


Financial aid available

Financial assistance from the Provincial Emergency Program (PEP) will be available to some people who suffered losses in the blizzard and flood which occurred between December 28 and January 1 in southwestern B.C.

The key is that losses must be "uninsurable." If insurance is available and the owner has chosen not to purchase that insurance, then the claim is not eligible for provincial assistance.

Highway crews re-open road, repair undercut

Scalers swinging on ropes over the site of the North End Road mudslide Saturday knocked more rocks, dirt and broken branches onto the pile blocking the road in preparation for its re-opening to traffic Monday evening.

Removing loose rock was the first step in clearing the slide and re-opening the road. Work started Monday morning to remove the rock, dirt and trees which came down with the collapse of a shale bank New Year's Eve. Total cost was estimated at \$10,000.

Traffic on Fulford-Ganges Road was expected to remain restricted to one lane until today (Wednesday) or Thursday, when repairs should be completed. JJM Maintenance superintendent John Weighill estimates more than \$25,000 is being spent to repair the roadbed near the Cranberry Road intersection, half of which was washed away by a combination of rain and melting snow December 31.

'It's a heritage site, actually," Weighill remarked. Part of the road's culvert was an old-fashioned square tunnel made of rocks fitted together. Butted up against it was an old asphalt-coated metal culvert, part of which had corrod-

JJM began moving in rock to rebuild the road Monday morning and planned to slide a new culvert into the existing culverts to re-direct the water. Drainage rock is water flow through the hill.

The undercutting of the roadbed was caused by a variety of factors, Weighill said. First, piles of snow blocked the ditches, so water flowing down Cranberry Road washed away the road shoulder. The fill surrounding the culvert became saturated with water and washed away.

The metal culvert had rusted out at the bottom and could not contain the water. Weighill said it will be up to the Ministry of Transportation and Highways to determine how much more work should be done on the road.

The maintenance company is also waiting for a ministry decision on future upgrading of Walker Hook Road, parts of which dropped following the storm. Barricades mark the hazardous sections and some parts are restricted to one-way traffic.

"Anything we do now would just be a fix," Weighill said.

Douglas Road, which leads down to the Salt Spring Sailing Club, was also undercut by rushing water and closed. Weighill said nothing can be done about that road as long as the ground is saturated with water. Input from the highways ministry is also required before work on Douglas Road commences.

Weighill said the total cost of snow removal during the last week of December and repairs to flooded roads is still being deter-

SPCA horrified by animals' state

At midnight tonight (Wednesday), 30 animals removed from Quail Meadows Farm on Salt Spring Island-December 13 are expected to come officially under the custody of the Salt Spring SPCA.

One of the rescued animals, a Nubian goat, died December 26 despite the efforts of a veterinarian and volunteers. But the remaining animals - four llamas, four dogs, 13 pigs, three piglets, two boars, two goats, a ferret and a cat - are recovering from neglect.

If owners Kevin Clark and Cara Clements cannot meet conditions to redeem the animals by midnight today, all 30 become custody of the SPCA. At that point, new homes will be sought.

Volunteers who helped remove

condition and that of the farm. In one room of the house, a dog was found standing in six inches of feces. Dog feces covered the floor in other rooms as well.

"It's just amazing that people slept in this house," said Richard Krieger, a local llama breeder called in to help rescue the llamas.

"They were skin and bones," Krieger said. There were also dead animals — pigs, two goats, a ferret and a dog. It was the carcasses and the malnourished animals still alive that prompted a B.C. Hydro meter reader to call in the complaint to authorities.

They were the skinniest, most malnourished animals I've ever seen," Krieger said. "There was not a blade of grass to eat in that pasture."

Transit boosters need to look at demographics, too

There's more to the implications of demographics than ice rink usage when looking at the future needs of Salt Spring Island.

Last week this space offered some thoughts on the prospects for the utilization of an ice arena and an arts centre, given the steadily advancing years of the Baby Boom. But other ideas put forward by David Foot in his book Boom, Bust & Echo have relevance here in the Gulf Islands.

Foot forecasts a strong future for the small specialty store as boomers, having both money and time as they get older, will tend to patronize such shops. That's because they'll be looking for quality goods and services and will take the time and spend the money necessary to get them.

Places like Ganges and Chemainus have seen a healthy increase in the number of such stores. From a demographic standTONY

point, their investors can look forward to a healthy future.

I don't know if bus operator John Cade should be quite as bullish about the prospects for public transit on Salt Spring, but given some facts about an aging population there may be hope.

