy that's already on the island.

Classes in the new school are all over the island, not just in the school studio on Sky Valley Road.

"What's nice about the fact we're decentralized is that we work within each artist's studio. The environment is so stimulating," Henson said. "You see the creative side of the instructor, the work they produce, what inspires them. This gives the student a sense of confidence in the instructor teaching

Mary Morden is a student and an instructor in the school, teaching basic drawing while learning about modelling in clay.

'Clay is a new medium for me," she said. "Exploring properties and techniques, taking my knowledge of the human figure and putting it into clay — for me this is a whole new thing."

The expansion of the school of sculpture into the school of fine arts has been a process with its own momentum. The future is hard to predict, Henson said.

"There are other aspects of art school we were being asked about," he said. Sculpture uses similar techniques and materials as

"Why not have pottery?" he said. "We may be looking at movement as art. How can we turn that into an instructional part of the school? Staying with sculpture is too limiting.'

But whatever the future holds, Henson is clear growth will be controlled and financially responsible.

"We will keep it focused so we can control growth and not get out of hand financially," he said. "We will evolve at a pace that feels

For the time being, residents and visitors can sign up for the new expanded roster of sculpture, pottery, drawing and painting classes which started January 18.

For example, if your vision is to be fit, healthy and a certain weight, and you currently weigh 30 pounds over, you obviously cannot do it all today. So what must you do first?

Change your diet. Can you do that today? What must you do first? Get proper foods. Can you do that today? No. What must you do first? Gather information about healthy eating plans. Can you do that today? Not completely. What must you do first? Find the information. Can you do that today? No. What must you do first? Call the Nutrition Centre to see if they have such information. Can you do that right

now. Yes! That is where to start. That's your first step.

Identifying first steps - small,

easy-to-take actions - overcomes inertia and the fear preventing you from acting. Taking several creates a pattern of success, increases confidence and builds momentum.



Rabies: threat is real, dangerous

Two recent cases of rabies in household pets in the Lower Mainland have put the disease into people's minds again.

Comical images of dogs foaming at the mouth disguise the fact that almost all cases of rabies are fatal. The disease is serious and the threat is real.

We must be cognizant of the fact of the ever-present threat," Salt Spring veterinarian Dr. Claus Andress said last week. "In Ontario every dog and cat had to be vaccinated. Here we have the choice."

It is a natural disease in bats, skunks, foxes and raccoons, though all warm-blooded animals are susceptible. Rabies is a virus which attacks the central nervous system and is transmitted through saliva, such as from a bite, Andress said. The virus has an incubation period of between 15 and 50 days.

Rabies shows itself in two distinct ways, Andress said. In the furious form, the sufferer becomes aggressive. This is the classic foam-in-mouth rabid animal. Often, Andress said, the threat from this animal is less because its aggression keeps other animals away.

In the paralytic form, the disease causes paralysis of the throat and mouth and general sluggishness. The animal looks sick, Andress said, and humans might approach it to help. At that time, the animal could bite them.

There are very few recoveries from rabies, he said, either among animals or humans. Animals which have rabies must be put down and sent to a laboratory for examination or put into quarantine for four

The greatest protection for humans is to have animals vaccinated, Andress said. Humans' contact with the disease is almost always through a pet. Vaccination will protect both the pet and its



Services available for victims of effects of childhood abuse

Services are available on Salt Spring for teens and adults trying to overcome the longterm effects of childhood sexual abuse.

Sexual Assault Recovery Anonymous (SARA) has organized a local support group, which can be accessed through the group's main office in Surrey.

A SARA Society letter states: "Many adult survivors of sexual abuse carry a secret burden of anger, guilt and shame that inhibits their ability to function in the family, workplace and in society. They may suffer from depression, anxiety, withdrawal or aggression. Some may be self-destructive or destructive toward others, and many have problems with drinking or drugs."

SARA is a registered non-profit charitable organization with membership open to anyone who was a victim of sexual abuse or incest as a child.

In addition to sponsoring several support groups in B.C., Canada and the United States, SARA represents sexual abuse victims as a group in advocating for social change and produces educational materials for the public.

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

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

Nicotine patch won't ensure magical quit smoking ploy

Tobacco is the number one cause of early death in Canada and the major cause of preventable death around the world.

It accounts for 70 per cent of all chronic lung disease deaths, 30 per cent of all cancer deaths, and 20 per cent of all heart attack deaths.

There is no question that smoking is an addiction which can easily kill you," pointed out Dr. Frederic Bass, Medical Director of the Stop Smoking Program at Vancouver General Hospital.

"However, it is also an addiction that can be stopped by making a serious commitment to a change in lifestyle.

Today, Wednesday, January 20, is Weedless Wednesday which encourages all smokers to kick the

The transdermal skin (or nicotine) patch has recently gained widespread recognition as an effective aid for stopping smoking.

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"It is definitely a step forward, but is not a magical cure for stop-ping smoking," stated Bass. "You should not use the patch unless you have set a target date for quitting smoking, and you should not use it without consulting with a doctor

"It is extremely important that you don't smoke when using the nicotine patch," emphasized Dr. Bass. "By doing so you can easily suffer from an overdose of nicotine which can be lethal."

The patch is easy to use and comes in seven, 14 and 21 milligram doses.

Addiction to the patch should not be a major concern.

'Smokers are already addicted to nicotine before they start using the patch, as well as carbon monoxide and over 300 toxic and carcinogenic chemicals in cigarette smoke," pointed out Bass. "So although the ultimate goal is to defeat their addiction, if a smoker becomes addicted to the nicotine in the patch alone it's much better than the original addiction to everything in a cigarette.'

There is no easy way to stop smoking.

