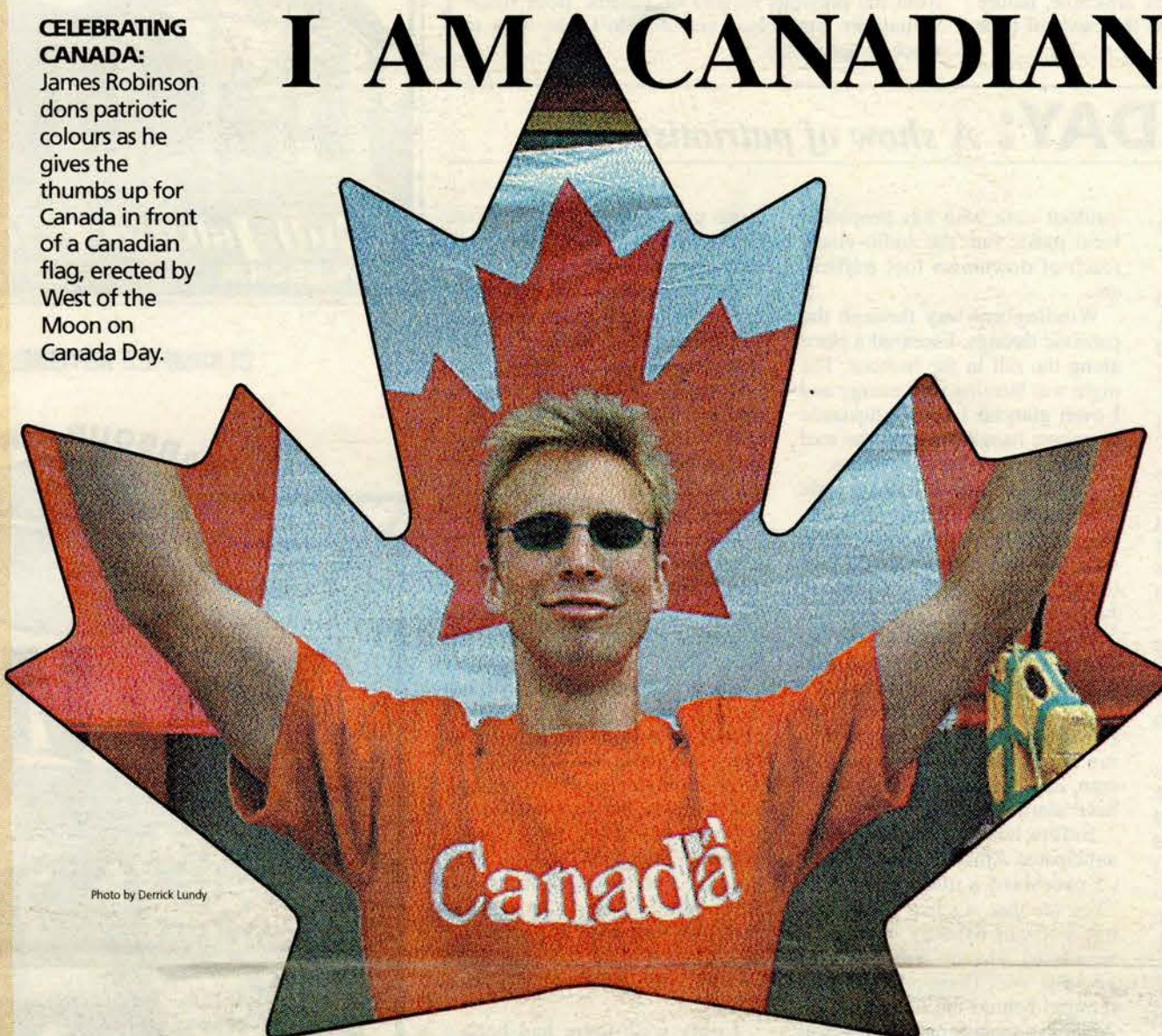

Worries coincide with watershed plan

Despite a flood of recent activity in
the community's dealings with
Texada Land Corporation, future log-
ging at Mount Maxwell is already
edging out the others for attention.

With harvesting on Mount Maxwell
scheduled to begin later this summer,
the community seems poised to join
others in the country zeroing in on
how to protect its most "pristine"
watershed lands.

According to Mike Larmour, North
Salt Spring Waterworks District
(NSSWD) manager, the waterworks
board has already agreed in principle

to a letter of intent which outlines
purchase of the 47.8-acre Lot 9 (next
to Maxwell Lake), covenants and
watershed logging practices promised
by Texada.

For someone like Gary Holman,
chairman of Salt Spring's Advisory
Planning Commission, the crux of the
question is: how will Maxwell-area
watershed logging differ from that
seen on Mount Tuam?

Holman is concerned any differ-
ence will be negligible and that
Maxwell will end up with the same
scale of clear-cut areas as Mount
Tuam.

He says it's crucial that Texada be

held to a "higher standard of logging
practices" on Maxwell. That means
pressuring the company to clarify and
stick to meaningful riparian buffer
zones, for example. Brent Kapler,
Texada's operations manager, said the
company is still working on the block
layout for Maxwell and "can't
address the specifics" of what and
how it will be logged.

He said any harvesting would
require the blessing of the NSSWD.

But even with that support, Texada
must deal with negative perceptions
about its Mount Tuam logging carry-

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Texada-CRD talks break down

Negotiations to acquire Texada Land Corporation property on Salt Spring have broken off between Capital Regional District (CRD) Parks and the land development company, the CRD said Tuesday.

Both sides have been negotiating for the CRD to purchase, with assistance from The Land Conservancy of B.C., some of an identified 1,000 hectares of property for potential park land.

Regional director Kellie Booth said that while the four months of negotiations were amicable, failure to agree on fair market value was the cause of their breakdown on Friday.

Booth said she was at a loss to explain why Texada values their lands at such a high price.

"While I continue to work towards this goal (of acquiring park lands) I cannot support the paying of significantly higher prices, in this case, two to five times higher, than independent appraisals commissioned by the district indicate the properties are worth," she said.

Booth compared the experience to the CRD purchase of a Mount Sullivan parcel late last summer from the previous owners of Texada. Both sides' valuations were close and it didn't take long to reach an agreement.

I only wish there had been a late-night taco stand at the Cusheon Lake crossroads run by a Montrealese chef.