Publicly financed transit, Foot says, only works in areas with high population densities. Transit systems have become extremely expensive to run because they offer extensive service in suburban areas where ridership is low.

One answer is to let private operators do it, or at the least tailor the service to meet the needs of the population. The bulk of

the population is in the boomer age group—currently between 30 and 49. In the next few years, these people will have more time on their hands and therefore be more inclined to use a transit service, but only if it's a good one.

Foot suggests the use of smaller, more cost-efficient buses that circulate on side roads so riders needn't have to walk far to a bus stop. And why not stop whenever the bus is hailed? These innovations spell quality service, and might even justify a higher fare, somewhere between regular bus fare and taxi fare.

There is, however, another group of transit users coming. The Baby Boom Echo consists of children of the boomers and they are now aged under 12 years. As Foot writes, this group is about to move into its prime, transit-using years. Quality is not an issue with young bus riders, but price is

John Cade, who has been struggling for

some time to keep a bus service running on Salt Spring, may have a solution for addressing the financial dilemma of providing that service without going bankrupt.

He has suggested a surcharge (\$1, \$2?) on non-resident vehicle fares on the ferries. Given one estimate that visitor cars total 400,000 per year that would raise what Cade sees as enough money for an extensive transit service.

The total number of cars seems rather high but the numbers are unimportant at this stage. We need to think first about the concept and decide if it's workable.

Given demographic information that would indicate a growing future demand for transit, and a highway infrastructure that is going to become woefully inadequate at current population growth levels, this is a topic which needs our attention.

Something to think about now that life has returned to some semblance of normality.

Assessments reveal minor changes

Word on 1997 assessments should be showing up in island mailboxes, with more than 12,000 assessment notices being sent to Gulf Islands property owners by the Capital Assessment Office.

Overall, there have only been minor changes in property values, noted area assessor Dave Hitchcock.

"The real estate market determines the value of property and B.C. Assessment reports that value to the property owner and taxing authorities," he said.

Compared to previous years, he described market changes as "relatively modest."

For example, a non-waterfront property on Salt Spring which was worth \$200,000 in the summer of 1995 had the same value a year later. But a waterfront property on the south side of the island valued at \$420,000 in July 1995 increased in value to \$440,000

Values changed little on Galiano, North Pender, South Pender and Saturna islands, Hitchcock reported.

Ganges coast guard aids

storm clean-up efforts

Cleaning up after the big storm tied up the Ganges coast guard crew between December 30 and January 6 as they and the Skua were called out

to help deal with 33 sunken boats at the Capital City Yacht Club in North

Saanich

The boats sank after boathouses collapsed under heavy snow. The immediate problem was pollution in the harbour, as oil and fuel seeped out of the sunken boats.

Starting the morning of December 30, the Skua crew spread a boom to contain the spills, sopped up the mess and also tried to clear snow off still-standing sheds to prevent further collapses.

Then they worked with divers and yacht club people to raise 18 of the sunken boats, a job which they completed Monday.

"These were pretty nice boats and they looked pretty rough," said officer-in-charge Dave Howell. But overall, he suspects most can be repaired. Owners now have their winter and spring project waiting for them and

Howell also predicts local boatyards will be busy. He estimates 75 per cent of the damaged boats were insured.

Earlier during the storm the Ganges coast guard helped with a medical evacuation from North Pender on December 29. The crew picked up a snowed-in patient from a waterfront home for transfer to Swartz Bay.

A single mother was almost in tears as she dropped off a thank-you card after receiving her Christmas hamper through Salt Spring Community Services.

For hamper project coordinator Anne Williams, the emotion attached to the card underlined the significance of the 130 hampers distributed to needy families between December 18 and 20.

"That gives you a boost in the middle of the controlled chaos," she said, noting that the woman received her hamper and immediately responded with the card, while volunteers were still working at Ganges United Church to assemble the remaining hampers.

"I had a great response from the recipients," Williams added. She also had a great response from donors, whose giving exceeded that of the previous year.

"It went tremendously well," she

said. An estimated 40 to 50 volunteers helped assemble or deliver the hampers, with more potential helpers waiting in the wings for an opening.

Each hamper included a mix of fresh and canned fruit and vegetables, Christmas cake, candies, beverages like juices, hot chocolate, tea and coffee - everything except a Christmas turkey.

Embe Bakery staff worked through the night to supply fresh shortbread cookies and dinner rolls for the hampers, Williams noted.