"The addiction is comprised of four elements: chemical, behaviourial, psychological, and social," Bass said.

Conquering the addiction requires persistence and repeated efforts. According to Bass, the average smoker who is trying to quit has spent 1,000 weeks building his/her habit, so the smoker usually won't be able to beat it in only 10 weeks.

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

Yet, statistics tell us that 90 per cent of Americans will marry at least once during their lifetime. The sad reality is that almost one out of every two marriages won't make it. In Canada the divorce rate continues to hold around 42 per cent.

Why do so many people choose their "lifelong" partners so poorly? Two thoughts come to mind. First, most young people receive little or no instruction on how to choose a life partner. Second, society specifically TV and the movie industry - teach people to rely almost exclusively on their "natural instincts" when making their choice.

I came across an article by psychologist Dr. Neil Warren in which he describes six traps to avoid when choosing a life partner. I'd like to share them with you.

1. Deciding Too Quickly. Kansas State University found a strong correlation between length of time spent dating and current marital satisfaction. Couples who dated for more than two years scored consistently high on marital satisfaction.

Conclusion: The risk of marital failure is significantly reduced by longer dating periods.

2. Deciding too young. Again statistics find that people who marry young are seldom prepared for marriage. The divorce rate for couples 21 and 22 years of age is twice as high as it is for 24- and 25-year-olds. A few years seems to make a big difference.

3. Over-eagerness. There are lots of reasons why people are too eager to get married. Some are looking for a way to get out of the house. Others are worried their partner will have a change of heart. Or maybe they're tired of being alone on weekends.


4. Choosing a partner to please someone else. Just because the invitations are out and the cake has been bought, doesn't mean you have to go through with it.

5. Not enough experience base. Young couples contemplating marriage need to do more than gaze into each other's eyes. They need to talk about the real issues of life: career, further education, their relationships with their parents, how they handle conflict, children, how to balance the cheque book.

6. Unrealistic expectations. "He'll change, I know he will!"

People have been trying to change their spouses but not with overwhelming success.

By avoiding these traps and making wise decisions you will be well on your way to a lifetime of meaning. So, no more second-rate choices. Great marriages can be our

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cludes unwanted circumstances you have a strategic opportunity to re-create structural tension. He suggests a simple technique you can learn to do easily and quickly:

1. Notice what is going on, and what you are saying to yourself about it, yourself and any other people involved.

2. Ask yourself if what you are saying is consistent with what you really want. Does it support your vision?

3. Then ask yourself, "What do I want?" relative to the situation. Answer by envisioning a complete, fully realized picture of what you want.

4. Formally choose what you want by saying the words "I choose ..." and filling in the rest with what

5. Move on, taking whatever next steps occur to you at that point. Notice the results. Make any adjustments needed, and move on to your next step.

This simple technique is very powerful. You can use it when you are angry, frustrated, depressed, or any time things don't go the way you'd like. You do not need an elaborate plan, you just need to know your next few steps.

You can let action emerge from the creative tension you set up. Creating is about inventing and innovating - about making up the best process with which to achieve your vision. Fritz says, "in the house of the creator, invention takes precedence over convention.

Practice makes better

Few of us are born with the skills and talent to achieve our visions. But we are all learners. Learning comes from trying things, correcting mistakes and practising until the new becomes natural.

If we insist that practice makes us perfect we are doomed to frustration, because perfection is an illusion. But we can get consistent-

A friend of mine wanted to be a good guitar player, but every time she tried to learn she was struck by a gap between her great ability and "great." She wasn't, so in her mind she was bad. So she'd quit.

Then a friend showed her three chords basic to country songs. After a little practice, she played a whole song. That confused her. She still wasn't good, but she was no longer bad. Then it hit her, she was better! She stopped trying to be perfect, and focused on getting better. In no time she was playing with grace and excellence.

Creating any kind of success is almost always a step-by-step process. If you try to make it an all-or-nothing leap, too often you end up with nothing. However, with patience and practice you are much more likely to produce the results you truly want.

Know when you reach your goal

It's not enough to say "I want to be happier," or "I want to be successful."

General, unspecified goals can lead to endless, unsatisfying action. You can always be happier, or more successful. Without specific criteria for judging outcomes, you are like a dog chasing its tail, seeking success but never knowing when you achieve it.

Success as a guitar player might mean playing "Home on the Range," or playing professionally. It's up to you. Each of us specifies our own goals.

Holding a clear vision of what you want in tension with a description of what you currently have not only gives you a framework for action, it gives you a way of judging your progress and knowing when you have completed what you set out to create.

Work has been carried out over the past few weeks to ready Montague Harbour's wharf and ramp as Galiano's temporary ferry terminal in place of Sturdies Bay.

The move was made necessary by the proposed reconstruction of the Sturdies Bay wharf. The work begins this week.

Enquiries from the B.C. Ferry Corporation about the schedules for the construction period (January 19 to March 2) provided only a limited amount of information. Both the Queen of Cumberland and the Queen of Tsawwassen will use the Montague terminal for most runs.

The exception is the early morning sailing for the mainland. Travellers wishing to catch this ferry will have to get to Montague Harbour much earlier than usual for the morning mainland sailing. They will board the Queen of Cumberland at 6:35 for Village Bay, disembark there and wait on Mayne Island until the arrival of the regular Long Harbour-Tsawwassen run which departs Village Bay at 8 a.m. and arrives at Tsawwassen at 9:25 a.m.

A positive aspect in all this for a limited number of Galiano's citizens anticipating the three-hour voyage to the mainland (as opposed to the usual 55-minute crossing), is that the Montague departure point is a much shorter trip down-island for North Galiano folk than the distance they usually have to travel.

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
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
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
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