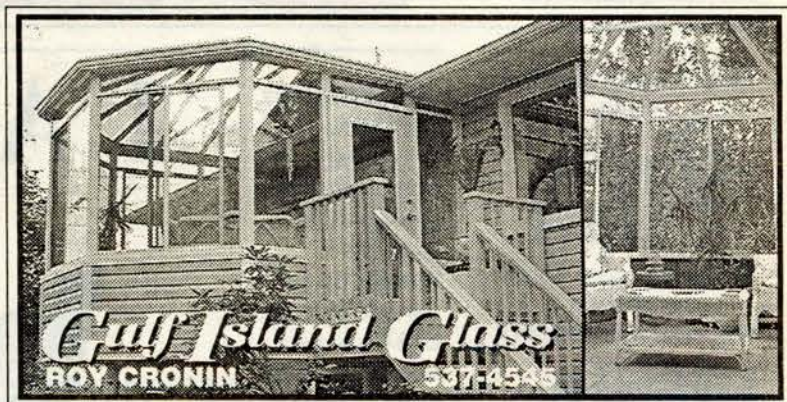

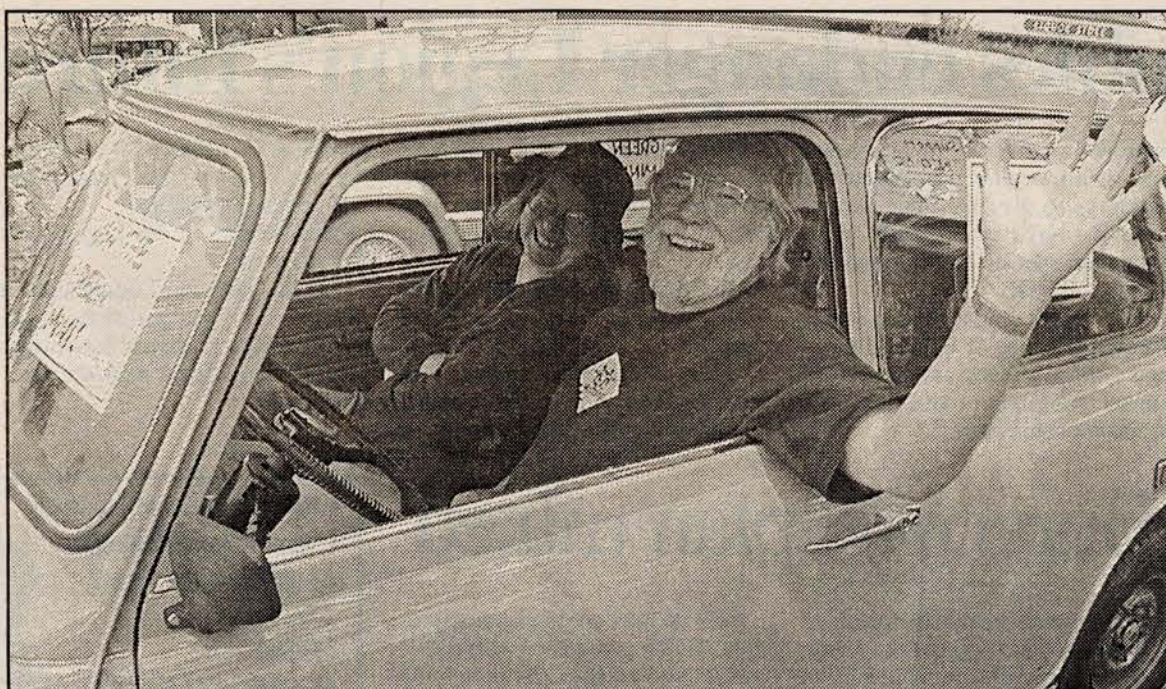
tune and trivia contests, treasure hunts and cape-building activities. A specially created magic wand is among prizes offered.

ing over to Maxwell. People such as forestry consultant Sally John have been comparing Texada's logging to its "code of principles" published last December. Twenty-metre protective setbacks with "no significant ground disturbance" were promised in the code.

"More recently," said John, "we've been told that Texada never intended to retain all timber in riparian strips, but that they would keep them 'machine free'."

During her latest check-in at blocks 50-51 Sunday, she found "riparian strips of 0 metres by any standards... with clear evidence of machine activity and considerable disturbance within the wetlands."

She also saw a flowing creek dammed by an active road with no culvert.

Kapler said Mount Maxwell logging would be different from that seen further south.

"On Mount Tuam there was nobody else that had any input into how we were logging up there so in that way it does differ. The monitoring by the (water-works) district is part of the agreement (with NSSWD)."

A large part of that agreement is the Lot 9 purchase for an as-yet-undisclosed price. Holman questions whether outright purchase is the best use of NSSWD funds since about three-quarters of the lot (all but 12 acres) falls within the official community plan's development permit area (DPA) #4.

He also wonders why receiving covenants on the rest of the watershed area needs to be tied to purchase of Lot 9.

The degree of protection provided by DPA #4 is a debatable point, however. Linda Adams, the Trust's regional planning coordinator, says landowners would need to apply for a permit to remove trees or do just about anything in that area.

Although she acknowledges ownership of an environmentally sensitive area is "the only ulti-

mate protection," she said "it would be unlikely a permit for much of anything would be granted considering that it is such a pristine watershed."

"The local Trust committee has the right to say it's a no-touch zone."

But Larmour does not feel a DPA can provide the desired level of protection for Maxwell Lake since regulations can change, be challenged in court, or have only as much conviction as the trustees in office at any given time.

"The only safe thing is ownership," Larmour said.

That is particularly true, he added, because a chunk of Lot 9 land next to the lake is in the Agricultural Land Reserve and zoned Watershed Agricultural. The NSSWD considers future potential agricultural land use more of a long-term risk to the water supply than logging.

So Larmour is satisfied with the proposed agreement. Being able to purchase Lot 9 fulfills a long-term desire of both the NSSWD and the island's Water Preservation Society (WPS).

"Tom Gossett (of the WPS) and I have been working on this for 20-25 years and unfortunately in the past, both with the government and the community, it was not a priority."

There is still no financial support from the provincial government, he added.

Larmour knows people will be acutely worried about what happens in the watershed, but he feels any problems would be "relatively short-term," meaning two to five years. The district could temporarily turn off the tap of a man-made diversion of Rippon Creek, and one proposed covenant also covers the whole creek.