The hampers brightened the Christmas season for an estimated 300 to 400 people

Included in the hampers headed to families were toys from Santa's Workshop. Organizer Bob Appleton said toys were collected and wrapped for 141 children.

Each child received at least three toys, Appleton said. Some were matched specifically to a child by sex and age, through the tree "angel" program at the Bank of Montreal, Canadian Imperial Bank of Commerce and the United Church.

Among the donations were 100 stuffed bears from Pat Barnes at The Tangled Web, who was showered with donated bears after some were stolen from her Christmas display, and 155 teddy bears from the liquor

Salt Spring's Santa's Workshop project had so many toys that some were taken to the Upper Room in Victoria for distribution to lowincome families in that city.

One volunteer set up a depot at Ganges fire hall and collected a number of toys. Although that venture was originally not coordinated with Santa's Workshop, Appleton said arrangements were made to pick up the remaining toys, which will be stored for future use.

Fulford ramp testing planned next week



Government help available for uninsurable storm losses

Financial assistance from the Provincial Emergency Program (PEP) will be available to some people who suffered losses in the blizzard and flood which occurred between December 28 and January 1 in southwestern B.C.

Claude Dalley, PEP manager of policy and plans, said advertising would be published in area newspapers in the coming week to let people know how they can apply for assistance.

"I'm sitting writing an ad to go in the local papers saying disaster assistance will be available for uninsurable losses," Dalley said Monday

The key is that losses must be "uninsurable." If insurance is available and the owner has chosen not to purchase that insurance, then the claim is not eligible for provincial assistance.

Eligible are homeowners, renters, small businesses which are owneroperated, charitable organizations and farms which suffered damage or loss through the blizzard or floods. Help is available to replace or restore the essential elements of a home, livelihood or community service. Claims cannot exceed \$100,000.

'It deals with essential items to help people get back on their feet," he said.

Dalley notes there is a \$1,000 deductible and the program covers only 80 per cent of the remainder. For example, if damage totalled \$10,000 and the claim was eligible for funding, the program would cover 80 per cent of \$9,000.

He expected claim application forms would be available in the provincial government agent's office. Once completed, applications must be sent to the PEP office in Victoria for assessment.

Adjusters visit sites with allowable claims and determine the amount to be paid, Dalley said.

A formal declaration of Vancouver Island, Salt Spring or the Lower Mainland as a "disaster area" has nothing to do with the claims process, Dalley said.

In the United States, areas hit by devastating floods or snowstorms or other natural disasters are frequently declared "disaster areas" because such a declaration must be made to obtain help from a more senior level of government.

For example, Dalley noted a city in the U.S. would have to declare itself a disaster area to get help from the county; the county would have to declare itself a disaster area to get help from the state; and the state would have to do the same to obtain federal assistance.

"Up here (in Canada), you don't have to declare a disaster," Dalley said. "All you have to do is ask."

Salt Spring's Emergency Social Services group requested sandbags from the provincial program and 5,000 were sent to the island. Dalley said all that is required for assistance in Canada is to demonstrate a need

In Canada, assistance for those hit by natural disasters is provided by the province. If the cost exceeds \$1 per capita or, in B.C., \$3.8 million, then the federal government can be asked to pick up part of the cost, Dalley explained.

Disaster assistance only covers extraordinary costs, Dalley said, not the normal cost of city workers or emergency personnel doing their jobs.

Man acquitted after judge decides act inappropriate but not indecent

A Salt Spring man was acquitted in provincial court of wilfully committing an indecent act when Judge J. Michael Hubbard decided that standing naked on his Fernwood-area deck was "inappropriate" but not "inde-

Hubbard dismissed the charge in Ganges provincial court last week after hearing from two Crown witnesses and a case-law-loaded argument by defence counsel Mayland McKimm.

Hubbard also dismissed a charge of exposing genital organs for sexual purposes to a person under 14 years old, noting that the evidence in the alleged offence did not suggest any sexual purpose.

None of the individuals involved in the case can be identified due to a court-ordered ban prohibiting publication of information that could identify the nine-year-old child who took the stand.

The court learned that on June 7 last year a woman and her two boys were walking down Fernwood Road on their way home from school just before 3:30 p.m.

The nine-year-old child and his mother told the court they were talking loudly and bouncing a basketball on the road when the boy looked back over his right shoulder and saw a man standing naked on the side deck of a house.

The woman said she followed her son's gaze and saw an "adult male, naked with his genitals visible."

"I couldn't believe it then he jumped back behind

a wall when he saw me watching him."