His position is that "It's important for people to be concerned but not paranoid about it."

A possible roadblock to the whole plan is that purchase of Lot 9 needs approval of NSSWD ratepayers — who will be paying

for the borrowed money to make it happen — not the whole island. A counterpetition process will likely be used, where a referendum would be held only if five per cent of ratepayers signed a petition against the plan.

Some funds could also be received from the local water preservation society and The Land Conservancy of B.C. fund. Larmour said a letter has been sent requesting some conservancy money "with no conditions attached."

Before any deal is finalized, however, Holman feels there should be a public meeting on the whole Maxwell issue.

"I think there should be an opportunity for Texada and the water district to stand up and defend what they're doing, and for the public to provide them with some input."

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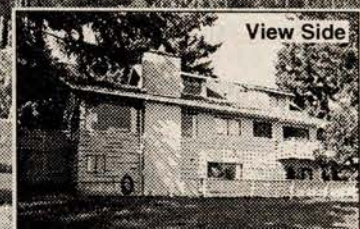
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Money troubles endanger Legion's future

The Salt Spring Branch of the Royal Canadian Legion is facing financial peril.

In an extraordinary resolution put forth at June's general meeting, it was reported that the Legion is failing to meet the expenses required to operate the branch and continues to operate in a revenue loss position.

The resolution — which calls for

liquidation of all Legion assets and sale of all Legion properties and buildings to dissolve their indebtedness — will be put forth at an upcoming special meeting planned for late summer.

"All members will be given a two-week notice of the meeting to make these decisions," said Tom David, member of the Legion's executive committee.

The financial situation comes as no surprise to David, who told the Driftwood that the Legion has been in financial trouble for some time.

He cited poor attendance and high overhead costs as the main culprits.

"One of our main pushes has been to get away from the drinking events and offer other things for

people who come to the Legion. We need events like Canada Day that will bring families."

Membership for the Legion runs \$31 per year.

"If you visit the Legion once a month, you'll get that money back with savings from the low prices we offer on food and drinks," David said.

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Reaction to Burgoyne plan mixed

Texada Land Corporation received a "mixed" response to its Burgoyne Bay proposal at an open house held last Thursday.

Company operations manager Brent Kapler said written comments collected seemed to reflect "mixed feelings."

Texada has requested public approval of a plan to subdivide six existing parcels of land into 25 waterfront lots averaging five acres along five kilometres of shoreline. An estimated 10 would have access by water only. Protection via registered covenant of 300-400 acres of Garry oak habitat would be part of the deal.

Because the land is in the Forest Land Reserve (FLR), approval of the Land Reserve Commission (LRC) is required for subdivision. Opinions of the public and the local Trust committee would be considered in that process.

Before it even gets that far, Texada is testing the waters of public perception to see if the journey to subdivision would cause nothing more than seasickness.

Julian Dunster, environmental planner with Texada, said at the open house the actual lot boundaries have not even been determined at this point since considerable cost is involved. If the proposal won't fly with the public, there's no point spending the money.

The plan is controversial because some islanders strongly feel Burgoyne Bay should be protected and not developed in any way. Consultant Greg McDade's recent report on a Gulf Islands national park pointed to the desirability of Burgoyne Bay being included in

the park if funds could be found.

Without LRC approval to subdivide, Texada can only sell the existing six large lots, explained company rep Jerry Bourdian at the open house.

What happens to the Garry oak meadows would then be up to individual land purchasers. They could also choose to covenant the Garry oak areas.

Some people feel that the local Trust committee's proposed development permit area (DPA) for protection of Garry oak habitat would take care of the Garry oak.

Linda Adams, Trust regional planning coordinator, said that while DPA conditions could not prohibit property owners from doing what zoning allows on their property — in this case building a single family dwelling — "We could conceivably say 'you should be building over here on that lot'."

New owners could also apply to the LRC for subdivision, she said.

Still, she noted, DPA protection "is only as good as people are willing to abide by it."

First draft of the DPA is almost complete, she said, but it will be some months before it could achieve final reading and Municipal Affairs approval.

Adams stressed that the local Trust committee cannot restrict "forest management activities" in FLR land.

Texada has also offered to put Lot 49, consisting of 160 acres on Mount Tuam, into the FLR to sweeten the decision-making pot for the LRC. Adding land to either the agricultural or forest reserves is considered desirable by the LRC.

Kapler said he expected there would be more community dialogue on the issue before any decisions are made.

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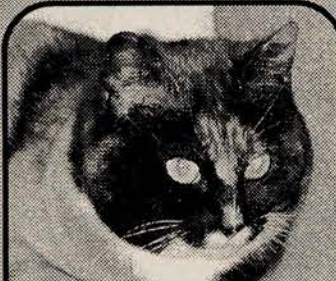


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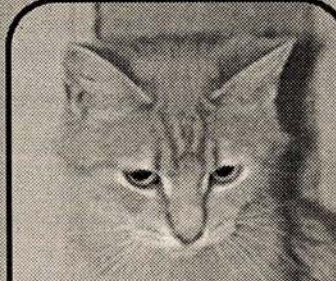
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Trust bylaw bounces Ganges to bottom of transmitter list

Ganges is at the "top of the list" for upgrading wireless communications, but may move to the bottom if the Islands Trust proceeds with a zoning bylaw amendment.

One of two British Columbia firms providing wireless communications services has identified the need for a new antenna in the Ganges area. But Telus Mobility would be prevented from installing a new antenna if the Salt Spring Trust Committee proceeds with its plan, announced last week, to ban such antennae from any zone on the island.

Rick Carlson of Telus Mobility told the Driftwood last week that upgrading services on Salt Spring is currently a priority for the company. But the \$1 million he has available will be spent elsewhere if an antenna site isn't available.

"I've got \$1 million to spend, but first I have to have a site," said Carlson, who is manager of construction operations and real estate.

Public opposition to cell-phone antennae has been strong since it was learned that Telus was considering installing a new antenna

in Ganges. Concerns are based on reports that radio frequency radiation could have adverse effects on health.

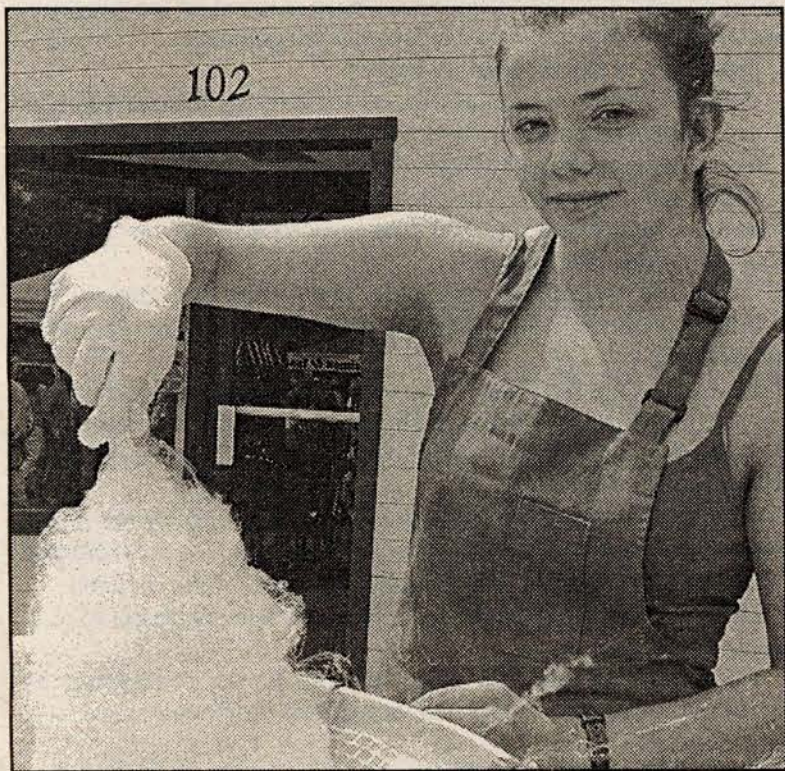
Carlson said Telus has only two antenna sites on Salt Spring, one on Mount Bruce and the other at Channel Ridge, and needs a third in the Ganges area.

The new antenna could also bring improved Internet access to the island, Carlson said. He explained that advances in wireless communications technology will soon enable Internet access speeds of 144 kilobits.

Carlson hopes to travel to Salt Spring next month to meet with Islands Trust representatives and discuss the issue.

Island Residents Opposed to Cell-phone Antennae (IROCA), a group which lobbied for changes to the land use bylaw, is glad that Ganges will sink to the bottom of Telus' priority list.

According to an IROCA press release, the group is "calling for a moratorium on transmitter installations until a regional committee is formed to make a complete analysis of available data concerning the adverse health effects associated with microwave radiation."

Trust gives bylaw officer job to CRD

If an Islands Trust bylaw enforcement officer comes knocking on island doors, he might be a familiar face if the Capital Regional District (CRD) officer has been on the doorstep before.

Last Wednesday the CRD approved an agreement to contract bylaw enforcement services to the Islands Trust on Salt Spring, North and South Pender, Galiano and Saturna islands initially for a period of six months beginning July 1, with an option for a series of one-year renewals.

The bylaw enforcement officer will be based on Salt Spring.

Wayne Quinn, the Trust's manager of local planning services, said the Trust expects contracting to the CRD will be more efficient than having one bylaw enforcement officer trying to cover the entire Trust area.

Quinn said it made sense to base bylaw enforcement on Salt Spring since about half the Trust area population resides there.

He noted the Trust would still deal with actual enforcement of bylaws, but that the CRD staff-person would investigate complaints.

The service will cost the Islands Trust \$62 per hour or portion of an hour of time spent by CRD Bylaw Enforcement, plus third-party expenses.

It's obviously our first initiative of this type and so we'll have to monitor it and see how efficient it will prove to be.

Nine Texada protesters face trial in September

Four days have been set aside in B.C. Supreme Court for the trial of nine people accused of contempt of court related to Texada Land Corporation's logging on Salt Spring.

Justice Allen Melvin ruled Friday that the individuals could be found guilty of either criminal or civil contempt of court, or not guilty at trials set to begin September 5.

Bob Gillen, regional Crown counsel, said the current situation was that all nine people would face trial that week.

When asked if that could change, Gillen said, I don't know.

On June 15 Texada was granted

its application to change initial charges from civil to criminal contempt of court.

At that time it appeared possible that criminal contempt charges may not apply to some of the accused.

Texada has a court injunction to stop people from interfering in its logging operations, which are carried out by Dorman Timber Ltd. of Vancouver Island.

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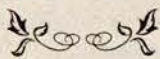

Trust makes a call



Faced with the perception that it can do nothing to help resolve the dispute over logging by Texada Land Corporation, the Salt Spring Trust Committee has found another cause it can champion.

Last week trustees David Borrowman and Bev Byron announced they were initiating a zoning bylaw change that would prohibit cell-phone antennae on the island.

This is in response to growing concern over the potential health risks of both cell phones themselves and the antennae that carry the signal.

The concerns are not new.

The subject has been studied for several years, but it appears that as yet no definitive conclusions have been reached on the danger of the radiation emitted by the phones and the antennae.

This is not to say there is no danger.

Further studies are called for, particularly by Health Canada, whose information on the subject is limited and a little dated.

But in the meantime the Trust should stick to its mandate.

As far as we know the Trust has no expertise in the field of radio frequency radiation, nor should it be expected to have any. Its mandate is to regulate land use.

It could be argued that cell-phone towers can be unsightly and that their presence is inappropriate given the Trust's preserve-and-protect goal.

But in this case the Trust is reacting to health worries and not the ugly appearance of an antenna, the locating of which, in the vicinity of high-voltage transmission lines, could hardly be described as detrimental to the view.

If Trust committee members are truly concerned about the health risks of cell antennae radiation they ought to join with local citizens in an effort to persuade federal authorities to do more research.

That's because there is more at stake here than the threat to public health.

Of equal concern to the Trust ought to be the dependence by many local businesses and individuals on wireless communications.

Many people rely on cell phones to do business. Before they abandon them they will want to be convinced, by sound scientific research, that their communications devices, and the signals they receive, do indeed pose a threat to their health.

antennae and phones as radar? Because mobile telephones are actually mini radio stations with the transmitter/receiver one inch from the operator's brain — a "nip here, a tuck" there and bingo — a new radio frequency is born.