The woman said her son looked at the man for approximately two minutes while she saw him for about 30 seconds

One week after she reported the incident to police, she said, a major renovation occurred at the home, and a gate and panels now block the deck from road-level view.

McKimm, who did not call any witnesses to the stand, argued the judge must find the accused guilty of committing an indecent act "done with the intent to insult or offend" in order to meet the criteria of the criminal code section with which his client was charged.

'Public nudity is a different charge," noted McKimm, indicating his client had done nothing to attract the attention of the passers-by

This is more consistent with an accidental exposure. . and then he took steps to screen the area" preventing it from occurring again.

Crown counsel Martha McNeely argued that due to the location, the time of day and the amount of noise being made by the passing family "it was no accident."

"He disrobed, went out . . . remained in that position while a child looked at him and only reacted when an In acquitting the man, Hubbard noted that the "state of

nudity is not sufficient of an indecent act." He also said he doubted the accused acted with an intent to insult the passers-by.



SPCA seizure of farm animals was 'descent into hell'-owner

"There was no warning - there was merely a descent into hell."

So Cara Clements describes the seizure of her and husband Kevin Clark's farm animals by the SPCA on December 13.

The animals seized from Quail Meadows Farm represented their livelihood, Clark said on Monday. The farm, combined with a feed pick-up and delivery service, brought in approximately \$1,800 a

Both deny the seized animals were starving although they concede some were underweight and the farm was in a financial squeeze.

We had some dead animals. I'm not going to deny that," Clark said. The animals were not buried because the couple do not have a backhoe and because they feared burying the carcasses would contaminate their water supply.

"We were also pretty damned depressed," Clements said. The dead animals were not their only problem. Their son had been taken into custody by Social Services and they'd received a foreclosure notice on the farm.

"We had some hard times we're guilty of that," Clark said.
"We had a whole pile of financial problems."

One goat died after her head was trapped under a corner of the barn and a dog died after getting hung up on an ornate footboard, they explained. Two sheep had also died and so had one of their ferrets. They lost 30 weaner pigs while away at a hearing over their son.

"Every farm has some sick animals," Clark said. He said the dogs disliked their food, which caused skin irritation.

"We were getting scraps for the pigs," Clements said. The dogs were fed meat scraps combined with oatmeal, barley and corn.

When the SPCA seized the animals, the couple were away delivering feed to a customer. They said there were bags of cat food in a closet, scrap meat for the dogs in the freezer and scrap food on their truck which they were bringing home for the pigs.

"The animals were not in sterling shape," Clements said. Nor, she admits, was the farm as wellkept as it had been in the past. "Try being depressed," she said. "Try losing your son. Is it a crime to be depressed?"

Initially they thought the SPCA was willing to work with them to resolve the issue. Now they have discovered it will cost them more than \$6,000 to redeem their animals - money which they do not

Clements sheds tears when talking about her missing dogs and the fate of the sows. Without their animals, they have little chance of keeping their farm.

They received no warnings before the animals were seized and maintain the SPCA broke two regulations governing the transport of animals. Doors and gates were left open after the seizure and the couple found it difficult to get information from the SPCA.

"Who guards this guardian?" Clements asked. "The SPCA is beholden to no one."

Clark maintains the SPCA stole their animals and caused the death of one of the goats. Both feel they are being penalized for poverty.

'Our chief problem is that, it's not very good to be poor on Salt Spring, is it?" Clements said.

"It's against the law to be poor anywhere - at least in this country," Clark added.

ANIMALS

animals were rescued, animal control officer Wolfgang Brunnwieser said, the four dogs went through 65 pounds of dog food. Each gained between five and seven pounds, he added.

All four are Komondor, an exotic herding breed from Hungary known for their long, white corded

A local dog groomer took on the job of bathing the dogs and clipping their coats to the skin. She said the neglected animals are just part of the issue. "The tragedy is not only the animals but that the family reached such a state without intervention or help from the community.

'It's the human condition that is scary. I believe that is the real tragedy of the story.

For Salt Spring SPCA president Pat Jacquest, the incident demonstrates the importance of an SPCA branch on the island.

"Nothing of this magnitude has ever taken place before on Salt Spring Island," noted Jacquest. In the past, the Salt Spring branch has dealt mostly with stray kittens and cats. "You put all your energy into cats and then you get hammered by something like this and you realize this is why the SPCA exists," she added.

The SPCA has collected evidence to present to crown counsel, who will determine if charges are laid. Very little information can be released by the SPCA on the incident because of possible charges, Jacquest said.