The towers themselves are necessary to gather up your conversation and send it on to the person you are talking to/and or base-station if you are still out of detection and range. The

messages get sent along on an imaginary beam that used to be a telephone wire. Instead, radio signals are emitted in a huge shower — a circle — a cell. Just get out your Chinese checker boards and observe how the marks line up and you will have a pretty good idea how cell-phone companies are planning to

decorate the land. Many RFWW antennae are set up in triangles, 120 degrees in each direction. Look again at your checkerboard and see how the triangles "kaleidoscope" into cells.

In 1985, there were 900 antennae across the U.S. In 1999 there were 83,000. Now there are 200,000 going into California alone.

Science has noted the corresponding rise in unusual illnesses. Back during the Cold War, Russian scientists were well aware of what they called "radio wave sickness." Don't tell us there is no completed evidence.

You've probably heard that these antennae operate by "line of sight." At first this sounded to me like that imaginary telephone wire connecting to the other post (antennae) at the golf course. Not so. These things, once again, will be showering out waves in a circular pattern and if you

could see them, they would look like a pebble tossed in shallow calm water — the circle gets larger and larger. If something is in the way, such as a boat or a large rock, that is your interruption in the "line of sight."

One in two people is getting cancer these days, among other immune system dysfunctions. We just can't keep blaming it on the ozone layer depletion and poor-quality luncheon meats. At the turn of the century, it was one in 20, and they were usually well past middle age.

After I wrote how rats died out after five generations of "normal" exposure to RFWWs, many people sniggered at me and said "we're not rats." No. But generations of rats can be studied in a few short years. They have hearts, brains, blood and eyes, just like us. DNA is DNA. You do the math: in 1900, one in 20 get cancer. In 2000, it's one in two. There

are far too many sick people out there. It's not natural.

Remember when our beloved Princess of Wales died and we all asked "who will replace her?" No-one can replace her, but you can set your own good example.

Please write to your telephone company.

Please notify B.C. Hydro of your extreme concerns. Please write to every government body you can think of provincially and federally. Also, don't forget the opposition — without them there would be no game and ultimately no hope.

In reference to my war veteran lady who said, "Your Country Needs You!" enlisting nowadays only involves writing a few letters. I will gladly come to your home with a fax machine if need be.

given one childhood and every child has a birthright to experience unbridled youth.

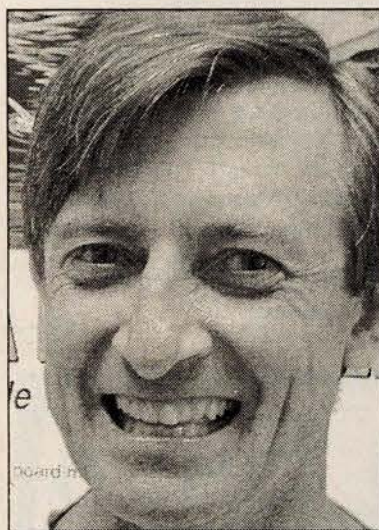

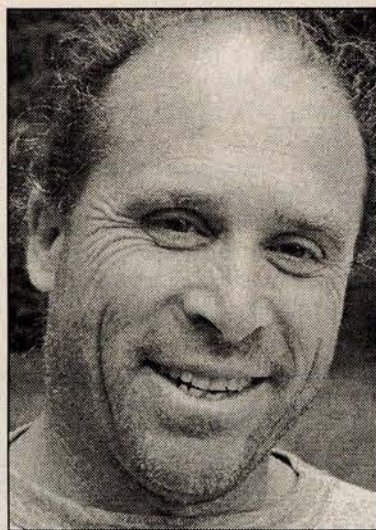

We asked: What is your water source and how do you feel about its quality?



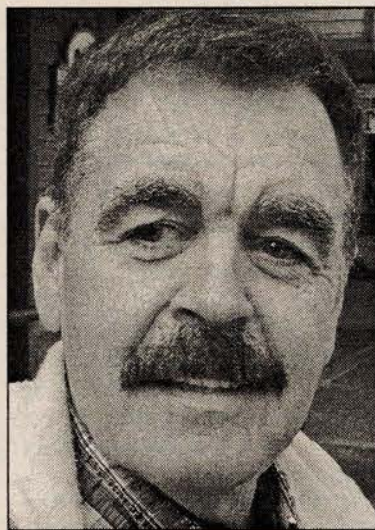

Our water source is a well. It's great — it keeps my garden going in the summer. It's cold and clean hard water.



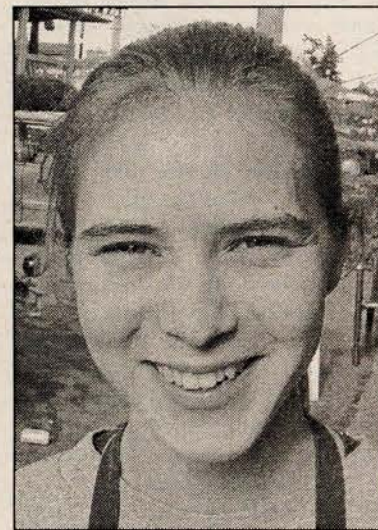

Watershed

The issue of water quality and protection has been highlighted by recent disasters in Ontario and by a number of health problems in B.C. related to drinking water.

B.C. is the only Canadian province with no ground water protection legislation. We should not only have laws ensuring safe drinking water but we also should have the right to compel investigation of polluters and the capacity to recover costs of remediation from them.

Clear-cutting in watersheds can have catastrophic, long-lasting impacts on water quality.

The forest cover protects streams and lakes from the deleterious effects of run-off with its load of decaying vegetable matter and other nutrients. Such run-off rapidly expands the growth of algae, the increase of nitrogen and the decrease of oxygen. Without oxygen, lakes die.

Maxwell Lake watershed is

under siege. This last and best source of our drinking water is threatened by the plans of Texada Land Corporation to engage in intensive logging, including clear-cutting, in the Maxwell Lake watershed.

Presently, we have no legal protection from clear-cutting on privately owned forest land and only a small portion of Maxwell Lake watershed is in a development permit area. Conservation covenants that outline the amount of allowable timber cut and that restrict agricultural and industrial use could and should be put in place.

Please write to the ministries of health and forests and the environment asking for immediate protection of watersheds and the introduction of legislation assessing fiscal liability for polluters of drinking water sources.