Meanwhile, she says it will be a challenge for the SPCA to cover the cost of caring for all the impounded animals. Costs as of last week exceeded \$6,000 and donations are being sought to pay the bills.

Residents worried by

Several car owners on Beddis Road were victims of vandals two weeks ago, but it wasn't the first

One resident blamed the snow plow at first but later decided the evidence pointed to vandalism as the reason her car window had been broken. She discovered the

damage after digging her vehicle out of the snow.

Another resident told the Driftwood the vandalism had been going on for three years and that cars parked on Beddis between Douglas and Rourke roads were the targets.

Three years ago an obscene note

was left on her car. On another occasion the antenna was broken. This time a window was smashed.

"We're quite scared," she said. "What are we going to do?"

In the latest rash of windowbreaking it has been estimated that as many as eight vehicles were targeted.

Emergency post-mortem planned this week

A post-mortem on how local emergency crews and volunteers handled the recent combination of heavy snow and flooding will be held Thursday afternoon.

Spring Provincial **Emergency Program coordinator** Chuck Hamilton said individual agencies will be holding their own in-house reviews of their operations during the snowfall and subsequent thaw before Thursday's joint meeting.

He noted that local resources were able to keep up with local demands. The only thing which had to be requested from the offisland Provincial Emergency Program was additional sandbags.

"It was extremely good. Everything went extremely well. he said Sunday.

Candidates sought for Parks & Rec

Interested in community recreation? Then the PRC wants you.

Salt Spring's Parks and Recreation Commission (PRC) is looking for volunteers willing to sit on the commission for one and two-year terms. Applications are invited until the end of January for the 10 positions which come open at the end of

The 11th member of the commission is Salt Spring regional director Kellie Booth.

Commission members are appointed by the Capital Regional District (CRD) board but the nominations taken to the CRD board will be determined through a community nominating process developed by the PRC in November 1995

Under that process, all applicants for places on the PRC are interviewed by representatives from 12 different community groups, who then vote on the applicants. Booth will be an exofficio member of the nominating committee but will not vote.

The nominating process was developed by the PRC in response to concerns that having one person - the regional direcor the PRC itself nominate commission members

Any commission members who want to sit on the PRC for another term will have to submit applications to the nominating committee, noted PRC administrator Tony Hume.

He hopes the call for applicants and the nomination process will produce a range of candi-

"I'd like to see as broad a cross-section as possible," he said.

To apply, people should submit either a resume or a written summary of their background and experience, mentioning anything relevant to serving on a recreation commission.

"Members are meant to represent the diverse interests of the community and they should have the wider interests of the com-

"Applicants should not be coming from any one perspective and only interested in one angle or one issue."

Commission members deal with PRC policy and projects and sometimes roll up their sleeves and pitch in to get a job done. Time spent on the commission varies from member to member. Hume estimates it can range upwards from eight hours

Applications must be in by the end of January and will be considered by the nominating committee in February. The next group of commission members should be appointed by mid-

A timely test

It has been said that southwestern British Columbia hasn't seen a storm like it for more than 75 years. It stands to reason, then, that conditions which come so infrequently will tax severely the services and amenities which we take for granted.

In a part of the world where the threat of a major earthquake has prompted extensive preparations, the emergency created by the storm of 1996 came at an ideal time. And it provided an ideal opportunity to test the emergency measures that have been put in place.

The final results of the test have not been tallied but at this point it is safe to say that locally we passed. We believe it is also safe to say that all the agencies involved did their best under the circumstances.

Take B.C. Hydro workers, for example, who put in double shifts of 16 hours on and eight hours off. Thanks to their efforts, many of the power outages which did occur were quickly fixed in most areas. Especially noteworthy was their quick action to re-route power to the north end of the island after a slide knocked out poles along North End Road on New Year's Eve.

By noon the following day, the majority of homes had power. By noon the next day, crews had restored the North End Road power line.

Helping the local staff in their struggle to keep the lights on were other Hydro workers brought in from Nanaimo, Vancouver and Williams Lake.

Islanders have been loud in their praise of B.C. Hydro and its facilities for keeping the power lines humming.

The same cannot be said, however, of reaction to the performance of highways maintenance crews. There has been some strong criticism of the speed — or the lack of it — with which roads were cleared on Salt Spring. There have been complaints over the priority given to different roads.

But the magnitude of the task faced by JJM Maintenance must be fully appreciated to be understood. The volume of snow, and the pace at which it came down, severely hampered the movement of even the most agile of four-wheel-drive vehicles.