Trust meeting, logging practices, herons and antennae

I would like to correct your reporter on her statement Meeting spectator Roy MacMillan thanked trustees for showing honour and justice in responding to some of the constituents about their concerns with the LUB. That statement was made by someone else.

In fact, nothing could be further from the truth about my feelings and concerns about the performance of the Islands Trust.

I was at the June 22 Trust meeting for several other reasons. I had telephoned Bev Byron and pointed out to her that she was in error for assuming that anyone who was not in attendance at their previous meeting was obviously happy with the second draft of Bylaw #355 and advised her that I had not been in attendance and was not happy. I also suggested she reassess her methods of determining approval/disapproval of her constituents.

I felt that a visit was required to update myself on the present performance of our trustees. I had grave concerns about three issues which were on the agenda and wanted to hear for myself from the trustees, their views and plans for dealing with these issues. I was deeply disappointed to find that trustees may change but the

performance of the trustees has not significantly improved.

I told them that I had visited the site where Dorman Timber is logging for Texada Land Corporation



and was horrified to see what they had done to the site. In one area I saw a steep incline with no trees left right up to the shoreline of a lake and have no doubts as to where that soil will go with the first rainfall. It will slide into one of the lakes which is a source of fresh water for the island. It may be legal but it is morally wrong.

I do know that the federal government appointed a task force several years ago to study ways of improving our logging techniques and visited a site where selective logging had been successful for over 50 years in Ontario. The federal department of agriculture completely ignored it and came up with their own plan. I believe that the same has happened out west as well.

It is interesting to note that the six per cent of B.C. which is being logged surrounds the port

of Vancouver which serves the far East and the Pacific Rim. Whose interests are being served by shipping our subsidized raw lumber to other countries and then paying for finished goods from other countries from that same lumber? The big logging companies? Certainly not Canadians or B.C. residents.

I would suggest that the first priority is to insist from all of our governments, federal and provincial, the creation of laws governing sustainable logging practices. Salt Spring Island is a prime example of the difference between clear-cut logging versus Wave Hill Farm owner Mark Whittear's portable band saw mill method. He increases the value of the logs by three times by milling them into lumber instead of selling them as rough logs, and has a sustainable operation to boot.

Another example is horse logger Tonio Bachrach, who demonstrated the efficiency of horse logging with his two trained Belgian horses.

Single-tree selection protects water quality, enhances wildlife values and at the same time allows people to make a living over the long haul, biologist Karen Hudson stated. But the most important faction to convince is the loggers themselves because they stand to benefit the

biggest from employment opportunities.

Mechanization has become a standard practice for industrial logging in Canada. In fact, Canada is the most mechanized forest extraction country in the world and one industrial machine can easily take the jobs of five people. In B.C. there is one worker for 1,000 cubic metres of timber harvested, compared to three workers in the United States and five workers in California. Canada employs the smallest amount of people per cubic metre of wood harvested in the industrialized world, said Robin Anderson of the Salt Spring Island Conservancy.

We get the fewest jobs in the forest industry. It's ludicrous because I would argue Canada has the best forest coastal temperate rain forest left and we get nothing for it.

In conclusion, I doubt whether the Islands Trust will be effective in preventing Texada from doing business as usual. It appears that at this stage Texada will continue escalating the clear-cutting and has no intention of abandoning its present practices. Perhaps when the impact of loss in business and the escalation of bad publicity rises, Manulife Financial's executive board will have a change of heart.

I also stated my concerns regarding a pending application which would affect the McFadden Creek Heronry. What I did say was, Please be more proactive as opposed to being reactive.

The third issue was the proposed cellular dish which Telus plans to erect on an existing B.C. Hydro tower at King's Lane and Howell. I am in the so-called affected area as I live within 1,000 feet of the proposed dish. I have worked in the telecommunications industry for 45 years and retired from Bell Canada in 1991 and have heard experts from both sides discuss microwave and have no vested interests in Telus other than possibly being a client of a cellular phone at some time in the future. The only precaution I would take is to limit the amount of time I had that phone plugged into my ear.

In terms of priorities, I would be more concerned about nuclear waste, sewage waste, the emission of coal-fired furnaces, the erosion of the ozone layer, i.e. burning of trees, and the damage to our eco-system.

I would be more concerned with how we treat the earth. The air we breathe, the food we eat and how we treat our water.

For many years I worked in close proximity with various agencies, including welfare agencies, and certainly realize the needs of some less fortunate. I did not make the statements in my letter without speaking to many of these young people.

Several I talked to really had no proper perception of what it really was about, a few even said, "Well I was told" and what they were told they believed and just followed along.

One even said, "Hey man, I haven't got anything else better to do," so they are just following along like a bunch of sheep.

If they are so environmentally conscious then why are they not utilizing their time more constructively, like planting trees?

I as well as others have worked hard all our lives and do not like being taxed to death either, but we are all paying greatly to pay for many who are capable and healthy who choose not to work.

Even at a young age I found there are no free train rides in this world.

Perhaps B.C. should adopt the same welfare system as Hawaii. A single person with no dependents only gets one three-month shot. Families or single parents cannot own property, rent is paid directly to the landlord.

They get approximately \$35 in cash (for bus fare, etc.) and the balance is non-tradable coupons like travellers cheques.

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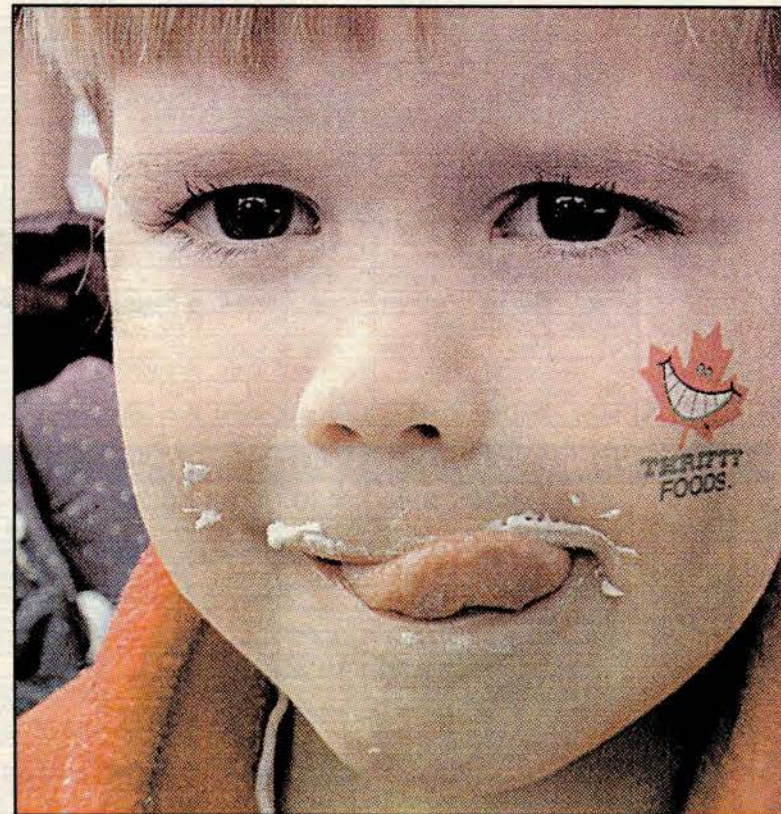
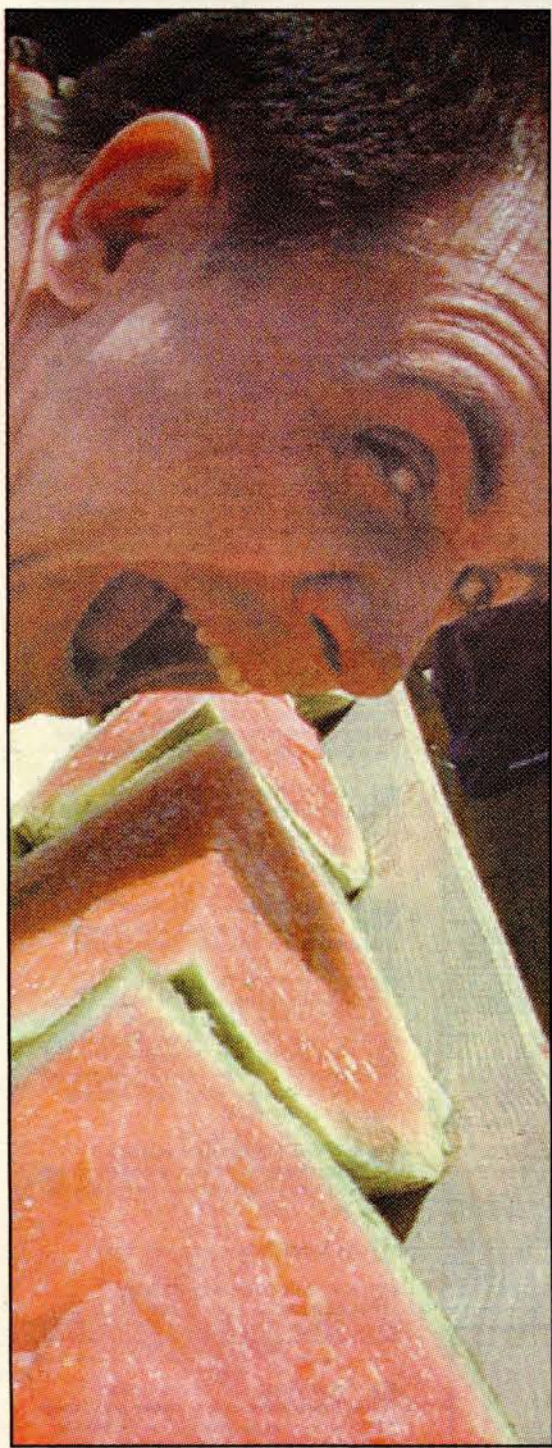

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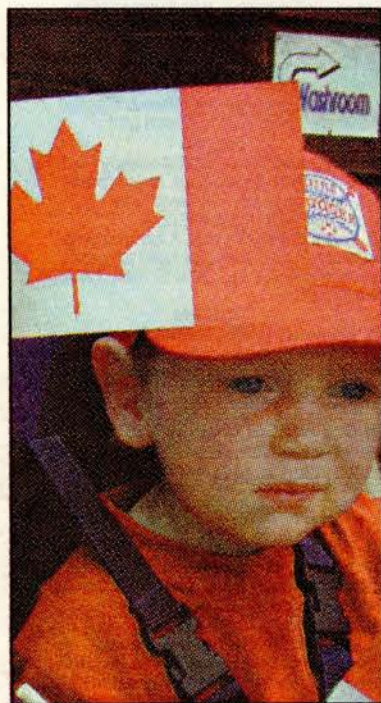

Sound at ArtSpring beamed through new infrared system

Infrared technology and three sleek headsets will bring the ArtSpring stage and people with hearing impairments closer together in future.

The Island Arts Centre Society has just installed the \$6,000 hearing enhancement system thanks to a grant from the Victoria Foundation and volunteer work of Marv Coulthard.

Sue Mouat, a Salt Spring resident and honorary governor of the foundation, was one of the first people to test the headsets on Friday. Instant reviews were extremely favourable.

Simon Henson has a different

prescription for hearing aids in both ears. He remarked on the good balance in sound coming through the headset.

Coulthard, who has 30 years of professional sound experience in the entertainment industry and now volunteers his lighting skills for community arts groups, installed the system.

He explained that the infrared signal would transfer from panels installed near the catwalk above the stage to receivers in the headsets.

Coulthard assured those at the demo that they weren't being "zapped" by anything harmful with the infrared system. He also noted that it has no capacity to record

performances.

Paul Gravett, ArtSpring's administrative assistant, said a protocol for issuing and cleaning the three headsets will soon be developed. Use will be free, with a driver's licence likely being requested as a security "deposit."

On the same general theme, society president Victoria Olchowecki said the board is looking for a grant to help fund an assessment of ArtSpring's acoustics.

Various individuals and groups have expressed dissatisfaction with sound quality in the facility since it opened in February of 1999.

Green office opens doors

The newly painted green, yellow and white Green Conscience Fund Office is preparing for an official opening in Ganges Saturday afternoon.

A joint project of the B.C. Green Party and the Green Party of Canada, the new fund will have three aims.

It will support the ongoing protest by assisting protesters with food and supplies; give legal support to people arrested for acts of civil disobedience, and provide education and up-to-date information to the community.