Despite that, by Monday morning the island's main roads were easily negotiable by vehicles with good winter tires. Consider that it was at least 24 hours later before residents of Greater Victoria were able to get around on their roads.

JJM drew on outside assistance, hiring two local contractors and bringing in off-island help to deal with the mix of waist-deep snow, slides and washed-out roads. Perhaps they should have hired more contractors to help but at least they recognized the need early enough to have additional equipment on the roads by Sunday, when the bulk of the snow fell.

The crews couldn't be everywhere and their policy of clearing main roads first, followed by secondary and then residential roads, left many people trapped for days.

But overall, they did an outstanding job of cheerfully keeping the roads as open as possible at a time when many would probably prefer to have been cozily warm at home with their families.

It was, after all, the holiday season but these workers didn't enjoy much of a holiday.

Also due for kudos are all those who used their own equipment to clear roads and driveways which highways crews couldn't reach. Like the volunteers who helped with emergency services and their neighbours, they lightened the burden of the storm for many residents.

Given a major earthquake we might have some serious problems. But given another major snowstorm, we know we can handle it.

Bleak outlook

For Canada as a whole there are some bullish economic forecasts being bandied about by those in the know. The outlook for British Columbia isn't quite as positive but easier to swallow when examined from a national perspective.

However, the outlook for improved standards of governance within the corridors of federal power appears as glum as ever.

The issue of the government's litigation with former prime minister Brian Mulroney is not directly a matter of the nation's governance. But the people in charge of our affairs are also responsible for the past year's preparations to go to court.

A great deal of money and effort could have been saved had Ottawa ended this fiasco rather earlier. The apology could have been made months ago without jeopardizing the ongoing investigation into the allegations that Mulroney received bribes for seeing that Air Canada purchased the Airbus for its fleet.

In Ottawa, as usual, the outlook for good, sensible government remains bleak.



This is reflection time, when our New Year's resolutions take shape and faith in our capacity to consummate them fills our hearts with sweet anticipation of things to come.



It all began a few years back when I read somewhere that we in Canada are cursed with 60 lawyers for every engineer we have while Japan is blessed with 60 engineers to every lawyer they endure.

We have Brian Mulroney, Jean Chretien and the national debt to show for it. They have seamless prosperity and a quality of life unimaginably high, a remarkable feat considering that their islands are chock-a-block with people. This disparity in performance is explainable in terms of lawyers and engineers.

These make me salivate fiercely for a hiatus, a year of bliss, a "lawyer-less" year. My clever plan goes like this: since paying and suffering is worse than paying and not suffering, and since lawyers would never allow us not to pay and not to suffer, I suggest we pay the lawyers up front as much money as each extracted from society the preceding year and ship them out of the country for a whole year. For the year, the courtrooms will be manned by "ordinary Canadians." Plaintiffs and defendants would have to tell their own story, play their own blues or do their own lying. Those who would not do it themselves would have to postpone their trials—no harm done considering that lawyers keep the system jammed up causing courthouse lineups longer than a year.

The flood of benefits would inundate the entire

society. Try to imagine, if you can, the budget being balanced because tax lawyers would not advise and protect tax evaders; count in the savings from "refugee" cases decided on merit instead of being made in cash cows for appeal-after-

appeal lawyers; think of the non-lawyer politicians scrapping the antiquated and convoluted assembly of loopholes known as the Income Tax Act and replacing it with an honest tax law.

oil salesmen can lie like that and those with talent for the latter have joined the former after Dr. Fleming invented penicillin and botched the snake oil trade.

Unlike reality, dreams are unbounded. Do not tell the lawyers, but when they are gone we would pass a law banning the entry or re-entry of lawyers into that dreamland that Canada will be. Better yet, we may amend the constitution and enlarge the Charter of Rights and Freedoms to safeguard the right of humans to lead their lives free of lawyers.



Ferry objectives

In light of the increasing comments regarding the Fulford Harbour - Swartz Bay schedule, I feel it is important to let our customers and the communities we serve know how schedules are developed.

Schedule changes are the product of an open consultative process that relies on the feedback our communities give us. This schedule is no exception.

BC Ferries regularly monitors and evaluates all routes for opportunities to enhance customer satisfaction and improve financial performance. These evaluations take into account potential changes to schedules that improve the effectiveness of the service for passengers and achieve increased operational efficiencies.

While the old schedule expected our crews to work without a meal break during their shifts, the new schedule meets the British Columbia Employment Standards Act by including the meal breaks within the schedule. These trips take an additional ten minutes. The schedule not only achieves improved conditions for our crews and a significant reduction in operating costs, it also more closely meets the stated travel needs of our customers.