All donations, which can be made at the office in the former Just Imagine store space on Lower

Ganges Road next to the Tides Inn, will receive provincial and federal tax receipts.

Generous tax reductions provided by political party donations, as opposed to smaller benefits of charitable donations, is one reason for tying the protest against Texada Land Corporation's logging to the Green Party fund.

B.C. Green Party officials will be on hand for Saturday's opening, which is a potluck event. People are also invited to bring food donations for members of the peace camp, who have faced food shortages during the past few months.

Canada loses but Clare Rustad a winner

Canada may have lost the bronze medal against China 2-1 in its final game of the Gold Cup 2000, but Salt Spring's own Clare Rustad walked away a winner.

Called up out of her sleep less than three weeks ago to play with Canada's National Women's Team, 17-year old Rustad showed the world she could hold her own alongside the big-league players.

And it looks like coach Even Pellerud has every intention of keeping the six-foot-two-inch centre-mid-fielder on his squad.

"He (Pellerud) has his hands on the best 18 players in Canada and it looks like Clare is one of them," said her mother Nancy Macdonald. "As the newcomer, we expected her to sit on the bench, but he started her in most of the games."

Macdonald said the recently-hired Norwegian coach sat Clare down for a "tete a tete" talk on Sunday and plans to recommend her for further carding. After her performance in the PanAm games last year, Clare started receiving a monthly government stipend of \$500 as a carded athlete.

"Here's a kid who was last week sitting at home. Now she's playing with and against some of the biggest names in women's soccer," said her father Robert Rustad. "She's a team player. When you watch her, she knows where everyone is — where everyone should be — and that just kills the defense."

The Gold Cup battle for third place was an even match with both teams fighting hard to penetrate their opponent's defense. Jin Yan broke through 42 minutes into the game, scoring 1-0 for the Chinese team. A chance at a rebound goal near the end of the half was fouled up when Christine Sinclair shot wide of the goal leaving Canada empty-handed at half-time.

In the second half, Canada was hungry for a score and was satiated when fast-footed Charmaine Hooper scored a perfect penalty shot into the left corner an hour into the game. That was Hooper's seventh goal during the 14-day tournament.

Canada's Kristina Kiss helped to shut down the Chinese Captain Lui Ailing and the tireless Christine Latham wreaked havoc with China's well-organized defense throughout the game. Rustad played aggressively and kept the Chinese squad alert with some good tackles and step-overs. Canada continued to fight valiantly in the \$75,000 battle for third place, but a costly defense

error deep in goal-keeper territory handed Chinese Qui Haiyan an easy shot 73 minutes into the game, putting the score back in China's lap 2-1.

The last 17 minutes of the well-executed matched game saw Canada struggle unsuccessfully for a tie, losing a second time to the hard-hitting Chinese squad.

Canada finished up the Gold Cup in 4th place, with

three losses and two wins on their score card. Salt Spring's Clare Rustad started in three games and was put into play for four out of Canada's five games in the series.

"It's been really exciting to play with such an experienced lot of players," said an enthusiastic Rustad from her hotel room in the U.S. "When I actually got to step out on the field and play, it was incredible."

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LOGGING AT MAXWELL LAKE AND EXPECTED IMPACT ON WATER SUPPLY

MAXWELL LAKE HAS TWO WATERSHEDS:

1. The natural drainage basin around the lake, comprising about 296 acres of mostly forested land.
2. A drainage basin near Maxwell Lake, about 235 acres, that is diverted under licence into Maxwell Lake. The main stream is Rippon Creek.

Part of the land in the natural drainage basin around Maxwell Lake is owned by Texada Corporation. Most of this land is within 300 meters of the lake, where restrictions by the Islands Trust will not permit logging.

The Rippon Creek watershed is almost entirely within land owned by Texada Land Corporation, and it is expected that it will be logged.

There are three main impacts expected from logging in the Rippon Creek watershed.

1. **NUTRIENT ENRICHMENT OF RUNOFF WATER**
Undisturbed forest land represents a baseline for nutrient loss from land to the lake. Nutrients are constantly recycled from decomposing vegetation and are taken up and stored in living vegetation and trees. A layer of organic material on the forest floor acts as a filter and also slows down runoff, so overland flow, carrying nutrients and silt, is relatively low. Logging typically results in some nutrient runoff increase for a period of time, about 2-5 years. Maxwell Lake is considered very sensitive to the growth of algae and subsequent changes in water quality form nutrient enrichment. Excessive algae may also cause taste, odour and discoloration and may interfere with disinfection.
2. **TURBIDITY**
Turbidity in water is caused by suspended matter such as clay, silt or organic matter. Excessive turbidity is aesthetically unpleasant, clogs filters and interferes with disinfection.

Some increase in turbidity is likely to result from land disturbed by logging. Logging practices agreed to by Texada will reduce land disturbance and the small size of the watershed, the coarse texture of the soil and the very small likelihood of land slides further reduce the risk. Nevertheless, there will likely be some land disturbance during logging.

3. HYDROLOGY

The removal of large areas of trees can affect the pattern of runoff within the watershed. Wintertime runoff, particularly during storms, will likely be faster, and the streams may dry up faster in the dry time of year.

Water from the Rippon Creek watershed is normally diverted into Maxwell Lake to help fill the lake in dry years. The District will not divert Rippon Creek into Maxwell Lake for at least one year, unless it is satisfied that the water is consistently good. The District monitors Rippon Creek for turbidity, total and dissolved phosphorus and nitrate nitrogen.

The District and Texada have worked together to develop an agreement on logging practices in the Maxwell watershed areas. This offers a much better protection of the watershed during logging than do provincial regulations.

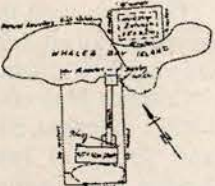

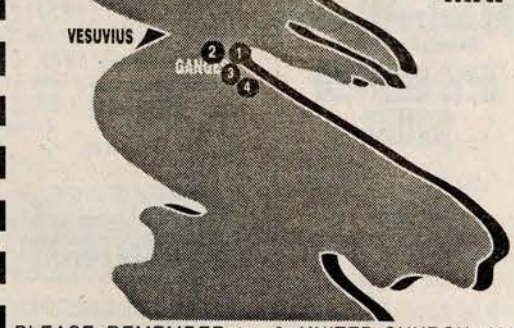