The schedule received a thorough review by our customers and stakeholders this fall. Over 200 comments and suggestions were received from various sources including Masters, crews and Salt Spring Island representatives of the Southern Gulf Islands Scheduling Committee. A number of service objectives were identified during this process.

I believe we have been able to implement a schedule that achieves the best balance between the identified objectives of: connectivity (to route one), on-time performance, morning outbound and afternoon inbound peak commuter trips, convenient commercial travel requirements and financial operating efficiency.

While we can expect new schedules to take some time to become routine as crews and customers adapt to the changes, I would like to take this opportunity to thank our crews for their efforts and our customers for their patience.

After the first snowfall the company presumably looked at its bottom line and decided to go with what equipment it had and wait it out despite ample warning there was more to come.

With all the logging and clearing equipment available on the island surely enough could have been hired before conditions worsened to keep all roads clear after each snowfall.





This newspaper is as good as the daily

VICTORIA — The old man stood at a street corner in down-town Victoria, selling some sort of tabloid newspaper.

I had just passed him when I observed a merchant approach the old man and berate him for what he called "obstructing business." I turned back, bought a copy of the paper and asked the merchant what he had against the old man.

"Nothing, but he has to learn that he can't obstruct business." By the time I had finished telling the merchant what I thought of his attitude, the old man had shuffled off.



The paper I had bought is called Red Zone. It is published by the Victoria Street Community Association. The Red Zone isn't your average newspaper. It doesn't cater to mainstream society, but I found its content at least as educating and enlightening as the latest issue of our daily newspaper.

The Red Zone is the voice of the poor, the disenfranchised and the street people. It gives hope and self-respect to people the merchant I mentioned above would rather see disappear.

On page four, there is a photograph of Blayne Helmer. The caption says Blayne used to be unemployed and on welfare, but had become one of the most successful Red Zone distributors.

"I'm not a panhandler, I'm a vendor," Blayne is quoted as say-

Blayne used to be homeless, but after selling the Red Zone for a month, he was able to rent an apartment. "People should give the Red Zone a try before they criticize," says Blayne.

I'd like to quote from another story in the Red Zone. Contributed by a woman identified only as Rose H., the story gives the reader a powerful insight into what it means to be poor.

She used to be on welfare, but upgraded her education and got a job. In December, after working for two years, she was fired. Merry Christmas and back on welfare.

"I hate thinking about Christmas and about what I cannot give my family (a husband, also unemployed, and a young son). It is even more difficult knowing that I should buy at least one special gift for my child who has the misfortune of having his birthday on Christmas Eve.

"Then there's the problem with school and its extra expenses. How do I escape that request for extra school fees for the Christmas concert, the class party, the Christmas craft fair? All the other kids are taking part, so where do I come up with this extra money?

"My questions are never about whether I should get the latest CD or the newest style of pants or a new pair of shoes, so he can be accepted by his peers.

"We are out actively looking for work, submitting at least three resumes every day, six days a week, while we're receiving welfare. We don't talk about the powerlessness and humiliation we feel. We know that even together, we cannot triumph over the almighty wrath of our government's actions and cutbacks."

Another contributor, Glenda Fleming, writes a poignant account of being inundated with flyers, advertising the most beautiful things for Christmas, only to be reminded of the reality of her life.

"What was I thinking? I don't even have enough for a \$2 present. I'm hoping that if I get a food hamper from the Christmas Bureau, I'll be able to arrange for a ride to pick it up. That hamper's food might be all my son and I have to eat.

"My heart dropped and I felt deep despair. I felt as if I was separated from the majority of people who were preparing to take part in the act of Christmas giving. No present to give, not even a card, not even supplies to make one ... what kind of person am I?"

She went to bed that night, crying herself to sleep. In the middle of the night, she awoke, with memories of a dream still fresh in her mind

"My dream reminded me that I give gifts all year round — a smile, a hug, kind words, a song, laughter, listening ears, helping hands, not only to my friends but strangers too. What kind of person am I? A kind person. The joy I felt inspired me to share my dream — a gift of goodwill."

It's been nearly a week and I can't help but think of the old man who was trying make an honest dollar by selling the Red Zone in downtown Victoria. He looked a little frail. I wonder how he made it through the worst blizzard to hit Victoria in decades.

I hope I see him again when I look for my next copy of the Red Zone.

A take-off on Elvis Presley, Birdie is a charming romp with many songs, dances and great lines which evoke the teen-age hysteria of the '50s.


The show runs two weeks from Thursdays through Saturdays starting February 19 with matinees and evening performances February 22 and March 2.







I maintain that all grandmothers should be granted a degree in psychology. After all, they invented the term. When my siblings and I balked at the unvarying diet of beans and peas my gran'ma solved the problem effortlessly by handing each of us a needle and thread and showing us how to string them into a necklace. We proudly wore them to school, nibbling and treating them as exotic delicacies. We established a trend and soon the entire school population followed - a lemon turned into a lemonade.

Back to the truffle. I take it out sometimes and look at it. I can't bring myself to eat it although it is becoming noticeably smaller. Perhaps I'll invest in a mate for it in the hope that they'll become fruitful and multiply.

Snow, floods, slides made it holiday week to remember

It was a holiday week few will forget. These were not times when one could get out to enjoy nature there were no walks on Bodega Ridge or climbs up Mount Galiano.

None ventured to Coon Bay on New Year's Day that we know of, all were too busy shovelling their way to the woodshed in order to keep the cookstove going. For those without generators and not on a gravity feed water system, melting snow for dish washing was the order of the day. It takes a lot of snow to make a pail of water!

The lack of water at the height of the storm was countered by the sudden meltdown experienced on New Year's Day, when areas usually free of puddles suddenly became lakes, and trickling streams became torrents

The main road from the ferry was threatened at Murchison Bay by the sudden rise of the creek which drains the north side of Mount Galiano and the valley below it. With the prospect of the backed-up waters washing out the road - Galiano's only passable thoroughfare from the ferry — a crew of volunteers from the South Galiano Fire Department sandbagged the road.

Porlier Pass Road was threatened as well. The waters from Shaw Creek, too great for the culvert, made their way down the shallow ditch on the landward side of the

road until they reached a private driveway, then cut across the road to the bay, causing erosion. In several other places, waters flowed across the road but caused no serious damage. In South Galiano, water covered a building site on Ellis Road.

Two heritage barns were damaged by the heavy snows. A section of the Macklin barn on Georgeson Bay Road built in the early 1900s received damage and the John Georgeson barn, built during the same period, completely collapsed.

A small slide occurred on Clanton Hill, partially covering the road with debris, and there were two slides at Saltery Bay.

Members of the Lions Club were out in force helping to pump three inches of water from the lower floor of a home on Morgan Road. The freezer at the Lions Park Centre temporarily became home for the contents of the householder's freezer.

One of the worst inconveniences of the storm, however, was the many power outages - there were at least four of them between December 17 and New Year's Eve at North Galiano. Many phones have been out as well, some for quite lengthy periods. Work crews have done their best to keep roads clear and services running smoothly.

House fires

Two house fires occurred in South Galiano during December, one with a loss of life.

On Boxing Day evening, South Galiano firemen were called to a rental cottage near Sturdies Bay. Forty-five seconds after his pager went, volunteer Ron Taylor was at the site, too late even then to save the back part of the building and its occupant. Dead is Yves Dumoulin, 44, known locally as Narcisse.

A bachelor from Montreal, Narcisse had been a resident here for about 10 years. He worked as a carpenter and handyman. Blackbearded and quiet by nature, he will be missed by his friends.

The other fire occurred earlier in the month at the home of Dan Persyko on Montague Road. He was out at the time of the fire. The building was completely destroyed. No cause for either fire is known at this time. Investigations are ongo-

Here's some simple post-Yule fare

After a holiday season of overly rich and sweet stuff, I'm starting out the New Year with a very old family recipe for a simple and sturdy pioneer-type

1/2 tsp. salt 1 tsp. soda 2 tsp. baking powder

Mix well and bake in two oiled loaf pans or one tube pan at 275 degrees F. for two hours.

Notice that this cake has no eggs, a boon for vegans. It is dense and heavy like most eggless

A vegetarian relative came for Christmas and asked me to help produce a truly light eggless cake. Is this possible? Is there a vegan or perhaps someone who remembers the years of egg rationing during the war years who can provide me with a recipe for a fluffy "cake mix" type cake without eggs? Any suggestions would be truly appreciated.

There was a mix-up in the December glazed nut wreath recipe that needs to be corrected. The printed recipe will work but an easier version that needs no candy thermometer is to cook 1 cup sugar, 1/4 cup corn syrup, 1/4 cup butter and 4 cups mixed nuts together until the nuts are caramel coloured. Then immediately turn out and shape.

Program offered for special constables


